

Could this be the year?

Solid squad
stokes Trojans
wrestling's state
title dreams

This is the year Toby Johnson and Tony Martinat have been waiting for.

The Homedale High School wrestling coaching trust had a special feeling when the nucleus of this year's squad showed up on campus a few years ago.

"This is the kind of group we've been waiting for," head coach Johnson said. "Three or four years ago when they got here, we thought this will be our shot."

Although Homedale is a regular at the state championships every year, Johnson feels that this year and this team may mark the Trojans' best chance to win a team title since the 1982 Homedale team led by Martinat, Steve Nash, Rudy Rodriguez, Jerry Perkins and Jerry Ferguson finished second to North Fremont by a mere 20 points.

And at least one group of observers agrees.

Idaho Wrestling News (IdahoWrestlingNews.com) ranks Homedale as the No. 2 3A team in the state behind fellow Snake River Valley conference member Weiser.

"I think it will be a battle between Homedale, Weiser and Bonners Ferry for the 3A state wrestling title," Johnson said. Bonners Ferry is ranked third by IWN's Greg Vickers in his 3A season preview.

"We have 10 guys who could conceivably pull a medal at the

state meet," Johnson said.

But Weiser, as was the case last year in Homedale's 3A debut, stands in the way.

"Weiser's upper-weight kids are devastating," Johnson said. "They have a few excellent kids, but not as much depth."

Homedale has the depth, and the crucial component of wrestlers at 103 pounds (Trevor Meligan, freshman) and 112 (Matt Sitko, freshman) to soak up the 12 points the Trojans spotted each of its dual-meet

opponents during the 2004-05 season.

Homedale still had an 18-6 record with that handicap.

The Trojans start their season Thursday in Caldwell with a tri-meet against Vallivue and Skyview.

As has been the case for the past three years, Jeremy Ensley is at the head of the class for Homedale. IWN calls him the best wrestler in the SRV and the third-best 3A wrestler in Idaho.

The senior 119-pounder is a

three-time state champion (103 pounds in 2003; 112 in 2004; and 119 in 2005). He has won 98 consecutive matches dating back to his freshman year.

"He's one of the best wrestlers to come through here," Johnson said. "He's phenomenal to watch."

And he has a shot at becoming only the 13th wrestler in Idaho prep history to win state championships in all four years

Rimrock off to another fast start

No one who watches prep girls basketball would argue the prowess of Rimrock High School. And the Raiders did nothing in their first five games to discourage any superlatives.

Coach Bob Delle, who has said this will be his last year as Rimrock's coach, watched his club open the season on a five-game winning streak behind — what else? — a balanced contribution.

Emily Chandler averaged 12.4 points a game in the stretch for the Raiders, who began the 1A Western Idaho Conference 2-0. Robynn Ridley scored 12.2 points a game and grabbed 5.4 rebounds a contest.

Melanie Simper chipped in 9.0 points a game, while Alex Thomas averaged 8.2 points a game.

The Raiders have crushed most of their opponents thus far this season, including a 72-27 conference victory over Greenleaf Friends Academy on Thursday. Five players were in double figures for the Raiders, including Thomas with 13 points, Chandler with 12, Hipwell with 11 and Simper with 10.

After looking at how well the team shares the ball, you'd expect nothing less than balanced scoring. Five players have double-digit assists this season, but no one averages more than 4.6 dishes a game (Thomas). Rimrock averages nearly 20 assists per contest.

The only two challenges for Rimrock this season have come against Dietrich.

In the season opener, Nov. 19 on the road, the Raiders roared out to a 21-7 lead after the first quarter but had to hold on for a 50-47 triumph. The Blue Devils actually clawed back to own a 34-33 lead after three quarters.

When Dietrich visited Bruneau on Dec. 2, three Raiders scored in double figures for a 55-50 victory. Ridley led the way with 16 points, while Chandler added 13 points and Simper chipped in 12. Dietrich was led by 23 points from Caitlin Dill.

Rimrock built its streak by winning the battle on its opponents' backboards. The Raiders have held an average advantage of 12.8 rebounds per game on their foes' end of the floor. Led by

Sweet Show sends Homedale to win

When Nampa Christian High School went into a stall offense Thursday night, it only revved up the Homedale boys basketball team.

"I told the kids, 'Don't panic. There's 4 1/2 minutes left, we're down four points and most high school teams can't hold the ball that long,'" Homedale coach Brad Hill said.

He was right.

Quick-handed moves by Andrew Vanderhoff, Garrett Sweet

and Matt Holloway resulted in steals and thwarted visiting Nampa Christian in Homedale's thrilling 44-42 non-conference victory. Sweet capped a dominant night, hitting two free throws with 2.9 seconds left and the scored tied 42-42.

"I was pretty nervous at the end," the 6-foot-4 senior post player said.

He had no reason to be. Sweet

NC girls edge Homedale

Homedale High School's girls basketball team fell victim to a case of split personality during its 27-21 non-conference loss to host Nampa Christian on Dec. 2.

"We played great defense, but didn't take enough shots offensively," Homedale coach Mike Greeley said. "We shot around 25 percent, so we have to shoot more to make more."

Last week, Homedale beat McCall-Donnelly 53-33 in its 3A Snake River Valley conference opener and lost a 47-31 non-leaguer Saturday to New Plymouth.

Against Nampa Christian, Cheyanne Andrade and Hailey Hall each scored six points.

Homedale shut down most every player on the floor for 2A Nampa Christian and trailed just 17-16 after three quarters.

Homedale's poor ball handling extinguished scoring chances.

"Bottom line: It is very difficult to win a two-point ballgame with 24 turnovers," Greeley said.

Nampa Christian's 6-foot senior, Lindsay Forseth, scored 20 of her team's points, including seven in the pivotal 10-point fourth quarter for the winners.

Tyler Christoffersen Senior, 145-pound class

Two-time District III champion and former state champion at 119 pounds. ... Ranked in top 20 among state's 3A wrestlers by Idaho Wrestling News. "Tyler is a tremendous leader with intensity that drives him to be a winner," Johnson said.



Stuart Miyasako Senior, 130-pound class

Placed sixth at prestigious Rollie Lane Tournament last season. "He's very focused on achieving his goal of placing in the top three at state this year," Johnson said.



Jeremy Ensley Senior, 119-pound class

Trying to become only the 13th wrestler in Idaho prep history to win four state championships. "He's one of the most gifted athletes to ever attend HHS," Johnson said.

Oh yeah, there is someone waiting in the wings at 119, too. Freshman Danny Zenor was runner-up at district last year for Homedale Middle School, and he is on IWN's best newcomer list.

Homedale returns three other wrestlers who finished in the top four at last spring's state tournament at the Idaho Center in Nampa.

Senior 145-pounder Tyler Christoffersen is ranked 13th in IWN's top 20 of 3A individual wrestlers. He won the District III title at 135 and finished second at the state tournament last spring.

Christoffersen is a three-time state meet qualifier, winning the 1A/2A championship at 119 pounds as a sophomore. He has compiled a 65-9 record in the past two seasons.

"He's a ferocious leader," Johnson said. "He's so determined to make things happen."

Bryan Martinat finished second in the state tournament last season to help Homedale take home fifth place in the team standings after

runner-up showings in the SRV dual season and at the 3A District meet.

Wrestling in the 140-pound weight class, Martinat — like his father, Tony — is on the cusp of being a major contributor to the Homedale program. He's only a junior.

"Bryan is a very determined young man," Johnson said. "He expects a lot of himself."

Josh Jolley was a district runner-up last year and wrestled all the way through the consolation bracket to finish fourth at 189 pounds at State.

"He's bigger, stronger and more confident than last season," Johnson said of the junior, who will move up to the 215 class this season.

Two-time state qualifiers Ricco Gonzalez (171) and Stuart Miyasako (130) are poised to make contributions again as seniors.

Johnson admits there are things that the Trojans must work on, such as getting into shape, but the veteran squad and the newcomers still give him something to look forward to.

"We're not over-confident," he said. "We're cautiously optimistic."

had been the center of Homedale's offense all night. He converted 11 of 16 foul shots and made the block his home with 16 of his game-high 28 points in the second half.

"The big thing was that we came down and executed our offense," Hill said.

It was the first win of Hill's tenure with Homedale, which improved to 1-1.

And Homedale pulled it off with the exact offense that Hill had envisioned for his tall team. With trees like Sweet, Erik Corbett and Ryan Rupp, Homedale was able to exert its will against the shorter players from 2A Nampa Christian (0-2).

Sweet, who had missed two free throws with just under 2 minutes remaining and Homedale trailing 39-38, made up for his rare misfires when he took a pass from Corbett in the key and slammed into Nampa Christian's Daniel Eckstrom to draw the pivotal foul.

"We've been hammering on them about being physical and strong inside," Hill said.

It worked, but Nampa Christian nearly stole away with the victory when Homedale let an 11-point lead slip away with poor ball-handling and unwise shot selection in the second half.

"You're better than that!" Hill screamed in the huddle after the third quarter when Homedale managed just seven points.

Nampa Christian found its touch again in the third peri-

od to rack up 16 points. Coach Willie Taylor's team was ice-cold in the second quarter, managing just a layup by Donnie Heida to convert a steal by Geoff Buckendorf with 4 minutes, 30 seconds left in the first half.

Nampa Christian hung around long enough to take a 30-29 lead on Jaron Crane's 3-point shot 53 seconds into the fourth quarter. When Greg Forrest canned two free throws to cap an 11-3 run and build a 38-32 edge, Taylor called for the stall offense.

Nearly two minutes melted away before Vanderhoff swiped the ball from Forrest to set up a Corbett jumper.

Sweet ended another stall at-

tempt by taking the ball from Buckendorf. Holloway nailed two free throws — part of a 22-for-28 showing for Homedale — to tie the game 38-38.

"The big difference in the second half was they were on the right side of the bonus," Taylor said of Homedale, which failed to take advantage of its bonus situation in a season-opening loss to Parma two weeks ago.

In the end, though, it was the one-on-one defense down the stretch that gave Homedale the opportunity.

With Nampa Christian ahead 39-38, Holloway knocked the ball away from Buckendorf again and Corbett controlled it. At the other end of the floor, Holloway pulled up for a clutch jump shot to push Homedale ahead again.

"We talk to the kids about the mentality of not panicking and playing hard all the time," Hill said. "And facing adversity."

Marsing boys can't recover from deficit

Marsing High School lost the psychological battle early against Glenns Ferry in the two teams' non-conference boys basketball game Dec. 6.

The Pilots roared out to a big lead and claimed a 50-37 non-conference victory by holding off the host Huskies' comeback bid in the second quarter.

Glenns Ferry (2-0) used a pressuring trap defense to force Marsing (0-2) into nine turnovers while building a 23-8 lead in the first quarter.

"When you're down and you fight back, it drains you and you just can't quite get over that hump, especially when you're down that many points," Marsing coach Brian Thompson said.

"So mentally and physically, we got drained."

The Huskies switched their defense in the second quarter and limited the Pilots to three points. Marsing cut its turnovers to just four in the final eight minutes of the half, but couldn't get any offense going.

Shea McClellin, who signaled the brief reversal of fortunes with a reverse layup at the end of the first quarter, cashed in an offensive rebound to spark six unanswered points to that closed out the first half.

"We took care of the ball a little better and didn't have as many turnovers in the second quarter," Thompson said. "And the guys fought back and did a great job."

McClellin, a 6-foot-4 junior, was making his season debut after sitting out the opener against Nyssa, Ore., with a non-basketball injury. The Huskies' leading scorer from a year ago poured in 12 points and snagged a game-high 14 rebounds.

Senior teammate Chris Covey, a 6-5 post, awoke after halftime with a rebounding display that

denied Glenns Ferry the second-chance shots it was getting in the first half. Covey had nine of his 11 boards on the Pilots' end of the floor and corralled nine of his rebounds after the intermission.

"Any rebound is a good rebound," Thompson said. "You've got to win the rebounds; it doesn't matter if it's offensive or defensive."

"You've got to get the boards to have an opportunity."

And seniors Brian Smith and Aaron Salvas tried to give the Huskies those opportunities.

Smith grabbed an offensive board and immediately fired in a jump shot 52 seconds into the second half to pull Marsing within two baskets at 26-22. But it was the closest the Huskies would get the rest of the game.

Aaron Salvas gave the Huskies a few chances to break through in

the second half, too. He converted an easy layup off a pretty pass from McClellin to get Marsing within six points, 35-29, with 3 minutes, 5 seconds remaining in the third quarter. But the Huskies didn't score for the rest of the period.

Chase Bitterman scored six of his game-high 18 points in the fourth quarter, keeping the Huskies at bay as Glenns Ferry followed up its strong opening defense with an effective finishing kick.

"Give Glenns Ferry credit," Thompson said. "They had an aggressive defense and came out in our face."

"That's a mental thing we have to work on. We have to understand that people are going to come after us."
