Trojans girls beat Huskies for first victory

Last week's high school girls basketball game between Marsing and Homedale was one for the lost and found file.

After starting the season with four straight losses, the visiting Trojans found the key to victory. Mike Greeley got his first victory as Homedale coach, 43-39, against a Huskies team that lost sight of its team goals.

"We need to run our offense," Marsing coach Don Heller said. "I mean, we went over it: Make good cuts. Make good passes. Look for the skip pass."

The Huskies fell to 1-2 with their second straight loss, while Homedale moved to 1-4.

Marsing used its trademark pressure defense to cause a slew of turnovers in the half, but the Huskies were unable to capitalize on the numerous steals and left the door cracked for Homedale and Cheyanne Andrade.

The 5-foot-10 senior emerged in the third quarter as the Trojans turned the tide with a little help from the Huskies' ongoing ballhandling woes.

"Our last two practices, we've spent a third of it going over skip passes and reversing the ball, and we were just throwing it everywhere," Heller said. Marsing committed seven of its 18 turnovers in the third quarter.

Marsing gave the ball away twice in the first 90 seconds after halftime, and Andrade scored half of her game-high 14 points as Homedale sprinted out of the third quarter on a 17-4 run and with a 35-27 edge.

"It was a supreme effort on the girls' part tonight," Greeley said. "It was one of the best games they've played this season."

Faith Brasher converted a threepoint play after Homedale broke Marsing's press for a 29-27 lead with 3 minutes, 51 seconds left in the third quarter. It was the first lead for the Trojans since the 1:28 mark of the opening quarter when Hailee Garrett hit consecutive 3-point goals for an 8-6 lead.

"They've always been one of our big rivals," Andrade said. "It's just nice to come out with a win against them."


