# Trojans tame Mac-Hi tournament

The Homedale High School wrestling team had its home debut with Emmett snowed out Monday night, but that just gave the Trojans a little more time to savor the glory they attained during the weekend.

Coach Toby Johnson's charges edged Madras, Ore., 263 to 245.5, to win the team championship of the Mac-Hi Christmas Tournament in Milton-Freewater, Ore.

The narrow victory over Madras was especially sweet for Johnson, who used to live in Milton-Freewater.

"Madras gave us a run for the money," Johnson said. "They had several decent kids at a wide va-

riety of weight classes."

fied for the finals, which kept the score close. In fact, Homedale was ahead by only 5.5 points heading into the championship

But Bryan Martinat capped a 3-0 tournament with a championship at 152 pounds to ignite a flurry Trojans titles.

Tyler Maxwell (160), Ricco Gonzalez (171) and Josh Jolley (215) also posted 3-0 records as Homedale brought home championships in four of the final six weight classes contested.

That run sewed up the team championship for the Trojans.

"The boys did a great job," Johnson said. "They were classy and represented their school very well."

Jeremy Ensley went 2-0 in the 119-pound class to run his career record to 101-3. He has now won 101 consecutive matches.

Frankie Obregon, a 125-pounder, was 2-0 to win a title, too. He beat freshman teammate Danny Zenor (2-1) in the title match.

Only four Homedale wrestlers failed to place in the Mac-Hi tourney.

Stuart Miyasako (130, 2-1), Joe Mac Hernandez (135, 1-1) and Amador Cortinas (275, 2-1) were runners-up in their respective divisions.

Trevor Meligan finished third at 103 with a 1-1 record. Tyler Christoffersen was third at 145

# Grizzlies bite Homedale

You've heard of the triangle offense made famous by the Chicago Bulls of the Michael Jordan era? It was a triangle defense of sorts that sent Homedale High School to its first conference girls basketball defeat on Dec. 13.

And the defense had very little to do with the effort of the Fruitland players, the 34-26 victors on the Trojans' floor.

"We stopped looking for opportunities to score and I subbed and we had turnovers in a run that ate up our lead," Homedale coach Mike Greeley said.

"We had two turnovers in 25 seconds."

Those turnovers and overall complacency on offense — two sides of that triangle — resulted in a two-point second quarter for Homedale as the Grizzlies grabbed a narrow 12-11 halftime lead.

More damaging was a fourpoint third quarter that started out promising with Cheyanne Andrade's fall-away jump shot and a bank shot by Hailey Hall for a 15-14 Homedale lead less than 2 minutes into the second half.

But the Trojans' offense went dark for more than eight minutes after Hall scored her only points of the game, and Fruitland took command with 16 unanswered points.

"We just had a flat third quarter," said Greeley, whose team lost for the eighth time in 11 games. "We're not a third-quarter team, and that hurts us."

The Grizzlies capped their 16-0 outburst for a 30-15 lead on a play that epitomized the Trojans' woes.

Raquel Rode scored her only basket of the game on Fruitland's third shot opportunity of the possession 90 seconds into the fourth quarter. Rode rebounded a missed shot by Stephanie Hutchinson, who had fired a midrange jumper from the left side

That third part of the triangle — a lack of intensity — allowed Fruitland, which ran its SRV record to 3-0, to hold a 16-6 edge on the Trojans' backboards.

Destinee Abston had six rebounds in the second half to hold the Trojans down. She led Fruitland with 14 points.

"In a tight game, a couple rebounds make a world of difference," said Greeley, whose

With Covey and his aggressive style in street clothes, Council was able to clean 24 missed shots off Marsing's glass. "Johnathon did step up and did a good job," Thompson said.

Shea McClellin, who led all scorers with 17 points, collected seven defensive rebounds for Marsing. But Council shot 47.8 percent (22-for-46) from the floor and came down with 10 offensive boards, so there weren't too many opportunities to begin with.

Aaron Salvas, who had seven second-half rebounds, nailed two free throws with 2 minutes, 48 seconds left in the third quarter to cap a 6-0 run and get Marsing to within a point, 43-42.

But neither team did much in the final period, combining for eight points. Council went nearly six minutes without a point, but Marsing missed four of six foul shots in the quarter, including the front end of two one-and-one opportunities.

McClellin banked in a layup with 1:50 remaining to pull the Huskies within three points at 51-48, but with 34.4 seconds left the junior lost the handle on a dribble. That allowed Council to run the clock out.

"We let them get up too much," Thompson said. "It was too much of a deficit to come back and we just ran out of gas."





## Huskies split tough WIC week

Any basketball coach would be hard-pressed to find a silver lining after watching a team commit 29 turnovers. Marsing High School girls coach Don Heller figured out a way Saturday night.

The Huskies nearly pulled off a stunning 2A Western Idaho Conference victory in Nampa, falling short in a 41-36 loss to Nampa Christian.

"To have 29 turnovers and only lose by five shots that we have a lot of potential," Heller said. "We have no one over 5-foot-9, and Nampa Christian has six girls 5-11 or taller."

Going up against that dilemma, the MJ Usabel, a senior and one of the taller girls on the Huskies' roster, grabbed nine rebounds and led all scorers with 17 points.

But Marsing dug a hole early, falling behind 22-14 at halftime. Nampa Christian 6-footer Lindsay Forseth scored all but four of her 15 points in the first eight minutes of the game.

Heller said the loss to Nampa Christian was reminiscent of setbacks earlier in the season in which Marsing would make great defensive stops only to turn the ball over with an ill-advised pass.

Marsing racked up 14 steals — nine in the second half — as Mollee Nielsen swiped six balls from Nampa Christian ballhandlers. She also dished a teamhigh seven assists.

A change in defense sparked the Huskies in a 2A WIC victory at home on Dec. 13.

Marsing trailed by as many as nine points early in the game, but clamped down with 18 steals (five from Usabel) to take a 24-23 lead at halftime.


Smith popped three treys for the bulk of his 12 points, while Quebrado hit two 3-pointers and was 3-for-6 from the free-throw line for nine points.


