Trojans tumble out of first place

Weiser wallops Homedale to keep perfect season going

Homedale High School's football team had its hopes of a piece of first place crushed under a red wave Friday night in Weiser. The unbeaten Wolverines

showed why they are the topranked 3A team in the IdahoSports. com state rankings, exploiting the Trojans' aggressive defense and miscues to post a convincing 5712 Snake River Valley conference victory.

"I thought our kids played hard," Homedale coach Thomas Thomas said. "I just think they didn't play smart or disciplined.

"They didn't want to take right angles or get the right man or read the dive back right or do their responsibilities."

With the victory over Homedale (4-3 overall, 2-1 SRV), the Wolverines (7-0, 3-0) moved into sole possession for the conference lead by doing what they've always done — run the ball, run it often and run it at you.


With Homedale's vaunted defense poised to strike anywhere across the line, Weiser utilized

misdirection and a little option, and the Trojans overpursued.

But Weiser coach John D. Scholec said the 305 yards rushing his Wolverines rolled up is nothing new.

"They run a defense that takes a lot of chances, and they're going

Trojans boys start 3A tourney strong

Three different players from three different grades scored goals Thursday as Homedale High School opened the 3A District III boys soccer tournament with a victory at Sabala Field in McCall.

Senior Patrick Vega, junior Cory Uria and freshman Miguel Vasquez each scored goals in Homedale's 3-1 victory over Fruitland.

The Trojans entered the tournament as the No. 4 seed after finishing the Snake River Valley conference season at 4-6, just behind third-place Payette.

Homedale dropped a tough 3-0 decision to top-seeded Middleton on Saturday to fall into the losers bracket of the double-elimination tournament. The Trojans (5-9) met Weiser in an elimination game Monday. Results weren't available at press time.

Against Fruitland, Uria opened the scoring with a conversion of Vasquez's assist in the 12th minute. It was one of 18 shots on goal the Trojans would take on the afternoon.

The Grizzlies, who were seeded fifth, tied the game, but Vasquez pushed Homedale back in front before halftime on a pass from junior Jacob Anthony.

Vega punched a crossing shot over the head of the Fruitland goalie for the game's final goal in the second half. Junior Guillermo Machuca was credited with the assist.


Myers finished 158 yards rush-

"Erik had an excellent game," Correa said.


The Vikings broke through to score three goals in less than five minutes.



Garden Valley rips league foe Rimrock

Rimrock High School quarterback Anthony Hofer put together his biggest passing day of the season Friday, but he couldn't overcome the onslaught of Garden Valley in a 1-A, Division I football loss.

The host Wolverines remained unbeaten with a 66-16 win shortened by the 45-point mercy rule.

Garden Valley (7-0 overall, 3-0 league) also found itself alone in first place in the league after Council handed Cascade its first league loss, 54-24. Both Council and Cascade are a game behind Garden Valley at 2-1.

The Wolverines wasted little time assuming control against Rimrock. Garden Valley scored 32 points in the first quarter with a balanced offense.

Hofer got Rimrock within a touchdown and PAT at 16-8 when he plunged in from 2 yards out then tossed a two-point conversion pass to his brother, Nate, a sophomore.

But Garden Valley cranked it up again with the second of Kyle Shepherd's three scores and a 3-yard run by Daniel Grimm. Shepherd scored on runs of 10 and 50 yards in the first half and added a 60-yard scamper in the third quarter.

Anthony Hofer did all he could to keep the Raiders (1-5, 1-2) in the ballgame. He completed four of six passes for 125 yards. None of his passes made it into the end zone, though, as freshman running back T.J. Snyder rushed four yards in the second quarter for Rimrock's other touchdown.

Hofer's favorite target was Carlos Salinas, who racked up 80 yards on just two receptions.

Hofer also picked up 35 yards on 10 rushes and made five solo tackles to lead the Rimrock defense. Weslee Aquiso was the Raiders' leading rushing, gaining 49 yards on 10 totes.

Garden Valley owned a 46-16 halftime lead as quarterback Brandon Moore threw a touchdown pass to Jed Jones.

The Raiders are back home Friday for a 7 p.m. game against Idaho City in Bruneau.



Trojans face rocky road to playoffs

Friday night's loss to topranked Weiser High School built quite a mountain for Homedale if Thomas Thomas' football team hopes to make the 3A state playoffs for the second time in to win the three years.

The 57-12 setback on the Wolverines' field dropped the Trojans to 2-1 in the ultracompetitive Snake River Valley conference.

Homedale is tied for second place with Fruitland and Middleton, but the Trojans control their own destiny because they play the Vikings on the road this week (7 p.m. Friday), and then close the regular season with a


But there is hope that the Trojans' running game could return to form against the Vikings, even if the reason for that optimism could mean trouble in two weeks against the Grizzlies

"It's not like they're overly big, but they're aggressive and they get from Point A to Point B very fast."

The Weiser defense did its part to frustrate the Trojans, too. While Krzesnik had one of his best passing days of the year, including a pretty 23-yard sideline route to Garrett Sweet for the Trojans' first touchdown, the Homedale ground attack was bottled up by the Wolverines.

The Trojans managed just one rushing first down and finished the disappointing night with only 23 yards on the ground. Twenty of those yards came when Ryan Johnson motored in from 20 yards out inside of 2 minutes left in the game.

That was Homedale's longest run play of the night.

The bread-and-butter fly handoff with Martinat taking the ball while in motion — a play that has resulted in at least two touchdowns this season - was snuffed out by Weiser.

"I feel like we have good team speed, and if you give us a crease or two we'll take advantage of big plays," Thomas said. "And they took that away from us.

Winless a year ago, the Antelopes took a long road trip to Joseph, Ore., on Friday in search of another win in a perfect season.

Instead, the Eagles plastered Adrian 62-12 to take command of the Old Oregon League championship race.

"Joseph is an awfully good team, certainly top-five 1A in the state," Adrian second-year coach

Gene Mills said. "They came out and executed their game, and we couldn't deal with their triple option."

Chris Schumacher scored on runs of 25 yard in the first quarter and 16 yards in the second quarter for Adrian's two touchdowns.

The Adrian defense's inability to contain - something Mills, as coach, takes the blame for — and six turnovers spelled doom for the Antelopes (5-1 overall, 3-1 OOL), who slipped into a tie with Joseph for second place.

Wallowa demolished Powder Valley 72-12 to remain unbeaten in league and maintain the upper hand for the top seed into the state playoffs.

The top three teams in the OOL get berths into the state tournament, and it looks like it's only a matter of where Wallowa, Joseph and Adrian end up in the bracket — not whether they'll even make it.

"I think it would take a major turnaround of events to get knocked out," Mills said.

Adrian plays host to Wallowa this week at Ward Field with a chance to spoil the Cougars' bid for a perfect league record. Wallowa is 5-1 overall.

Kickoff is 7 p.m.

"Obviously we're going for the win, but Wallowa is awfully good," Mills said. "They're quick but hopefully we can defend them."


