JV volleyball finishes 2nd at State

After fighting through six games at state, the Jordan Valley High School volleyball team brought home the second-place trophy from the Oregon 1A state tournament in Springfield, Ore., last week.

"We came together as a team, and I was proud that we made it as far as we did," senior Cassia Trautman said. In the best two-out-ofthree state title match, Jordan Valley dropped a close 25-23, 27-25 decision to Dufur, which defended its

state title. Lauren Cuvelier

The last time Jordan Valley had

reached the state tournament, the Mustangs lost the 1999 title match to Ione 15-8, 15-11.

The loss to Dufur snapped the Mustangs' 20-match winning streak, and Jordan Valley finished the season 20-1. Dufur entered the tournament as the District 3 champion.

"We were having some problems getting our offense rolling and getting hits on our third touch," Jordan Valley coach Jacque Naegle said. "I'm proud of our girls. We might have ended our season with one loss at the end of the state championships, but I think Dufur was relieved that it was best two-out-of-three and they didn't have to play us again."

Mustang hitter Lauren Cuvelier made first team all-tournament at State, and Angela Larsen made second team.

Cuvelier led the Mustangs'

charge in the title match with five kills, followed by three for Michelle Baltzor, two for Larsen 2 and one for Trautman.

Cuvelier had four blocks and Larsen added two. Bailey Kershner and Breann Hipwell each contributed seven assists in the state final.

At the end of the day, the Mustangs were happy it was

Adrian bows on State stage

The Adrian High School volleyball team came within a few points of transferring into Saturday's bracket play at the Oregon 1A state tournament in Springfield, Ore.

After winning the first game of their final pool-play match on Friday, the Antelopes dropped a 16-25, 25-22, 15-13 decision to Damascus Christian, the No. 2 seed from District 1.

"I was pleased with our performance at State, (but) disappointed that we didn't finish against Damascus when we had the chance though to make it into the tournament on Saturday," Adrian coach Aimee Goss said.

The loss shut Adrian out of the second day of the tournament in the Antelopes' first trip to State since 2000.

The Huskies ended their hibernation with a flurry of second-half layups to collect a 52-39 non-conference victory on the Trojans' home

Students raise money for Trojans coach

When Homedale High School girls soccer coach and Homedale Middle School teacher Lesa Folwell undergoes surgery today, she'll be bolstered by the knowledge that so many people in the community care for her.

Folwell, who has taught at the middle school for two years, is having surgery today at the University of Utah Medical Center in Salt Lake City to repair a lung disorder that has kept her from fully enjoying her time with the Tro-

jans and her sixth-grade students.

Folwell suffers from something called spontaneous pneumothorax. The disorder causes air

to escape the *Lesa Folwell* lungs, and the

building pressure collapses the top part of Folwell's lung.

"It happened the first time about 2 1/2 years ago," she said. "I had surgery two years ago which supposedly fixed it."

Even with the limitations the

ailment has created, Folwell found out Friday just what kind of impact she has had when students at the middle school rallied to raise money to cover her travel expenses with a bake sale during the school's two lunch periods.

"I'm totally surprised by the whole thing," Folwell said Friday afternoon. "It is just totally amazing, and I can't believe how they got so many people involved."

JoAnn Morris, a fifth-grade teacher at HMS, said that the bake sale and other donations from the school's faculty helped raise about \$500 for Folwell. When the bake sale began during the first lunch

Cuvelier led with 13 kills, followed by four from Trautman and three each from Baltzor and Larsen

Bailey Kershner had 13 assists, and Hipwell added 10.

Cuvelier recorded four blocks. After a break, Jordan Valley thrashed South Wasco in two games, 25-10, 25-12, as Cuvelier came through with eight kills. South Wasco was the third seed from District 3.

Trautman and Baltzor each had three kills. Trautman and Larsen registered two blocks, with Baltzor adding one.

Kershner had a dozen assists,

and Hipwell added seven. The Mustangs, champions of

District 4, wrapped up Friday's pool play with an 18-25, 25-14, 15-9 victory over Umpqua Valley Christian, the No. 2 seed from District 2.

Cuvelier had five kills, while Trautman (four), Larsen (three) and Baltzor (two) backed her up in that category.

Larsen had two blocks, and Cuvelier, Baltzor and Trautman had one each.

Kershner got her customary 12 assists, and Hipwell chipped in nine.

Bracket play began Saturday morning with the Mustangs smashing District 1 No. 2 seed Damascus Christian, 25-15, 25-15. Cuvelier exploded with 10 kills, while Larsen had six and Baltzor and Trautman added four each.

Larsen had two blocks, with Cuvelier and Baltzor each picking up one.

Kershner and Hipwell were electric from the setter position, collecting 16 and 15 assists, respectively.

In the state semifinals, Cuvelier collected 11 kills as Jordan Valley swept District 1 No. 3 seed Perrydale 25-14, 26-24.

Kershner had another 16 assists, and Hipwell added 15.

Baltzor, Trautman and Larsen registered four kills each, while Cuvelier had five blocks.



The Homedale High School volleyball team held its year-end banquet Wednesday night to say good bye to the team's seniors and celebrate the achievements of the program during the 2005 season.

The Trojans (6-13 overall) finished fourth in the 3A District III Tournament in Middleton last month.

"I learned a lot during my first year of coaching," Homedale coach Maleta Henry said. "I couldn't have asked for any better athletes.

Seniors Hailee Garrett, Hailey Hall and Faith Brasher wrapped up their high school careers with nominations to the All-Snake River Valley conference team.

Garrett, a 5-foot-5 setter and off-side hitter, was named to the first team. Garrett was a team served 20 aces.

Hall, a 5-11 outside hitter, landed on the second team. Hall served 32 aces and racked up 92 kills this season. She also had 30 blocks

Brasher, a 5-10 outside hitter, was an honorable mention. A team captain, Brasher recorded 75 kills and served 19 aces during the season.

Garrett and Hall also were selected for the District III all-star team, which played its exhibition game Nov. 7 in Fruitland.

Henry also handed out scholar awards at last week's banquet.

Seniors Faith Brasher and Jenny George and sophomore Mandy Brasher, all varsity players, earned 4.0 grade-point averages during the season. Senior Jessica Mooney earned a 3.85, and Garrett carried a 3 71 Rachel Wheeler a captain who collected 73 assists sophomore on the Trojans' junior for kills, registered five kills and varsity team, was cited for her 3.71 GPA.



But senior MJ Usabel took over on the backboards - she finished with 10 rebounds, including seven on Homedale's end. She and Martinez scored nine of their team's 10 points in the third quarter.

Usabel had 10 points, and Martinez led all scorers with 16. Despite playing the bulk of the game with three fouls, Hall paced Homedale with 14 points, including a couple 3-point goals. Marsing's next game is Tuesday at home against Homedale. The freshman game starts at 4:45 p.m.

"I went through a series where every week it was happening," she said. "It has become chronic."

Folwell missed preseason practice with the Trojans. Her lung collapsed again three or four times during the season, but she never missed a game.

Folwell, who has been the only coach for the two-year-old soccer program, is focused on getting better and getting back to teaching at the middle school.


And students and the faculty, no doubt, eagerly await her return.

Raiders girls raring to go

The old adage is familiarity breeds contempt. But playing together for six years has spawned no disdain among the Rimrock High School girls basketball players.

Well, except maybe for a strong dislike for losing.

"They were 22-4 last year. Most people would be happy about that," Rimrock coach Bob Delle said. "You go talk to any one of them, and they're all devastated. They thought it was the world's worst year in the history of basketball."

The Raiders open the season Saturday afternoon on the road in Dietrich as winners of 73 of their last 78 games. That includes consecutive 1A state titles in 2002-03 and 2003-04 and a 50game winning streak that ended with a 52-44 loss to Glenns Ferry in the season opener last year.

"The expectations are high, and they're high again this year," said Delle, who has coached the Raiders for nine years. "These girls expect to win the league and they expect to the district and they expect to win the state.

"Whether they can get it done remains to be seen."

It would be a good bet. Rimrock has made six consecutive appearances in the final four of the 16-team 1A state tournament.

And seven seniors return to the team for one last go-round with

Delle. He has said this will be his final season at Rimrock, and that's only because he promised the current crop of seniors he would stick around after he contemplated retirement when they were sophomores.

The top six scorers from last year's squad, which lost in the quarterfinals of the state tournament, are back in the fold this season.

In that bunch are two players who were named to last year's 1A All-State team as juniors. Emily Chandler, a 5-foot-8 guard, was a first-teamer, and 5-10 post-guard Robynn Ridley was placed on the second team.

"What we have in the cupboard is plenty adequate to get done what we've got to do," Delle said. "Our problem is: Can we stay focused and keep our heads on straight and get the road to get it done?"

Delle admits that focus is one of the few areas where the Raiders need some work. But who can blame them with the recent history of the program? After all, half of last year's four defeats came at the hands of larger schools.

"These girls, basically, their whole season rides on the last two days (Feb. 17-18)," Delle said, referring to final two days of the 1A Real Dairy Shootout state tournament. "So how do you keep them motivated all the way to (Feb. 17-18), because that's what they're motivated for."

Chances are the seniors have been together long enough to find motivation from their history.

It's all speculation, though, because not even Delle has an answer for the drive exhibited by the Rimrock players.

"I don't know," the coach said. "I hope it's that they like to compete and they like to do well and collectively they feed on each other.

"And hopefully some of it comes from myself and my assistants."

Or it could be that once the first game of the season rolls around that the Raiders are so tired of running fundamental drills that they are just happy to play an opponent.

Delle said that Rimrock scrimmages maybe 10 minutes during a two-hour practice. The rest of the time, it's all about the drills. But once the Raiders start playing, expect to see an uptempo game and a emphasis on man-to-man defense.

"We have not been in a big hurry to do anything other than getting their legs back under them and working on some shooting," Delle said at the Marsing Jamboree on Nov. 8. "They'll be a lot better in two weeks."

Two senior first-teamers lead Homedale All-SRV contingent

A strong start to the Snake River Valley conference season translated into a good showing on the all-conference football team for Homedale High School.

And it doesn't look too bad for the future of the Trojans' program, either.

A total of 10 players were placed on the three levels of the all-league team in voting by coaches, including two seniors on the first team Homedale's second-team selections had a young feel to them, which bolsters the coaching staff's assertion that things will only get better for the Trojans, who finished 4-5 this year after a season-ending three-game losing streak.

Josh Jolley, a 6-foot-2, 225pound junior, was picked as a lineman on both sides of the ball. Jolley had some flashes of brillance during the season. He had a sack and a fumble recovery in the Trojans' watershed 11-6 non-conference win over New Plymouth. Junior Bryan Martinat, a second-team all-league pick at linebacker, also emerged as a threat as the defense clicked against the Pilgrims on Sept. 16. The speedy 6-0, 155-pound defensive back exploded with three quarterback sacks, two forced fumbles and four tackles behind the line of scrimmage in Homedale's homecoming game. Another underclassman selected to the second team was giant 6-8, 265-pound sophomore Terence Thomas. The coach's son was selected as an offensive lineman. Ricco Gonzalez, a 6-foot, 170pounder who finished his senior season with three interceptions, was picked as a second-team defensive back.

Two linemen and the Trojans' starting running back corps made the honorable mention list.

Ryan Johnson, a 5-8, 165-pound junior, rushed for a team-high 459 yards and was tied for the team lead with four rushing TDs. He averaged 4.4 yards a carry. Johnson was also honored for his kicking ability, which included 11 PATs and two field goals. His 34-yard boot late in the first half accounted for the first points of the game in the 11-6 win over New Plymouth. Johnson's backfield mate, the 5-9, 165-pound senior Carson, bulled his way to 430 yards rushing and a spot on the honorable mention team

Christofferson and Sweet will join Kyle Carson, a second-team all-league selection, as Homedale's representatives at the Shrine Game, the senior all-star showcase that will be held Nov. 25 at Bishop Kelly High School in Boise. Opening holes for Carson and Johnson was senior Humberto Obregon (5-6, 205), who was an honorable mention All-SRV offensive lineman.

Jaime Uriate, who at 6-1 and 273 pounds is another young gun to watch down the road, was named an honorable mention defensive lineman as a sophomore.
