Strong first impressions are good, but the Homedale High School softball team would rather present strong first innings.

The Trojans blasted Parma 13-3 and 22-6 in a pair of non-conference games halted by the 10-run mercy rule on March 21, and Homedale scored 15 first-inning runs in the doubleheader.

Homedale ripped 27 hits in 10

innings at Sundance Park against the Panthers from the 2A Western Idaho Conference. Freshman left fielder Kendall Rupp was 5-for-5 with six runs scored and five RBIs in the two games, while senior Jenny George drove in five runs in a 13-3 victory in the opener.

"We just knew we had hitting going through the lineup," Homedale coach Larry Corta said. "And Jenny did step up and

hit the ball well for us, and so did Kendall.

"When we had people on the bases, they came through for us."

Corta said Parma played without its top pitcher, but the Trojans punished her backup, Hailey Constantine, incessantly throughout the afternoon.

With two outs in the third

Late rally lifts Trojans past state champs

If he's going to get results like Friday's victory against two-time defending state champion Middleton High School, Homedale softball coach Larry Corta won't think twice about bribery.

After Thursday's practice, Corta promised the Trojans if they could knock off the Vikings in both teams' Snake River Valley conference opener at Sundance

Homedale's decisive 7-2 victory sent the third-year coach scurrying for the phonebook in search of pizza joints.

'We tried to think of anything to get them going, and they seem to think pizza is a good thing," said Corta, who called the victory the biggest moment in his three seasons at Homedale. "If they go error-free in games, we buy them milkshakes.

"They got one error (against Middleton), but we'll probably give them milkshakes, too."

It's a small price to pay for historic results.

"The win (Friday) is a big milestone for them because now they know they can compete at the top," Corta said of his Trojans. "They may have been doubting

themselves, but today showed they can compete. Their goal is to go to State."

That's not such a lofty dream after the way Homedale handled Middleton pitching ace Donnae Carrell, whom Corta classifies as the top 3A hurler in Idaho.

Homedale High School couldn't find its bearings at the start of the Snake River Valley conference baseball season Friday. The Trojans were caught off-guard by a junk-baller in a 6-1 loss to visiting Middleton.

The Vikings' Coby Cantrell used his curveball to fan 12 batters and limit the Trojans to just four hits in the league opener for both squads.

"He had a good curveball and just threw us off," Homedale coach Tim Fulwood said. "He kept us off-balance with the curve and mixing it in with the fastball, and we could never get our timing at the plate."

Leadoff hitter David Liddell scored Homedale's only run. The junior center fielder began the

Homedale thrives with Liddell leading off

Call him the reluctant catalyst. David Liddell has blazing speed and a keen eye at the plate, but the Homedale High School junior had told baseball coach Tim Fulwood earlier this season he didn't like the idea of batting leadoff for the Trojans.

That situation — and perhaps Liddell's outlook on the responsibility — changed on March 21 in a decisive doubleheader sweep of Parma.

Liddell went 5-for-7 and scored six runs as Homedale pummeled Parma 16-0 and 14-4 in a pair of non-conference games that were halted after five innings because of the 10-run mercy rule.

"For Parma, I wanted to try an additional bit of spark and speed at the top of the lineup," Fulwood said.

"David doesn't like to hit leadoff, but he has the speed and tools to hit leadoff and as long as he's mentally prepared, he can get the job done for us."

Liddell entered the day hitting .250 (3-for-12). After the Parma



conquest, the center fielder had raised his batting average to .421 (8-for-19) with 11 runs scored and six stolen bases.

Liddell's five hits were only the tip of the iceberg for the Trojans' titantiic display against Parma. Homedale's hitters collected 27 hits in 10 innings, including 16 in the 16-0 cakewalk in the opener.

"Hitting is contagious," Fulwood said. "In the first game, we came out and scored five runs and had five straight base hits to start the game off."

The first game of the doubleheader was a makeup for a March 10 season opener in Parma that was postponed be-



Homedale was tabbed as the visitor in that first game, and it was the worst way to start for the Panthers from the 2A Western Idaho Conference.

Josh Jolley crushed a tworun triple to bring in Liddell and Brandt Graber with the game's first runs. Graber finished the first game 3-for-5 with three RBIs, and went 6-for-8 and knocked in four runs in the twin bill.

Meanwhile, Ross DeWitt, a transfer from Washington state, was 4-for-6 on the day with four stolen bases in the first game and two RBIs in the finale.

"I hope it catches on," Fulwood said of his team's hitting. "We've been working hard in practice on developing consistency and putting the ball in play and making the other teams make plays on us."

The Panthers, who slipped to 0-4, committed four errors in the two games, fueling five unearned

"Parma's a better team than what they showed," Fulwood said. "That was the best we played all year."

Claudio Garcia continued his strong start for the Trojans in the opener. He struck out seven and allowed only three baserunners in five innings, running his record to 3-0.

Garcia has been the workhorse for Homedale, which carried a 4-2 record into Friday's 3A Snake River Valley conference season opener at home against Middleton. But Fulwood is looking for

another pitcher to step from the shadows and take some of the load off the righthander.

The coach thought he had found the answer when Garrett Sweet assumed that role in the second game against Parma. The senior righthander overcame a rocky start in which he hit the game's first two batters to get the victory. Sweet, who was pitching for the first time since eighth grade, allowed one hit and two walks in four innings.

"I was very pleased with what Garrett did on the mound," Fulwood said. "He was very nervous, but that was understandable."

Sweet fielded his position flawlessly, igniting a home-to-first double play after he loaded the bases in the first inning. Sweet had three assists on putouts in the first two frames.

Alas, Fulwood is looking for another backup hurler after Sweet decided to pack his glove away and concentrate on reaching the boys golf state tournament for a fourth consecutive season.

"We're really looking for Ross DeWitt to step up and fill that spot for us," Fulwood said of the hunt for the No. 2 starter. "His arm is an issue now. Inflammation of the shoulder and tendonitis has limited his pitch count."

DeWitt throws no more than 40 pitches in a game, but he struck out six in a three-inning start against Nampa Christian on March 20.

Homedale's defense fell apart in the fifth inning in Nampa as the host club scored nine unearned runs to secure a 14-4 victory shortened by the 10-run rule. Homedale committed five errors during the rally.

Kyle Miyasako led the Homedale hitting with a 2-for-2 outing that included two stolen bases and a two-run single to drive home DeWitt and Ryan Johnson and tied the game 4-4 in the fourth inning.

Antelopes open softball season with exciting win

The Adrian High School softball team has developed a taste for the dramatic.

For starters, it wasn't even certain until the 11th hour whether the school would field a softball team this season.

Thursday, the Antelopes won their season opener in eight innings, beating non-conference foe Horseshoe Bend 4-3.

With the scored knotted 3-3 and the international tiebreaker in effect, Adrian started the top of the eighth inning with pitcher Paige Branstiter standing on second base. Branstiter scored the go-ahead run from third when Horseshoe Bend catcher Kelly Kennedy mishandled a third strike to Adrian's YaYa Dominguez. Andrea Garner had bunted Branstiter to third to set up the scoring opportunity.

"The girls were able to manufacture enough runs to get the win by doing the little things and getting runners in scoring position," Adrian co-head coach Jay Gomeza said.

The Mustangs, who slipped to 0-4, loaded the bases with no outs in the bottom of the eighth as Branstiter gave up two walks on eight pitches.

Gomeza said he called a timeout after the second walk, but didn't speak directly to Branstiter during a conference with the infielders at the pitching circle.

She still got the message, though.

The 6-foot sophomore, who has a ferocious delivery, struck out the next three batters to end the game.

"She's a dominant pitcher when she's on," Gomeza said. "She throws as hard as any girl you want out there."

It was the first victory for the Antelopes under the head-coaching tandem of Gomeza and Megan Price.

"I told them that I think they handled the first game better than I did," Gomeza said.

Price coached Adrian a year ago, but Gomeza signed on this spring, bringing a fiery attitude and demanding style from his gig as a longtime wrestling coach at Nyssa.

Branstiter fit right into the mold Thursday. She recorded 17 of the Mustangs' 24 outs by strikeout and played a part in three other putouts. She allowed only four hits and dodged seven walks and two fifthinning errors by her infielders.

Gomez praised his team's ability to play small ball. With junior pitcher Trista Procter firing BBs for Horseshoe Bend, station-to-station was the only realistic way the Antelopes were going to score. Procter fanned 14 and walked four in her eight innings.

But the Antelopes were able to reach her for seven hits.

Adrian took a 3-2 lead in the top of the sixth when Amanda Simpson led off the inning with a base hit, swiped a couple bases and scored on Dominguez's single.

Ryann Bowns uncorked a clutch two-out single in the fourth inning to chase home Garner for a 2-1 lead.

Kat Sillonis led off the game with a walk, stole second and eventually scored for an early 1-0 Antelopes advantage. She was 2-for-3 on the day.

"It was nice to get a win under their belts in March and get a little momentum going into Spring Break," Gomeza said.

The Antelopes are scheduled to play their next games on the road April 15 in the Oregon Special District 8 season-opening doubleheader against a co-op team from Enterprise and Joseph high schools. But Gomeza still is trying to scare up some competition before then.



Freshman triggers Marsing softball's first victory

With Keshia Stafford possibly lost for the season with a broken arm, Marsing High School's softball team is looking for another big bat to come through.

Freshman Miranda Clausen might be the answer.

Clausen, who stepped into Stafford's defensive slot in left field, went 3-for-5 with a double, triple and two RBIs on March 21 to lead the Huskies to a 16-9 non-conference victory over host

Wilder.

It was the first win of the season for the Huskies, who appeared in the 2A state tournament last year.

"As a freshman, she stepped up, and when she got up to bat, she nailed the ball," second-year Marsing coach Tanya Hughes said of Clausen. "We needed a hitter to come in and take Keshia's place.

"As far as hitting and fielding, (Clausen's) doing the job."

Stafford was hitting a team-

best .800 (4-for-5) with four runs scored, six RBIs and a mind-boggling 1.800 slugging percentage (thanks to three doubles and a triple) when she suffered a broken arm while diving for a fly ball in a 21-17 loss to Wilder in Marsing on March 16.

After last week's performance in the rematch with the Wildcats, Clausen was hitting .428 (4-for-7) with three runs scored and three RBIs. Her slugging percentage soared to 1.000 on the strength of her double and triple.

Both of Clausen's run-scoring hits came with two outs.

In the sixth inning, she clubbed a triple to chase home Ashley Kirsch for the final tally of a fiverun rally Marsing used snap a 8-8 stalemate.

Kirsch scored on Clausen's third-inning double as part of a four-run outburst that gave the Huskies a 7-5 edge.

Marsing held on to the lead this time around, five days after Wilder outscored the Huskies 17-4 down the stretch when Hughes piled in all her reserves in an attempt to get inexperienced athletes some game exposure.

"I kept all my starters in and didn't pull anybody out," Hughes said. "I did it because I wanted to build their confidence and let them know that they can win."

"We just didn't make some plays behind them."

Homedale committed six errors while DeWitt and Garcia allowed iust four hits.

The Trojans had two golden scoring opportunities in the second and third innings, but Cantrell managed to wiggle free.

After Cantrell struck out Garcia and Trevor Krzesnik on six straight

pitches to start the second inning, Kyle Miyasako slapped a double and Ryan Johnson reached base after being plunked by a pitch. But Cantrell got a fly ball from Brockett to end the threat.

In the third inning, Homedale began rumbling again with two outs. DeWitt and Josh Jolley laced singles, and Cantrell drilled Garcia with a delivery to load the bases. But Cantrell got Krzesnik looking at a third strike to end the last serious Trojans threat.

"We just couldn't get anything

going offensively," Fulwood said. "We left runners on and couldn't get that hit when we needed it."

Cantrell faced the minimum number of batters over the final four innings. Jolley led off the sixth with a single, but was gunned down trying to steal by Middleton catcher Trent Harrison.

"I think the guys know now that they can compete with these guys," Fulwood said. "It's just a matter of keeping the confidence up and going up there and keeping the focus."

THE WAR ON THE MOUNTAIN- Last week we stated that the Ida Elmore and Golden Chariot Companies were strongly fortified and closely watching each other, which state of things continued until about noon on Wednesday last when it appears that the Golden Chariot party underground stormed the works of their opponent, forced them back to the main hoisting shaft of the Ida Elmore and within ten feet of which they hastily made a breastwork of gunny sacks filled with sand, which commands the shaft so that no one can go down or u, but still leaving as a means of ingress and egress to the Ida Elmore party the New York shaft, four or five hundred feet further north. Desperate fighting ensued during the charge, at the time of which or immediately after, John C. Holgate, an owner and disarmed. Two more were penned up in a slope and refused to give up their arms, but we understand they were allowed to come out before dark. Shooting was kept up at interval during the night and the next morning a man named Meyer Frank, who was fighting on the Ida Elmore side, was brought down to town mortally wounded, a bullet from a Spencer or a Henry rifle haring passed through his intestines producing a fatal wound. The unfortunate man died about two o'clock in the afternoon. A short time after noon on the same day another Ida Elmore man, named Jils Howard, was brought down with his right arm broken-a large bullet did the work. The bone is horribly splintered and smashed up between the elbow and shoulder. It is thought that it will have to be amputated and fears are entertained that it will prove fatal. Some others have received slight wounds, but up to the time of going to press nothing serious has occurred. The Golden Chariot party will hold the ground which they seized on Wednesday. Consequently the Ida Elmore party has been compelled to suspend work although we are told that the former are taking out more one than ever. As yet there has been no fighting outside of the mine, but it is for real that peace will not long be kept as both parties have secured compelling positions and furthered them within very hot of the two mines and as there are at least fifty men armed to the teeth on each side. We are prepared at any time to hear of a bloody battle.

Apparently they had a great feast on eggs and potatoes taken from the wagon of Mr. Jarvis. The missing chinaman was tracked to the place on the creek, but there all trace of him was lost. It is not known whether he was killed and thrown into the creek or taken captive away. From the sigh it appears that only four Indians were concerned in the affair. The place where they crossed Reynold's Creek is said to be the only practicable crossing for a distance of several miles each way up and down the creek.

Social Security must be secured now

During the recent debate in the Senate over the federal budget, Sen. Jim DeMint (R-S.C.) and I introduced an amendment that would stop the United States government from raiding the so-called Social Security Trust Fund. I

highlight the term "Trust Fund" because it's misleading.

Every year, the federal government uses the surplus deposited into the Old Age Survivors and Disability Income (OASDI), more commonly referred to as Social Security, to cover expenses incurred in other government programs. Now, instead of money there is an ever-increasing pile of IOUs issued by the government to all taxpayers. With the number of workers paying for retirees steadily declining — 40 workers paid for one retiree in the 1940s, three pay for one right now, and 2.2 will pay for one in about 20 years Sen. Mike Crapo - you can likely guess what those IOUs are

worth and where the system is headed. To the detriment of future taxpayers, the amendment was defeated by a vote of 53-46.

Because of the way Social Security is set up, Congress can cut benefits at any time, change the structure of the program, or raise taxes even further. These are not unlikely scenarios — Congress will face tough choices in coming years because the government has not set aside any money to pay out future benefits. Considering the outcome of the failed vote on the amendment, the majority of the Senate seems predictably intent upon placing current budget priorities ahead of the sober reality of much higher tax rates for our children and grandchildren. These rates will be necessary to raise enough revenue to fund Social Security in 20 or 30 years.

The DeMint-Crapo amendment would have:

1) Stopped Social Security surpluses from being spent

on other government programs;

2) Ensured Social Security surpluses were only used for Social Security benefits;

3) Provided a voluntary option for younger Americans to obtain legally binding ownership of a portion of their

> 4) Made no changes to the benefits of those Americans born before Jan. 1, 1950.

When we consider the questionable future of Social Security solvency, it is good to bear in mind the original intent of the program. A recent Washington Post article said it best: "The point of Social Security was to subsidize those who couldn't work, not those who could. The program's founding document said it would support old people who were 'dependent,' 'beyond the productive period' and 'without means of self-support.' " Even though the system was designed to be a safety net, we need to

make sure that it is a viable one that fulfills its important obligation to seniors.

I, for one, do not want to saddle my children and grandchildren with sky-high taxes. Furthermore, I believe that individuals have the right to make decisions about their own money. Many 20- and 30-year-olds today have doubts about whether there will be any Social Security when they retire. This begs the question: do we fix the system now, when we can make incremental changes, or do we leave the burden for coming generations to bear when it becomes a catastrophic financial crisis? The choice is truly ours to make. Allowing the federal government to continue to cut benefits, raise taxes or both is a risky proposition. Setting aside personal benefits now is a concrete solution.

Survey says: Young farmers optimistic about the future

Results of a yearly survey of young farmers and ranchers ages 18 to 35 conducted by the American Farm Bureau Federation revealed that 95 percent of respondents hope their children follow in their footsteps. The only time this percentage was higher was in 1996, when nearly 96 percent of respondents said they want to see their children earn a living on the farm.

A total of 330 young farmers and ranchers responded

to the survey conducted during the AFBF Young Farmer and Rancher annual conference in Des Moines, Iowa. Eight young farmers from Idaho attended the conference this year.

Optimism also ran high among the farmers when they were asked whether they are better off today than they were last year and whether they expect to be farmers or ranchers their entire life. Among the group, 94 percent said they are better

off today, and 91 percent said they expect to be lifetime

For the second consecutive year, availability of land and facilities was a top challenge listed by respondents. There were 21 percent that listed this as the top concern this year. Concerns about ongoing farm profitability were the second-biggest concern listed by the group with loss of farm land to urbanization listed third.

Energy policy and strengthening private property rights were two other political issues listed as high priorities for the group. Sixteen percent of the respondents said they would like to see energy policy that includes a bigger role for renewable fuels. They also want the government to strengthen private property rights, which reflects a common rural America sentiment for state legislators to outlaw use of eminent domain for economic development projects.

Of this year's group, 29 percent started farming on their own as a career decision, while 15 percent married into farming or ranching. About 12 percent inherited a portion of their operation, and 44 percent said they started as partners in a family farm or ranch. Last year, 53 percent, or 9 percent more respondents than last year, started as partners and only 23 percent started on their own.

This year, 33 percent of respondents said they use futures and options as marketing tools for crops and livestock compared with 22 percent last year. In 2000, the survey showed 50 percent of respondents were using futures and options as marketing tools. Two other management tools used by at least 30 percent of the group were accounting services (38 percent) and crop advisors (34 percent). Last year, these two services were also the top outside services used.

Fewer husbands but more wives among the 2006 respondents are working off the farm compared to last year and in 2004. The totals for this year show 8 percent of husbands and 43 percent of wives are working off the farm to earn additional income. In 25 percent of the farm households, both husband and wife work off the farm. As expected, the reason listed for working off the farm was to obtain health insurance for the family.

Farm Bureau Young Farmers and Ranchers are entrepreneurs and are adapting with new strategies to earn a living in agriculture. These young people are proving to be top-notch stewards of our nation's most important asset — its land.

UN may reform, but secrecy will persist

The United Nations has launched another effort at "reform," designed to convince American taxpayers that things are changing for the better at an institution known for corrupt practices. The public face of this effort is an American, Christopher Burnham, the new U.N. Under-Secretary-General for Management, who recently spoke to the Heritage Foundation about affirming "the highest ethical standards" at the world body and making sure the U.N. is more open and accountable. Unfortunately for him, he agreed to take questions, one of which — about U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan getting a \$500,000 personal gift from a foreign government — he didn't want to answer. His other answers indicate that it's mostly business as usual at the U.N.

Burnham said that he didn't know how much reform would cost because, "There has not been a PBI, a budget implication document, produced yet." He added, "So I would not use any figure right now as an absolute figure for what these reforms are going to cost." Yet Annan has put the cost at \$510 million. That includes paying some employees to leave the U.N. through \$100,000-per-person "buyouts."

Burnham described these employees as "no longer contributing to the United Nations" but still on the payroll. He said they "lack the passion" for the U.N. mission and "are marking time in the parade of life waiting for retirement to roll around." He didn't explain why they couldn't be fired or why the buyouts couldn't be lower. Through the buyouts, he indicated, the U.N. would "help you reach that point where you can go into those golden years." They are golden in more ways than one. These staffers would presumably still be able to draw from the U.N. pension fund, which has assets of \$29 billion. It's a nice parade, if you can get a ticket.

So in order to get some better employees, U.S. taxpayers are being asked to pay the bad ones to leave. But where will the new ones come from? Burnham did not effectively dispute the notion, offered by a member of the audience, that new employees will be nominated by the same old governments that nominated the old ones.

Burnham, who has an impressive background in financial affairs, said the U.N. needs \$200 million worth of new computer software to make the organization more open and transparent. But he didn't know if that cost was part of the \$510 million or not. So the cost of U.N. reform could go higher than \$510 million. Burnham said the \$510 million figure shouldn't be etched into marble just yet. They use marble, not stone, at the U.N.

Burnham highlighted the new financial-disclosure policy, saying disclosure forms will be "far more expanded and meaningful." He said the form to be filed by various U.N. officials "is stronger than the one we have in the federal government we have in Washington, D.C."

But he admitted that the forms will NOT be available to the public. By contrast, federal disclosure forms by high-ranking officials, including members of all branches of government, are disclosed publicly.

Burnham insisted secrecy is necessary for security reasons, because some U.N. employees are refugees from despotic regimes. He said he came into contact with some Iraqi doctors working for the U.N.'s World Health Organization in Jordan during the time of the Saddam Hussein regime who could not

go back to Iraq because they might be killed. Burnham said if these people released disclosure forms and they were posted on the World Wide Web, Saddam's intelligence services could have looked at them. "This is an inter-governmental international organization, and you can't have what you would expect here in the United States and perhaps other governments to do that," he said.

That was a passionate plea, but he didn't explain why disclosing possible financial conflicts-of-interest involving the U.N. might jeopardize someone's life. If there are some U.N. employees who legitimately fear the disclosure of personal financial information, because it could somehow threaten their lives, why can't those cases be dealt with as exceptions to the rule of making it public? An official in the audience countered that the Iraqi doctors were not of a highenough level at the U.N. to have been required to file the forms anyway. But when he asked why disclosure forms of higher-ranking U.N. officials should not be made available to the public, Burnham said "we can't have two different levels" or a "two-tiered system." Burnham said the U.N. would have an outside entity, perhaps a law firm, review the forms. Of course, this process won't be open to the public.

On the matter of financial disclosure, the U.N. says that "Under the new financial disclosure system, the value of gifts that UN officials will be required to report will drop from \$10,000 to \$250, and financial disclosure forms will be required from a far broader spectrum of officials than the current range of assistant secretary-general and up."

Can you imagine a system under which officials could receive \$10,000 gifts? That was the state of affairs at the U.N., and it's supposed to be a great step forward to lower this to \$250. If you didn't know the figure was this high to begin with, that's probably because the pro-U.N. press corps didn't find it newsworthy. But Kofi Annan received a gift worth \$500,000, and Burnham said that he would have nothing to say about it. Claudia Rosett disclosed the gift, an environmental award from Dubai's ruler, Sheik Mohammed bin-Rashid al-Maktoum, in a Feb. 27 "Cash-for-Kofi" article in The Weekly Standard.

"I won't comment on the gift to the secretary-general," Burnham said at the Heritage event. But why? How is a no-comment consistent with being more open and accountable? Burnham made the point that he is now an international civil servant, which helps to explain his no-comment and why he was so gung-ho about Annan's "bold" U.N. reform plan. He used to work for the U.S. State Department, but now he works for the U.N. — and Annan.

New York Sun reporter Benny Avni, who covers the world body, has explained how Annan managed to accept a \$500,000 gift. He reports that, according to the U.N. charter, "staff rules do not apply to the secretary-general. So instead of leading by example, Mr. Annan is now half-a-million dollars richer. And if Dubai does anything wrong around the world, he will wisely refrain from criticizing it."

Such a "gift" demonstrates that perceived corruption is still a problem at the world body, and Burnham's no-comment suggests he has no ability or intention to get to the bottom of it. If his performance at the Heritage Foundation is any indication, reform of the U.N. is shaping up as a very expensive fraud.

ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE 329 PERTAINING TO ANIMAL CONTROL AND ANIMAL REGULATIONS; AMENDING HOMEDALE MUNICIPAL CODE, TITLE 6, CHAPTER 6.04, ITEM. 130 FOWL OR **POULTRY**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND THE CITY COUNCIL OF HOMEDALE, OWYHEE COUNTY, IDAHO:

SECTION 1: SHORT TITLE

Fowl or Poultry defined herein are prohibited within the city limits of the City of Homedale.

SECTION 2: PURPOSES

AND AUTHORITY

Whereas, information has been laid before the City Council of the City of Homedale tending to show that the control of animals within the City is inadequate and that the health and safety of the citizens of the City are required to be protected and controls need to be in-place. This article is intended to help solve the problems caused by un-owned, unwanted or at large fowl/poultry within the city limits of the City of Homedale, Idaho

SECTION 3: DEFINITION OF FOWL/POULTRY:

Chicken, Turkeys, Ducks, Geese, Peacocks, Quail, Pheasant, and Guineas.

SECTION 4: CHANGES TO CODE 6.04.130:

6.04.130 Fowl or poultry running at large prohibited

It shall be unlawful for any person to keep fowl, guineas or poultry (per definition)—unless such fowl, guineas or poultry are at all times kept upon his own premises, within a shed, pen or other enclosure sufficient to restrain said fowl, guineas or poultry from trespassing upon the property of others and are not considered a public nuisance. Fowl, guineas or Poultry limit is ten (10) per residential property.

Violation Fee: The receipt of any violation notice subjects the violator to a fifty-dollar (\$50.00) violation fee per instance, where violation fees are not already noted, along with proof of compliance or correction.

Non-Compliance: If the owner does not comply by the compliance date on the written violation notice, a formal citation may be issued.

Čitations: Any person who fails to comply with a written violation notice may receive a citation and shall be deemed guilty of an infraction Each and every violation of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

Severability Clause: Should any provision of this chapter be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of this Chapter in whole or in part thereof other than the part so declared to be unconstitutional or invalid.

Repeal: All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.



ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE CONSTRUCTION AND INSTALLATION IMPROVEMENTS TO THE DOMESTIC WATER SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF HOMEDALE, IDAHO; CALLING Á SPECIAL ELECTION FOR THE SUBMISSION TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE CITY THE QUESTION OF INCURRING AN INDEBTEDNESSANDISSUING WATER REVENUE BONDS IN A PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$2,265,000 TO PAY A PORTION OF THE COST THEREOF; ESTABLISHING THE DATE, TIME, AND PLACE OF ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR PUBLIC NOTICE OF ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR REGISTRATION OF VOTERS: PROVIDING FOR RELATED MATTERS; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

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CITY OF HOMEDALE STATE OF IDAHO ORDINANCE #359

ORDINANCE REPEALING CHAPTER 8.16, HOMEDALE MUNICIPAL CODE, AND ORDINANCE NUMBERS 81, 255, 315, 329 AND 331; AND PROVIDING FOR A DEFINITION OF A PUBLIC NUISANCE, AUTHORIZING A VIOLATIÓN FEE, CIVIL OR CRIMINAL PROCEEDINGS, ESTABLISHING PROCEDURE FOR A CIVIL ABATEMENT OF NUISANCES, DEFINING VIOLATIONS AND ESTABLISHING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATORS

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE HOMEDALE CITY COUNCIL, OWYHEE COUNTY, STATE OF IDAHO:

SECTION 1: Short Title, Repeal of prior Ordinances, and Savings Clause. This Ordinance is entitled, "Homedale City Public Nuisance Ordinance". Ordinance numbers 81, 255, 315, 329 and 331 are hereby repealed upon the effective date of this Ordinance. Initiated violations that are pending under the ordinances in effect prior to this repeal may be prosecuted in the same manner and with the same effect as if the prior ordinances had not been repealed and this Ordinance had not been enacted. The provisions of this Ordinance are applicable only to complaints made or initiated pursuant to this Ordinance.

SECTION 2: Authority and

Purpose.
This Ordinance is enacted pursuant to authority conferred by Idaho Code, Section 50-317. Its purpose is to provide for, and further, the health, safety and welfare of the public by providing a procedure for abating public nuisances which can created traffic safety hazards, fire hazards, health hazards including those caused by rodent infestation, and other problems which may have

safety, and welfare of the public.

SECTION 3: Public Nuisance

Declared Unlawful. It is unlawful
for any person to create, cause,
maintain or knowingly allow
to exist for more than ten (10)
calendar days a public nuisance
on any premises or real property
which the person owns, leases,
occupies, manages or has charge
or possession of.

a harmful effect upon the health,

<u>SECTION 4: Public Nuisance</u>

Defined.A. The term "public nuisance" means a condition or use of property which is harmful or injurious to, or creates a danger of harm or injury to the health, safety, or welfare of the neighborhood, community, or members of the public, or which is so offensive to the senses or such an obstruction of the free use of property as to interfere with the comfortable enjoyment of life and property by the neighborhood, community, or members of the public.

B. The term "public nuisance" is further defined so as to include, by way of example, but not to be limited to the following:

a. A condition or use of premises or property which creates a fire hazard or any traffic or safety hazard to members of the public;

b. A condition or use of premises or property which creates a **health hazard** by permitting, allowing, or fostering the harboring or nesting of rodents, vermin and/or insects or unattended animals, or which creates any other type of

health hazard to members of the public;

c. A condition or use or premises or property which allows the open storage, deposit, or scattering of scrap lumber or wood, waste petroleum products, scrap or waste paper, trash, garbage, junk, boxes or debris of any type;

d. A condition or use of premises or property which allows the open

storage, deposit, or scattering of scrap, abandoned, discarded, or unused objects such as furniture, stoves, refrigerators, freezers, cans, containers, tires, tools or mechanical parts;

A condition or use of premises or property which allows the growth of weeds, grasses, bushes, shrubs, trees, or other plant life to such a size and in such a condition as to cause, or reasonably threaten to cause a fire hazard because of their dried and un-kept condition, or a traffic or safety hazard because they obstruct sight, applying the measurements and the standards contained in Idaho Code, Section 49-221, as amended, at intersections or other points at which driveways, lanes, or highways come together, or a health hazard because they provide nesting areas for rodents. vermin, insects or unattended animals, or the growth of weeds to such a size or in such a condition as to interfere with the free and comfortable use of adjacent and neighboring premises and property. "Weeds" are defined as undesirable or objectionable and non-useful plant growth but shall not include noxious weeds as defined by Title 22, Chapter 24, Idaho Code, as amended.

fr. A condition or use of premises or property which allows dead, defaced, broken, dangerous, diseased or untrimmed **trees** within any public right-of-way, including alley ways, which has or may become a traffic hazard, impede traffic or create a hazard to adjoining property.

C) No "public nuisance" shall exist if the items and materials set forth in Section

4, subsection (B) 3 and 4, are stored, placed, or parked on private property in connection with the lawful business operation of a licensed dismantler, salvage yard or junk dealer, when such storage, placement and parking are necessary to the operation of the business, provided first that such private placement and parking are necessary to the operation of the business, provided first that such private property where the items are stored, placed or parked is located within a zone in which the business or commercial enterprise is allowed or permitted under the Homedale City Zoning Ordinance, as amended, and provided further that storing, placement and parking does not create either a health or safety hazard to members of the public, and does not violate any other county, state, or federal law or regulation.

SECTION 5: Enforcement

Procedure.

(A) The Homedale City Police Department, Homedale City Mayor, or any Homedale City Official, shall be responsible for investigating any violations of this Ordinance. Upon completion of investigation and determination in a finding of reasonable cause to believe that a public nuisance exists, enforcement proceedings shall be pursued as follows:

1 NOTICE OF OFFENCE:

a. Written notice of the existence of nuisance by City Hall and the commencement of the ten (10) calendar day period herein referred to in Section 3, shall be by certified mail, return receipt requested, addressed to the last known address of the owner and/or occupier, and or/person in charge of the premises or property. Should service by certified mail fail to be obtained, then said written notice shall be affixed to the building, prominent fixture or other place on the premises or property so conspicuous that any person occupying, possessing, or using the premises or property would be reasonably expected to see said notice;

b. Said notice shall constitute service of notice to the owner and/or occupant of the real property:

or occupant of the real property; c. The written notice referred to above shall describe the nuisance, state the violation fee assessed by the City of Homedale (found in Section 6, B, No. 1), advise that the nuisance must be abated within ten (10) calendar days from the date of the' service' advise that either civil or criminal proceedings may be initiated if the nuisance is not abated, advise the costs of civil court proceedings and attorney fees may be assessed, that the nuisance may be summarily abated by the City of Homedale, that the costs of the abatement may be assessed to the owner, occupier, person in charge of the premises or property, and advise the procedure by which such person may request a hearing.

2 REQUEST FOR ADMINISTRATIVE HEARING:

a. The owner, occupier, or person in charge of the possession of the premises or property may request a hearing before the Homedale City Council by filing a written request for such hearing with the Homedale City Clerk within ten (10) days from the day

the notice was served; **b**. When a written request for hearing is filed with the City Clerk, the Clerk shall schedule a hearing with the City Council at a regularly scheduled Council meeting no less than fifteen (15) days or more than thirty (30) days from the date the request for hearing was filed. At the hearing, the person identified in Section 5, subsection a. who conducted the investigation shall present a summary of the investigation, and the person who requested the hearing may respond with evidence relevant to the question whether a nuisance exists or to the question of how much time should be allowed for abatement of the nuisance;

c. Within ten (10) working days upon completion of the hearing, the City Council shall issue a written decision as to whether a nuisance exists. The decision shall be filed with the City clerk and shall be sent certified mail, return receipt requested, to the person who requested the hearing;

d. From the date a request for hearing is filed with the City Clerk, the running of the ten (10) calendar day period referred to in Section 3 of this Ordinance shall be tolled, but the remainder of the ten (10) calendar day period shall commence to run five (5) calendar days following the date of service of the written decision by the city Council that a nuisance exists.

e. If the then (10) day period referred to in Section 3 has run and the nuisance has not be abated, then a uniform citation may be issued pursuant to Section 5 (3) of this Ordinance.

3 C R I M I N A L E N F O R C E M E N T PROCEEDINGS:

In the event that the nuisance is not abated and violation fee not paid within the 10 days allotted, enforcement may be by uniform citation issued pursuant Idaho Code 18-113A, signed by a Homedale Police Officer. Upon Issuance of a uniform citation for violation of this ordinance, criminal enforcement proceedings shall continue pursuant to the Idaho Code 18-113A

Idaho Code 18-113A 4 C I V I L E N F O R C E M E N T PROCEEDINGS:

After the ten (10) day period referred to in Section 3 has run, the City Council, in lieu of a uniform citation being issued, may request that the City Prosecuting Attorney initiate civil enforcement proceedings to abate a public nuisance. The city Prosecuting Attorney also has the discretion to recommend to the City Council that civil instead of criminal abatement proceedings should be pursued. The city Prosecuting Attorney may elect to dismiss a criminal enforcement proceeding and recommend civil enforcement proceedings. If the City Prosecuting Attorney decides to recommend a civil enforcement proceedings, he shall file that recommendation with the City Council. The City Council shall review the case and inform the City Prosecuting Attorney of its decision. If the City Council determines that civil enforcement should be pursued, it shall direct the City Prosecuting Attorney to initiate civil abatement proceedings in the appropriate

5 THE CITY MAY CAUSE THE CLEAN-UP, DISSIPATION OR ABATEMENT OF A PUBLIC NUISANCE AND ASSESS THE COSTS OR CHARGES.

The City Council, after ten (10) calendar days notice, may cause the removal, disposal and/or dissipation of refuse, materials and conditions constituting a public nuisance as defined in Section 4 of this Ordinance as often as necessary on lots, lands, or premises not in compliance with this Ordinance. The expense of such work shall be billed to and paid by the property owner(s) involved and if not paid within thirty (30) calendar days the City may proceed to collect the expense in any manner authorized

6 EMPLOYMENT OF LABOR.

The City Council shall employ such labor or contractor as is necessary to carry out the provisions of the Ordinance and allow the bills therefore, with the owner(s) of said property billed for such.

SECTION 6: Abatement and Penalties: A. ABATEMENT

PROCEDURES:

1) If a hearing is requested before the City Council as provided in Section 5 (2) (a) of this Ordinance and the hearing results in a determination that a nuisance exists and/or the nuisance has not been abated after the ten (10) calendar day period referred to in Section 3 of this Ordinance has expired, then the Homedale City Police may issue the owner, occupier, or person in charge of the premises or property a uniform citation

pursuant to Section 3 (A) of this Ordinance.2) This Ordinance may be

enforced through either civil or criminal abatement proceedings. The City Prosecuting Attorney has the discretion to pursue criminal abatement on the uniform citation or to recommend that the City council pursue civil abatement pursuant to this Ordinance. If civil abatement is pursued, the expense of civil abatement proceedings shall be charged to the owner, occupant, or person in charge of possession of the premises or property upon which the nuisance exists. The City Prosecuting Attorney shall seek recovery of those expenses in civil proceedings

B. PENALTY:

1) Any person owning, in charge of, or occupying any lots, lands or premises within Homedale City limits who has been served a written violation notice from the City of Homedale per Section 5, A-1-a, shall be permitted to pay a written violation fee per the following schedule:

1st Written Notice.......\$ 25.00 fee and abatement of nuisance

2nd Written Notice......\$ 50.00 fee and abatement of nuisance

3rd Notice-Uniform Citation signed by a Homedale Police Officer.

2) Any person owning, in charge of, or occupying any lots, lands or premises within Homedale City limits who shall after notice, as provided for herein, fail or refuse or neglect to continuously keep the property they own, are in charge of, or occupy free from constituting a pubic nuisance as defined in Section 4 of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of an infraction and be subject to the penalties described within Idaho Code Section 18-113A, as amended. The Homedale City Police shall have the authority to issue a uniform citation to violators of this Ordinance.

3) In addition to the above criminal penalties, should the City, pursuant to Section 5 of this Ordinance, cause removal, disposal or dissipation of refuse, materials or conditions constituting a public nuisance as often as necessary in lots, lands, or premises not in compliance, such work shall be billed to and paid by the property owner involved. The Court shall permit payment to the City of the above costs as a condition of any probation granted in a criminal proceeding.

4) Each and every day after the ten (10) calendar day period from the date the notice of violation is given by a law enforcement officer to any such person mentioned and described herein who fails, refuses or neglects to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance shall constitute a separate and distinct offense against the provisions of this Ordinance and each of such separate offenses shall be punishable as provided by the provisions listed above.

SECTION 7: Interference With Authorized Person:

A) It shall be unlawful, and shall be a misdemeanor to interfere with any law enforcement officer in the performance of duties connected with enforcement of this Ordinance. Such interference shall include, but not be limited to, removal of notices posted on the property pursuant to this Ordinance or impediment or harassment of the ordinance official in the performance of their

duties under this ordinance.

B) A n infraction violation of this section of the Ordinance shall be punishable as provided in Idaho Code Section 18-113A,

as amended.

SECTION 8: Severability Clause:

Should any provisions of this Ordinance be declared by a Court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid.

such decision shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance in whole or in part thereof other than the part so declared to be unconstitutional or invalid.

SECTION 9: Effective Date:

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effective upon

publication of the summary of this Ordinance in a newspaper of citywide circulation.

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
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



Vance, Chadez collect track and field wins

Mark Vance was up to his old tricks again Thursday in the first scoring meet of the year for the Homedale High School track and field team. But while the junior captured the triple jump with an effort of 41 feet, 9 inches, the Trojans got another dose of the behemoth that is Middleton. The Vikings swept the boys and girls team titles at the meet in Parma. Middleton, which has nearly 100 athletes on its squad, piled up enough points to lap the

field in the boys competition. The Vikings scored 157 points, while second-place Homedale scored 77.

The Homedale girls team finished third behind Middleton and Weiser. Marsing was fourth.

On the girls side, former high jump state champion Breanna Chadez returned to top form with a victory. She cleared 5 feet, 4 inches.

Homedale's Taryn Corta also brought home gold, beating Chadez in the long jump with a try of 14-4 1/2. The Huskies' CC Zanardi, a sophomore, was fourth in the event.

Terence Thomas, the sophomore son of first-year Homedale track coach Thomas Thomas, finished third in both the shot put and discus with teammate Daniel Valadez grabbing fourth in the shot put.

Marsing coach Don Heller continued to witness consistency in the boys sprints. Two Huskies finished in the top six of the 200 (Aaron Salvas was second and Perry Gibson grabbed sixth)

Chris Covey from Marsing finished second in the 800 meters, and Homedale's Scott Thatcher came in sixth.

In the 1,600-meter sprint medley, Marsing and Homedale relay teams finished second and third, respectively, behind — who else? — Middleton. The Trojans were second to the Vikings in both the 4x200 and 4x100 relays, while Marsing finished fourth in both races.

Homedale also placed athletes in the top six for the hurdle events. Chris Anders crossed the line in third in the 300 intermediate hurdles, while Joe Mac Hernandez grabbed fifth in the 110 high hurdles.

Corta and Chadez finished second and third, respectively, in the triple jump. Corta's teammate, Annamaria Salas, finished fifth, and Marsing sophomore Amanda Staudenmier was sixth.

Staudenmier also placed third in the 400.

Homedale senior Cheyanne Andrade placed in both the shot put (second) and the discus (third), while sophomore Holly Heller from Marsing was fifth in the discus.

Marsing was bolstered by a strong showing in the running events, too. Sophomore Elisa Moreno was second in the 100 dash and sixth in the 200.

Homedale's Belen Vega picked up a pair of second-place showings in the 1,600 and 3,200 runs.

The was no pole vault event for state champion MJ Usabel, but the Marsing senior still got her kicks in. She finished second in the 100 hurdles and was just behind Homedale's Chalsea Hicks in the 300 hurdles. Hicks finished third, and Usabel brought home fourth.

Marsing and Homedale seemingly ran in tandem in some of the girls relay events, too. The Huskies and Trojans finished second and third, respectively, in the 4x100 and went 3-4 in the 800 sprint medley. A Homedale team also finished fourth in the 4x200.
