

Ensley pins Trojans' career wins record

Jeremy Ensley found another plateau on which to stand last weekend in the Weiser Invitational.

The Homedale High School senior wrestler added another honor to his trophy case with a simple first-round victory Friday in the 119-pound weight class.

The three-time state champion eclipsed Adam Duryee atop the Trojans' career victories podium with the opening-round victory.

For good measure, Ensley ravaged his weight class in Weiser, going 4-0 to capture his fourth consecutive Weiser championship.

After a 4-0 showing at Weiser, Ensley finished the weekend with 121 career wins, four better than Duryee, who got the last of his 117 wins in 2001.

"It's quite an accomplishment to get 100 wins," Homedale coach Toby Johnson said. "It's not something that happens all that often."

"Lots of things can throw that off, like ineligibility, injury, a shortened high school schedule of competition (to name a few). It

takes a lot of talent and some things going right for you."

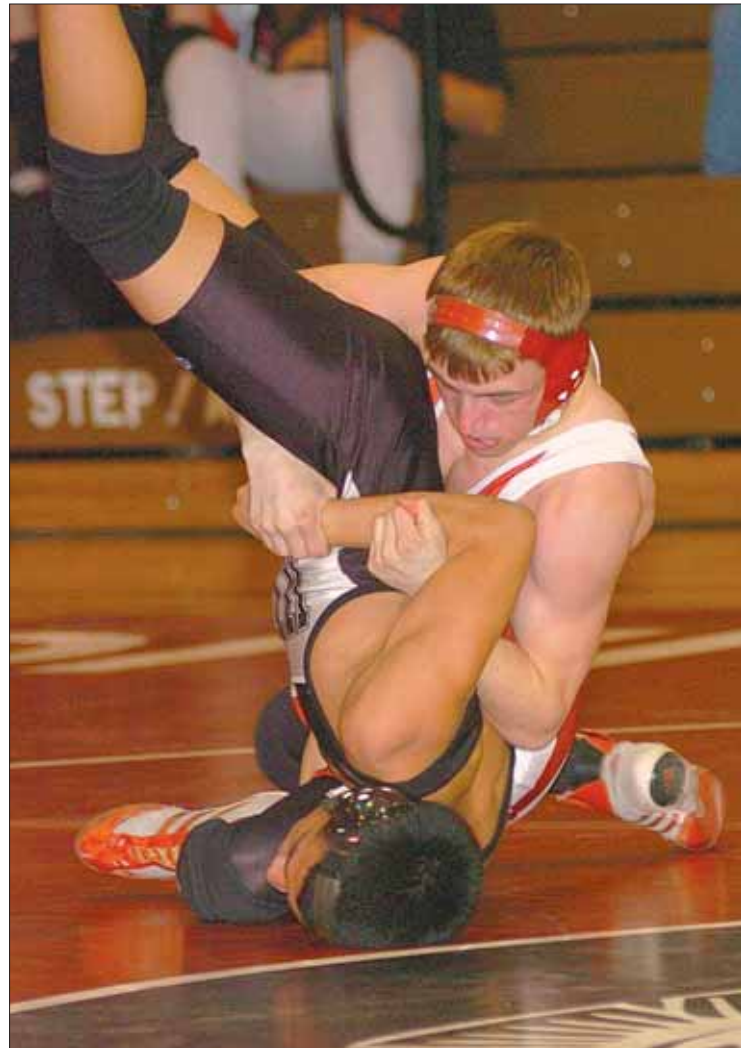
Obviously, everything has gone right for Ensley, who now has won 112 consecutive matches. He was 8-0 during a busy week for Homedale.

Ensley tied Duryee inauspiciously enough with a forfeit victory Thursday as the Trojans wrapped up the 3A Snake River Valley conference dual-meet season with a hard-fought 47-24 victory over host Middleton.

Tyler Christoffersen, like Ensley one of five wrestlers in the Homedale century club, pulled within six victories of catching Duryee for second all-time as he also won eight matches during the week.

Christoffersen capped his week with his second Weiser title, this one at 145 pounds, and Homedale finished third in the team standings behind champion

Marsing girls bow out of 2A tourney

The Marsing High School girls basketball season ended in disappointment last week in Homedale.

The Huskies struggled to score in both games they played during the 2A District III Tournament at Homedale High School. Coach Don Heller's team was eliminated with a 46-26 loss to Melba on Saturday.

Marsing's season ended with a 5-17 record.

The Huskies started the week with a bitter 51-34 setback to Parma.

Senior MJ Usabel scored 15 points in her second-to-last game with Marsing, but Parma's Lacey LaPierre, a 5-foot-10 junior, was perfect in the fourth quarter to slam the door on the Panthers' first-round victory Thursday.

LaPierre led all scorers with 24 points. She was 5-for-5 from the floor and 3-for-3 from the foul line to score all of Parma's 13 points in the final period. The Panthers

Rimrock schools Council in opener

Raiders' coach still fine-tuning undefeated club

Even though Rimrock High School coasted into the 1A District III Girls Basketball Tournament with a perfect 20-0 record, the Raiders were by no means on cruise control in Friday's opening-round game.

"Our goals are ahead of us, so the second I quit coaching then my girls believe that we're not focused on what we have to do," veteran Rimrock coach Bob Delle said.

The next logical step in the Raiders' list of goals came Friday in Emmett with a 62-24 shellacking of Council from the Long Pin Conference. Rimrock's first objective was winning the 1A Western Idaho Conference regular-season championship, which the Raiders did with an unblemished 14-0 record.

But wait there's more.

"We have three goals: Win league, win district and win state,"

Delle said. "We've only achieved one of those, so why in the world would I quit coaching?"

Friday's victory pushed Rimrock (21-0) into Monday's semifinal against Cascade, another qualifier from the Long Pin that beat Cole Valley 46-30 on Friday. Monday's results weren't available at press time, but a Rimrock win means a championship showdown Saturday in Emmett against either 1A WIC No. 2 seed Greenleaf Friends Academy or the more probable matchup against Garden Valley, the top-seeded Long Pin representative. The Wolverines gave Rimrock its closest test of the year while losing 39-37 in a Dec. 21 non-conference game.

The looming rematch with Garden Valley is the reason Delle and his assistant coaches were so adamant about correct execution in an otherwise easy win over the Lumberjacks.

Players were admonished for not taking smart shots or passing up an open teammate underneath — two things that Delle says

Key injury knocks Trojans for loop

As if the Homedale High School girls basketball team’s morale wasn’t low enough, the rims at the Middleton gymnasium pounded the Trojans’ psyche into submission Wednesday night.

Already facing the absence of senior point guard Hailee Garrett, Homedale’s shooters couldn’t buy a break in the first quarter against Fruitland. The Grizzlies then quelled a furious fourth-quarter rally to grab a 35-25 victory in the semifinals of the 3A District III Tournament.

“It just kills us,” Homedale first-year coach Mike Greeley said of his team’s shooting start. “It’s tough to keep an up-tempo game when you have that type of bad luck.”

Homedale rebounded Saturday with a 47-21 victory over McCall-Donnelly in an elimination game and took an 11-12 record into Monday’s eliminator against Weiser.

Second-seeded Fruitland (11-10) tackled No. 1 seed Middleton (19-1) on Monday for the district

championship and a ticket to the 3A Real Dairy Shootout state tournament.

Homedale roared out of the gate against Fruitland with seniors Hailey Hall and Faith Brasher getting nice, strong looks at the basket. But both high-percentage shots rimmed out of the hoop.

Homedale shot 0-for-9 in the first quarter, and two other easy shots wouldn’t fall later on.

“There’s eight points there that we should have had just as easy as we missed them,” Greeley said.

Fruitland didn’t fare any better until it seemed the lack of production broke the Trojans’ will. The Grizzlies reeled off eight straight points, including two layups on fast breaks fueled by turnovers to build a 12-2 lead at the end of the first quarter.

But Fruitland was unable to bury the Trojans completely.

Hannah Johnson, a freshman called up to the varsity after Garrett tore the anterior cruciate ligament in her right knee in a Jan. 30 first-round win over Payette,

racked up five steals.

Fruitland led by as many as 14 points (27-13 after three quarters), but Homedale whittled that advantage down to five points, 30-25, on a 9-1 spurt that was capped by Faith Brasher’s inside jumper with 3 minutes, 19 seconds left.

Brasher, who scored four points and grabbed six rebounds despite being ill, took a sweet pass from Hailey Hall and converted.

“Faith had one of her better games,” Greeley said. “She’s been fighting the flu and give it everything she had offensively and defensively.”

Hall led Homedale with nine points, but missed all three of her foul shots. The Trojans went to the line just five times compared to a 9-for-17 showing for Fruitland. The Grizzlies hit their first six foul shots, and Raquel Rode hit her first four en route to a 14-point night.

“We’d penetrate and Hailey would get hammered, and we wouldn’t get any calls,” Greeley said. “We drove against them.

I think the girls did all they are capable of.”

Hall snagged eight defensive rebounds, and Cheyanne Andrade had six of her co-team-high eight on defense. Homedale out-boarded Fruitland 24-8 on the Grizzlies’ end. But Fruitland answered with its own rebounding prowess under the Homedale basket. Led by seven rebounds (and 10 total) from 5-foot-11 sophomore Bridgette Teunissen, the Grizzlies enjoyed a 19-3 advantage on Homedale’s glass.

Compounding the issue, the Trojans couldn’t navigate through 28 turnovers, including 18 in the first half.

Fruitland forced mistakes with its pressure defense early, and Greeley didn’t deny the impact of having a seasoned ball-handler like Garrett sitting on the bench in street clothes.

“It was huge when you lose your starting point guard that you relied on all season,” the coach said.

Homedale regains tourney footing

The Homedale High School girls basketball hot rod got back up to speed Saturday night behind a freshman point guard.

Hannah Johnson, called up from the junior varsity after Hailee Garrett’s knee injury nine days ago, engineered an offense that blew out McCall-Donnelly 47-21 in the 3A District III Girls Basketball Tournament.

“Losing Hailee was like pulling the V-8 (engine) out of our truck,” Homedale coach Mike Greeley said after the game in Middleton. “And at least now we have a 6-cylinder, and if we play a good game, we might have a V-8 Monday night.”

The Trojans survived to play another elimination game Monday night against Weiser. Results weren’t available at press time, but a win would have put Greeley’s squad in the tournament’s second-place game tonight against the loser of Monday’s championship game between No. 1 seed Middleton and second-seeded Fruitland.

Tonight’s game will decide which team earns the District III’s second seed into the 3A Real Dairy Shootout state tournament.

The Vandals’ season ended.

Johnson dished two assists against McCall, and — more importantly — the Trojans committed a season-low 13 turnovers three nights after coughing up 28 in a loss to Fruitland.

“This was a big morale booster, and it gave our new point guard — Hannah Johnson — a chance to assimilate to the team and get into the groove,” Greeley said.

Senior Hailey Hall scored a season-high 21 points, drained two

of the Trojans’ four 3-point goals and snagged nine rebounds.

Faith Brasher continued her strong tournament play with seven points and seven rebounds.

McCall was held scoreless in the first and third quarters. Freshman Baylee Weeks paced the Vandals with seven points.

Homedale 33, Payette 23

Things got bleak quickly for Homedale in the tournament opener Jan. 30 when Garrett was lost for the remainder of the season after injuring her knee while attempting a jump pass to break Payette’s press.

“I just felt it pop out of place,” she said. “I knew it wasn’t anything good.”

Fourth-quarter 3-pointers from Hall and Sarah Cline tipped the scales in favor of Homedale in the wake of Garrett’s departure. She’s scheduled to have knee surgery Thursday.

Garrett was the sparkplug for the Trojans’ pressure defense, averaging 2.8 steals per game. She is also the team’s third-leading scorer (5.4 points per game)

After Garrett left the game, the Pirates closed the gap to trail 13-12 at halftime. Homedale held Payette, which entered the game 0-20 on the season, to just two points in the first quarter.

Senior Kayla Shaw (team-high seven points) and junior Heidi Haas buried 3-pointers for the pesky Pirates in the second.

Hall was perfect in four trips to the charity stripe and grabbed eight rebounds, including six on the defensive glass. Faith Brasher scored seven points for the Trojans.

Trojans collect first SRV win

It doesn't get any easy for the Homedale High School boys basketball team.

But at least now the Trojans can say they have their first 3A Snake River Valley conference victory after Friday's balanced 56-37 home win against Middleton.

Garrett Sweet's 14 points led three players in double figures as Homedale won for the first time in eight conference starts.

The Trojans took a 6-12 record into Tuesday's SRV game against Payette. Homedale wraps up the regular season at home Friday night against Weiser searching for a favorable slot in the 3A District III Tournament that starts next week.

Andrew VanDerhoff fired in three 3-point goals to rack up 13 points against Middleton. Erik Corbett rediscovered his scoring touch with 10 points, including a 5-for-6 showing on the foul line.

Homedale 56, Vale 54

On Saturday, the Trojans edged non-conference foe Vale in Oregon, but not before the Vikings threw a scare into Homedale with a 24-point fourth quarter.

Sweet scored nine of his game-high 17 points in the third quarter as Homedale built a 38-30 lead heading into the stretch run.

But Vale scored 10 points from the free throw line in the final period to make a game of it. Matt Kurth scored nine of his 12 points in the final eight minutes, and teammate Tully Wagner drained the last of his four treys in the fourth quarter.

The Simplot Games attract some of the best high school track and field athletes from throughout the West.

Thomas, Vance and Andrade all qualified for Idaho's 3A state meet last spring, with Andrade earning a bronze medal in the discus.

The 5-foot-10, 150-pound Vance finished 15th in the triple jump at State with an effort

of 38 feet, 5 inches.

Thomas, a 6-8, 265-pounder, finished eighth at State as a freshman with a discus throw of 131-4. He was third at the District III meet.

Andrade was second in the shot put and discus at last year's district meet before uncorking her third-place distance of 110-03 in the state meet discus competition. She finished 12th at State in the shot put.

Trojans JV boys stay tough despite setbacks

The Homedale High School junior varsity boys basketball team has been off the mark every-so slightly this season.

In fact, Friday's 47-39 3A Snake River Valley conference loss to Middleton marked the seventh time in six losses this year that the opponents' margin of victory was nine points or less.

But the Trojans (11-7 overall, 2-6 3A SRV) righted the ship a bit Saturday night with a hard-fought 48-44 non-conference win over Vale, Ore.

"We are battling through a lot of sickness right now," Homedale coach Scott Bryant said. "My kids continue to play hard despite these setbacks."

"I hope we can fight off these sicknesses this week and finish the league strong going into districts."

Homedale played Payette on Tuesday and finishes the conference regular season at home Friday against Weiser. The 3A District III Tournament begins Saturday. Second-round games

will be played in Homedale on Tuesday.

"I am really happy how hard my kids have been playing," Bryant said. "Even though we have been on the short side of some close games recently, they play hard and never quit."

Homedale began last week with a hard-to-swallow 58-52 loss to Fruitland on Jan. 31, but the Grizzlies' winning margin was slimmer than the first time around. Fruitland is the only team to beat the Trojans by more than nine points this season.

Kyle Miyasako scored 14 points to lead the Trojans in a game that was tied 46-46 with three minutes remaining before the Grizzlies rode free throws to the victory.

David Liddell added 13, Ryan Johnson nine and Zach Tolmie eight.

Liddell was the sparkplug Jan. 24 in a 59-48 win over visiting McCall-Donnelly. He scored 22 points to lead the Trojans, while Austin Ferguson came off the bench to chip in eight points.

Homedale wrestlers roll through meet-filled week

Homedale High School's wrestling team showed off its depth in winning four dual meets in two days last week.

On Jan. 31, the Trojans celebrated Senior Night quite appropriately, crushing Melba 74-6 and beating Vale, Ore., 59-15, behind an unbeaten phalanx of upperclassmen.

Homedale's senior contingent of 119-pounder Jeremy Ensley, Tyler Christoffersen (145), Ricco Gonzalez (171) and Stuart Miyasako (130) were unbeaten in six matches during the meet inside the Trojans' gymnasium.

Christoffersen pinned Luke Skerjanec from Vale, Ore., to move past Ryan Nash into third place on Homedale's all-time career victories list. Before the Weiser Tournament last weekend, Christoffersen had notched 106 victories in his four seasons. Nash won 105 matches during his career.

Gonzalez put Vale's Max Zinic on his back in 46 seconds as part of his two-pinfall night, and Miyasako collected an impressive 16-0 technical fall in the second round of his bout in the Melba dual.

Ensley crept closer to Homedale's career victories record with a pin of Arcenio Carrillo from Vale and a technical fall in an extra match after Homedale dispatched Melba.

Rowdy Lair came from behind for a pin in the third round of an extra match against Melba. He also pinned his opponent at 189 pounds in the regular dual and took care of Vale's Michael Brewer with a 56-second pin. It was one of seven matches the Trojans won by pinfall against the Vikings.

Joe Mac Hernandez was another standout for the Trojans. The freshman returned to the lineup with a pin in the 135-pound match against Melba.

"It's good to have Hernandez back in the lineup," Homedale coach Toby Johnson said.

"He got a big pin for us at 135 pounds."

Homedale 60 McCall-Donnelly 24

The Trojans collected just three wins on the mat in their easy 3A Snake River Valley conference dual-meet victory over the visiting Vandals on Jan. 30.

The biggest win was heavyweight Amador Cortinas' pin of former state tournament placer Richard Campbell.

Frankie Obregon pinned McCall's Cory Allen in 44 seconds of their 125-pound match, while Bryan Martinat pinned the Vandals' Scott McCoy at 152.

Homedale 57, Emmett 19

Gonzalez came through big-time for the Trojans in a non-conference dual in Homedale on Jan. 30. His 7-5 overtime victory at 171 pounds fueled the Trojans' seven dual-meet victory in eight tries this season.

After the Jan. 31 duals against Vale and Melba, the Trojans are 9-1.

Josh Jolley needed just 15 seconds to pin Emmett 215-pounder Andrew Pack in the dual meet. In an extra match afterward, Lair wrestled up from his usual 189 and pinned Pack, too.

Cortinas needed just 27 seconds to dispose of his opponent at 275 as five of the Trojans' six pinfalls were achieved in 42 seconds or less. Christoffersen (145), Martinat (152) and Tyler Maxwell (160) all racked up pins.

In a bit of revenge, the Trojans finished just ahead of tournament host Weiser.

Christoffersen and Ensley are the first Trojans since 1988 graduates Ryaan Nash and Ron Hooker to win 100 victories while

wrestling on the same team.

"For Homedale, it's great to have two of them in the same season," Johnson said. "It's fairly unusual."

Ensley has surpassed the 120-victory mark, but Christoffersen sits nine victories away with the 3A District III meet and the 3A State Tournament looming as the sun sets on his career.

"One hundred is difficult

enough, but to continue to exceed that and approach 120 is amazing," Johnson said. "It says a lot about their talent and determination to be winners."

Christoffersen's biggest victory of the week probably came in the Middleton dual meet. He shut out Brandon Doramus at 145 pounds for a major decision that fueled the Trojans' victory in a tightly contested match.

Homedale was 5-0 in dual meets last week, and the Trojans have won 10 of 11 showdowns this season. The only loss was to 3A SRV rival Weiser.

Bryan Martinat, who finished third at 152 in Weiser, collected a narrow 4-3 decision over Bryon Doramus to help Homedale solidify the victory against Middleton.

"TC was flawless, and Martinat

did well," Johnson said of the win over the Vikings.

Josh Jolley, wrestling at 215 pounds, finished second at Weiser after starting the tournament with three straight victories.

He needed just 50 seconds to pin Middleton's Cody Harvey on Thursday.

Homedale wraps up the 3A SRV dual-meet season on the road Thursday against Payette.
