

Homedale's Vega grabs top 20 finish at State

Her coach had set goals all year. On Saturday, Nick Schamber's prodding helped Homedale High School sophomore Belen Vega finished 16th in the 3A cross country state meet.

Vega was the third-fastest District III representative to complete the 5-kilometer course at Eagle Island State Park. She finished in 21 minutes, 19.06 seconds, 8 seconds behind Middleton's Samantha Roberts. Roberts finished 14th, while the top District III runner was Amanda Palmer of Weiser.

She finished second in the race in 19:35.45, a full 24 seconds after Cydney Jacobsen of Bear Lake crossed the line to win the state title.

On the boys side, Homedale freshman Tyler Gibson finished that 5K

in 19:25.87, which placed him 55th in the field. Junior Scott Thatcher was 61st at 19:35.52.

None of the Trojans' three state meet qualifiers had run cross country before joining the team for Schamber's first year as coach back in August.

Grizzlies' ground game gobbles up young Trojans

Team speed was a hallmark throughout the season for Homedale High School football, but on Friday the Trojans ran into the kings of quick against Fruitland.

"They've got a talented bunch. They're coached well. Speed's a big factor, and at times they blew us off the line," Trojans coach Thomas Thomas said.

The Grizzlies took advantage of every opportunity and every Homedale weakness — including three sophomores on the Trojans' defensive front — to post a 48-0 3A Snake River Valley conference victory at Deward Bell Stadium.

At times, Homedale had three sophomores — Amador Cortinas, Jaime Uriarte and Terence Thomas — on the defensive line, and another 10th-grader, Daniel Valadez, at linebacker.

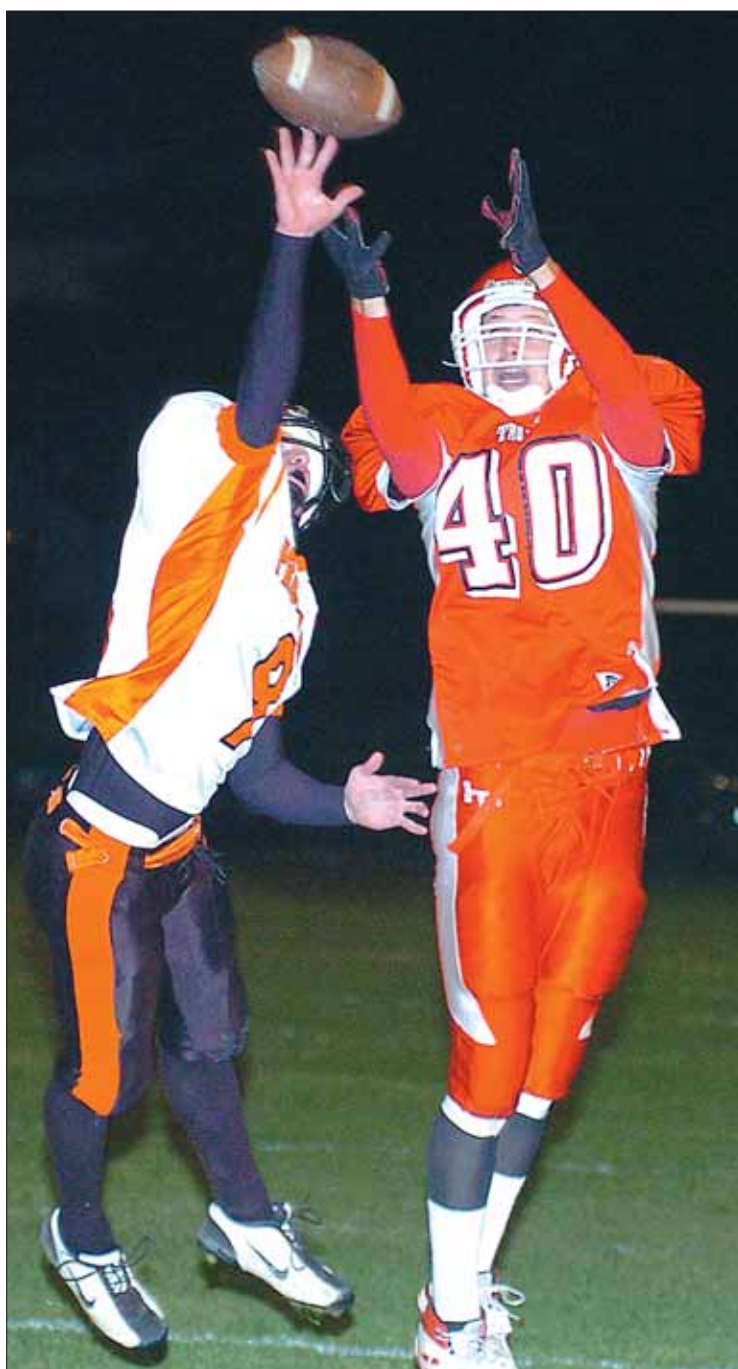
Fruitland (8-1 overall, 4-1 3A SRV) wrapped up the second state playoff berth from District III with the dominating victory. Homedale (4-5, 2-3) lost its third straight game and notched only the sixth losing season in Trojans' history since the modern era began with coach Deward Bell's arrival in 1955.

Four of those seasons (1995, 1996, 2004, 2005) have come in the past 10 years.

Friday's season-ending loss was the first setback suffered by the Trojans on their home field this year.

And Fruitland started the rout quickly.

The Grizzlies assumed possession on Homedale's 11-yard

Adrian-JV rivalry reborn through OSAA alignment

The Jordan Valley-Adrian high school rivalry will rekindle in the fall after the Oregon School Activities Association voted for realignment on Oct. 24.

Under the new plan, Jordan Valley and Adrian will be placed in the newly created 1A District 8 with 12 other schools.

Essentially, not much will change for Jordan Valley athletics in terms of travel, but the road will get a little easier for Adrian.

All schools in the OSAA were asked to submit their preferences during the research period for this realignment.

"Geographically, it's just a better situation," Adrian football coach and school superintendent Gene Mills said. "If we sub-district the district, the furthest trip will be as far as our nearest trip."

Adrian athletic director Aimee Goss said a meeting is scheduled for next month to figure out the logistics of the new district, and a main topic will be splitting it into subdistricts.

"I see them making two leagues, and you'll play closest to you,"

Shrine Game calls on three Trojans seniors

Carson, Sweet, Christofferson to play in all-star game in Boise

Homedale High School's football season is over, but three Trojans will slip on the pads for one more game in their prep careers. Outside linebacker Tyler Christofferson, tailback Kyle Carson and wide receiver Garrett Sweet have been tabbed by area coaches to play in the Shrine Game all-star contest for Treasure Valley players on Nov. 25 at Bishop Kelly High School in Boise.

The Shrine Game is a senior showcase for athletes at all levels in the valley.

The 6-foot-5, 185-pound Sweet made his living on the football field this season by outjumping shorter defensive backs for balls launched by either Christofferson or Trevor Krzesnik.

Sweet finished the 2005 campaign as Homedale's leading scorer and had 23 catches for 437 yards and seven touchdowns. He capped his career at Homedale with a five-catch, 100-yard performance in Friday's 48-0 loss to Fruitland.

Christofferson (5-10, 155) was a two-way player for the Trojans, and he helped anchor assistant coach Dave Hart's 3-5 defense at outside linebacker.

"Tyler Christofferson played a fantastic outside back. That's

the hardest position to play," Hart said. "We put a lot of pressure on those strong safety-type guys. They've got to play pass and run and sweep and option.

"He did a heck of a job. He deserves to go to that all-star game."

Carson (5-9, 165) shared the bulk of the running duties with junior Ryan Johnson. Carson finished the season as the Trojans' second-leading rusher with 430 yards on 123 carries. He scored three touchdowns.

"Kyle and Tyler deserve it because they're such good leaders," Homedale coach Thomas Thomas said.

Adrian football pounds out win

Sophomore Aaron Langley ran wild over North Lake High School on Friday as Adrian posted a 56-32 non-league victory in Crane, Ore.

Langley scored on runs of 15 yards and 33 yards as the Antelopes (6-2 overall) built a 24-0 lead in the first quarter.

Langley also scored on a 41-yard scamper in the fourth quarter.

North Lake (1-7) tried to mount comebacks on two different occasions.

Chris Schumacher scored two touchdowns in the second quarter, pulling within 14 points, 30-16, at one point.

Chris Schumacher ran six yards for his second touchdown of the game to push Adrian's lead back to three scores. Schumacher returned a North Lake fumble 12 yards in the first quarter for his first touchdown.

The Antelopes pulled out to a 40-point lead in the fourth quarter before North Lake scored a couple more touchdowns.

Eric Rios scored Adrian's other touchdown on a 33-yard run in the third quarter. Rios finished with 51 yards rushing, while the Antelopes piled up 358 yards rushing on 39 attempts against North Lake.

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line when Trojans kick returner Mark Vance fumbled the opening kickoff. Two plays later — and 51 seconds into the game — Fruitland quarterback Trent Gatzemeyer got his only pass completion of the game, an 8-yard scoring strike to Shawn Parker.

It wouldn't be the last time the Trojans would see Parker in the end zone.

The 5-foot-8, 160-pound senior racked up 199 yards on just nine carries, a per-rush average of 22.1 yards. Two of his rushes covered 98 yards and went for touchdowns.

One of Parker's backfield mates, senior Adam Smith, streaked up the middle all night and finished with 138 yards on 10 carries (13.8 yards per carry).

Smith run right through the center of the twice in the first quarter for touchdowns of 45 and 50 yards. He also scored on a 3-yard run in the second

quarter.

"Our key was to stop the big play, and when they do cutbacks sometimes the kids blitz out of position to take care of the cutbacks or wouldn't get over there," Thomas said. "It just goes down to basic angles and basic football.

"Sometimes we'll blitz out of it. Sometimes our kids just didn't recover."

Fruitland threw too many haymakers for Homedale's defense, which was peppered with young players, to find its feet again. The Grizzlies piled up all but eight of its 435 yards offense on the ground.

Meanwhile, Homedale's struggles with its own running game continued. The Trojans managed just 1.4 yards per carry (46 yards on 34 attempts).

"It's missing blitzers periodically and being outmatched inside," Thomas said of the downturn of the Homedale running attack against the top three SRV teams — Weiser, Middleton and Fruitland.

The longest run from scrim-

mage for Homedale came from backup running back Gilbert Obregon, who motored for 20 yards the first time he touched the ball Friday.

While the running game floundered again, the Trojans caught glimpses of a passing game, and senior wideout Garrett Sweet was the beneficiary.

Sweet hauled in five passes for 100 yards, but the two other Trojans to catch balls — Bryan Martinat and Ricco Gonzalez — collected just 28 yards.

"We wanted to get it in the end zone, though," Thomas said. "We had a few chances, but we shot ourselves in the foot."

Fruitland's pass rush hassled quarterbacks Trevor Krzesnik and Tyler Christofferson most of the night. The two-headed signal-calling setup resulted in four interceptions.

"I'm not ashamed," Thomas said. "If the kids try hard and look me in the eye after the game and they give 100 percent, I'm not ashamed at all."

said Goss, who is also Adrian's volleyball coach.

Under the current alignment, Adrian's shortest trip is a 320-mile round-trip journey to Powder Valley in North Powder. The longest trip for the football team this year was a 420-mile round-trip trek to play Joseph.

"It's going to help financially and in terms of missed school time," Mills said, echoing one of the reasons the realignment was undertaken in the first place. "And it's less distance for our fans to travel for a ballgame."

The reorganization was unanimously approved at the OSAA meeting in Wilsonville, Ore., and added two more districts to the six-district Class 1A. OSAA sports information director Steve Walker said last week that the realignment was approved after a 35-member delegation decided what the enrollment standards would be for each class. The 1A division is for schools with an average daily membership of 115 students, as calculated by numbers from the 2004-05 school year.

Said Walker: "The committee looked at three criteria for realignment: To increase competition, shorten travel distance and lessen the enrollment gap between larger and smaller schools within a classification."

The realignment process began in 2004 with a public comment period. The new alignment will be in effect from the fall of 2006 until the spring of 2010.

The entire process begins anew in September 2008, Walker said.

When the new alignment takes hold next fall, it will bring an end to Adrian's competition against football teams now in the Old Oregon League, but the Antelopes gain the possibility of a league date with Jordan Valley each year.

"Our biggest rivalry

traditionally has been Jordan Valley and Crane," said Mills, who has coached at both Adrian and Jordan Valley in his career.

Crane will make the jump with Jordan Valley and Adrian to the new District 8.

Jordan Valley superintendent and athletic director Mike Sessions says his school won't benefit as much from the realignment because it's a long drive anywhere in Oregon from Jordan Valley.

"Football-wise and with volleyball, there's not any change," Sessions said. "In basketball, it will change significantly because we won't be going to Joseph (534 miles round-trip) and Wallowa (486 miles) and Cove (396 miles) and have those overnight trips."

The travel costs probably will stay the same for Jordan Valley, Sessions said, because there are still jaunts to Crane (218 miles) and Unity, Ore. (316 miles), where Burnt River High School is located.

"We'll try to figure out something and not go past there," he said, "but we still have to go to Monument (530 miles) and Dayville (476 miles) and Prairie City (446 miles)."

The longest trip for either Adrian or Jordan Valley — which are only 67 miles apart — would be to Mt. Bachelor Academy in Prineville. It would be a 592-mile round trip for the Mustangs and a 450-mile trip for the Antelopes.

There is a chance, though, that a subdistricting plan could eliminate a trip that far.

Or it could be left to the state of athletics at Mt. Bachelor from year to year, Sessions said.

"Sometimes they have a football team, and sometimes they don't," Sessions said. "They also have a basketball team and have mid-year graduation, so sometimes they cancel the second half of the basketball season."

The Mustangs' win-loss record in 2005 was nothing to sneeze at considering Jordan Valley coach Jeremy Chamberlain had only 10 players go out for football. Some observers didn't expect the team to win at all, but the Mustangs made their fans proud with their superior determination.

"Next year we will have more players and more experience," freshman Koehl Trautman said.

Hofer completed three passes for 40 yards as the Raiders' quarterback.



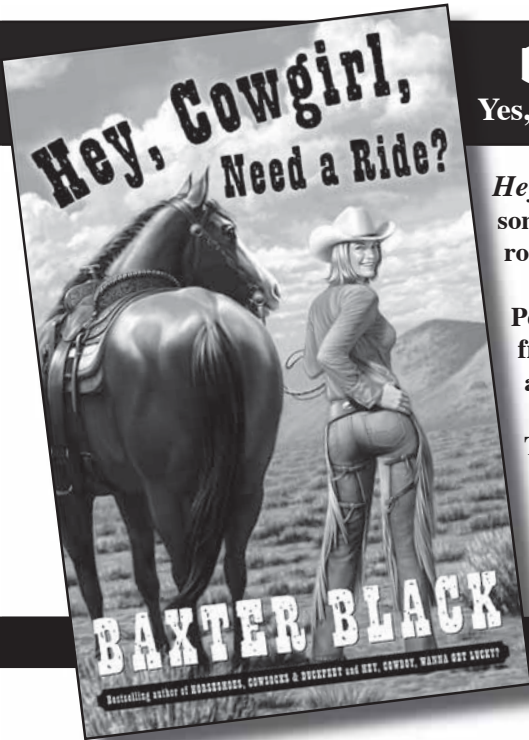

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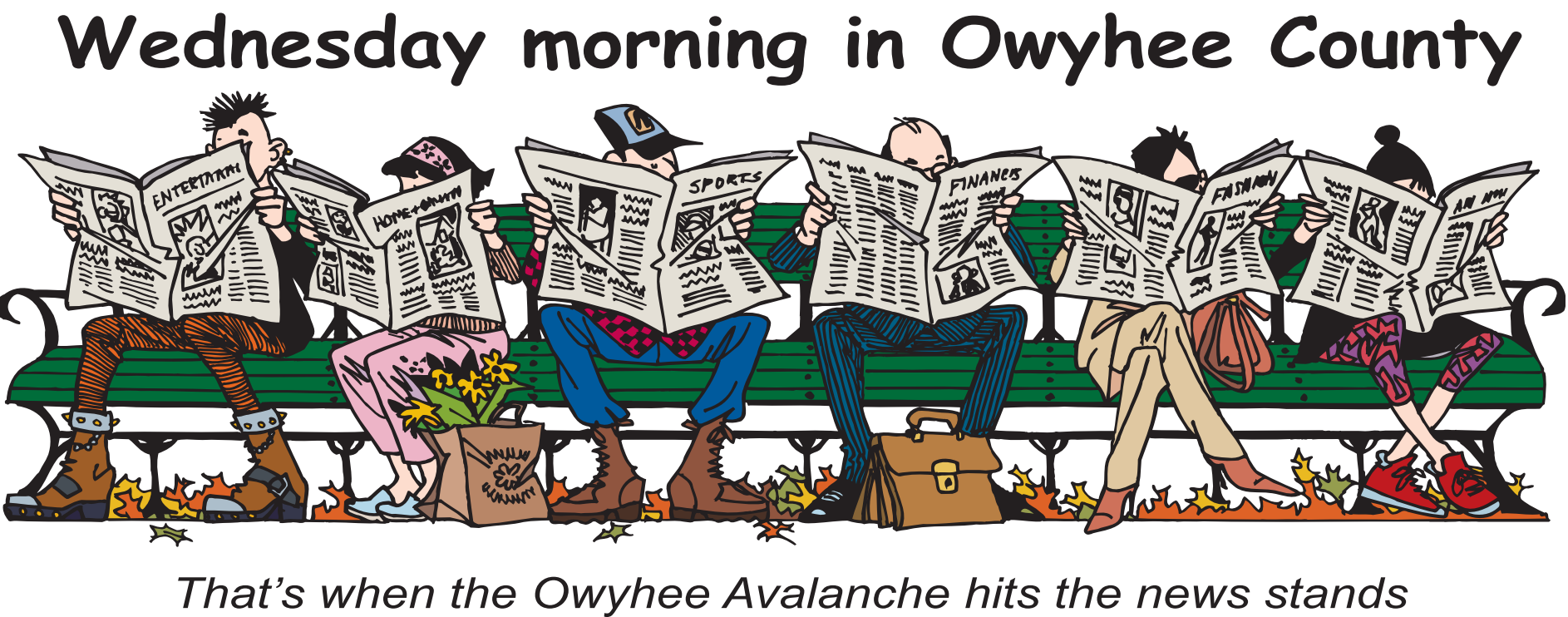
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
