2002 –

The year in review

by Cheryl Peterson Beeson Like most years in Owyhee County, 2002 was not without change and controversy. The City of Marsing lost

one of its leaders to cancer, but replaced the position with a well-known face in

a showdown for the job.

The City of Homedale faced its own challenges this last year with the arrest of a councilman, a one million dollar tort claim filed against the city and continued a debate concerning what to do with the local airport and a hazardous waste spill.

The county also faced legal obstacles with a recall petition for its prosecuting attorney, the arrest of his now former wife and the sexual assault allegations of one of law enforcement's own officers.

Residents continued to wonder when Enhanced 911 would be in operation in the county. Rural addressing continued to hit snags and an early 2002 projected date of completion came and went.

The Bureau of Land Management continued to make headlines in 2002 as rangers were outfitted with weapons. Commissioners Hal Tolmie, Chris Salove and Dick Reynolds joined Owyhee County Sheriff Gary Aman in sending a message to Interior Secretary Gale Norton stating Owyhee County would not tolerate "BLM cops" without being notified in advance of their activities.


Environmental extremist Jon Marvel filed yet another lawsuit on the BLM stopping the reseeding of a fire-ravaged 35,000 acres in the Jordan Creek and Jacks Butte area in early January.

BLM issues continued through the year with commissioners and law enforcement in the county saying no to "BLM cops" in January. Commissioners stated in a letter to BLM that Aman "has made it perfectly clear to BLM personnel in Idaho that it is his constitutional and statutory duty to enforce the law, and that their enforcement work must channel through him and with his approval."

Marsing trustees asked school district voters to approve yet another levy in February. The \$1.7 million levy was shot down in early February by voters but was approved later in the year. The bond will add a new freestanding kitchen and lunchroom and add five classrooms to the high school.

Homedale Councilman, and former city police commissioner, David


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



Six arrested for local car thefts

Sheriff's deputies from restored 1969 Chevrolet Canyon and Owyhee counties arrested six men Tuesday on suspicion of stealing at least two vehicles. Canyon County authorities said the men are suspects in the theft and sale of one vehicle in Canyon County and another in Owyhee County.

Owyhee County Sheriff Gary Aman said the arrest is the beginning of breaking up a car theft ring. He said charges would be pending upon a continuing investigation.

One of the vehicles, a Notus, aiding and abetting

Corvette, has been recovered, officials said. The Corvette is owned by Ben and Lori Badiola of Homedale and was stolen in October. The Badiolas also had a 1956 red Chevy pickup stripped at the same time their Corvette was stolen. Five of the suspects were booked into the Canyon County Jail on various charges:



Freelove may like to forget the 2002-year. Freelove had plenty of troubles beginning with a fire that destroyed his home, an arrest for driving under the influence of alcohol, a \$1 million tort claim filed against the city due to a report of juveniles drinking made by Freelove and his subsequent resignation as city police commissioner. Freelove will stand trial on the DUI charge later this month.

The Owyhee County Commissioners finally signed the comprehensive plan in February, which would later come back into review in December when P and Z commissioners requested amendments to the plan. Ranchers from around the county attended the public hearing on the amendments stating a concern for private property rights. A decision to the amendment is planned for later this month.

The City of Marsing grieved after the loss of its two-term mayor, Jenny Haken. Haken died in late February of cancer and asked the people of the city to pull together just hours before her death.

Former Marsing councilwoman Faye Pfrimmer was appointed to fill the mayor's position after a weeklong deadlock with the council over who would be appointed. Pfrimmer will be required to run for the seat

during the next general election, or step down and a new mayor will be voted in.

In April farmers, ranchers and irrigators worried about depleting water supplies in yet another drought stricken year. Low reservoir levels kept water supplies at a minimum, but irrigators were able to supply the county through the season, unlike most surrounding counties.

In the primaries, Commissioner Chairman Hal Tolmie had his seat contested by Fair Board Chairman Bill Watterson. Watterson lost to Tolmie in May by 156 votes putting Tolmie back in the commissioner's seat for another term. Tolmie was later again appointed as chairman of the commission.

Maureen Cassidy Yarbrough, former wife of county prosecuting attorney Ed Yarbrough, was arrested by the Owyhee County Sheriff's Office in April following a two county pursuit ending near Walter's Ferry Bridge. Cassidy was charged with three felonies including possession of a controlled substance and eluding officers. The Attorney General's Office was asked to prosecute the case due to an obvious conflict of interest. Later in 2002 she pleaded guilty to one felony and two misdemeanor charges and will be sentenced this month.

May began a several month disagreement between the Owyhee County Fair Board and the local rodeo board over disclosure of rodeo board records and who had control of the rodeo grounds. The back and forth arguing went on right up to the opening of the annual fair when the rodeo board agreed to sign a contract to use the rodeo grounds. The county commissioners have said they will review appointments to the fair board in January and may, or may not, make reappointments as several of the board members' terms are expired.

Only days after a successful LeRoy Breshears Fishing Day in Marsing, coordinated by the county's Dare officer, the sheriff's office announced the forced resignation of Dare Officer Troy Tarter on allegations of misconduct. Tarter was later arrested and charged by a special prosecuting attorney from Canyon County with sexual battery of two local teens. Tarter will also stand trial later this month.

Long time rancher Mike Hanley was granted a stay from the United States Department of the Interior in his grazing issues with the BLM and environmentalist groups in June. Hanley said he sees the decision as a victory and that it could mean that he may have the opportunity to tell his story to a judge.

"The judge found that severe irreparable harm would be

done to our ranch operation if this plan was carried out. That means every one of us, all 68 of us," Hanley responded.

The city of Homedale issued a warning to water users of an impending shortage as the drought throughout the state continued in the summer of 2002.

The city was in the process of putting a larger well online from the Canyon County side of the river, but a loss of power to the city's then running well caused concern and a warning from city officials.

Loud cars, fireworks and a parachutist delighted those attending Homedale's 20th annual Lion's Club Demolition Derby. A record number of 40 drivers signed up for the yearly competition and rammed each other until the end in front of a sold out stadium.

A sign of changing times showed itself with the temporary closure of the Silver City road for paving. An additional two miles of pavement was added to the gravel road making travel much easier.

In August, a petition that had nearly enough signatures to file for a recall election of Prosecuting Attorney Ed Yarbrough, was dropped only days before the deadline. Petition promoter Peggy Tallman stated that due to information received from the

Owyhee County Clerk's Office, nearly twice as many signatures were required forcing the Marsing resident to drop the effort.

In September, as the nation remembered the thousands of people who died during what is called the worst attack on the United States by a terrorist group, local schools and government agencies held their own remembrance ceremonies. Local law, emergency response and volunteer aid groups were honored in many different events throughout Sept. 11.

Homedale Mayor Harold Puri said in September that appointed police commissioner and elected councilman David Freelove would not have his police commissioner status removed by the council after he was arrested for driving under the influence. Freelove later resigned the position.

The City of Homedale, the City of Wilder, Homedale Police, Wilder Police and Councilman Freelove were named in a one million dollar tort claim filed in October by a local restaurant/bowling alley. The claim was filed after Homedale officers closed the doors to the establishment for several hours to breath test nearly 40 juveniles for drinking. No juveniles were found to have been drinking.

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

Reservoir levels remained seriously low as the 2002 irrigation season came to a close in October. South Board of Control Manager Rex Barrie commented that coming into the storage season, the ground is dry. He said; "if we get some moisture in those hills and get that ground wet before the snow starts to fly, a lot of that moisture is going to soak into the ground." Barrie told irrigators to add snow to their list of presents for Christmas this year.

911 addressing added confusion to many local residents in late October when the new addresses were sent out. Sheriff Aman asked local residents to be patient as the bugs were worked out of the system. Aman said residents may use their old address for up to one year after receiving the new address.

The first week in November

also seen the county's first snow of the winter. A small storm front moved through the area dropping nearly two inches of fresh powder on the Owyhee mountains, but the white stuff was short lived as temperatures climbed and the snow melted quickly.

The Homedale City Council began considering options to solve a long time problem at the local airport. One of the options was to move the airfield to a different location. The airport has been part of the council agenda for nearly a year for decisions on what to do with removing hazardous waste found on the site.

In December, the Owyhee County Sheriff's Office conducted a multi-agency raid on two homes in the area arresting six people for illegal use of drugs and possession. An additional five people were arrested in connection with the

raid in neighboring counties over the following weeks.

Local people pulled together to collect food, toys and clothing for needy people in the area as the Christmas season approached. Thousands of items were collected throughout the county in an effort to share holiday cheer. Schools, government offices, community groups, and businesses held donation efforts for the season.

A new state director for the BLM was appointed in early December and said Owyhee County is at the top of his priority list. K Lynn Bennett told the Owyhee Avalanche in an interview that he intends for things to be different this time by sitting down with the local farmers and ranchers to hear their concerns.

Extension office plans beef education programs

County puts hold on money discussion with Homedale

Commissioner stalls funding offer for airport cleanup

Owyhee County Commissioner Chairman Hal Tolmie canceled a scheduled meeting with the Homedale City Council Monday to review how much funding would be needed to clean up a hazardous waste spill at the Homedale airport. Tolmie said he and mayor Harold Puri had spoken frequently over the weekend and decided it would not be necessary for the city government to attend the Murphy meeting.

Homedale requested nearly \$40,000 from the county commissioners several weeks ago to help fund a cleanup of Dynoseb, a hazardous chemical, found in the ground and ground water at the airport. Commissioners requested the council attend a regular meeting in Murphy to show how much has been spent and how much would be needed for the cleanup. But Monday, during the regular meeting, Tolmie canceled the gettogether stating he felt it was unnecessary for the council to attend until it could report about the possibility of additional funds from a grant.

"Hal said we didn't need to be there," Puri said Monday. "He just said they would do something for us and we didn't need to drive down there over it. I took him at his word. We submitted a bunch of information to them about money needed and money spent. Other than just going down there and making some personal yelling match, Hal felt like it wasn't necessary for us to go down there, that they could take care of things without us making the trip."

Tolmie said he put off the meeting since Puri said the council was seeking other options such as a grant. Puri said he did not know the details of the grant since it was in the beginning stages, but he said he still feels the county will give some money to the cleanup.

Commissioner Chris Salove said the only thing discussed by the commission was that the 4 p.m. meeting had been canceled because Tolmie and

Puri had discussed Homedale receiving money from other options. He said Puri was told to approach the commissioners again if the funding did not materialize.

"We are trying to get other monies besides from Owyhee County," Puri explained. "We are just now submitting the formal paperwork so I don't recall all of the details."

"We are just in a holding pattern right now," Salove said. "We have not committed to giving any money right now, at least until they check out other options. We told them to let us know when they need something. I didn't have a clue until about 10 a.m. this morning (Monday) when Hal said the meeting with Homedale had been canceled."

Tolmie said Monday afternoon that he and the mayor had been "visiting" and other funding had recently become an option for the City of Homedale.

"There is no use in him running up to Murphy until they find out if they have any other financing," Tolmie said. "We plan to help them, but if there is other funding they should use that first."

The commissioners will

meet again on Jan. 6 for its first meeting of the New Year. -

The Idaho Medicaid Program will reimburse for out-of-state nursing home placements when services are not available in Idaho to meet the recipient's medical need, or in temporary situation for a limited period of time required to safely transport the recipient to an Idaho facility. Comment by: 1/22/03.

16-0310-0301, Rules Governing Medicaid Provider Reimbursement in Idaho. The Idaho Medicaid Program will reimburse for out-of-state nursing home placements when services are not available in Idaho to meet the recipient's medical need, or in a temporary situation for a limited period of time required to safely transport the recipient to an Idaho facility, at the per diem rate set by the Medicaid Program in the state where the nursing home is located. In the championship game against McDermitt, things were a little bit closer for the Mustangs, as they were holding


on to a slim 23-17 halftime lead, before exploding for 24 third quarter points to push their lead to 47-31 after three quarters of play.



The county has been "working" on these issues for several years, and yet we do not have the rural addressing completed, nor do we have the 911 system in place.



These issues need resolved immediately, but at the very least, they should be completed in this new year of 2003.



Poor man's ranch rodeo

The working ranch rodeos are enjoying a resurgence around the country. They allow ranches to enter teams and compete against cowboys from other ranches. They are often well organized and can be pretty fancy events.

This has caused a minor disgruntlement among ranchers who, though offically qualified for the Working Ranch Cowboy's Association based on cow numbers and full time employment, don't have the finances to hire full time help. Tracy explained, in their case the neighbors all try to schedule their work together and hope nobody gets busted up, too bad. She says the concept of a four-man team isn't usually in the cards. If she and her husband can even get the banker or the town derelict for half a day they consider themselves in tall cotton.

Team penning consists of the two of them, halfway mounted, in a wire pen with two hundred Brangus cows and their bawlin' calves. It involves lots of yelling and dust. Nor, she said, does their team doctoring resemble the official ranch rodeo event. If she's alone and finds a sick one in the pasture



she sorts the (a) loco'd (b) pinkeye'd (c) prolapsed (d) all of the above, heifer off and prods or chases it a jillion miles to the pens or if she and her husband are together he ropes the beast and she runs down the rope to stab the critter without getting clotheslined, head butted, kicked or stabbing herself!

The winter olympics version involves roping afoot in slushy snow and cowboy water skiing. The WRCA branding is the closest to the real thing on her ranch, except if you rope more than two by the neck you spend the rest of the day on the ground mugging.

Wild cow milking is a favorite event of many ranch rodeo fans. On Tracy's place they do most of their wild cow milking in the squeeze chute on a rank, bad bagged, big titted fightin' cow that was supposed to have been sold last fall except she came up bred and a couple of perfectly sound, good-tempered ones didn't. The hardest part is getting the witch back in the chute four days in a row till the calf can suck.

She said she does enjoy the saddle bronc and the wild horse race events. But only to watch. They haven't started green colts on their ranch since they raised their insurance deductible to \$45,000.00. The last ranch rode that she and her neighbors combined to enter featured a saddled steer riding (not a contest that seems destined for perpetuity, author's note). A bunch of Corriente roping steers are turned out. The roper rides out a'horseback, ropes a steer, team members saddle it and ride across the finish line (although I can understand the cowboy mentality that invented such a great event, author). In Tracy's team's case, when two-hundred pound Fred swung aboard the corriente it sank to the ground and became boneless as a sleeping hound dog.

I don't know if we will ever see a professional rodeo association that truly represents the cow business as Tracy lives it. But it's possible. After all, this is how we got women's mud rassling, Bowling for Dollars and reality programming on TV.

Fish and Game wants public comment

Should unclaimed controlled hunt tags go on sale again after a certain date? Should the one-year waiting period related to antlered deer and elk go away?

These and other questions will soon be discussed by the Idaho Fish and Game Commission. In the meantime, the Fish and Game Department wants to hear your opinion.

"We're up against a tight deadline," Fish and Game regional conservation educator Evin Oneale noted. "Public comments need to be summarized by January 10, so we're asking folks to stop by a Fish and Game office, comment on our website (www2.state.id.us/fishgame), or give us a call (465-8465) with their opinions. Of course, written comments are also welcome, but those will have to reach us by early January.

My advice is to use one of the other comment options."

So what are the issues? "There are three, actually," Oneale said. "The possible resale of unclaimed tags, the waiver of the one-year waiting period/once-in-a-lifetime rule for certain tags and a blanket rule regarding that fun topic of discussion, the requirement to leave evidence of sex attached to a carcass.'

Resale of unclaimed controlled hunt tags - Each year, approximately six to eight percent of all deer, elk and antelope controlled hunt tags remain unclaimed. There is a move afoot to establish a cutoff date by which all controlled hunt tags must be claimed," Oneale explained. "After that date, the unclaimed tags would be made available on a firstcome, first-served basis at license vendors."

Waiting period/lifetime rules waiver - There is no process in place to block the sale of leftover antlered deer, antlered elk or antelope tags to persons who don't qualify under the one-year waiting period rule currently in place. The same goes for leftover

person having already harvested a moose under Idaho's once-in-a-lifetime rule can currently obtain a second tag during the leftover moose tag sales event. "We're considering eliminating the one year waiting period/once in a lifetime stipulations associated with these hunts IF the tags are acquired as leftovers,"

Oneale said. "Obviously, if adopted, this rule would make it possible for a hunter to participate in an antlered-only deer and/or elk controlled hunt in consecutive years or harvest more than one moose in their lifetime.'

Evidence of sex -Department rules require evidence of sex to remain naturally attached to the carcass in most hunts. In either-sex hunts however, requirement is waived. "The requirement, or lack thereof, has left a number of people confused, and - in some cases hindered enforcement efforts," Oneale said. "So,

moose tags. For example, a Department is considering a blanket rule requiring hunters to leave evidence of sex naturally attached to all harvested big game animals until the animals reach the place of final storage."

These are the issues. "Now we need input," Oneale said. "As noted earlier, time is short, so we doubly appreciate everyone's willingness to provide their input in a timely manner."

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


