School officials get 'proactive' about soaring diesel prices

The boys and girls soccer teams from Homedale High School will share the same stage Thursday when they open their 3A Snake River Valley conference season in Middleton.

The girls will play at 4 p.m., and the boys game will follow.

And the reason goes beyond the fact that Middleton doesn't have a junior varsity team to create a doubleheader.

The teams originally were scheduled to play their Vikings counterparts at separate venues — one in Homedale, one in

according to Homedale athletic director Dave Hart.

"We have to be conscious of the stuff," Hart said. "We're being proactive about the gas prices, and our leaders are leading the charge."

Hart said school officials wanted to do something before the price of diesel hit \$4 a gallon.

And Homedale principal Mike Williams will take the concept a step further at today's meeting of SRV member schools.

Trojans can't overcome miscues

The Homedale High School football team began a meandering journey Friday night with a tornado of fumbles and other miscues.

But by the end of the night, Homedale had found a receiver and a heart.

The only thing missing was Judy Garland, red shoes. And a season-opening win.

Nampa Christian cashed in on two first-quarter turnovers, scoring a pair of touchdowns in less than a minute to ignite a 35-20 non-conference win over Homedale.

It was Nampa Christian's first victory over the Homedale football program in at least 10 years. Some say as long as 21 seasons.

But while Homedale coach Thomas Thomas downplayed the fact that Nampa Christian snapped a long drought against its former 2A rival, he told his players to remember how they battled back from a four-touchdown deficit.

"I'm not leaving this game demoralized," Thomas said. "We know what we need to work on. And I know we can hit."

Deep NCHS wears down Homedale

No one is immune from the gas crunch these days — not even the Homedale High School volleyball team.

Homedale opened the home portion of its season Tuesday night with a 25-23, 25-8, 27-25 loss to 2A Nampa Christian in a non-conference match.

In reality, the pair of two-point games in the match weren't as close as the score indicates.

In the first game, Homedale (1-2 overall and 1-0 in the Snake River Valley conference after Thursday's 25-17, 25-21, 25-17 win over Parma on the road) was two points away from a victory at 23-18 when Nampa Christian rallied with seven straight points to win the game.

"My girls were getting tired," first-year Homedale coach Maleta Henry said. "That's another thing we're working on.

"We're a small school and we're trying to get this program stronger."

Nampa Christian, which suited a dozen players to Homedale's 10, then surfed a 23-6 run to an easy 25-8 victory in the second game.

"We ran out of enthusiasm in the second game," Henry said. Homedale got a second wind in the third game, moving out to a 6-2 lead and later hanging tough as Nampa Christian tried to close out the match. Homedale went ahead 23-22 to cap a 13-6 lead then traded serves before a series of fatigue-triggered unforced errors ended the night. "The team leaders got back on the floor and got them back up again," Henry said of her team's rally in the third game. One of those leaders is senior Hailey Hall, but when she and her teammates tired, that opened the door for Nampa Christian's head honcho — 6-foot-1 outside hitter Lindsay Forseth.

when Homedale took over briefly with Jordan Warwick serving. Warwick finished the match with nine service points. Faith Brasher had four kills and served three aces for the Trojans.

But when Forseth drilled a shot past the Homedale defense to pull Nampa Christian within a point at 4-3 early in the second game, things changed rapidly.

"Lindsay is an outstanding player," Nampa Christian coach Larry Downs said. "She's probably one of the top players in the state of Idaho, regardless of league.


"She's kind of in a league of her own."

Nampa Christian went on a 22-4 rampage through the rest of Game 2.

Forseth, who had 3 inches on the tallest players on Homedale's roster, finished with 13 kills. Teammate Melissa Blamiers, a junior setter, collected four aces against the tiring Homedale defense.

"(Forseth) kicked butt," Henry said. "She could go over our blockers and she carries the team."

Lauren Vermeer utilized a frustrating bit of finesse in the middle of the net to register seven kills for Nampa Christian. Vermeer's dainty tip over the net contrasted Forseth's powerful striking much like legendary fireball pitcher Nolan Ryan backing up his 100 mph fastball with an 85 mph changeup. "This is the first team that has done a lot of tips on us," Henry said.

The game went from good to bad to ugly for the Mustangs as they saw three quarters of hard work and perseverance wash away.




The Antelopes brought up the tempo in the next two games, with scores of 25-20 and 25-17. Both their offense and defense woke up to keep the scores much more competitive.



Correia said of the chemistry he


seeks. "The Erik Padilla team seems very united off the field.

SECTION 1: PENALTIES In compliance with Idaho State Code 50-302, any and all City of Homedale Ordinances and Municipal Codes which state the violator shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor shall be replaced and read as follows;

Shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and be fined an amount not to exceed One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) or by imprisonment not to exceed (6) months or to include both a fine and imprisonment.

AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING OCTOBER 1, 2005, APPROPRIATING THE SUM OF \$1,552,061.00 TO DEFRAY THE EXPENSES AND LIABILITIES OF THE CITY OF HOMEDALE FOR SAID FISCAL YEAR, AUTHORIZING A LEVY OF A SUFFICIENT TAX UPON THE TAXABLE PROPERTY AND SPECIFYING THE OBJECTS AND PURPOSED FOR WHICH SAID APPROPRIATION IS MADE.
