Many Homedale High School cowboys and cowgirls have been preparing for the upcoming District II spring rodeo season. Now that the weather is starting to get warmer, it's time to whip out those boots and cowboy hats. The first rodeos of the season come Saturday and Sunday at the Payette County Fairgrounds in New Plymouth.

The action starts at 10 a.m. both days.

Throughout the winter these young members of the school's rodeo club have been scrambling to find sponsors for their events. Each contestant must obtain a minimum of \$75 in sponsorship money per event in which they plan to compete. This process goes along with gathering photos and advertisements for the yearbook each rodeo member receives at the end of the year. Each sponsor gets business information printed in the yearbook, along with a picture of the high school contestant that they are sponsoring.

Earlier this school year, a few Homedale competitors placed in the fall rodeos in New Plymouth. This spring, they will continue to compete for their standings. Junior Bryan Martinat is sitting first in the saddle bronc riding. Cory Uria is eighth in the tie-down roping, while Wade Hyer is right behind in ninth. Uria and Hyer are

Despite an uncharacteristically wild afternoon from pitcher Shannon Hipwell, the Rimrock High School softball team broke into the win column Thursday.

Hipwell survived five walks and three runs in the bottom of the seventh inning to collect a 12-9 victory over Nampa Christian at West Park in Nampa.

"Our pitcher got a little tired toward the end and made a few mental mistakes more than anything," Rimrock coach Mike Chandler said.

Homedale's baseball and softball teams returned to action against each other Monday, and the Trojans' diamond squads resumed the 3A Snake River Valley conference season Tuesday against Weiser. Results weren't available at press time.

Today, the Homedale baseball and softball teams face non-conference opponent New Plymouth from the 2A Western Idaho Conference. Both games begin in Homedale at 5 p.m.

Monday's games against Homedale provided Marsing's baseball and softball teams with their first chance to forget their experiences at the rain-shortened Mike Kendall tournaments in Parma on March 24-25.

Coach Mark Worley's baseball team began the week 1-4 after an 0-2 finish in the Kendall. Taylor Nielsen was 4-for-4 with two doubles and two RBIs, but

couldn't prevent the Huskies' 6-4 loss to Melba on March 24. Parma's Frankie Olmos allowed only a Trent Lootens hit in the Panthers' 8-1 victory over Marsing on March 25.

The first Trojans batter in the seventh scorched a bounding ball over the glove of Raiders first baseman Nathan Hofer for what appeared to be a base hit. Owyhee men in top 10 at reined horse event

Two men with Owyhee County ties reached the top 10 in several divisions Sunday in the National Reined Cow Horse Association's Stakes Aged Event at the Idaho Horse Park in Nampa.

Jon Roeser, the 1990 NRCHA

Futurity world champion who now lives in Lemoore, Calif., guided Mister Smart Remedy to a 10th-place tie in the Open Final.

Jon also finished tied for ninth in the Intermediate Open Final aboard Mister Smart Remedy,

and he and his brother, Dan shared a piece of fourth place in the Limited Open Final riding Calboys Badger Chex.

In the Intermediate Open Final, Dan and Calboys Badger Chex finished fifth.

Dan, who won the 1998 Open Bridle world championship, manages the horse division of the Roeser Ranch in Marsing.

Dan and Jon are the sons of the late Jim Roeser, who made five appearances in the National Finals

Rodeo before turning his attention to reined cow horses after retiring from professional rodeo.

Dan and Jon are uncles to Scott and Kallie Roeser, both high school rodeo veterans. Dan's daughter, Annie, is a barrel racer.

Rimrock track athletes finally see some competition

Rimrock High School's track and field athletes finally got a chance to stretch their legs last week when they traveled to Canyon County to face Nampa Christian's formidable bunch.

Coach Kermit Tate's Raiders were dwarfed in numbers by the Trojans, who also invited runners from Council and Meadows Valley.

"I think our kids did pretty well, especially since this is the first time this year they've actually been on a track," Tate said. "I had hoped to see more 1A schools so we could see how our people stack up against their potential District meet competition, but we were just grateful for the opportunity to finally compete."

Rimrock most likely will see more 1A talent Saturday when the Raiders enter the Cole Valley Invitational in Boise. Tate's entry list includes about two dozen athletes.

The Raiders had their first meet of the season canceled because of snowfall, and the second meet in Parma was scrapped when most prospective teams decided to visit Homedale instead.

Tate's first look at his team in action confirmed his suspicions

about his distance runners. The 27-year coach says this year's pack of runners is one of the best he has seen at the school.

Marco Jacobo led the way in the 1,600 with a time of 5 minutes, 30.4 seconds. Leigh Martin (5:45.9) and Cole Merrick (5:57.9) also cracked the 6-minute mark. Jacobo ran the 3,200 in under 12 minutes, clocking an 11:53 on Nampa Christian's all-weather track.

Merrick seems to be a jack-of-all-trades for the Raiders. He ran a 13.1 in the 100 and turned a 1:01.2 in the 400.

After a strong warmup, long jumper Ellie Cantrell faltered in competition with an effort of 14 feet, 1¼ inches. Tate said she hit 15-7 during pre-meet practice.

"She struggled with her approach during her competition jumps, but she definitely has the ability to go a long way this year.

"It's just a matter of being able to get some time (in competition) to fine-tune her run-up."

Cantrell clocked a 17.9-second run in the 100 hurdles and a 14.1-second showing in the 100 sprint.

While Cantrell struggled in her field event, the Raiders' boys

showed promise in the throws. Joseph Morrison led the way with a shot put of 25-11½, and teammate Jason Starbuck had a 24-4. Morrison also booked a 95-1 effort in the discus.

Mike Myers turned in a long jump of 17-4 and a triple jump of 34-1.

There were some bobbles along the way, but Tate says said that's to be expected in a first meet — and given the fact that the Raiders have been practicing for nearly a month without seeing any opposite numbers.

"We were also able to identify areas of technique that each of our athletes needs to work on, which is a major part of our early-season competition," Tate said. "Our younger people also got to get past the first-meet jitters. They'll probably never be that nervous again in their lives."

And Tate also got the jitters of watching another crop of athletes for the first time.

"All in all, I was very satisfied with our performances," Tate said. "We still have a lot of work to do, but that's what the season's for."

"The really important meets are District and State. I think we'll be in good position by mid-May."

Emily Chandler, who went 3-for-4 with a triple three runs scored, notched one of her two RBIs with a first-inning single. Devani Lawson stole a pair of bases after getting hit by a pitch and scored on Brittany Bowman's base hit.

"We're coming around and starting to hit the ball a little better," Mike Chandler said.

Chandler said baserunning like Lawson's will be a key this season for the Raiders, who opened the year with an 18-4 1A Western Idaho Conference loss to Greenleaf Friends Academy and dropped a non-league decision to Glenns Ferry, 13-3, on March 27.

Chandler and Kaeloni Roberson, who hit No. 3 and No. 4 in the order, will be crucial components in Rimrock's aggressive offense, the coach said.

Chandler stole two bases against Nampa Christian, and Roberson went 2-for-4 with an RBI and two runs scored.

"Kaeloni is very experienced and very smart on the basepaths,

and Emily is, too," Chandler said. "If we can get them on and get them around, I think that's key to our success."

Hipwell is 1-2 on the year after striking out six and surrendering nine hits against the Trojans. Chandler said the right-hander had walked only eight batters in two other starts before issuing 14 free passes Thursday. He said overall the pitching has improved greatly with the addition of assistant coach Ashley Merrick.

Shortstop Jessica Kamper was 3-for-3 with two RBIs and two runs scored for coach Tony Chilson's Nampa Christian squad.

The Trojans cut the Raiders' lead to 6-5 with a three-run outburst in the fourth as Kamper and Melissa Ropp drove in runs.

But Rimrock rallied in the top of the fifth as Emily Chandler led off with a triple and scored on a sacrifice by Lawson. Chandler is hitting .571 (4-for-7) this season. She homered against Greenleaf Friends Academy.

Bowman also singled and scored a run in the key rally against the Trojans.

The SRV meet runs May 8 for field events and the 1,600-meter run (girls in Payette; boys in Weiser) and May 9 (running events for both in Weiser).

Chandler said of the transition. “His knowledge of basketball was great.”

Chandler was along for the ride in the past eight seasons as Delle turned Rimrock into a 1A powerhouse in Idaho. The players who helped the Raiders win back-to-back state titles and string together 50 consecutive victories ended their prep careers with a second straight fourth-place finish in the state tournament in February.

“I’m excited about doing it,” Chandler said of taking the reins. “We’re going to have to do a lot of rebuilding, but we have good

kids coming up and we have good (junior varsity) kids.

Chandler’s JV squad won the District III tournament last season. He’s a 13-year veteran of the Rimrock basketball program

Starting his seventh season as the Raiders’ softball coach, Chandler has been in the Bruneau Grand View School District since 1992. He teaches Government, Economics and History at the high school.

Two decades ago, he coached varsity basketball at Owyhee High School in Nevada.

That background and the fact that he has been the top assistant for Delle for years is a formula that Chandler won’t tinker with.

“I was more of an assistant than a junior varsity coach,” Chandler said. “The two teams practiced together.”

141 years ago

Because of incomplete archives from 19th century Owyhee County newspapers, articles appearing in subsequent editions of Looking Back may be dated sporadically.

August 19, 1865

THE OWYHEE AVALANCHE being the first paper ever published in Owyhee county, it is but meet that we should start out by giving a brief sketch of the early history of the county.

In the early days of California, when gold was first discovered there, the enterprising and industrious emigrants could be seen ending their way across the plains, prepared to endure any amount of hardship0s or trials; and the same might be said of those who started by water.

Arriving in California, they found everything new, strange and different from anything they had ever seen before. Money was plenty and no man need go unemployed; but of late years, the labor market was overstocked and as a natural consequence, wages were cut down. The hard fisted miner, rather than submit to any depredation of his services started on a prospecting tour and the history of Nevada, Idaho, Montana and Colorado, and other places of less importance, speak for themselves, and the world is familiar with the result.

In the fall of 1859, a few hard miners, with their blankets on their backs, started out on a prospecting tour across the Sierra Nevadas – a task in those days accompanied with much risk, hardship and suffering. Placer diggings were few, owing to the scarcity of water, but on the discovery of the Comstock ledge, adjacent to where Virginia City is located, a new impetus was given to mining and men commenced sinking shafts and running tunnels. In a short time the Gould and Curry, Ophir, Yellow Jacket, Empire, Savage, Crowpoint, Mexican, Original Gold Hill, and a host of other equally valuable claims were soon discovered, and these mines have yielded the world millions of dollars; and who can tell but that the mines of Owyhee county are far ahead of even the celebrated Comstock, in Washoe, for richness? Time alone can tell.

About the first of May, 1863, a party of men started on a prospecting tour from Boise Basin, traveling in a southerly direction. On the 18th of the same month they arrived at a place which they called Discovery Bar, and which is about ten miles below Boonville on Jordan Creek.

After remaining there a day of two, they came up the creek about five miles, to a place which they called Skull Camp, from the fact of finding a human skull there. From there they moved up the creek about five miles where they discovered good place diggings, and at which they camped, made their laws and marked out their claims. Having made all their arrangements, they had a little jollification and all feeling happy over what they had discovered they game the stamping ground the name of Happy Camp, which goes by that name at this time. This place is a about a mile and a half below Ruby City, on Jordan Creek.

As the Territory is indebted to this company of miners, for the valuable discovery of the Owyhee mines, we will give the names of the Lucky Twenty Miners, as they were then called so that their names may be handed down as the pioneer of Owyhee county. The company consisted of Michael Jordan, James Carroll, Fulton Haight, O. H. Purdy, Dr. Rudd, Thomas Carson, Jos. Boon, W. L. Wale, L. H. Gehr Witt, Duncan J. Derey, Wm. Churchill, P. J Miner, Silas Iba, John Connor, Wm. Phipps, D. P. Barnes, Jack Reynolds, H. R. Wade, John Cannon, J. Gardin, Chas. Ward, Stephen Rifle, John Chadwick, and a Spanish boy.

These gentlemen have done much to make their county what it is today, as they were men of enterprise and great industry. Michael Jordan and Joseph Carroll were killed by the Indians while out on an Indian hunt about one year ago. No two men of that little company were more respected than Jordan and Carroll. W. R. Wade, another member of this company, paid the debt of nature last May, after enduring a lingering illness, which he contracted while developing the resources of this county.

WE LEARN that the stage line between South Boise and Boise City has been discontinued on account of the scarcity of travel on that route. Wells, Fargo & Co. recently established an office in South Boise and this stage arrangement must necessary affect that institution very seriously.

WITH BUT LITTLE more than hearsay knowledge of the importance of this section of Idaho, we have seen fit to bring printing material to this place sufficient to publish a paper the present size, and meet the demands of the county in respect to job work, unsolicited and believing that there is business enough in our line to make a paper self sustaining. As far as developed, the prospects of this section of Idaho for richness, extant and permanency, tend to the conviction that Owyhee stands first in rank among quartz mining camps; and, believing that the publication of the progress made to ward its further development will be for good, it will be our aim to keep a correct record of all discoveries made in future, of all work performed, of capital invested and money taken out – and, in short, every item of interest that will go to make up a local newspaper. If obtainable, we shall give something of a history of the camp up to this time. Heretofore the outside world has been dependtent for information from this quarter, upon correspondence of a transient character, generally the production of haste and consequently far from being reliable; the influence of a local paper must necessarily counteract, to a certain extent, incorrect impressions formed from such information. We hope to be able with the assistance we shall have in a few weeks, aside from a better local acquaintance required in the meantime – to present a paper worthy of a liberal patronage at home and abroad.

Our rates of subscription and advertising are fixed to compare favorably with those of other papers in the Territory.

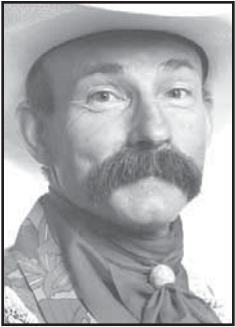

The building and surroundings had all the appearances of an active carpenter ship but having no doors or windows in it I was also of the opinion that it was a shelter over a new species of portable saw mill, that was to run in opposition to the injunction on the Ruby lumber yard; but after hard quizzing, I finally ascertained that a genuine press was soon to turn out an Owyhee newspaper, flaunting the crushing, rushing title of AVALANCHE! I should think you will find some tramping round in search of items of fact, but then there is such a splendid opportunity for imaginary flights, perpendicular thoughts and the giving of ”airy nothings a local habitation and a name.” But little change to “spread yourself,” without crawling into a tunnel, and many of the tunnels are no longer that a gopher hole. But the Scripture says “there are sermons in stones and books in running brooks,” and it may be a consolation to you to know that there is an abundance of material for such works in Owyhee. I have no doubt your enterprise will be extensively commented on if not bought and paid for, as this camp contains a surplus of long headed men – measured from the top of the head to the extreme length of the “jawbone,”

If these few rough remarks are acceptable, I may come again. (Go on with your abuse – we can stand it.)

Moustache regulations

Recently, I hopped on a plane in Boise at about 1 p.m. (Mountain Standard Time) on a Thursday. An hour later, I was at SeaTac Airport, outside Seattle. At 1:15 (Pacific Standard Time), I was checking into the hotel across the street from the airport.

I don't like flying — especially since all the security checks were instituted at airports. The trip to Seattle was better than some in recent years. Nobody pulled me out of line for addition screening, as the token older white male. A couple of years ago, a discussion of that practice with the lady at the airline boarding gate in Portland, put me about one word away from walking home (if I had been able to make bail).

As usual, the hotel put me in a room as far from the scheduled activities as possible. To get from my room to the convention center, I had to walk down two long halls, through the lobby, past some meeting rooms occupied by an army of stockbrokers, down another long hall, through a parking area and take an elevator to the third floor of the convention center. The total distance, one way, was between a quarter- and a half-mile. I made that trip at least a dozen times during the next 40 hours.

From Washington Financial literacy key to debt-free future

For the first time since the Great Depression, the average savings rate of Americans has dropped into negative numbers. Nearly 60 percent of parents don't restrict how their children spend the money they are given. Add this to the following statistics about financial literacy in our country, and you can see there is cause for concern:

- 65 percent: Percentage of 4,000 high school students in 33 states who received an F on tests evaluating knowledge of personal finance basics in 2004;
- \$11 trillion: Household debt in the United States in the third quarter of 2005;
- 2.04 million: Individual bankruptcies filed in 2005;
- \$3,000: Average credit card balance of college seniors, the majority of whom own four or more cards;
- 42 percent: In 2005, percentage of workers or spouses who calculated the amount needed to save for retirement (down from 53 percent in 2000).

These numbers represent a rather unstable financial foundation for many families and individuals. With ever-increasing threats of telephone and Internet fraud and outright electronic credit card theft, it's more than a little frightening.

In Idaho, there is no lack of financial literacy education, but there is a lack of general knowledge about how to obtain these services.

Idaho has strong financial and education institutions that have taken up the challenge of educating people of all ages about financial literacy. The United States Senate has declared April "Financial Literacy Month," providing

a great opportunity to talk about these resources.

The 25-member Idaho Financial Literacy Coalition brings together expertise and resources from the public, private and non-profit financial sectors. Members provide financial literacy education and services through local banks, schools and non-profit agencies. Some services include:

- The Idaho Department of Finance provides speakers to schools and organizations for presentations on personal financial education;
- Wells Fargo Bank offers financial literacy education services through its Hands On Banking program and other outreach efforts. Last year, team members visited 45 schools statewide, reaching 3,000 children.
- The Idaho Credit Union League partners with the National Endowment for Financial Education to offer financial literacy curriculum to high schools.
- In 2000, the Idaho State Board of Education adopted achievement standards, including financial literacy classes in high school as part of the social studies graduation requirement.
- Debt Reduction Services offers free 1-hour money management classes in the Treasure Valley, Pocatello, Coeur d'Alene and Idaho Falls, serving 7,000 Idahoans annually.
- Coalition members provide financial literacy outreach to at-risk populations around Idaho.

In addition, the Idaho Bankers Association meets quarterly to set up community outreach on financial literacy issues. As a member of the Hispanic Financial

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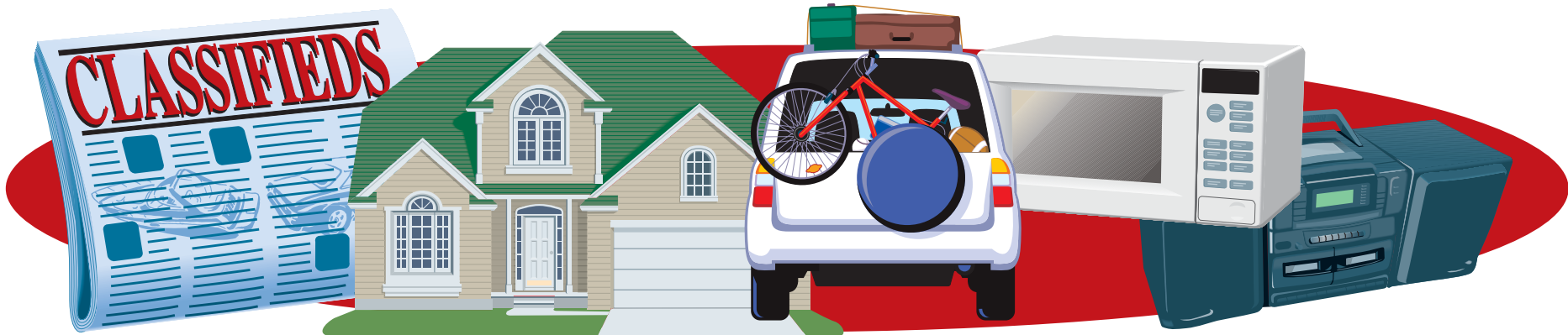
