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5 The year in review



New faces, old standards mark year



The year in sports was one of turmoil, triumph and titles in Owyhee County in 2005.

Athletes from Homedale and Marsing high schools both enjoyed state championships in the past year, but many Trojans were left wondering what would become of their sports after the athletic program nearly imploded in a flurry of resignations and non-renewals in the spring and summer.

By summer, though, there was enough glory to dim the glare from the fiery end to the high school sports season in Homedale.

The year began much like it will end, with the spotlight on basketball and wrestling.

The Homedale girls basketball team, coached by Mark Weekes, went two-and-out in the 3A District III tournament. Despite strong play by eventual Homedale female athlete of the year Jessica Stimmel, the

Trojans' season ended with a 57-32 loss to Fruitland.

By the end of the school year, Weekes would be out as coach. Only days before practice for the 2005-06 season, Mike Greeley was hired to fill the position.

While the girls made a quick exit from the tournament, Homedale's boys squad, coached by Randy Potter, used a strong start to the season to finish at 16-4 with the No. 3 seed into the 3A District III tourney. District player of the year Nick Williams, who would earn All-State honors, and fellow all-district player Luis Escutia and junior Brett Hopkins led the Trojans to a 17-7 record. The season ended with a 60-43 loss to Payette in the district tournament at Treasure Valley Community College in Ontario, Ore.

But Potter's days with the program were numbered. He resigned

Trojans trounce Melba boys

Andrew Vanderhoff and Trevor Krzesnik know what side their bread's buttered on, and the Homedale High School guards were more than happy to sate the appetite of their big teammates Dec. 20.

Quiet Ryan Rupp loudly devoured the guards' offerings and Melba's boys basketball team in a 57-43 non-conference victory on the Trojans' floor.

"I thought in the first half our guards did a real nice job of reversing the ball and getting the ball inside," Homedale coach Brad Hill said.

Rupp scored 16 points and turned in a strong bid to replace those mangy TV crows as a Windex spokesman with six key offensive rebounds.

"Ryan works his rear end off in practice, and it's nice to see him playing a little better," Hill said.

"He's actually finishing under the basket."

Rupp turned the Trojans' hardwood into his personal stage twice during the game. The prologue to his lengthy run came four minutes into the contest. His second effort resulted in a putback of his own missed shot. He was fouled and hit the free throw for a three-point play that ended a 7-0 run, established a 7-3 lead for Homedale and set the tone for the rest of the night.

"He's a quiet leader who plays extremely hard," Hill said. "You can always count on him getting the dirty work done."

Rimrock girls survive battle of unbeaten teams

Raiders halt Garden Valley's winning streak, extend their own

Rimrock High School's girls basketball winning streak was in serious peril Wednesday night before the Raiders strung together a patented bit of teamwork to down previously unbeaten Garden Valley, 39-37, in a non-conference game in Bruneau.

But what else would you expect from the two best 1A teams in the state?

The Wolverines brought their own season-opening victory streak into the game, having won eight straight before running head-on into Rimrock.

"It was a close game all the way," Rimrock coach Bob Delle said.

"We were up five with just over a minute to play."

With the score tied 37-37 and the Raiders' season-opening nine-game winning streak on the line, guard Kaeloni Roberson — one of seven seniors on Delle's nine-player roster — fed Robynn Ridley for the game-winning layin with 2 seconds remaining.

The Raiders' 83rd victory in their past 88 contests was sealed when a desperation 75-footer from Garden Valley junior Layne Tucker banged off the backboard.

The Raiders had built a 30-26 lead by holding Garden Valley to just four points in the third quarter. The 37 points was the lowest point total for the Wolverines this season. Garden Valley routinely puts at least three players in double-figure scoring and beat Council 103-16 on Dec. 9 behind a school-record 40 points from Tucker.

The Wolverines' first three wins of the season came against 5A Borah and Capital and 4A Caldwell in which Garden Valley held each opponent to fewer than

20 points. In fact, Garden Valley has allowed 20 or fewer points in six games this season.

Rimrock has won 10 straight to open the season, and are back in action Monday when the Raiders take a perfect 5-0 1A Western Idaho Conference record into a road game against Idaho City (0-3 in 1A WIC).

Tucker facilitated Ridley's clutch basket when she made one of Garden Valley's 19 steals and was fouled going to the hoop. She dropped in both free throws with 30 seconds left to tie the score 37-37.

Tucker finished with a game-high 17 points for the Wolverines.

Lexi Rinfro knocked down her second 3-point goal of the game to begin the Grizzlies' late-game comeback.

Ridley led the Raiders with 13 points. Roberson added eight, including a pair of 3-pointers. Emily Chandler dished nine assists for Rimrock before fouling out.

in the final 1 minute, 52 seconds of the contest when the Mustangs used the Trojans' turnovers and tendency to foul to whittle Homedale's 50-35 lead down to nine points

"I felt like at times we played really well and at times our inexperience — especially at guard — really showed because we didn't take our time with plays and tried to force it," Hill said.

But after 6-foot-3 senior forward Lewt Greenfield hit a pair of free throws to pull Melba within nine points, 50-41, Rupp arrived on the scene. He scored seven straight points, including converting his own rebound and pulling off a sweet leaner for a layup that drew a foul (and another successful free throw).

The 6-3 senior forward took advantage of the absence of Melba's 6-5 sophomore forward Doug Beus by putting in back-to-back offensive rebounds in the third quarter.

"We were missing our 6-5 kid, and he certainly could have helped us on the boards," Melba coach Bob Lenz said.

Homedale owned a 38-18 edge

in rebounding. You wouldn't guess it by Melba's horrific 16-for-59 shooting (27.1 percent), but the Mustangs weren't allowed many second-chance shots. Miller clanged his first 11 attempts and wound up hitting just five of 22 shots for his team-high 13 points. Guard Cameron Keeney was 1-for-10 from the field.

Rupp had nine rebounds, but six of those were on the offensive glass. All five of Erik Corbett's boards were on Melba's backboard as Homedale enjoyed a 25-10 advantage in that category (14-3 after halftime).

"We knew coming in that rebounding would be the key to the game for us," Lenz said.

Rupp grabbed a rebound off a rare Garrett Sweet miss and stuck it back in the basket for his second consecutive score in the midst of a 9-0 Homedale third-quarter charge that would eventually give the Trojans a 34-18 advantage.

Sweet, who led all scorers with 22 points on 9-for-12 shooting, also was a big part of that rally, legitimizing Lenz's worries.

"We knew coming in that we would have to take care of the Sweet kid," the veteran coach said.

Huskies boys fall short again

Brian Thompson could have a monster on his hands if Marsing High School's boys basketball team ever puts together a 32-minute game.

The Huskies' coach claims his club didn't play the first half last Wednesday against gunslinging Cole Valley from Boise. Still, Marsing lost by only four points, 54-50, to their non-conference opponent from the 1A ranks.

"We've got to put a whole game together. We had spurts throughout the game," Thompson said. "And we've got to put it all together. Full-speed, everyone, every minute.

"Once we figure that out ..."

When Marsing did try to control the game by running the floor and taking the ball to the basket, the Chargers from Boise could do little to stop the Huskies.

But the surges never turned into full waves of momentum.

"We've got to get our guys to learn how to take the momentum and keep going with it," Thompson said. "We seem to get relaxed once we get going. We've got to keeping getting aggressive and keep the excitement going."

Senior point guard Santiago Quebrado had his coach excited and jumping off the bench with encouragement in the fourth quarter as Marsing took yet another run at the Chargers.

Quebrado showed fresh legs, outrunning Cole Valley's defense for a layup with 5 minutes, 1 second remaining and then draining two free throws nine seconds later.

"He may not have scored a lot points, but he did a lot of other things defensively," Thompson said of Quebrado. "He made them travel four or five times just by him jumping out on them.

"He handled the ball really well tonight and was, by far, our best player tonight."

Although Cole Valley merely had to sit back and protect its lead through the fourth quarter, the Chargers seemed to get caught up in the frenzy of the moment when Quebrado's feet began to fly, rushing their offense and burping up shots.

And Marsing was able to control the Cole Valley glass when those shots began going awry. Aaron Salvas, who finished with nine rebounds, was fouled while grabbing one of his seven defensive boards and sank both shots to get Marsing within a point, 46-45.

Salvas scored six points, while Quebrado finished with 11 points, which was second-highest for the Huskies behind Shea McClellin's 16 points.

It was McClellin's off-balance layup that capped the 6-0 run started by Quebrado and put Marsing within a point, 44-43. The junior forward had to corral a Salvas baseball pass that soared above three-quarters of the court before having just enough time to throw the ball in the basket.

McClellin was a key figure in the third quarter when the Huskies launched a 12-2 spurt, drawing within two points on Brian Smith's 3-pointer with 2:48 left in the period. McClellin had what would have been a gametying jump shot negated when he was whistled for charging 36 seconds later.

Cole Valley junior guard Matt Jones canned a 3-pointer with 2:12 left in the third to spark a pivotal 6-0 run that snuffed out whatever momentum Marsing had. It was the only shot Jones sank, and snapped the 6-footer's 0-for-8 start to the game.

Jones' wasn't a lone gunner, though. The Chargers let the 3-pointer fly at will early and launched 15 in the game. Nate Beery and Alex Canfield drained four in a row in the second quarter when both teams fired from the perimeter during a four-minute stretch that also saw McClellin and Quebrado slam home bombs from beyond the arc.

As cold as Jones was from the field, Marsing was even more timid in driving to the basket during the first half.

There were only three fouls called in the first 16 minutes, and Marsing's players seemed unwilling to get inside to draw fouls. In fact, when McClellin missed two free throws 4:41 before halftime, it marked the first time either team had been to the foul line.

"We've got to be aggressive," Thompson said. "We've got to take the ball to the basket. and try to use our height to our advantage, and we forgot that in the first half."

Deaf Melba player excels Trojans' JV, freshman at basketball's fast pace

Melba High School basketball player Lewt Greenfield had the same amount of pressures as any other athlete during last week's 57-43 non-conference loss to Homedale High School.

Each time down the floor, Greenfield had an incredible checklist of things to do: Find out what the other team is doing defensively, figure out where his teammates are on the hardwood.

But for Greenfield there was one other key activity: Glance over at Sheila Robertson on the Mustangs' bench.

Robertson isn't a cheerleader. She and Natalie Kelly are signlanguage interpreters, and Greenfield is deaf.

"Any dead ball, you see him looking over (at the Melba bench)," Homedale first-year coach Brad Hill said. "And I think (Mustangs' coach Bob Lenz has) done a great job in the situation."

Robertson and Kelly are fixtures at practices, too, to help Greenfield communicate with coach Bob Lenz and the rest of his Melba teammates. The Mustangs play Marsing in 2A Western Idaho Conference games on Jan. 26 (in Marsing) and Feb. 10 (in

Greenfield, who has played basketball in the Melba program for four years, scored six points and grabbed five rebounds on Dec. 20 during a non-conference game in Homedale.

He had an increased number of minutes because Melba was without sophomore post Doug Beus, and because Greenfield was playing well despite carrying three fouls.


"We carry nine players, but I have a philosophy," Lenz said. "You get in, get your shot and you play well, and you'll get your minutes.'

Lenz said Greenfield was instrumental in the Mustangs' 51-49 non-conference road victory over Glenns Ferry on Dec. 13, and the veteran coach had good things to say about his charge after the Homedale match.

"He played pretty well tonight, and he hustled pretty well tonight," Lenz said of the 6-foot-3 post player who connected on two of his four field-goal attempts.

Former Kuna girls coach Brad Hill was hired to take over the boys basketball team, and Dave Hart from Fernley, Nev., was tabbed as the Trojans' new athletic director.

Tim Fulwood also was a winner in his final days as the Trojans' junior varsity boys basketball coach. Homedale won the 3A Snake River Valley conference championship with a 7-3 mark. Scott Bryant took over the JV squad this season.

The Marsing boys basketball team qualified for last season's 2A District III tournament and beat Melba in the opening round.

Coach Don Heller's Marsing girls team also picked up a first-round victory in the district tournament. The Huskies beat Parma 48-37 before losing two consecutive games

Jordan Valley's basketball program placed two athletes on the all-state team in Oregon -- Paul Elsner and Pat Anderson from the boys team that finished fourth at district, and Laura Cuvelier, whose girls squad finished fifth at district.

It was more of the same for the Homedale wrestling program.

A baker's dozen of wrestlers from coach Toby Johnson's team made the 3A state tournament at the Idaho Center in Nampa. Jeremy Ensley won his 98th consecutive match to claim the 119-pound state championship, his third straight state title. He recorded three pins to reach the state final against American Falls' Tyson Curry, whom Ensley beat 4-2.

Trevor Christoffersen was one of five Trojans to reach the championship round. He finished third at 135 pounds.

Ensley, Christoffersen and heavyweight Erik Garcia all won district titles.

Marsing wrestlers Chris Wright (135), R.J. Crossland (189) and Michael Tuckness (215) also reached the 1A/2A state tournament.

Spring

Once the fields thawed, Marsing's softball program heated up. The Huskies garnered the district's No. 3 seed into the 2A state tournament, but the team's stay in Pocatello was a short one after losses to Potlatch and Malad.

Homedale's JV baseball team cruised through the season with an 18-3 record. The squad won nine games in a row at one point

and beat Middleton 9-3 for the SRV championship. That was the only game in town for Homedale baseball fans because coach Tim Fulwood was forced to cancel the varsity season because of a lack of participation.

The Trojans' state championships continued as the boys golf and tennis teams both won the 3A Academic State Championships. The golf squad had a 3.448 grade-point average, while the tennis team carried as 3.422 GPA.

Both teams would lose their coaches before the 2005-06 school year began. Jim Smythe's last hurrah in a long and successful run as tennis coach was leading the Trojans' girls team to a third-place finish in the state tournament. Caity Jones won the girls single state championship, while Hopkins lost in the boys singles championship match.

Marsing hung a state championship from the spring when senior Cody Heller won a the shot put crown at the 2A state track meet. He finished second in the discus, and Breanna Chadez was runner-up in the high jump.

Homedale sent four athletes to the track and field's state meet. Stimmel qualified in four events after winning district titles in the 100- and 200-meter sprints and the triple jump. She was second in the long jump. At State, Stimmel was runner-up in the 100 and triple jump.

Stimmel later earned a \$200 scholarship from the Idaho Coaches Association. She received the check from her coach, Troy Sullivan, who would leave his longtime post before the next school year.

Cheyanne Andrade capped her junior year with a third-place showing in the discus.

On the boys side, freshman Terrance Thomas qualified for State after a third-place finish in the district discus contest, and Mark Vance reached the state meet in the triple jump.

Homedale Middle School showed off the depth of the town's athletic ability as seventh-grader Katie Holloway captured the district title in the 100 meters to help the Trojans win the team championship.


Other titles for the middle school included district crowns for the eighth-graders in girls basketball and volleyball. The seventh-grade football won a league championship.

New Homedale High cross country coach Nick Schamber established a middle school program in the fall, and that squad finished second in the SRV.

Rodeo

Bryan Reay of Homedale and Brandon Mackenzie from Jordan Valley joined forces to finish eighth in team roping at the first-ever Wrangler Junior High School National Finals rodeo in Gallup, N.M.

Bryan Martinat, who had completed his junior year at Homedale, won the novice saddle bronc title at the Owyhee County Rodeo, and Sammy Mackenzie won the saddle bronc crown. Scotti Fuller of Lewiston was all-around champion for the rodeo.

Other summer championships went to Dusten DeCaney of Payette in the 23rd annual Homedale Lions Demolition Derby on the Fourth of July, and the Panzeri Livestock team captured another title in the Percifield Memorial Softball Tournament in Marsing.

Fall

As is the case every year, the sports came full circle back to high school in the fall.

Coach Thomas Thomas' Homedale football team held on to a piece of first place in the SRV until Weiser plastered the Trojans 57-12 on Oct. 14. The season was highlighted by a 28-0 victory over Parma in the Milk Jug game. Homedale would slide to a 4-5 record, only the program's sixth losing season since 1955.

Christoffersen, a senior line-backer, won the defensive MVP award for the West team in the District III Shrine Game on Nov. 25 in Boise. The West beat the Fast 22-21

Don Heller, who also coaches track and field at Marsing, also came full circle with football. The Huskies snapped a sevengame losing streak during the year, but won only one of eight games.

Rimrock High School's football team got a new coach in Jim Clark and ended an 11-game losing streak, but the Raiders still finished with a 1-7 record.

Adrian's football team won its first five games and eventually reached the state playoffs for the first time since 1990. The Antelopes' volleyball team made its first trip to the 1A state tournament in five years, while Jordan Valley's volleyball squad finished second in the 1A state tourney in the Mustangs' first trip since 1999. Jordan Valley's only loss came in the title match against Dufur.

The Trojans' volleyball squad played its first season under the direction of new coach Maleta Henry.

Homedale's cross country team put three athletes in the state meet. All three — Tyler Gibson, Scott Thatcher and Belen Vega — were all first-year cross country runners. Vega finished 16th in the girls championship race.

The Trojans' boys soccer team collected a victory in the district tournament as David Liddell, Erik Padilla, Andres Vasquez and Cory Uria all earned all-district honors.

As the curtain came down on 2005, basketball and wrestling re-emerged from hibernation.

The Homedale boys and girls basketball teams began seasons under new coaches.

Ensley ran his winning streak on the mat to 101 matches as Homedale brought home the team title at the Mac-Hi Christmas Tournament in Milton-Freewater, Ore.

Marsing's boys basketball team found a moment of clarity in an otherwise murky beginning by winning the Pine Eagle Tournament in Halfway, Ore.
