
Enhanced system awaits completion of addressing

The long-awaited day of having a three-digit number to dial and reach emergency response personnel has finally arrived in Owyhee County as people throughout the area can now call 911 and reach an emergency response dispatcher.

Owyhee County Sheriff Gary Aman said last week that local phone companies are required through a federal regulation to route the emergency numbers to a dispatch center. He said people who use a cell phone, pay phone or a domestic phone in Owyhee County can all reach an Owyhee County dispatcher on the three digit emergency number.

"Right now all we have is the basic 911 service," Aman said last week. "All that means is that when you dial 911, the phone company will route the call on our seven digit lines so it goes right into the county's dispatch. We are still waiting on rural addressing to be able to complete the enhanced 911 system. Until that is done, we can not use the enhanced procedure."

Aman said his dispatchers are ready for the enhanced 911 system, but he is still waiting on rural - to page 4



Homedale service area has ended, and prices will drop to the same level as other areas, Intermountain gas has announced.

In September 1997, the Homedale "Adder" Project enabled the City of Homedale, as well as residents between Wilder and Homedale, to obtain natural gas. In the Homedale area, an extra \$.28184 per therm was added to regular residential and commercial customer gas price for a period of five years.

The additional temporary collection was necessary to cover the cost of extending the mainline from Wilder to Homedale, a distance of 4.8 miles. Homedale did not have the potential customer base necessary to otherwise support the cost of that main extension at regular prices.

Effective September 1, 2002, the Homedale Adder will end, and the benefits of natural gas will be available in Homedale at the same prices paid by IGC's other 230,000 customers. - to page 4

Prosecutor's recall petition dropped days before deadline

Misinformation from county clerk ends recall petition for Yarbrough

Due to information from the Owyhee County Clerk, a recall petition to remove Owyhee County Prosecuting Attorney Ed Yarbrough from his elected office has been dropped just days before the petition deadline.

Marsing resident and promoter of the recall Peggy Tallman said Tuesday that the petition had been dropped after she was informed by the county clerk,

Cindy Eaton, that the petition needed nearly twice as many signatures as she originally said was needed.

"The law says the number collected has to be the number of registered voters at the time the person was elected into office," Eaton said last week. "That would mean that they need 882 signatures which is the difference of 383 signatures then they originally planned for.

"I don't know what happened. It appears that the

original number was taken from the number of voters instead of the number of registered voters." Eaton said the group had not filed for an extension on Tuesday.

"Cindy called me and told me she had made a mistake on the number of signatures we needed for the petition," Tallman said Tuesday. "We have the 500 we thought we originally needed, but we now

Marsing School District plans another bond election

\$1.985 million needed for kitchen and classrooms

by Cheryl Peterson The Marsing School District would ask voters for nearly \$2 million in a bond election next month. The district says it needs the funds to add five classrooms and build a new kitchen facility. The election would be held Sept. 19 from 12 p.m. until 9 p.m.

The centerpiece project of the bond election is a free standing food service building. The district says there is evident need for the facility since the current kitchen is in "dire" need of extensive equipment replacement and remodeling to modernize the building.

The old lunchroom would be converted into a gym and provide the district with extra gym space.

The proposed kitchen and lunchroom would be a freestanding building located in the open ground between the elementary school and the high school. Use of the old kitchen would be eliminated and it would be turned into storage. The lunchroom would be fitted with gym carpet, basketball backboards, and would be utilized for elementary physical education and youth basketball programs.

The new lunchroom facility would be approximately 9,300 square foot and a stage would be included in the design.

The bond would also be used to add five new classrooms to the Blue Gym at the high school, while preserving over one half of the current floor space as an assembly area and wrestling room.

Two of the classrooms,


along with the assembly and and 2/3 approval rate to pass. wrestling area, would be located on the ground floor. Three classrooms and the storage area would be added to the second floor. The total square footage would be approximately 4,900.

The school board and the superintendent of the district said other projects planned with the bond would include repairing cracking outside building structure at the midhigh, replace HVAC (heating/cooling) units at the mid-high, replace carpet at the high school and place a drain field in the stadium parking lot to alleviate the flooding the occurs when it rains.

If approved, the total bond cost of \$1.985 million includes all construction, site development, furnishings, kitchen equipment, landscaping and several plant projects. The bond would amortize over 16 years or less, which the district said would ensure a competitive interest rate.

The new levy would increase a property owner's taxes by an estimated 14 cents per \$1,000 or taxable assessed market value. A \$95,000 Marsing home, including the homeowners' exemption, amounts to an additional cost of \$8.33 per year.

The bond requires a 66



A levy election held in February was defeated by voters when it received a 64 percent approval from those who cast ballots. Of the 420 votes cast in that election, 269 voted yes to the bond, but it was not enough to override the 151 who said no to the levy.

Voters most recently approved a \$2.65 million school bond in April, 1998 for multiple classroom additions to the elementary school, a multi-purpose/ physical education facility for the elementary and middle school and a new vocational agriculture shop.

In 1993, voters approved a \$1.65 million bond election for the purpose of refinancing outstanding bonds at a lower interest.

addressing.

"All of the normal seven digit numbers still work and will continue to work for some time," Aman said. "If you call Marsing Ambulance on its seven digit number, you will still reach Marsing Ambulance. It is the same for the fire departments, Homedale police and ambulance crews in the county. But now if you call 911 you will be routed to the dispatch center in the sheriff's office."

Owyhee County Dispatch Supervisor Sherry Olson said her dispatchers have completed the training required for a 911 emergency situation.

"All of our dispatchers have been through basic dispatch post academy and we only have a couple left who need to finish the advanced post academy,' Olson said Wednesday. "We are all emergency medical dispatcher certified which means we are certified to give instructions over the phone in an emergency situation. We have a protocol book that we follow to the letter. It explains every emergency situation you can imagine and we do not go away from the protocol book. We follow it completely."

Aman said he was unsure when the enhanced system would be complete. He said it all narrows down to when rural addressing is finished. -CP

investigation into the incident and suspended Tarter within one hour of receiving the report. He said an outside agency was asked to conduct the investigation due to a possible conflict of interest.

"It has been found that Tarter had been involved in numerous policy violations within the department," Aman said. "We accepted his resignation in lieu of termination after the allegations of misconduct were made and immediately began an investigation."

A special prosecutor from Canyon County has been prosecuting the case. Canyon County Special Prosecutor for Owyhee County John Christensen said Friday that Tarter would be arraigned on Monday, but details of the arraignment were unavailable at press time. He said because of the ages of the juveniles involved, Tarter was charged with sexual battery instead of lewd and lascivious conduct with a minor.

"It used to be that sexual abuse with children under 15 resulted in a L and L charge," Christensen explained. "But the legislature said that 16 and 17 year old minors were being left out. So this case is being prosecuted as a sexual battery with the language of L and L included in the complaint."

Christensen said Tarter could receive up to life in prison if the crime is proven as an L

and L case. He said Tarter could receive up to 15 years if the case is proven as sexual abuse.

Aman said the allegations of criminal conduct do not involve actions which occurred while Deputy Tarter was on duty as the DARE officer or the Marsing Resource Officer. He said his action is consistent with his department's requirement that all employees sign an oath of office and a notice of the law enforcement "Code of Ethics."

He stated, "I demand from our employees a higher standard of ethical conduct than that required of normal everyday professional employees. When it appears that the standard may have been violated, swift and sure action is necessary."

Troy Tarter began working for the Owyhee County Sheriff's office as a deputy sheriff on Feb. 7, 2000. In September 2001, he began working as the department's DARE officer. He taught the DARE program in schools in Bruneau, Grand View, Marsing and Homedale.

Tarter lives in the Nampa area with his wife Jana and two sons. Tarter and his family moved to Idaho from Spokane, Washington in 1991 so he could attend Boise State University.

He worked for the Canyon County Sheriff's office as a jail deputy for nine months and joined Owyhee County as its jail deputy in November 1999. -CP

"I want to thank the 500 people who have signed the petition to recall the attorney. prosecuting Everywhere we went we were greeted with the dissatisfaction performance. of his Unfortunately we were given the wrong information and the number of signatures needed just a few days before the petition was due. I think everyone in the county now realizes there is a problem in the prosecution of cases brought before the prosecuting attorney. I thank all those who

work so hard to make Owyhee County a safer place to live."


Tallman said she was disappointed in the outcome, but did not regret the action. She said if she has accomplished anything, she felt she accomplished letting the people of Owyhee County know what is happening in the prosecuting attorney's office.

"We had about 35 to 40 people who have been helping us collect signatures," Tallman continued. "We have people in every city from Bruneau/Grand View, Pleasant Valley and into Homedale and Marsing. 

Juvenile probation office offers alternative studies

by Cheryl Peterson The Owyhee County Juvenile Probation office isn't only a place for county children in trouble to report to as ordered by a judge, the local office is now also a place any child can go to improve studies, study for a GED or be sent to instead of being expelled from local schools.

Senior Juvenile Probation Officer Doris Jewett said her office offers many opportunities for children in the area to improve their educational skills before they get into trouble with the law and are forced to attend her classes.

"We have a class that meets every evening for kids who want to earn a GED, we have tutoring classes for kids who just need extra help and we also have an alternative to expelling a student," Jewett said. "When kids get into trouble at school, the schools are now working with the probation department to teach them in our office instead of just letting them be at home. Sometimes that is exactly what some kids want and this way they still get credit for the work they do here." Jewett said all the classes given by the probation office are funded through grants she has applied for. The Juvenile Justice Formula grant pays the cost of the GED classes offered. "We have all the books, pretest and the post test so students can do everything here," Jewett said. "We also give a practice test so if they are not ready to go to BSU and take the test we can help them prepare for the final test." After students pass the testing in Jewett's department, they go to Boise State

University and take the final test for a GED certificate. Each GED test taken at the college costs \$15.

The department also offers schools a place to send students who are expelled or suspended from public classrooms. Jewett said she has been working closely with the Homedale and Marsing School Districts to get the program running.

"They may be able to actually earn a credit until they can actually go back into the school," Jewett explained. "We will also be offering from an Idaho Communities Foundation by Curriculum grant in which we have bought drug and alcohol curriculum, anger management, gender specific programs, a boys program and a girls program, domestic violence programs. We have a lot of things that we can actually converge on now. We go into the schools help teach these kids as a whole instead of singling out anyone."

Currently Jewett has five employees working in the probation office. She has a part time secretary, a misdemeanor and restitution officer, a part time classroom coordinator, a contract facilitator and a part time juvenile tracker who also works for the Homedale School District. She said every employee on her payroll is also partially paid by grants. "We have just hired a misdemeanor probation officer to replace Peggy Dorman who moved out of the state," Jewett

said. "We hired Jeff Cole to a much larger office that we replace her. We are also hiring a new juvenile officer. He will take some of the cases that I am not going to be able to handle. I have some intense probation cases in the Bruneau/Grand View area and he will help her case load. We are growing. We started out with a small office near city hall and now we have

can hold classes in and meetings."

Jewett said she currently has approximately 70 children on probation. She said local students attended many of the tutoring classes she offered and she said she hopes the classrooms will get bigger this year.



134 years ago

August 8, 1868

ELECTION. - Day after to-morrow the General Election in this Territory takes place. From present indications it will be, in this part of the Territory at least, one of the most exciting and best contested elections ever held here. Politics seem to be almost entirely discarded-the fight being confined to matters of local interest. The two tickets - the People's endorsed by the Republican party, and the Democratic - seem to have about an equal number of supporters, but each appear to be confident of success. We have witnessed many closely contested elections and seen what was called electioneering, but we must confess that our ideas of the thing were very limited until the present canvass. As the time draws nearer the excitement grows higher, and the parties, to show their confidence in their respective strength, are wagering considerable sums of money on the result. To show sufficient interest to get a fair expression at the polls is perfectly right and proper, but it is to be hoped that no one will permit himself, or be permitted to go beyond the plain requirements of the law and of a citizen. Let each resolve to see equal justice, and nothing else, done and all will go of quietly.





Recall petition fails, but for the wrong reasons

It was learned last week that the petition drive to recall Owyhee County Prosecuting Attorney Ed Yarbrough was being dropped just days before the deadline. Until the information given last Wednesday that an additional 300 signatures were required, it looked as though the drive for a special election would be successful.

In Idaho, it's difficult to recall an elected official. It requires proof of

strong support, legitimate reasons, and more votes to oust the official than that official received when elected. And that is good.

But the events surrounding the failure of this particular case smells. To start with, the promoters were given erroneous information. They turned in the required papers with 20 signatures, and the petitioners were given the go-ahead to gather signatures by County Clerk Cyndi Eaton. Several weeks later the clerk informed the group they had to start over gathering names. They did. They were advised by the clerk they needed 499 signa-

tures to call for a special election. The figure was based on twenty percent of the voters in the last election, the amount of names the clerk confirmed was needed to call for an election.

The drive progressed, and the 500 signatures were gathered. It appeared the election would be held.

Then, just three days before the deadline, the subject of the recall, Prosecutor Yarbrough, informed the clerk she was wrong, and that the number of signatures required was not 499, but 882. The number is to be based on the registered voters at the time the official was elected, not the number of voters in the last election.

And he's correct.

But what really smells is the timing. Why did Yarbrough, the legal advisor to the county, wait until he was confident the correct information would kill the petition drive before he advised the clerk of the legal requirements? The answer needs no explanation.

I hadn't signed the petition. But should someone start a new petition drive to recall the prosecutor for his act of misfeasance in this instance alone, I'd sign it without hesitation.



Rein in the DEQ - Please

shut down. Most municipal waste systems won't pass muster and some gas stations could exceed the standards. Granted, some operators could do a better job managing waste. But to attempt to regulate and fine them out of business rather than working to solve problems is a vindictive and lazy strategy. Dust is another big concern. Southern Idaho is a windy place. Dust from farms, construction sites, rangeland and other places cause road closures and other problems. Farmers aren't indifferent about watching their topsoil blow away. If irrigation water is available they turn it on. But there aren't many other options. Fining landowners, which DEO attempted to do in Bonneville County last spring, won't make the wind stop blowing. In addition, DEQ is woefully behind on processing permit applications. Just last week north Idaho grass seed farmers were prohibited from residue burning because DEQ's new standards, that were supposed to be finalized by August 1, weren't ready. The farmers had permission from all four of the other agencies involved and weather conditions were favorable. Time is money and those farmers only have a short window to burn the residue. As each day passes those farmers are paying for DEQ's inability to perform. There are dozens of other examples of DEQ either not doing its job, or overstepping its authority and the agriculture community is becoming very concerned about this agency. It appears that DEQ is attempting to carve out a niche for itself at agriculture's expense. We certainly support all that goes with a clean, healthy environment. But we don't think fining landowners for so-called violations they have no control over will accomplish that.

Remember back a few short years when Idaho's Department of Environmental Quality was still a division? And remember the arguments surrounding the proposal to elevate DEQ to department status?

Farm Bureau and other conservative voices in Idaho argued the change would create an unnecessary bureaucracy. And that elevating DEQ to a department would create more costly regulations, putting more limits on private property rights. The other side argued DEQ was toothless and unable to enforce and regulate without full department status.

As it turns out, both sides were mostly right.

It should be clear that Farm Bureau supports clean air and water and all of the other environmental qualities that make Idaho special. What we

don't like are entrenched state bureaucrats dragging their feet on dozens of permit applications and using make-em-up-as-we-go environmental regulations to threaten and fine farmers and ranchers.

Since June of 2000, when the division was elevated to a department, DEQ has added 37 new employees for a total of 431 and the budget has increased from \$36.6 million to \$39.5 million.

Regarding overzealous regulating, if the recently proposed odor regulations for dairies and feedlots are approved, most livestock operations will be

Summary Judgement

Bush: nine former presidents wrong; Clinton right!

In 1872, Congress enacted the General Mining Law, allowing miners to enter onto federal land, locate valuable mineral deposits, and then develop those minerals. Once claims were staked, they were inviolate against all others, except the United States, which could challenge their validity at any time. Miners had to perform annual assessment work or else the land was open to relocation by rival claimants as if no prior claim existed. However, if the original claimant resumed work before such relocation, the claim was preserved. Often called the†"resumption doctrine," this is the "statutory right to resume work."

While the "right to resume work" protected claims against rival miners, did it apply to the United States? In 1930, the United States told the U.S.

Supreme Court that it did not: claims were forfeited if a miner failed to perform assessment work, even if the miner resumed work before a challenge by the United States. The Supreme Court unanimously rejected that argument, emphasizing:†"[I]t isÖclear that [a miner] maintains his claim...by a resumption of work.... Such resumption does not restore a lost estate; it preserves an existing estate." Thereafter, the United States challenged claims for lack of assessment work only during a lapse in the work; but the Supreme Court later rejected that too, ruling that there was no authority for it. In 1970, the Supreme Court backtracked



slightly: the United States did have that authority. But the Supreme Court left its 1930 ruling standing: a miner maintained his claim if he resumed work before the United States challenged his claims.

Not surprisingly, given the frequent and consistent rulings of the Supreme Court affirming the rights of a miner to "preserve[] an existing [claim]" by resuming†assessment work, the United States took the view, from 1930 on, that claims were invalid only if the United States instituted its challenge during a lapse in assessment work. Then in 1993, in Clinton's first year, the United States reversed 63 years of official policy and rejected the rulings of the Supreme Court: the statutory right to resume work was dead; in its place was a regulation that automatically voided claims upon a lapse in assessment work.

Meanwhile, in 1917, four oil shale claims were located on 520 acres in Uintah County, Utah. In March 1989, the owner of the claims, Cliffs Synfuel Corporation, filed an application for title (patent) to those claims. In October 1992, the United States said Cliffs had complied with federal law and was entitled to a certificate ending its duty to perform assessment work. But in 1996, the United States declared the claims null and void because, during the 75 years the claims were held, there had been a lapse in assessment work, which the United States had never challenged. A federal district court reinstated the claims, holding, "the Supreme Court knows how to say a statute is invalid;" because it did not declare the statutory right to resume work invalid, that provision was still alive! The Bush Administration appealed the decision to the Tenth Circuit. On May 6,†2002, lawyers from Bush's Justice Department argued that 63 years of†interpreting the mining law were irrelevant and the Supreme Court's decisions, which had bound the federal government for nine presidencies, were wrong. A†three judge panel, deferring to the federal government's expertise, agreed: the claims were null and void. Cliffs asked the entire Tenth Circuit to rehear the case[†] and will petition the Supreme Court if the Tenth Circuit fails to rectify its error. †President Bush reportedly is seeking to restore stability and steadfastness to a†Justice Department that had a reputation, during Clinton's years, for scandal and†schizophrenia. But which is worthy of Bush's embrace: three Supreme Court†rulings and the official policy of nine presidents spanning more than six decades, †or a dubious regulation adopted because of the anti-mining zealotry of William Jefferson Clinton? Sadly, Bush chose the latter.

Accuracy in media

Stinking coverage of Pew Poll

On August 4, the Pew Research Center released the results of a survey of 1,365 adults conducted in the last two weeks of July. It found that the public's opinion of the news media has fallen sharply from the levels attained in November in the wake of the media's excellent coverage of 9/11. The Center's press release said, "As the media's focus has shifted away from terrorism, Americans regard news organizations with the same degree of skepticism as they did in the 1990s."

For anyone interested in accuracy, the most shocking finding was that 56 percent of those surveyed said the media usually report inaccurately, and only 35 percent thought the media usually get the facts straight. What was even worse was that two-thirds of those polled said that the media try to cover up their mistakes, and slightly less than a quarter believed they were willing to admit their errors. These numbers closely tracked those opinions about bias, with 59 percent saying the media are politically biased and only 26 percent saying they were careful to avoid bias.

Numbers like these should have been very disturbing to editors and producers around the country. They are in a business that claims to provide its customers with reliable, accurate information. When a survey finds that only a little over a third of the public believe they usually get the facts straight and two-thirds of the consumers of their product think that they try to cover up any mistakes, an alarm should go off in newsrooms around the country. Meetings should be called to discuss what they were doing wrong and to figure out what they might do to correct it.

But if the publishers and editors relied on news sources such as the Associated Press, the New York Times, the Washington Post and Los Angeles Times news services for their information, they would not even have learned about these disturbing numbers. The AP and the L.A. Times reported that six out often of those polled said the news media were biased, but they said nothing about the large number of those who thought they were inaccurate and tried to cover up their errors.

Refusing to report those embarrassing numbers is one way of being inaccurate-omitting information that many consumers of the news would consider quite important. The editors and producers don't suppress it because they think that it would be of little interest to anyone. They omit it because it is embarrassing to them and they fear its publication might be damaging to their business. They might argue that the public's perception of the accuracy of their reporting and their handling of mistakes is so far off base that it doesn't merit mention.

None of these excuses are sound, ethical reasons for a news provider to withhold information from the public. The media devote a lot of resources to sampling public opinion. The polls they take to predict the outcome of elections are frequently wrong, but they don't refuse to report them because of that. Their decision not to report the Pew findings that were most unfavorable to them was a mistake, and it is a mistake that they will neither admit nor correct. This adds to the evidence that has caused so many people to say they tend to be inaccurate and to cover up their mistakes. The Washington Times, which is looked down upon by the

establishment media, published a good story about the survey, giving the numbers the others could not bring themselves to mention.

The Washington Post recently published a good article by Prof. Amitai Etzioni, who exposed the failure of the graduate schools of business to teach their students ethics. He showed that the education they got at Harvard and other respected business schools diminished rather than increased their respect for ethics, citing a study that found that the students in 13 top business schools had less respect for ethics at the end of their first year than they had when they entered the program.

A similar study of the role ethics plays in the training of journalists is needed. What is needed in journalists is a burning desire to get the truth and a willingness to make corrections if they get it wrong. Too many journalists tend to accept without question what they are told by "authorities." That is a lot easier than studying the evidence and coming up with information that challenges what the authorities say. Not one major news organization has reported the evidence that disproves the scientifically absurd CIA video that "proved" that the crash of TWA Flight 800 was initiated by a fuel-tank explosion.



Shore-Side meals for fresh fish

Dear Betty,

My family likes to picnic near our favorite fishing spots. What are some good ways to cook our catch? What other foods could I bring along to eat with our fish dinner?

McMinnville, Tenn.

What fun! Fish never tastes better than when it's fresh from the lake, river or stream. Frying fresh fish in a light, crisp batter complements its taste and texture. Here's one of my favorite batters for pan fish:

Pour about 1 1/2 inches of vegetable oil into a heavy skillet and heat.

Lightly coat a pound of fish fillets with 3 to 4 tablespoons of Bisquick.

Mix together 1 cup Bisquick, 1/2 cup of beer, 1 egg and 1/2 teaspoon salt until smooth. If the batter's too thick, add a little more beer until it's the right consistency for dipping. (The alcohol in the beer cooks off as the fish fries, leaving just the flavor.)

Dip the fillets in the batter, letting the excess drip into the bowl.

Then fry the fish in the hot oil about 2 minutes on each side or until golden brown.

Remove from the pan and place on a plate lined with layers of paper towel to absorb excess oil.

Round out your shore-side meal with:

Your favorite cole slaw. Or toss a mixed green salad with sweet red onions, chunks of steamed red potatoes and honey-mustard dressing. (Tip: Cook the potatoes at home.)

Sliced tomatoes, wedges of cucumbers and chopped onions in a vinaigrette dressing.

A grilled veggie mix such as zucchini, onions, green peppers and mushrooms.

Thinly sliced potatoes and onions, along with butter, salt and pepper; wrapped in foil and grilled.

How should I freeze the fish my kids catch? Rayne, La.

Here are two easy ways to freeze fish fillets:

1. Wrap the fish tightly in plastic wrap, put it in a zipper freezer bag and remove all the air.

2. Put the fillets in a zipper freezer bag and fill it with water, making sure there's no air left in the bag before sealing. Lay the bag in a pan in your freezer until the water


