

Businesses and schools close for Christmas holidays

Board gives athletic director choice: resign or no renewal

Homedale Trojan Athletic Director Randy Potter was given a choice during a school board meeting last week. He can either resign his position by next month, or the board will not renew his supplemental contract. Potter said Thursday that he has accepted the board's decision and he does plan to resign, but he said he would not do that until his attorney receives the decision in writing.

During last month's board meeting, Potter's supplemental contract as athletic director was not renewed by the board, but Monday before last, the board rescinded that decision from the Nov. 8 meeting minutes blacking out copies of the minutes posted on the district's web site and minutes sent out by request.

The meeting opened with Board Chairman Benita Miller asking for a motion to approve the minutes of the November meeting and was seconded, but the motion was never voted on.

After a short discussion, Board Member Kurt Shanley moved to rescind the motion made in November to "not renew employee A's supplemental contract." The motion was seconded and carried without the vote of Ric Uria who abstained

Towards the end of the meeting, the board recessed into executive session. After deliberation, the board reconvened and moved to "not renew the supplemental contract of employee A." The motion carried, minus Uria's vote. Shanley then moved to amend the original motion that if "employee A" resigned his position by the January board meeting then the original motion would be rescinded. Potter said that his understanding is that if he resigns and a letter would not be added to his personal file.

"Yes I intend to resign," Potter said Thursday. "Basically not because I have done anything wrong or not done the duties of my position or done anything to this district that would embarrass them. I am resigning to protect my future. I am resigning to protect my family and they are far more important to me than anything a couple of people can do to me."

teaching position, which he said is more important to him than his other positions. He said his position, as boy's basketball coach, athletic director or any other coaching position he has held is nothing more than supplemental positions. He said the school board

does not have to give a rhyme or reason for the school district to go in a different direction on the

"Basically you can put in 30 years of your life doing a job and if they want to stop your contract, they can," Potter explained.

Potter said the issue is about complementary football tickets issued from Boise State University. But he said the issue is covering other issues that have not been addressed.

"That is the issue they have given," Potter said. "They had to fabricate that I was not doing the duties of my job. I have been athletic director for 10 years. I have never been evaluated. I have never seen a job description and I have never been reprimanded for my job performance."

Potter, in his 10 years at Homedale, has received awards as athletic director of the year for the district, athletic director of the year from the state and has taken them to the state level five of those 10 years. The team has won the district title four of those years. He said he couldn't see himself doing anything else except coaching. Currently the boy's basketball team is undefeated in a higher-ranking class as a 3A school.

"I have a hard time figuring out if I didn't pull the bleachers out straight or what," Potter Potter said that he feels that stated. "There was an allegation by resigning he can protect his of breach of confidentiality with

inappropriate individuals. In my position throughout the last 10 years, parents come in and there are situations you have to investigate. You have to talk to people. Basically there is nothing to it. To me they are allegations that are a cover-up because the ticket issue was a non issue."

Potter said he can fight the board legally, but after long consideration he has decided that the \$3942 he receives for the director's position would not cover what it would cost for an attorney to proceed. He said his family has suffered enough financial strain and he did not want to pursue the issue any further.

Potter said pursuing a career in a different district is absolutely an option he is following. He said although he didn't want to uproot his family, he may not have a choice.

"It makes you bitter. It makes you frustrated and untrusting," Potter explained. "We have committed to building a home in this community. We wanted to raise our kids here. Have them finish school here. I have had some people ask why I am so upset, it is just a position. I feel I do my job well. I feel I put a lot of effort in the community. It is not the community who is doing this to us. This community is extremely supportive. The people, the kids and the staff have been nothing more than supportive. Someone has an agenda. Not only in my position, but other people here have put up with the same thing from a small group of people. It has been going on for a good five years and at some point you get tired of fighting."

Board Chairman Benita Miller said that she could not go into any details concerning employee issues or what was discussed in executive session. When she was asked about who would be replacing Potter, she stated that, "I can not go into any details on the executive session or on any employee matter. I can tell you that we have not received any recommendations for any positions at the high school."

Miller said that if or when the position is filled, the principal of the high school will make a recom-

Marsing disaster auction coordinators planning event

Friends, family and treasure seekers will gather at 10:13 a.m. Feb. 5 for the annual Marsing Disaster Auction at the Phipps-Watson Community Center and plans for the event have begun.

The auction is held yearly and is the community's biggest fundraiser. Proceeds have gone to help hundreds of people who have been victims of disaster. Last year a record \$67 thousand was raised in the event, but this year's coordinator Kelly Ineck says she will break that record. The local fundraiser has raised over \$300,000 in just eight years.

Several hundred people gather for the event, which includes an auction, raffle items and home cooked food booths. Six thousand six hundred and sixty dollars in tickets were sold for last year's dollar drawing and over \$9,000 in tickets was sold for the \$10 raffle.

The auction is an annual event, which has gathered people from around the United States in Marsing who hope to have their chance at being the highest bidder on annual auction items like home canned pickles, sour cream and raisin pies and a beautiful selection of handmade quilts only to name a few items. 


Basque organization raises thousands for holidays

Euzkaldunak of Caldwell was started nearly 40 years ago by a small group of Basques who heard about a young girl that had no where else to turn. Now the group is made up of 25 members and their spouses known as Euzkaldunak, or The Caldwell Basque Charities, and has raised nearly one million dollars to help local families in need.

Every January, Euzkaldunak Charities hosts a dinner and dance at the O'Connor Field House in Caldwell. Money raised from the event in the past has helped Treasure Valley residents make house payments and feed those in need.

This month, the organization is giving \$6,000 worth of meat to churches and community assistance groups in Homedale, Parma, Caldwell and Nampa. Volunteers got together last week to distribute the food to churches throughout the area.

The funds are given 100 percent back to the communities. Co-chair Rick Uria said the group has raised money that has been donated to families for children to receive eyeglasses, artificial limbs and

other medical need.

"We have paid for parents to accompany family members to burn centers, cancer clinics and have helped pay lodging and meals while they were there," Uria said. "We have paid rent, power bills, loads of coal, fuel oil, replaced windows, doors, water heaters and other stuff. We do it so the needy of our community can have a better life."

Every year the group holds a meat drive for Christmas so the less fortunate can have a brighter holiday season. This year, over \$6,000 in meat was distributed.

The main fundraising event, a dinner and dance, is held every year in Caldwell to raise the funds. This year's event will be held on Jan. 22 at the O'Conner Field House at 8:30 p.m. The Caldwell Basque Dancers, Oinkari Dancers, exhibitions, a silent auction and other entertainment will fill the evening. The event is co-chaired by Uria and John Indart.

"We have raised nearly \$1,000,000 since our group began and with the support of people in the area, we can continue to help others less fortunate in our community," Uria said.



Editor's notebook

Tampering destroys credibility



Since the issue involves "personnel" matters, little information of official nature can be gleaned from the rumors, but the entire situation reeks.

It is difficult to comprehend how an athletic director who has earned statewide recognition for his outstanding success in that field two years in a row can all of a sudden be chastised to the point of termination by the local powers.

The true colors of the trustees is exemplified by action of the board last week. Someone – actually, all of the board – authorized the tampering of official documents of the district.

During the November 8th meeting of the board, a motion was adopted, titled "Non-reissue of Supplemental Contract." The minutes go on to state: "It was moved by Kurt Shanley and seconded by Allen Hayes ... The motion

carried." The wording of the actual motion is blacked out in the minute book.

Our inquiry as to the blacked-out motion was that it was rescinded at the next meeting, and as Supt. Lisonbee stated, "Minutes are not minutes until they are approved by the board."

The fact that a motion was passed at one meeting, then rescinded at the following meeting is not something the board can change. Approval of minutes is certification that the minutes accurately record action taken. The board cannot hide, or eliminate, action taken previously simply by striking it from the record. It happened, and it is part of the record

By blacking out a duly passed motion made in a previous meeting is an attempt to conceal the fact the motion was adopted. That's nothing short of tampering with official documents.

Such shinanigans by the board destroys its credibility with the public; and consequentlyconfirms suspicions of the true motive behind this entire incident.

he best Christmas gifts I received as a child, weren't wrapped in colorful paper.

But the fact that Dad was up didn't mean the festivities could commence. First he had to do the morning chores. Our Jersey cows didn't know it was a holiday. That added another hour to the suspense. I fidgeted impatiently, dancing in front of the flat-topped cook stove in the kitchen as Mother prepared breakfast.

On Christmas Eve, before he went to bed, Father always closed the big sliding pocket door that sealed off the living room, containing the tree and gifts, from the rest of the house. The only other time during the year the door was closed was when company was sleeping on the living room couch. Nobody but Mom was allowed to see what was beyond the door on Christmas until Dad officially opened it.

When Dad returned from the barn, he seemed to move in slow motion as he peeled off his coveralls and boots and washed up in the kitchen sink.

The big moment eventually arrived. As I stood poised in anticipation, Dad rolled back the door, the seldom used rollers squeaking on their overhead track.

As the door opened, a wave of warm, pine scented air rolled over us. A fire crackled in the living room fireplace. The flickering flames threw animated shadows on the ceiling and walls.

Any disturbance of the air caused the tinsel-covered tree to shimmer, reflecting the red, green, blue and orange hues of the tree lights.

On Christmas Eve the only presents under the tree were from relatives. But the next morning an assortment

of packages in colorful wrappings had magically appeared. That was pretty solid evidence to me that the Jolly Old Elf was real and had visited our house during the night while the sliding door was closed. The fact that most of the new packages had tags stating they were from Santa, dispelled any lingering doubts.

Looking back on those special mornings more than a half century ago, it's interesting that my clearest remembrance isn't of the presents I received. My most vivid memories are of the warmth of the kitchen stove, the smell burning pine, sizzling bacon, the voices of my parents and siblings, a squeaky sliding door and the shimmering Christmas tree. Unlike physical gifts, memories never break and forever remain as bright and new as the day they were created.

RESOLUTION – 93 **RESOLUTION BY THE CITY** OF MARSING TO CHANGE THE RATES FOR WATER TO WATER USERS AND TO SET THE RATE CALCULATION THEREFOR, REPEAL OF RESOLUTION 70, AND PRO-VIDE AN EFFECTIVE DATE

THEREFOR. WHEREAS, The City of Marsing has the obligation to provide a safe and adequate drinking water supply to its citizens and water customers, and

WHEREAS, city Ordinance A-81 grants the City authority to establish the minimum charge for water service by resolution,

WHEREAS, The City of Marsing has previously set the minimum water charge to water users by Resolution 70, and

WHEREAS, The City Council has reviewed the cost for providing, maintaining and upgrading the potable water supply providing, maintaining and upgrading the potable water supply for meeting the demands of the users of the City and surrounding area, and

WHEREAS, The City Council has determined that the water use charges need to be changed.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARSING, IDAHO:

Section 1: Water charges will be determined on a monthly usage basis, with the amount of water passing trough a water meter. The following rates are hereby established:

A. The City is establishing a standard meter size of 3/4 inch. For 3/4 inch or smaller water meters, except as noted below, the following charges will apply:

0 to first 2000 gallons - \$28.52 and in addition thereto \$2.45 per 1,000 gallons or part thereof.

For meters larger than 3/4 inch, the base rate will be based on a multiplier based on the area of the subject meter when compared to the standard meter. For example, a one (1) inch meter will equal 1.75 standard meters, a 2 inch meter will equal 7 standard meters, a 3 inch meter will equal 16 standard meters. The gallons included will also increase by the same amount. (For example, at the present base rate, a 1 inch meter will have a base rate of \$33.42 and will include 3,500, rounded up to 4,000 gallons). Additional allows will be charged the standard volume rate

per 1,000 gallons or part thereof. B. Multiple Uses: Where more than one dwelling, business, or like unit is using the same meter, the following rates and basis for charges will apply:

apartments. Duplexes, manufactured home parks, businesses, etc., will be charged based on the number of units, spaces, or offices. For example, at the present rate, a duplex would have a base rate of \$33.42 and would include 4,000 gallons. Additional gallons will be charged the standard volume rate per 1,000 gallons or part thereof.

2. The City shall have the option of choosing an alternative schedule for multiple businesses in one building as follows: The base rate shall be based on average water usage over the previous year, when compared to a system average (currently 6,650 gallons per month). For example, a building with 5 separate businesses, which used an average of 15,000 gallons per, would have a base rate multiplier of 2.45 applied. At the present base rate, this base rate would be 35.87 and would include 4,520, rounded up to 5,000 gallons. Additional gallons will be charged the standard volume rate per 1,000 gallons or part thereof.

Section 2: The monthly charges for water services for hauling from the tower shall be \$22.82 per month.

Section 3: Resolution 70 of the City of Marsing is hereby repealed.



The City has existing indebtedness in the amount of \$649,000, plus interest accrued on that amount to the date of election. The interest rate anticipated on the proposed bonds is 4.50% per annum. The range of anticipated rates is from 4.0 % to 10.0 %. The total amount to be repaid over the life of the proposed bonds, principal and interest, based on the anticipated interest rate, is estimated to be \$2,854,707.

Any qualified elector who, because of illness, disability, or expected absence from the City on the date of election, will be unable to vote at the designated polling place on the day of election, may apply to the City Clerk for an absentee ballot. An application for a mail-in absentee ballot must be received by the City Clerk not later than 5:00 p.m. on the sixth day before the election. An application for in-person absentee voting must be received by the City Clerk not later than 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election, and absentee ballots must be received by the City Clerk not later than 8:00 p.m. on the day of election in order to be counted. Application for an absentee ballot may be made by using a facsimile machine. The City's facsimile number is (208) 896-4123.

Persons who are eligible to vote may register for the special bond election at the office of the Owyhee County Clerk, Marsing City Clerk as Deputy Registrar, at City Hall, Marsing, Idaho, until January 7, 2005. Any elector who will complete his or her residence requirement or attain the requisite voting age during the period when the register or electors is closed may register prior to the closing of the register.

Any person who is eligible to vote may register on election day by appearing in person at the polling place established for the election, by completing a registration card, making an oath on the form prescribed by law, and providing proof of residence in the manner provided by Section 34-408A, Idaho Code, as amended.

No qualified elector who is duly registered as a voter, and who continues to reside at the same address or within the same precinct in which he or she is registered, shall be required to re-register.

If, at the special bond election, the majority of the qualified electors voting upon the ballot question assent to the issuance of revenue bonds for the purposes set forth in Ordinance No. A-144, the water revenue bonds of the City of Marsing will be issued for such purposes, which bonds, or so much thereof as may be necessary, will mature annually, or at such lesser interval as may be prescribed by the ordinance authorizing the issuance of the bonds, over a period which may be less than but which shall not exceed thirty (30) years, and will bear interest at such rate or rates as shall be prescribed in the ordinance authorizing the issuance of the bonds. The principal of and interest on the bonds will be payable solely out of and derived from rates and charges for the use of and the services rendered by, and all other income, earnings, and revenues of, the domestic water system.





