Life is about to get interesting for the Homedale High School wrestling team.

The Trojans ride a wave of 12 dual-meet victories and record-shattering seasons into this weekend's 3A District III Tournament in Weiser.

And it's only fitting that Homedale's next step on the road to the state meet in Pocatello would be onto the Wolverines' mat.

"We are one of the top two teams in the conference," Homedale coach Toby Johnson said. "We lost to Weiser in the conference dual but have beaten them in every tournament this season.

"It should be interesting."

The 3A district tournament runs Friday and Saturday.

Meanwhile, Marsing is preparing for the 1A/2A district tournament, which starts at 9 a.m. Saturday in Melba.

Junior 189-pounder Michael Tuckness (24-7) leads the Huskies into the tournament. Coach Rick Folwell expects him to be seeded No. 1 for this weekend's action.


Robynn Ridley nailed six of her seven field-goal attempts (86 percent) and led all scorers with 15 points as Rimrock won its 23rd consecutive game.

Curtain falls on Homedale girls' season

Weiser took advantage of the Trojans' inexperienced backcourt for a 39-28 victory Feb. 6 in the 3A District Tournament at Middleton High School.

"Weiser taped us on the game we played McCall, and they just had pressure on the ball all the time," first-year Homedale coach Mike Greeley said.

"And they knew we had a freshman point guard (Hannah Johnson), and they attacked us where it could hurt us the most.

Playing just her third varsity game after Hailee Garrett's careerending knee injury, Johnson committed six of the Trojans' 20 turnovers in the first half. She bounced back in the second half and committed just one miscue.

"The seniors weren't pulling through," Greeley said. "Hannah was real nervous."

Johnson scored three points on 3-for-6 free-throw shooting. The Trojans were led by 10 points from Cheyanne Andrade, one of eight seniors who played for Homedale this season.

Weiser, which owned a 21-7 lead at halftime, was paced by 10 points from Annie Hafer and eight apiece from Elise Overgaard and Amanda Palmer. While Homedale's season ended with a 11-13 record, the Wolverines lived another day, losing in the 3A state tournament play-in game, losing 48-33 to Kellogg on Saturday in Craigmont.

"Nobody expected us to be (near) .500 for the season overall or in league even," Greeley said. "At the start of the season, they just wanted me to make everybody have a good time.

"When we started winning games after Christmas, I could see the potential."

That potential landed the Trojans in the district tournament will a real chance of doing some damage.

"The whole team just kind of came together and people stopped playing for themselves and their own stats and worrying about time on the floor and started working together as a team," Greeley said of the turnaround as Homedale headed into the 3A Snake River Valley conference season after the Christmas break.

Greeley also said that Garrett grew into the point guard position around the same time. She was taking over from Jessica Stimmel.

"Those are big shoes for Hailee Garrett to fill, and we really didn't have any other point guards to help fill the spot," Greeley said.

But Garrett was a quick learner

and the Trojans seemed to follow suit.

"As we went through the season, Hailee really stepped up as point guard," Greeley said. "She came a long way in a short amount of time, as did all the girls. Hailey Hall stepped it up, Faith stepped it up, and so did Cheyanne and (Jessica) Mooney."

In the end, the lack of depth at the point is what doomed the Trojans after Garrett was injured in a first-round tournament game against Payette.

But the end of the season didn't dim Greeley's pride or his optimism for the future.

"I feel good because it's basically the same girls that played last year except for a couple of seniors that graduated and we had a better overall record (this season)," he said.

And it wasn't an ideal situation, but the coach could start his second season next fall with a sophomore point guard in Johnson who has a little varsity experience. Greeley said the same goes for Taryn Corta, who was promoted from the junior varsity for the district tournament.

"The way it worked out was good experience because now she knows how much she needs to step it up over the summer for next year," the coach said.

Trojans boys can't catch Weiser

The Homedale High School boys basketball team hasn't played well in the third quarter this season, so Hank Garrison's 3-pointer at the first-half buzzer could have been considered overkill Friday night.

In all actuality, it may have spelled the end of any chance Homedale had of catching Weiser in the Wolverines' 64-42 victory in the 3A Snake River Valley conference season finale for both.

"The third quarter has really hurt us this year," Homedale coach Brad Hill said. "We came out flatfooted (after Garrison's trey)." attempts.

"The last couple of games, people just seem to shoot the ball really well against us," Hill said. "It's frustrating because we've been working so hard on our defense."

But, as Homedale found out in both its games last week, it's difficult to defend a team with a hot hand. Before Weiser shot lights out and buried seven 3-pointers, Payette bombed 11 treys in a 59-45 home victory on Feb. 7.

Hill said.

the Wolverines' multiple trips to the free-throw line. Many of Homedale's 18 fouls were called after collisions caused when Trojans defenders couldn't stop their momentum after being beaten to a loose ball and crashed into Weiser athletes.

Like a foot-race leader pacing himself, Weiser stayed just out of Homedale's grasp throughout the first quarter. And the Trojans could never find the kick to close the gap.

Matt Holloway showed off some speed and power, driving to the basket for a layup to get Homedale within six points at 19-13 with 44 seconds to go in the opening quarter. But the Wolverines took the air out of the ball to start the second period and later used a 7-2 run to take control 26-15. Then Garrison's 3-pointer took the wind out of the Trojans' sails. Homedale was out-boarded 21-12 on its end of the floor, and Ryan Rupp collected six of those rebounds for the Trojans.



The 6-foot-1 junior's one-footed bank shot at the buzzer was shot with all the grace of a snoozing flamingo and pushed Weiser's lead at the break into double digits, 33-22. But the thrilling shot was only the most spectacular element to the Wolverines' domination on the Trojans' floor.

Homedale ended the SRV season at 1-9 and took a 6-13 overall record into Monday's first round of the 3A District III Tournament. Weiser wrapped up the second seed with a 14-6 overall record after a 7-3 SRV campaign.

Weiser seemingly could do no wrong. The Wolverines knocked down their first 14 foul shots and hit 20 of their 40 field-goal Four of Weiser's treys came in the first half as Garrison, Bobby Hopkins, Zach Widner and Michael Bergquist all found the range from beyond the arc.

Hopkins' 3-pointer ended a hot streak in which he scored 11 of his 13 points in the first eight minutes. He was 4-for-4 from the field to start the game, and he also trampled the Trojans' hopes with his quickness to the ball. Hopkins snagged eight rebounds, including five on Homedale's end.

"One thing about our league is we don't just match up well with the other teams," Hill said. "Quickness kills us. Anybody with speed just hurts us, and we don't get any loose balls."

Weiser's speed also led to

"We do not get very many second-chance points," Hill said. "We settle for jump shots, and the kids know we don't want to settle for jump shots.

"And a lot of times, we're taking (a shot) with no one underneath to rebound."

Marsing boys run out of gas vs. Parma

Marsing High School's boys basketball team had a meteoric start to the second half Wednesday against Parma.

And we all know what happens to meteors.

The Huskies couldn't sustain the white-hot intensity of their third quarter, falling 52-46 to the Panthers in a 2A Western Idaho Conference game.

"We had some turnovers that cost us in critical situations," Marsing coach Brian Thompson said after his team's home finale.

By week's end, Marsing had ended the 2A WIC season at 1-7 and took a 6-13 overall record into Tuesday's first round of the 2A District Three Tournament.

Regular-season champ Parma (13-5 overall) ended up 7-1 and got a first-round bye.

The Panthers rode a rash of Huskies turnovers to a 14-4 run to a 30-26 halftime lead. The Panthers struck again with an 8-0 spurt fueled by Marsing's poor ball control and less-than-desirable shot selection to close the game and erase the home team's 46-44 lead with $4\frac{1}{2}$ minutes left.

Sandwiched between the bouts with ball-handling, though, was that pristine, rafter-rattling 13-0 beginning to the second half.

"We corrected some offensive stuff at halftime, but mainly we corrected defensive stuff," Thompson said. "Basic basketball stuff."

Marsing's frontcourt ignited the rally with strong rebounding.

Junior Shea McClellin powered in his own rebound to tie the game 30-30. Aaron Salvas, a 6-foot-5 junior post, blocked Kevin Weilmunster's shot on one end and cashed in with a jumper on the other. Chris Covey stole the ball from a Parma player in the Panthers' key and roared down the court only to get fouled and sink his free throws.

"We just got hot," Thompson said. "I thought our defense was pretty good right there. I've always told the kids the defense is going to create your offense."

When the dust had settled, Marsing was up 39-30 and Parma was in a timeout searching for answers.

The answers were the recurrence of the Huskies' poor shooting and ball-handling.

After McClellin glided in for a layup off a steal for a 41-32 lead, Santiago Quebrado missed a layup opportunity triggered by another turnover and Parma's Tony Olivo intercepted a pass by Brian Smith at midcourt.

Parma pulled within three points, 41-38, when Trent Timmons hit a jumper with 25 seconds left in the third. That basket was set up when McClellin came down with his only defensive rebound of the night but lost possession when he fell while trying to sprint out of the paint and downcourt.

"I think we were too anxious, too excited," Thompson said when explaining the lapses in the Huskies' running game. "We've

just gotta learn how to control the ball and know when to run and stav in control."

By the start of the fourth quarter, Parma had stripped the momentum from Marsing.

The Panthers were a free throw from tying the game after a 10-2 run when Weilmunster and Covey got tangled up going for a rebound on the Huskies' glass. When Covey tried to rip the ball from Weilmunster's grasp, both players crashed hard to the floor with the Parma athlete banging his head loudly off the hardwood.

Covey was hit with a technical, which turned out to be inconsequential, but the game was stopped while coaches and medical staff tended to Weilmunster - and the referees and security tried to deal with a woman who had bolted from the stands to check on the player.

"I don't think it played into the loss," Thompson said. "It was the dumb mistakes like throwing the ball out of bounds and traveling that cost us."

After a wobbly Weilmunster was helped back to the Parma bench, the Panthers squeezed ahead before Smith drained his second clutch 3-pointer of the night. Smith, who had come off the bench and popped a sudden trey in the first half, gave Marsing its last lead of the game, 46-44.

Then the poor shots and turnovers returned for Marsing, slamming the door on any chance of beating the league leaders.
