The Homedale High School wrestling team has been here before — the 3A state tournament. Yet, veteran Trojans coach Toby Johnson refuses to treat another visit to Holt Arena in Pocatello as old hat.

"We've done this tournament a couple times, and we know things can be unpredictable," Johnson said Monday. "And matches can be won or lost by one point."

"This is the state tournament. Everybody is going full-out since they have nothing to lose."

That's why, while his wrestler is confident, Johnson is guarded

JV earns trip to 1A Oregon tourney

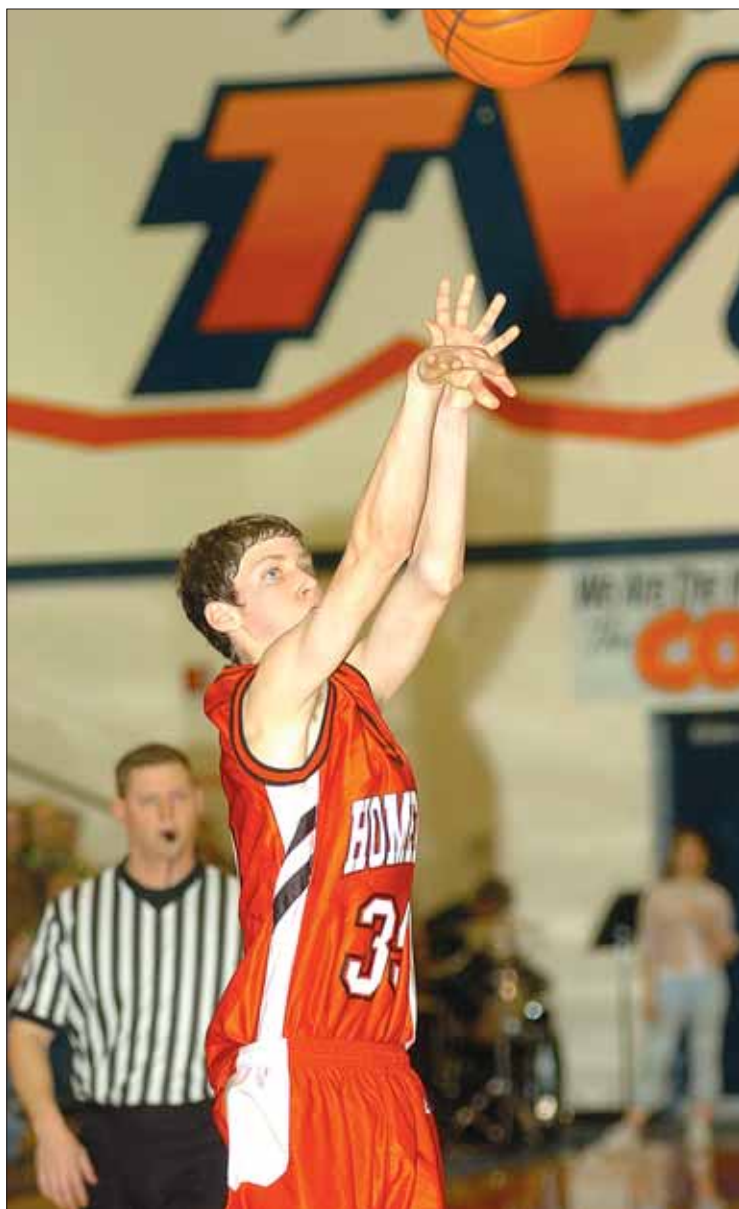

Rimrock girls settle for fourth

Raiders lose
in 2nd round
to eventual state
champ Wallace

A fire alarm sounded Thursday night before the 1A Real Dairy Shootout girls basketball state tournament quarterfinal between Rimrock and Wallace high schools.

Perhaps it was a sign of the barn-burner to come?

Or a signal that the Raiders' hopes of a state championship in Bob Delle's final season as coach was about to be extinguished at Nampa's Skyview High School.

With her team trailing by two points, Rimrock's Alex Thomas fired a 3-point attempt out of a timeout with 8.3 seconds. But it bounced off the rim and Wallace's Cara Hayman hit two ensuing free throws to ice a 39-35 victory.

"I thought it was going in. It looked pretty good," Wallace coach Kirby Krulitz said of Thomas' shot. He had good reason for his trepidation because Thomas had two key treys earlier in the game.

Rimrock had to settle for the 3-point shot because the Miners from North Idaho had denied any

Spring sports practice gets started Friday for Owyhee prep squads

Practice for spring sports begin Friday for high schools in Owyhee County, and at least two of the varsity teams will be warming up for the season under the watchful eye of new coaches.

Mark Weekes takes over the Homedale High School tennis program after being confirmed at the last school board meeting.

The same goes for David Thompson as the Trojans' new golf coach.

Tim Fulwood is back to guide the baseball team, and Larry Corta returns to coach softball. But Thomas Thomas is beginning his first season as the Homedale track and field coach.

The track team's first meet comes at 4 p.m. March 9 in Middleton. The softball team opens at home against Parma at 4:30 p.m. on March 10.

The baseball program will play its first varsity game in two years on March 10 when Parma visits for a 4:30 p.m. first pitch. Fulwood

canceled the varsity season last spring because of a lack of players, and the Trojans' junior varsity went on to win the 3A Snake River Valley conference.

Weekes' competitive debut comes on the Trojans' home courts at 4 p.m. March 14 against Nyssa, Ore.

Thompson's golf schedule still was being finalized at press time. The Trojans play their home meets at River Bend Golf Course in Wilder.

In Marsing, Don Heller returns as track and field coach, while Mark Worley will guide the baseball team and Tanya Hughes skips the softball squad.

The Huskies start the baseball

season at 4:30 p.m. March 13 by playing host to Rimrock from Bruneau. Marsing and Homedale face off at 4:30 p.m. March 14 on the Huskies' diamond. The Raiders are coached by Bob Murray.

Marsing and Rimrock will battle in the Huskies' softball opener, too, also at 4:30 p.m. March 13. Mike Chandler coaches the Raiders.

The Huskies' season-opening track meet takes place at 4 p.m. March 16 on the Deward Bell Stadium oval against Homedale.

Kermit Tate begins his 27th season as the Rimrock track and field coach on Friday. The Raiders' first action comes March 10 at Weiser.

What retirement? Trojans' new golf coach tees it up

Many people play golf in their retirement. Dave Thompson has decided to coach the sport.

The 59-year-old Thompson is the new Homedale High School golf coach after being confirmed last week by the school board.

"I enjoy golf, and I enjoy coaching and teaching kids," said Thompson, whose only previous coaching experience was with Boys and Girls Club intramural and traveling teams.

This is his first high school coaching assignment.

But just because Thompson is retired after 38 years with the Boys and Girls Club doesn't mean that he's taking up coaching to relieve the boredom associated with retirement.

"I've got plenty to do. My wife has a pretty good 'honey-do' list for me," Thompson said.

"It's kind of a marriage of two of my life's interests, and the timing was right."

And the timing isn't so bad for the Trojans, who begin practice at River Bend Golf Course in Wilder on Friday.

Thompson is the third person to coach the Homedale golf program in the past three years.

"Apparently, there wasn't much organization last year, and that's one thing I want to provide," Thompson said, who succeeds Michael Williams at the coaching helm.

"I want to give the kids structure and organization to practice and match day. I want to give them a routine and make them comfortable with that."

Williams served as interim coach last spring after the resignation of longtime Homedale coach Rich Hoyt.

"Dave is an avid golfer," Homedale athletic director Dave Hart said. "We are very lucky to have someone with Dave's experience take over our golf program."

A native of Oregon, Thompson grew up in Idaho's Hagerman Valley and graduated from Idaho State University. He and his wife, Pamela, have been married 35 years and moved from California to Nyssa, Ore., in December. The couple has two grown children: Jennifer, 28; and Jonathan, 25.

a golf team, but he picked up the sport as a ninth-grader and competed in non-scholastic leagues in Gooding and Buhl.

Thompson and his wife moved to Nyssa from Rancho Cucamonga, Calif., which is part of the Los Angeles metropolitan area. He served as a program director for the Boys and Girls Club of the San Gabriel Valley.

He dealt with boys and girls from urban backgrounds, but he doesn't think there will be much transition in dealing with the 21 boys and girls who are expected to go out for golf at Homedale.

"Dave Thompson brings 30 years of experience working with high school age students," Hart said. "Dave had a tremendous career with the Boys and Girls Club in the Los Angeles area and coached some great athletes."

Thompson is excited about the crop of golfers that await him.

"I understand that it's a good, solid returning group of kids who had a little bit of success last year as underclassmen," he said.

Among the players who could return to the Homedale team are 2005 3A state tournament qualifier Garrett Sweet, a senior, and junior Trevor Krzesnik. Krzesnik missed the state tournament by one stroke a year ago as a sophomore.

"I try to develop an individual plan of attack with each kid in terms of their learning the game and learning to manage it," Thompson said.

Marsing boys split first two district games

Big inside game sends Huskies to first-round win in 2A tourney

Shea McClellin showed last week why he has been selected to an all-star team that will play basketball in Italy this summer. The Marsing High School junior registered season highs with 30 points and 17 rebounds on Feb. 14 to propel the Huskies past Melba 63-49 in the first round of the 2A District III Boys Basketball Tournament in Middleton. “McClellin just took over the game inside,” Melba coach Bob Lenz said. Marsing coach Brian Thompson said the the long-awaited arrival of the Huskies perimeter offense set the stage for the inside job by McClellin, Aaron Salvas (eight points) and Jon Cossel (six points). “I knew we could (play like that) all year,” Thompson said. “We just had to get some outside shooting started first.” Guard Troy Dines obliged with his third double-digit scoring effort in the past five games. Dines popped a trio of 3-point goals and finished with 10 points. No trey was bigger than when the junior converted the final shot of the first half to give Marsing a 25-22 lead as the buzzer sounded. The basket capped a 7-0 Huskies run, puncturing any momentum

the Mustangs had earlier in the game and creating an atmosphere ripe for domination in the third quarter. With McClellin taking the lead, Marsing was responsible for 12 of the first 15 points scored in the second half. The 6-foot-4 junior spun around a defender with one step and stuck a high-percentage shot off the glass with 5 minutes, 40 seconds left to give Marsing a 34-25 advantage. “He had a great game, but we also have to have other people step up and play, too,” Thompson said. Even with McClellin scoring 15 points to start the second half, his coach got his wish. The Huskies scored 25 points in the third quarter, with Aaron Salvas crashing the boards on a McClellin miss and Dines and Santiago Quebrado launching 3-pointers. “I feel pretty good about (the 30 points), but I’m just trying to help the team out,” said McClellin, who will be part of a NBC Camps all-star team of 16- to 20-year-olds on a tour of Northern Italy in July. He said he has started his fund-raising campaign by sending inquiries to Marsing businesses. McClellin grabbed 10 of his rebounds on Melba’s end of the

floor as Marsing held a massive 28-8 edge on the Mustangs’ glass. Salvas collected nine of his 12 rebounds on the defensive side. With that rebounding advantage, the Huskies built enough equity to stave off Melba’s rally midway through the final period. Doug Beus converted a three-point play, and Lewt Greenfield hit a pair of free throws to fuel an 8-0 spurt and pull Melba within six points, 52-46, with 4:17 left. “I think we relaxed, and they started putting it back in (the basket), and we let them get the momentum again,” Thompson said. “Every team in this tournament is good, and we can’t relax out there.” Soon enough, the Mustangs ran out of time and were haunted by a 4-for-21 shooting performance (19 percent) during the last eight minutes. “We didn’t shoot well down the stretch at all,” Lenz said. “When we’re not shooting well outside and they’re getting baskets inside, the outcome won’t be good.” McClellin hit nine of 11 attempts (81.8 percent) over the second and third quarters. His aggressive layup and free throw put an end to Melba’s comeback bid in the fourth quarter. “We knew they were smaller than us, and we had to get it inside to win,” Thompson said. — JB

Physical Parma pounds out win in semis

What started with the air of a heavyweight title fight Saturday night devolved into a backstreet brawl between the boys basketball teams from Marsing and Parma high schools. The Panthers took advantage of a loosely officiated game to post a 42-26 victory in the semifinals of the 2A District III tournament at Middleton High School. “Parma was very physical,” Marsing coach Brian Thompson said. “They came out and got in our faces, and we didn’t handle things that were happening very well.” The regular-season champion Panthers qualified for championship game, while Marsing (7-14) slipped into the losers bracket. Parma (14-5) met New Plymouth on Tuesday for the district’s No. 1 seed in next week’s 2A Real Dairy Shootout state tournament. Marsing also played Tuesday, needing to win two games to reach the state tournament. The results of both games weren’t available at press time. With a game atmosphere that Thompson said had fans from both teams climbing down the officials’ throats Saturday, Parma stifled a Marsing offense that seemed to be on the verge of a breakthrough

earlier in the week. “Basically, it comes down that Parma took us out of our gameplan,” Thompson said. “Once you have a team playing mental games with ourselves, believing we can’t make a shot or rebound, the other team has the edge.” Parma’s aggressive defensive style resulted in Marsing players forcing shots. “They put some pressure on us, and we didn’t handle the pressure too well,” Thompson said. “We just kind of threw the ball up instead of shooting it like we should be.” Parma took command with an 18-6 third quarter. Trent Timmons, Tony Olivo and Brian Merrick scored nine points apiece to pace the Panthers. The Huskies, who had ignited a superb inside game to beat Melba 63-49 on Feb. 14, shot around 16 percent Saturday night as Parma shut down Marsing’s scorers.

Shea McClellin, who was averaging 16.6 points a night heading into the game, was limited to 11 points. Chris Covey didn’t have a field goal, while Aaron Salvas’ one field goal was a 3-pointer. Troy Dines, who Thompson said has been ill in the days leading up to the game, was scoreless. “Whenever we tried to push the ball down low to Shea, they put three people on him,” Thompson said. “And when we kicked it out, they quickly got to us, or we rushed our shot because we knew they were coming after us.”

Cardiac Christoffersen rallies for district gold

Let there be no doubt that Tyler Christoffersen is a wrestler who thrives in clutch situations.

The Homedale High School senior 145-pounder put together one of the classic matches of the season Saturday to beat Weiser's David Bilbao and win the 3A District III championship.

Christoffersen's 2-0 overtime victory in the final was one of the highlights of the day as the Trojans qualified a dozen athletes for this week's 3A state tournament, which begins Thursday in Pocatello.

"I knew it would be a close match," Christoffersen said. "I didn't think it would be that close."

Homedale was unable to parlay its strong performance Saturday at Weiser High School — nine wrestlers competed for championships — into the elusive district team title, though. Middleton knocked off two-time defending state champion Weiser for the championship.

"Sometimes we're a victim of population," Homedale coach Toby Johnson said of the team championship quest. "Weiser has two kids in almost every weight class, and so does Middleton."

The Trojans finished third in the team standings with 234 points. Middleton edged Weiser by a half-point, 292 to 291½.

"(Middleton coach) Keith Love did a great job getting his boys ready to accomplish that goal," Johnson said.

Christoffersen and Bilbao ended a contentious three-round duel in a scoreless tie Saturday, but — as is his style — the Homedale senior was a split-second from winning the match at the end of regulation. Christoffersen (33-3) wriggled free from Bilbao's grip for what seemed to be a two-point escape as the referee blew the whistle at the end of the third round. But it was ruled the escape was completed just after the whistle.

"I knew it was right on the border," Christoffersen said. "I stayed in the position just waiting to hear the two."

In sudden death overtime, Christoffersen wasted little time — or energy — in getting the take down necessary to grab the championship.

"I know in OT that a lot of people are tired," Christoffersen said. "I've been in quite a few OT matches this year, and I know that I'm the one that has to put pressure on them. Have to let them know I'm not tired."

As dramatic as Christoffersen's title match was, the senior insists junior Tyler Maxwell's championship victory over top-seeded Chase Harberd of Weiser at 160

pounds was the match of the tournament.

"Maxwell's match was really intense," Christoffersen said. "The crowd was getting into it, and the wrestlers were getting into it."

Johnson said Maxwell took a shot to the forehead from Harberd in the second round that seemed to be the turning point for the match.

"He was in a lot of pain," Johnson said. "I walked out there and said, 'Don't let him have this match. Don't give it him,' and he did a fantastic job of holding it together and doing what he had to do."

Maxwell (28-7) rallied to get a pin.

Pinfalls were the order of the day for unstoppable 119-pounder Jeremy Ensley, who battled through injuries to his right ankle and his right knee to lock down the state's top seed in his division with a 29-0 record.

"Maybe I'm just getting old because I've been doing this so long," Ensley said of the dings. "I'm more thinking about the match than (that) it hurts."

The senior rolled up three pins on the way to another championship. He finished off McCall-Donnelly's Daniel Romaro in 1 minute, 3 seconds in the final.

"He was squirming," Ensley said. "I didn't even know what he was doing. He would fake one way and cut back."

Ensley takes a school-record 124 career victories into the state tournament, including a winning streak of 115.

One of the biggest disappointments Saturday was the end to Bryan Martinat's promising junior season at 152 pounds.

Martinat reached the championship match against Middleton's Bryon Doramus and was leading 2-0 in the second round when he had to retire because of a fractured

right fibula.

Yelling, "Oh, I broke it," Martinat he rolled out of a scrum with Doramus, clutching his lower right leg.

"He's a junior and a re-turning state runner-up," Johnson said. "That's tough. You can't help but have expectations of yourself to do well in consecutive seasons, and it just kind of shoots it down."

Homedale's other individual championship came in the heavyweight division. Top-seeded Amador Cortinas, a sophomore, pinned McCall-Donnelly's Richard Campbell, the No. 2 seed, for the district crown.

"Cortinas wrestled awesome," Johnson said.

Campbell reached the final by pinning Homedale's Jaime Uriarte in the semifinals.

"He had his opportunities against Campbell, but couldn't get him locked down," Johnson said.

In other championship matches:

Josh Jolley missed a title with a hard-fought 3-0 loss to Weiser's Cory Pratt at 215 pounds.

Senior Stuart Miyasako finished second at 130 pounds after an 8-4 championship loss to top-seeded Abram Salcedo of Payette.

Ty Post of Middleton pinned Homedale's Jason Christoffersen at 140 pounds.

Ricco Gonzalez lost to Weiser top seed Ryan Alder in the 171-pound final.

"Our team is tough," Christoffersen said. "We all wrestled really well, but we just didn't have enough numbers to be up there with Weiser and Middleton."

Huskies wrestlers create fuel for brighter future

Four of Marsing High School's wrestlers emerged from Saturday's 1A/2A District III Tournament with tickets to this week's state tournament in Pocatello.

That's the good news. The better news: They're all underclassmen.

"Hopefully if we get some success at State, some other kids will come out (for the program)," fourth-year coach Rick Folwell said. "State is the thing that builds programs. It's a chance for kids to go on a compete beyond our little borders."

Michael Tuckness is returning to the tournament as a junior, and Folwell thinks he has a good chance to make some noise in the 189-pound bracket when the tournament begins Thursday inside Holt Arena on the Idaho State University campus.

Also qualifying for the state tournament from the Huskies squad were freshman Michael Moore (140 pounds) and sophomores Chaz Covey (130) and Kris Young (135).

Tuckness and Moore won district championships in their respective weight classes. Young and Covey each placed third, while Daniel Ineck finished fourth at 160 pounds. Senior Ricky Branin, who was wrestling at 171 pounds, lost his first two matches and was eliminated.

"The sophomores are going to be wrestling the No. 1 or No. 2 guys first," Folwell said. "Michael and Michael are sitting pretty good."

The Huskies finished fourth

in the district team standings, which came as a bit of a surprise to Folwell. Parma won the team championship.

"We have never been concerned with team points because we never had enough teammates," he said. "But we beat everybody except one in the first round, and all of the wins were by pin."

"If our numbers were up a little bit we could have taken third. It was definitely a welcomed surprise."

Tuckness collected the championship at 189 by pinning Mark Finley of Parma in 3 minutes, 2 seconds. Moore secured his title by putting Parma's Cody Profit on his back in 1:16.

Covey decisioned Ryan Brown of Melba, 5-3, in the 130 third-place match. Brian Aernt of Melba pinned Ineck in 3:30 for third place at 160.

Tuckness (26-7) is in a bracket that includes Glenns Ferry senior Kole Adamson (22-5) and unbeaten Kamiah junior Clayton Foster (43-0).

Young's competition at 135 includes Tyler McGreal (22-12) of Potlatch and top seed Michael Sams (21-6), a senior from Wendell.

Moore (13-6) faces a field that includes top seed George Butts (31-2), a senior from Challis, is proejcted as the top seed.

Covey (14-14) will see competition from, among others, Caleb Jolley of Firth (21-14) top-seeded Aberdeen senior Charles Gonzalez (43-7).

Simplot Games kind to Owyhee athletes

Two Owyhee County high school track and field athletes walked away with top-10 showings last weekend at the Simplot Games in Pocatello.
