County proposes FY '05 budget


Owyhee County's proposed budget for fiscal year 2005 was signed Monday by the commissioners, with a total figure of \$6,708,782, down \$1,443,629 from FY '04's budget of \$8,152,411.

The proposed budget is published elsewhere in this issue. A public hearing will be held on Tuesday, Sept. 11, at 1 p.m. at the courthouse in Murphy.

It is important to note that the proposed budget, as published, includes the county's Road and Bridge department budget. This levy does not apply to properties within the Gem Highway District, Homedale Highway District, or Three Creek Good Roads District, so usual comparisons do not reflect the R& B budget, even though it is a county levy on the remaining properties within the county.

Search continues for suspect in stabbing of Homedale woman

A Homedale woman is recovering in a Boise hospital this week from stab wounds she received early last Saturday morning. Now an extensive search for the man who stabbed her is underway.

Teresa Solano Cruz, 20 was attacked in the very early morning hours Saturday and the father of Cruz's two year old child, Mauro Ortiz Guzman, 24 is being sought by law enforcement officials.

Reports state that Cruz had received a protection order against

Guzman on Aug. 11, but the order had not been served because county deputies could not locate him. The order is for protection against Cruz and her child due to Guzman driving while intoxicated with the toddler after being cited in Oregon earlier this month. The order also states that Guzman has threatened to take the child out of the country.

Homedale Police Chief Jeff Eidemiller said Cruz had been stabbed approximately seven

City proposes budget

The City of Homdale proposes a revenue and expense budget for fiscal year '05 of \$891,247 less than this year's, according to the notice submitted for publication Monday afternoon.

Last week the clerk submitted the notice which showed the city proposing to spend \$130,000 less than its incoming and reserve revenues next year, and the two previous years showing it spent nearly \$800,000 more than its revenues.

This newspaper questioned Mayor Paul Fink concerning the budget Saturday, but he insisted that the figures were accurate.

Monday afternoon, however, a new set of figures, for all three years, was submitted.

The revised proposed budget shows a total of \$1,150,821, compared to \$2,042,068 for FY '04.

The new proposed budget is printed elsewhere in this issue.

Fire fatality ruled accidental

57 year-old Homedale woman has been determined to be an accident by county investigators. Donna Sue Goodall's body was found in the living room of her home on Maas Lane off of Sage Road early Tuesday morning.

Firefighters responded to the blaze at about 1:20 a.m. Tuesday morning and spent approximately four hours battling the blaze and cleaning up. County coroner Harvey Grimme said Wednesday that an autopsy had been performed and it was determined that Goodall died from smoke inhalation.

Sheriff's Deputy Jim Bish said that the fire apparently started in the bedroom of the home and quickly spread through the interior trapping Goodall in the living room. He said no one will ever know how or why Goodall was in the living room, but he speculates that she may have been sleeping on the couch.

"The fire originated in the bedroom at the head of the bed," Bish said last week. "It got into the wall on the west side. It got

The original house is where the living room was located. It is pure speculation and no one will really ever know, but she was probably sitting or lying on the couch. She was overcome by smoke and didn't make it out."

> Bish said the neighbors reported the fire when their lights flickered they looked outside and saw Goodall's home on fire.

"Scott Salutregui was the incident commander for the fire department," Bish continued. "The fire department did an excellent job preserving the scene so we could do a proper investigation. When Scott turned the scene over to me there was nothing disturbed and the scene was preserved. They did a great job and made my job that much quicker."

Bish said Goodall lived in the home with her husband. He was not home at the time of the blaze.

Council addresses irrigation thefts

The City of Homedale may soon have an answer to a shortfall in irrigation payments resulting in several years of nonpayment of irrigation taxes. The city plans to prosecute anyone "stealing" irrigation water that has not paid their last year's taxes. The council plans to adopt an ordinance allowing the city to fine tax payers who are delinguent.

Mayor Paul Fink said the city has lost approximately \$35,000 in past taxes it will never collect. City Clerk Susan Mansisidor said the city can not collect on bills that are over five years old which is nearly half of the total due. She said the city sent out tax notices in June, but only a "hand full" of people paid their past due amount. Now they can send the bills to collection agencies and if the person delinquent is found to be using city irrigation water, they could receive a citation for a misdemeanor, "stealing city service."

"What I want is to have an ordinance that will allow us to give a citation if someone is found to be stealing irrigation water," Fink told the council. "It is a theft of services. The fine should be double what the taxpayer owes which is about \$100."

City Chief of Police Jeff Eidemiller said the city should keep the fine as a misdemeanor fine, which is \$300 and make the delinquent accounts go to court.

"If they are stealing from us, we might as well get what the court will allow us," Eidemiller said. "We want the fine and then we want restitution. If they get fined and they still have to pay restitution, then it is win, win."

Fink said all the city is after is to receive what delinquent irrigation users should pay. City attorney Chris Nye said he could write up an ordinance that would allow the city to charge a fine, restitution and force the tax payer to pay their delinquent taxes. Fink said the council would discus the matter during next week's council meeting.

JV Ambulance Service to hold feed, auction

The Jordan Valley Ambulance Service and Emergency Medical Services will hold a spaghetti feed and auction on Aug. 21 at the Lions Hall beginning at noon. Tickets are \$20 for a family and \$7 for individuals.

The service is a non-profit ambulance service located in the southeastern Oregon town. It provides and maintains two ambulances and a rescue truck with extrication and other emergency equipment.

Coordinators said the fundraiser is being held to add stability in order to help maintain and keep the organization operating in a high state of readiness. Items and services for the auction are still being sought from local businesses.

Shortfall could close library

Budget shortfalls and unstable funds could close the doors on the Homedale Public Library, at least for up to total of one week. Librarian Margaret Fujishin told the city council last Wednesday night that unless "something changes" the library would be negative \$800 by the end of the year.

"We have been watching our budget very close all year," Fujishin said. "About four months ago it looked like we were going to come up short so we froze the book budget. Every month we have been watching the figures, but each time it looks a little worse."

Fujishin said to help prevent some of it, the library is planning several fundraisers including two yard sales, a raffle and another book sale. The library has also frozen several other line items they would normally purchase.

"No more supplies are being purchased, no more education and travel for the staff is being paid for and we have not paid any wages for a substitute all year," Fujishin said. "If we are not able to make any more money to offset it, we will discuss in early September possibly closing the library for a few days."

She said if the library closes for one week and pays no wages for that week, the library would save \$441.69.

The council made no decisions concerning the matter.

Water report for Aug. 16

Reports from the Owyhee Reservoir on Aug. 16 indicated that 115 cubic feet per second of water is entering the reservoir at Rome and 204 cfs of water is leaving the dam.

The reservoir is holding 28 percent of full at 187,755 acrefeet.

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taxes to finance the budget total \$1,958,678, of which \$282,726 is for the Road and Bridge department. The proposed budget would increase the tax levy by 9.7%.

In last week's issue, it was reported that the tax amount was over what the state law allows. The figures provided by the county clerk prior to the issue totaled that amount, but after publication, the clerk provided another worksheet, showing the foregone amount that can be levied, which covered the shortfall this newspaper reported. The FY '05 tax levy "maxxed-out" the legal amount the county can collect without a special election.

Departments and offices showing an increase in overall budgets include: Bond redemption \$20,000; Health District \$674; Historical Society \$945; Indigent and Charity \$24,700; Junior College (not a levy) \$2,000; Revaluation \$2,857; Tort \$11,000; 911 Dept. \$9,300 (not a levy).

times in the legs, hands and chest area. He said the incident happened at Cruz's home in the 200 block of North 5 St West at 12:02 a.m. An incident report from the sheriff's office states that officers were notified at approximately 9: 04 p.m. that Guzman had been at Cruz's home and threatened to return at 10 p.m. Officers checked the area at about 10 p.m. but found nothing. Cruz was taken to a Boise hospital by air ambulance.

A witness from Homedale who asked to not have her name used, said a man matching Guzman's description had attempted to enter her vehicle near the Senior Center just after midnight Saturday morning. She said the man was staggering in the street, but when she slowed to keep from hitting him, he "jerked" open the passenger door and tried to pull

her son from the car. She said her son was able to slam the door shut on the man and also shut the door on his hand.

"The last we have heard is he called family members from San Francisco area Sunday," Eidemiller said. "We are conducting a very extensive search for him."

Eidemiller said he is seeking a warrant from the prosecutor's office for attempted murder. He said anyone with information on Guzman's whereabouts should call local law enforcement officials as soon as possible.


Deitra Haylett to wed Chris Batt



Marsing mid school approved

Marsing school district voters turned out in record numbers Tuesday to approve financing for a proposed mid school. A proposal to construct new dressing rooms at the high school was defeated by a narrow margin.

It was a record turnout for a Marsing bond election. The heavy voter turnout was attributed, at least in part, to a campaign conducted by a citizen s committee on behalf of the bond.

It was the fourth time the bond proposal had been put before the voters. In February, a single proposal for the mid school and dressing rooms was defeated by a fivevote margin

Final result show and bond issue for the mid school passing 466-144, whit a whopping 76.9 prevent of the voters favoring the \$885,000 proposal. The school passed by it largest margin in Canyon County where patrons approved by a vote of 54-8. In Owyhee County the vote was 412-132.

The proposal to spend \$110,000 to construct new dressing rooms at the high school failed 365-197, missing the needed two thirds by less than two percent. Forty eight voters did not vote on the dressing room proposal or spoiled their ballots.

Tests indicate water is good

The long fight to obtain a good water source for the City of Homedale appears to be nearing an end.

Earlier in the summer drilling began on a test well located near Tom Morris Equipment on the east side of the Snake River. This week tests were run on the well, and so far the results are encouraging, according to Mayor George Murray.

Initial tests indicate the new well is capable of producing at least 400 gallons per minute. The tests also show the water to be ordorless and clear.

Early reports on the well had been pessimistic. After the city council authorized drilling to a greater depth, several additional veins were found.

Mayor Murray said final results of the well test will be heard at the September meeting of the Homedale City Council.

County tax cut predicted

Owyhee County residents can expect a tax cut with the 1979-80 fiscal year gins, according to Barbara Jayo, county clerk.

Jayo said the tax decrease is being cause by the one percent freeze, combined with an increase in assessed valuation in the county.

One percent legislation passed by the Idaho Legislature put a freeze on the amount of money county governments can raise. The legislation was designed to keep taxing units from increasing tax levies prior to the full implementation of the one percent. In the case of Owyhee County the freeze hurt because of the amount of new property going on the rolls.

According to Jayo, the assessed valuation of the county will increase considerably this year. Although final results aren't in, it appears the property values in the county will increase from the year's \$23 million to about \$28 million. Because of the freeze, however, no additional funds can be realized from the increase. Instead, taxes will be cut.

Simplot paid \$1,825 for the Grand Champion Beef owned by Tammy Earl. Micki Yzehekley's Reserve Champion, sponsored by Glen Salmeier, was purchased by the Haken Agency of Marsing for \$1,144.32.

The Grand Champion Swine of Craig Dines was purchased by Hoff Forest Products for \$493.50. Hal Howard's Reserve Champion went to the Marsing and Homedale branches of Idaho First for \$377.60.

Diane Williams sold her Grand Quality Sheep to Whitney-Dickenson Seed Company for \$651. Rite-Way Market of Grand View bought Kelly Curry's sheep for \$262.50

Sales at the 4-H Livestock Auction totaled \$80,531.53 with cattle accounting for \$57,362.53 of the total.

138 years ago

August 25, 1866

JUMPING STREETS. If we are correctly informed, a case of this kind has occurred in Silver, the jumpers complained of and the cause tried before Justice Miller and a jury on Wednesday. The defendant acts up in defense that Second only extends to Jordan street, while the complaint avers otherwise. The jury failed to agree, and the matter remains unsettled. A perfectly reliable citizen informs us that he knows that Second street was extended to the creek on the original plat of the town; that he was employed in connection therewith; that he has no interest in the ground further than to have a stop put to claiming ground that was set apart for public highways. We have known our informant for years, and believe what he says to be true to the letter. We know that a necessity exists for a street over the jumped premises, and it should be made such. If this case is sustained in favor of the jumpers, we've heard a number of men say that it will lead to great confusion and litigation. Public rights are as sacred as private ones, and should be respected accordingly. A petition is in circulation addressed to the Board of County Commissioners praying more stringent orders respecting the blocking up of public thoroughfares. The matter needs attention.

CHURCH IN SILVER. Thos. H. Smith says there is piety and money enough in Silver to insure the erection of a fine church edifice. Glad to hear it and hope to see it demonstrated. If there are any germs of piety round, they should be nourished, and to this end a neat comfortable house for divine service should be erected. It would exert a much needed moral influence. They took a portion of the team and left two head of stock that had been stolen several days previous. Mr. Grete was of American birth, about 30 years of age, and a very industrious citizen. Was but recently from California and in the employ of Philip Kohlheyer & Co., of Ruby City. Waterfowl season open house slated

Waterfowl hunters have a chance to comment on proposed 2004-2005 duck and goose seasons during an upcoming open house hosted by Idaho Fish and Game.

On Wednesday, August 18, from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m., Fish and Game personnel will be on hand to visit with the public at the Nampa Fish and Game office. The open house format allows visitors to attend anytime during the session. Call 465-8465 for more information.

For those who can't make the open house, Fish and Game is taking waterfowl season comments on their web site.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, which oversees waterfowl management at the national level, has authorized Fish and Game to hold a waterfowl season very similar to last year's. Using that authorization as a framework, Fish and Game has crafted several options for southwest region waterfowlers to choose from. They are, a liberal, 105-day season running from October 9 through January 21, a moderate, 84-day split season from October 9 through October 15 and from November 1 through January 16, and a moderate 84-day late start season from October 23 through January 14.

All of the options include the following: a 60-day season for pintails and canvasbacks (pintail and canvasback seasons would start on the opening date for duck season and would run concurrent with the duck season for 60 days); snipe and coot season would be the same as duck season; and a two-day youth hunt, September 25-26 for youths ages 12 to 15.

The liberal season option includes a seven-duck daily bag limit (only two mallard hens, one canvasback, one pintail,

Because goose numbers remain particularly strong, the 2004-2005 goose season will

mirror the duck hunting option adopted by Fish and Game, which will include a four goose daily bag limit.

Information collected at public open houses across the state will be summarized and presented to the Fish and Game Commission, which will set the final waterfowl seasons on August 24.







Editor's notebook

Oh, those budgets



Prior to setting the final budget this time around, there were some most confusing numbers presented. Example: This year's ['04] budget as published, listed the total budget as \$8,417,345. But, the clerk told us, that wasn't right. It should have been \$8,072,411. The L-2 form (which is filed with the state tax commission) had a figure of \$8,152,411.

The FY '05 published budget shows proposed taxes at \$1,958678; the L-2 worksheet, which goes to the State Tax Commission for certification, lists the tax at \$1,869,023.

That's not all the confusion, however. In last week's issue I stated the county would be overtaxing \$141,669. This was taken from the figures provided on the L-2 sheet. After the paper was out, the clerk faxed us another worksheet, showing yet another figure which has been added to the budget, plus three percent, plus new construction levy, plus property tax replacement, thereby balancing the income side of the budget.



**:

The original proposed budget for the city of Homedale was submitted last week for publication. According to the figures, during the '02-'03 fiscal year, the city spent \$371,000 more than its revenues. And, according to the notice, this year ('04) the city will spend another \$400,000 more than it has.

If those numbers were accurate, the city would show a deficit of \$.8 million. The numbers were questionable, since the city cannot spend more money than it has, and we doubt, also, the bank would carry that kind of overdraft.

Also, for FY '05, the budget showed more revenues than expenses. To comply with state budgeting laws, these two figures are to be equal.

When the mayor cornered me at the fair, he was obviously a little irate that I would question his budget. But a new proposed budget appeared on our fax Monday afternoon, with some better numbers. Mayor, we're glad to have helped keep the city out of even more trouble.

(It should be noted that the council didn't vote to adopt either tentative budget at any public meeting. It was submitted without the council's approval.)

When kids could be kids

It was a period when the world seemed to turn more slowly -- when people had the time to appreciate small incidents and events -- to file them away in memory so they could be shared with generations yet to be born.

My mother and father met while working in a fruit packing shed in the spring of 1929. They married that same summer. Mother's family had arrived in southwest Idaho the previous autumn from Nebraska. Father's kin had made the journey from Kansas in 1910.

Father was a printer. During the 1930s he worked for or managed several newspapers in eastern Oregon and southwest Idaho. Often part of his wages were groceries or goods from stores that advertised in the paper. My two older sisters were born during that period.

In 1941, Father entered what we called his farming phase. He and Mom scraped up enough money for the down payment a 40-acre farm near Kuna, Idaho, a small town about twenty miles southwest of Boise. It was to be their home for the next 40 years. Father was a slender, wiry man who went everywhere at a quick step. But the speed at which he moved around was deceiving. He was a planner. He believed slow and steady was the best way to win the race. Sometimes his planning for a simple project took longer that the task itself.

Dad seldom showed much emotion. If something displeased him, he might snort in disgust and that was

the end of it. A job well done was worth an approving grunt. Father usually let Mom do the worrying.

Mom was a short woman with a matronly figure - probably the result of a Depression diet loaded with starchy foods. She was the detail person who kept track of the budget and family calendar and tried to keep Dad pointed in the what she considered a proper direction. She was outspoken and emotional.

A lot of Mom's worrying was the result of her childhood. She often observed that times were so tough when she was growing up that nobody in her family really noticed when the Depression began. She was determined to make sure her children had a better life.

When Mom, Dad and my sisters moved to the farm, there were chickens roosting in the living room. There wasn't even a well. Drinking water had to be hauled from neighboring farms in 10-gallon milk cans. An underground cistern caught rain water which was hand pumped for laundry and bathing. Periodically, someone had to climb down into the cistern and scrub the cement walls.

The day I was born, a drilling crew struck good water on our property, putting and end to water hauling. I'm suspicious the well caused more excitement than my arrival. Because I was the only male child, considerable thought was devoted to selecting my name. In the end, they gave me Dad's first name -- Clyde. Because Clyde didn't seem like a little boy's name, and to avoid confusion, everyone called me by my middle name -- Wayne. I always considered myself fortunate I had Wayne to fall back on. Father's middle name was Brisbin.

Accuracy in media

Using the Patriot Act to target Patriots

John Kerry voted for the anti-terrorist law, the USA
Patriot Act, but now wants to change it and replace Attorney General John Ashcroft with someone "who actually upholds the Constitution of the United States." However, the liberal critics never cite alleged "abuses" under the law involving the anthrax investigation, which has been driven by Kerry's Democratic colleagues, Senators Patrick Leahy and Thomas Daschle.

The Patriot Act has been used to obtain search warrants against doctors and scientists who had been warning about the threat of bioterrorism in the U.S. The most prominent such cases are Dr. Steven Hatfill and now Dr. Kenneth Berry. No evidence has been produced against either man, but the highly publicized raids on their homes—and the media feeding frenzy—give the fleeting impression that the Bureau is making progress.

Yet it appears that Hatfill and Berry have become FBI targets primarily because they warned America about terrorism that the FBI and the CIA didn't prevent.

The same FBI that falsely implicated security guard Richard Jewell in the Olympic Park bombing has made several mistakes in the anthrax case. The first mistake was assuming that Leahy and Daschle received anthrax letters because they were liberals. Leahy's influential chief of staff, who pushed this theory, was quoted in Marilyn Thompson's book on the case as saying the anthrax killer was a "right-wing zealot." Daschle offered his opinion that the perpetrator probably had a U.S. military background. This fit an FBI profile of the alleged perpetrator. Barbara Hatch Rosenberg, a leading advocate of this view, met with the FBI and Leahy's staff and pointed them toward Hatfill, a former U.S. government scientist. Her views were echoed by New York Times columnist Nicholas Kristof and other media.

Under media assault, Hatfill was labeled a "person of interest" by Ashcroft. After losing several jobs because of government and media scrutiny, he has filed suit against the Justice Department and Kristof and the Times.

The second key FBI mistake was thinking that the Ames strain of anthrax, used in U.S. labs and found in the letters, was not available to foreign terrorists.

These mistakes explain why the Justice Department, in

a 29-page report on the Patriot Act, cited dozens of cases in which the law has been beneficial but had only one anthrax-related "success" story. It said that investigators "saved valuable time" by using the Patriot Act to apply for a search warrant for American Media, Inc. in Boca Raton, Florida, the employer of the first anthrax victim.

The reference to "saving valuable time" ignores the fact that it took the FBI nearly a year after the attacks to start a crime-scene investigation of the American Media building. The decontamination of the building only started this July.

Former CIA Director James Woolsey says it is time to change the FBI assumption that the anthrax attacks were perpetrated by "a crazed solitary American microbiologist operating out of a cave" in the U.S.

Such a theory, he pointed out at a June symposium at the American Enterprise Institute, means that the perpetrator was either "a very quick crazed solitary microbiologist" or "a very lucky crazed solitary microbiologist," because he was ready to mail his anthrax letters shortly after al Qaeda hit the U.S. on 9/11.

According to the FBI theory, this crazed scientist even wrote like an Islamic radical, putting references to "Death to Israel" and praise for Allah on the letters, only as a diversion.

Woolsey noted the evidence that in the summer before 9/11, hijacker Muhammad Atta took an associate, who turned out to be one of the other hijackers, in for medical treatment in Florida, near the first anthrax attacks and near where they lived. He had a black lesion on his leg that a doctor and experts say was anthrax-related. Woolsey said, "That raises some interesting questions which again I would suggest we should pursue rather than bury."

Ignoring the al-Qaeda connection to the anthrax attacks, the FBI's targeting of Berry continues the questionable behavior evident in the Hatfill case. As some of their agents wore protective suits to dramatically enter one of Berry's homes, the FBI was telling local officials there was no danger to public health. It looked like another big show and photo opportunity, similar to what occurred when the FBI raided Hatfill's home.

Journalists should be investigating how the Bureau obtained search warrants in the Berry case and what, if any, "evidence" is contained in them. There may be a story here about real abuses of the USA Patriot Act and why the FBI has been unable to solve this nearly three-year-old case.

Energy Legislation Past Due

Although unfortunate, it's an accepted reality that not much gets done in Washington D.C. during an election year. At a time when most politicians are putting their energy into campaigning, Americans could use some effort directed at an energy policy.

With crude prices setting new records and our dependency on foreign oil increasing, it's past time for Congress to get behind meaningful energy legislation that encourages development of alternative resources like wind, ethanol, geothermal, biodiesel and methane and biomass digesters. These new technologies would not only create jobs and commerce in rural America, they'll reduce energy costs for American families.

Some people might ask why the government should get involved. Why not let the market dictate alternative energy development? Many entrepreneurs are developing alternative energy resources. In Idaho we have limited wind, geothermal and methane digester energy being developed. Wind power is gaining momentum all around the country and the Midwest is leading the way in ethanol and biodiesel development. However, among the hurdles these entrepreneurs face are government

subsidies given to traditional energy development. Without government involvement alternative energy development will continue to be slow in coming to states like Idaho.

U.S. agriculture has a tremendous potential to produce energy. Ethanol and biodiesel made from corn, soybeans and many other crops are the most visible alternative energy sources that use renewable feedstocks. Ethanol use reduces the U.S. trade deficit by \$2 billion annually now and has the potential to increase net farm income by \$4.5 billion per year. The amount of corn grown for ethanol production in the U.S. has grown from just over 100 million bushels in 1986 to over 1 billion bushels in 2003.

Congress should encourage investment in alternative energy sources by passing a comprehensive energy bill that includes the Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS) agreed upon earlier this year. The RFS calls for an increase in ethanol and biodiesel production to five billion gallons per year over 10 years. The legislation should also include funding of basic research for new uses of agricultural products in energy production; requirements to use alternative fuels in federal vehicle fleets and continued tax incentives that encourage development of alternative energy sources and uses.



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
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
