

## Trojans fall in last seconds

New Homedale High School girls basketball coach Mike Greeley got a haircut and trimmed his beard last week. And in two games since then, his Trojans endured some close shaves as well.

"Change is good," Greeley said, relating his new look to the improvement on the court.

Homedale's season-opening losing streak stretched to four games with two non-conference losses last week, including a 45-44 setback on the road to Parma on Nov. 15 and a 38-37 loss in the final seconds to Melba on Thursday in Homedale.

In Thursday's loss, Melba came out on top when junior LesAnn Harris flung a 3-point shot through the hoop with 4 seconds to go.

It was Harris' third trey of the game and came on her 16th shot of the contest. She had missed 10 straight shots at one point.

"That was just a Hail Mary. Just basketball at its finest and its worst," Greeley said. "It was just Hail Mary luck."

Even after Harris' prayer was answered, Homedale still had hope. Hailee Garrett fumbled the inbounds pass near the top of the key, and Faith Brasher recovered the loose ball and fired a 3-point try that rattled in and out of the basket.

"Hailee Garrett's upset because she didn't come out on that pass

on top at the end of the game," Greeley said. "I said, 'Hey, it's better than having it go out of bounds.'"

"And we got a shot out of it. Doesn't get much better than that with 2 seconds on the clock. That was a tremendous effort."

It was amazing that the Trojans even had the opportunity to be that close to the Mustangs after the shorter Melba squad dominated Homedale's backboard in the first half.

The Mustangs held a 15-1 rebounding edge on Homedale's end of the floor in the first 16 minutes. Junior Emily Romero paced Melba with seven defensive rebounds, while four of Harris' game-high nine boards came on the Trojans' glass.

Homedale's first offensive rebound of the game was pulled down by Faith Brasher with 1 minute, 15 seconds left in the first half. The Trojans collected only four boards on their end of the floor in the game.

"We weren't getting any rebounds," Greeley said. "That was the difference in the ballgame."

Defense was the reason the Trojans hung around the rest of the way.

## Glenns Ferry drops tuckered Huskies

The Marsing High School girls basketball team is in this for the long haul.

Maybe that's why Huskies coach Don Heller's frustration last week melted away into a determination to not relive the nightmare he endured against Glenns Ferry on Nov. 15.

After pressuring Glenns Ferry incessantly in the first quarter, the Huskies ran out of gas and fell victim to a sloppy offensive showing in a 46-43 in non-conference loss at home.

"We made great steals and then we turn around and throw the ball away without even looking," Heller said. "We had awesome defensive efforts, and then we just give them an easy one because we throw it away."

The fatigue resulted in poor ball-handling decisions on the offensive end of the floor. The Huskies (1-1) committed 29 turnovers against the Pilots (1-1).

But the Huskies' ball-hawking

defense forced Glenns Ferry into 41 turnovers, including four steals from Samantha Wilson and three apiece from Mollee Nielsen and Holly Heller.

Marsing steamed out to an 11-3 lead by forcing 11 turnovers in the first eight minutes. But Glenns Ferry's Alisha Crane fueled 12 straight points in the second quarter as the Pilots took control.

Crane, a 5-foot-10 junior, scored 10 of the dozen points, including a pair of free throws with 2 minutes, 16 seconds left in the first half for the Plots' first lead of the game at 15-14. Crane finished with 26 points.

"We just played lazy defense," Heller said. "We never had any backside help, anybody standing in the middle of the key to help out."

"First quarter, we did that. The whole time we were intercepting passes. Then in the second quarter,

One of Mooney's steals set up Hailey Hall's turnaround jump shot in the paint for a 24-23 Homedale lead with just under four minutes remaining in the third quarter.

Garrett and Hall each scored nine points for Homedale.

Garrett, who dished some key passes in the third quarter, ignited an 8-3 run in the fourth quarter with a layup and a 3-pointer as the Trojans grabbed a 37-31 lead with 2 1/2 minutes to go.

Turnovers put the Trojans' offense in a deep freeze after that.

"We just came down the floor

and had three turnovers in a row, and it gave them a chance to catch up," Greeley said.

Johnson fired in a jumper with 1:22 left to pull Melba within a basket at 37-35. Despite two blocked shots by Brasher 22 seconds later and sloppy ball-handling of their own, the Mustangs came away with the victory.

Cheyenne Andrade scored a game-high 13 points to lead the Trojans, but her scrappy play was lost with 35 seconds remaining when she suffered a slight hyperextension of her right shoulder diving for a loose ball. "She was putting shots in when we needed them," Greeley said of Andrade. "She was making big plays when we needed them. That was the bottom line. She turned it up tonight for us."

The Homedale High School junior varsity girls basketball team won both its games last week, but not without a little drama.

The Trojans edged visiting Melba 33-31 in overtime on Thursday with foul shots from Mikal Mackenzie and Hannah Johnson Gibson making up the difference in the extra period.

Melba's Cara Duckworth, a 5-foot-3 gunslinger, threw in a buzzer-beating 3-point shot from well beyond the arc at the end of regulation to tie the score 26-26.

Duckworth, who scored 11 points all in the second half and nine of those on treys, banked in another deep 3-pointer with 30 seconds left in OT to get the Mustangs within a point 32-31.

Taryn Corta scored 10 points to lead the Trojans.

On Nov. 15, Corta scored 11 points as the Trojans went on the road to beat Parma 46-28. Whitney Rohrbacher, a 5-foot-11 sophomore, led all scorers with 12 points for the Panthers. Teammate Erin Nielsen added 10.

## Marsing football team hands out postseason awards

Marsing High School's football program wrapped up the 2005 season Wednesday with a postseason awards presentation.

Huskies coach Don Heller thanked the athletes' parents for their support throughout the year before acknowledging his seniors then handing out awards for both the varsity and junior varsity.

Shea McClellin, a junior fullback who rushed for more than 1,000 yards with only seven starts this year, was honored as the varsity's Back of the Year during the ceremony inside the Huskies' gymnasium.

Jeb Russell, who helped open holes for McClellin, received the Lineman of the Year award to cap his senior season.

Junior Daniel Ineck was honored as the varsity's Most Improved Player.

David Marcial, a junior, was named the JV's Back of the Year.

we're tired and we stand there and let them cut in front of us without putting any kind of defense on them."

The tired Huskies couldn't capitalize on their continued defensive effort primarily because the poor passing negated the advantage in transition.

"How many times in a row did we have 2-on-1s and threw it out of bounds, fumbled it out of bounds?" Heller said. "That should be an automatic score every time."

Marsing briefly regained the first-quarter magic in the second half, building a 24-18 lead on MJ Usabel's hook shot. But Crane and Tori Hurst sparked an 8-0 run to put the Pilots back on top, 28-26. That lead grew to 37-28 before Elisa Moreno hit a jump shot with 10 seconds to go in the third quarter for the Huskies.

Moreno scored 12 points, and most came in key situations. Usabel also scored 12 points and collected 15 rebounds, including 12 on the Glenns Ferry glass.

The Huskies pulled within a point, 38-37, on Nielsen's

jumper with 5:40 left in the game. Seven straight points from Moreno highlighted a 9-1 rally by Marsing.

But when the Huskies got the ball back on Glenns Ferry's 37th turnover, Holly Heller threw the ball away with 4:39 left. Samantha Richards hit a jump shot a minute later to give the Pilots enough cushion to ride the storm out.

"You make your 2-on-1s, and you blow them away," Don Heller said.

But the coach assured concerned fans that the fatigue-induced offensive lapses won't be the norm.

"When you have an 11-point lead in the first quarter and let them score 12 in a row. ... But that will change," he said.

"Guaranteed by District time that won't be happening."

Marsing plays host to Nyssa, Ore., in a non-conference game Monday.

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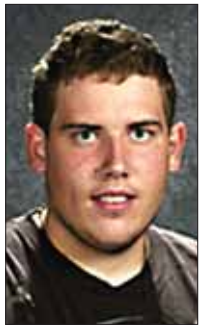

## McClellin leads Huskies' All-2A WIC football picks

He wasn't even supposed to play in the offensive backfield this season, but Marsing High School junior Shea McClellin parlayed his opportunity into a second-team berth on the all-league football squad for the 2A Western Idaho Conference.

As a linebacker, he was also one of four Marsing defensive players to be named to the all-league first team.

A 6-foot-4, 206-pound junior, McClellin started the season at tight end for coach Don Heller, but worked his way onto the all-league second team after being pressed into duty at fullback.

McClellin's presence in the backfield was required after injuries to Perry Gibson and Jamison Price.

He rushed for 306 yards in his 2005 debut against Valley and 292 yards against Nampa Christian. McClellin finished the season with 1,022 yards on 164 rushes in just seven games. He scored 11 touchdowns and averaged 6.2

yards per carry and 146 yards a game.

What makes McClellin's numbers on offense even more extraordinary was that he was a full-time fullback for only six of those seven games.

As good as he was at fullback, McClellin was selected to the All-WIC first team as a linebacker. Placing four athletes on the first-team defense was an amazing feature for a Huskies team that surrendered 35 points per game during a 1-7 season.

"Our defense was 100 times better than last year," Marsing coach Don Heller said in an earlier interview, perhaps hinting at a reason so many defenders were nominated to the all-league team.

Behemoth junior Dan Galligan, who stands 6-3 and weighs 300 pounds, and 5-10, 200-pound senior Jeb Russell were elected to the all-league first team as defensive linemen.

Gibson (5-10, 165), one of the Huskies' representatives for the

Nov. 25 Shrine Game in Boise, earned a spot as a defensive back after enduring a senior season marred by a foot injury.

Senior lineman Ernie Villa (6-0, 200), Marsing's homecoming king, was the Huskies' lone first-team selection on offense.

Joining McClellin on the second team was offensive lineman Michael Tuckness (6-0, 185, junior) and 5-10, 165-pound junior defensive lineman Daniel Ineck.

Senior Chris Covey, another Shrine Game nominee, was an honorable mention at wide receiver. The 6-3, 166-pounder, who averaged 15.9 yards per reception, caught 10 passes and scored a touchdown.

Honorable mention selections from the Huskies' defense included 6-0, 195-pound senior linebacker Jamison Price, who battled shoulder and back injuries this season, and Sergio Quebrado, a defensive back who wasn't even on the varsity roster for the season opener against Payette.

## Four Rimrock players named all-leaguers

Four players from Rimrock High School's football team were named to the A-1, Div. I all-conference team, which was released by coaches late last week.

And the future is bright for the Raiders. Two of the players selected are sophomores.

Three players from first-year coach Jim Clark's squad were named all-league, including senior Wes Aquiso as both a running back and a linebacker.

Senior Anthony Hofer and sophomore Chris Hipwell earned berths as linebackers.

Sophomore defensive lineman Carlos Salinas earned honorable mention.

The Raiders were 1-7 in their first year under Clark during the 2005 season. Defensive statistics aren't available for Rimrock's Sept. 10 game against Cole Valley in Boise.

Aquiso led Rimrock's ground game with 740 yards on 106 carries. He averaged 6.9 yards

per rush and scored seven touchdowns. Aquiso rushed for 92.5 yards a game.

Hofer recorded 42 solo tackles, including 12 in Rimrock's 40-22 loss to Idaho City on Oct. 21.

He also had three interceptions, and picked off two passes in the Raiders' season-ending 42-8 loss to Cascade on Oct. 28.

Aquiso had 28 solo stops, five assists and one quarterback sack.

Hipwell had 39 solo tackles, seven assists and picked off one pass. He also recorded a sack. As was the case for many players as the defense came around late in the season for Clark, Hipwell made a season-high nine solo tackles against Cascade.

Salinas made his mark by helping his teammates with stops.

While the sophomore collected 31 solo tackles, he also assisted on 12 other tackles and picked up sacks against Tri-Valley on Sept. 30 and Dietrich on Sept. 2.

## Hall's 22 can't help Homedale in defeat

Senior Hailey Hall poured in 22 points on Nov. 15, but Homedale High School's girls basketball team couldn't get a shot to fall in the final eight seconds and lost to Parma, 45-44, in a non-conference game on the road.

"It was just a tough game. We were kind of flat," Homedale coach Mike Greeley said.

Homedale owned a 23-16 advantage at halftime on the strength of Hall's 15 first-half points and a tight ball-control offense that gave up possession only six times.

In the second half, though, the

Trojans committed 21 turnovers and let the Panthers from the 2A Western Idaho Conference climb back into the game.

"It just boils down to creating opportunities for the other team," Greeley said.

Lacey LaPierre, a 5-foot-10 junior, sparked Parma with eight of her 14 points in the fourth quarter. The Panthers entered the final eight minutes trailing by just a point.

Cheyenne Andrade converted four consecutive free-throw chances in the second half as part of her nine points. Hailee Garrett added seven points, including a 3-point goal.

Hall hit a pair of 3-pointers. Jessica Mooney scored six points in the second half and led the Trojans' rebounding effort with seven boards.

She also led the team with four steals.

Senior Brittney Lehman and junior Logan Smyser scored nine points apiece for Parma.

Homedale visits Melba on Tuesday.
