## Zatica brings unique flair to parade

Paul Zatica brought back a tradition of sorts when he served as grand marshal of Saturday's Owyhee County Fair and Rodeo Parade.

As Zatica rode in the back of a Chrysler convertible with his wife, Erma Jean, he tossed candy to the children lining Idaho Avenue and other streets along the parade route.

But he also showed off his arm by chucking fresh bread rolls occasionally. Shortly before the parade started, Zatica said that participants with parade entries sponsored by his grocery business had done that in the past.

Saturday's ride, however, was the most special for the man who has been involved with the fair and rodeo for seven decades.

"Anytime they pick you to be the grand marshal of the parade, it's special," Zatica said. "I've never been asked before. I don't like the limelight."

For a man who doesn't like spotlight, Zatica has spent the better part of the past half-century making sure that some of the biggest events in Homedale bring the community together.

He served nearly 30 years on the Owyhee County Rodeo Board. He attended his first county fair in Homedale's city park in 1948 and within a decade his Paul's Groceteria was helping supply the beef for the Old Timers Day barbecue presented in conjunction with the fair for a time.

Today, Paul's Market sponsors a float in the parade, and the store chain always buys from the junior livestock sale.

"Every year, for years and years, we've bought livestock," he said. "We just try to help the kids out."

Paul's Market has supported the livestock sale at fairs in several different counties — wherever there's a store. But, deep down, that support is something personal

for Zatica, whose son, Brian, entered animals in the Owyhee County sale when he was a child.

"I like being involved in the rodeo and the 4-H livestock sale is good," Paul Zatica said. "It gives kids motivation and teaches them responsibility. They have to work at it for a year to get here."

And Zatica worked a long time to support the fair, the rodeo

and the auction before being approached this year about leading the procession.

But Zatica still deflects the attention.

"The parade kind of brings all the people in town together, and the various organizations have floats and it gives the rodeo board a chance to be in the parade and get exposure," he said.

## Paul's float wins sweepstakes again

For the second year in a row, the Paul's Market float has won the sweepstakes award for the Owyhee County Fair and Rodeo Parade.

The float, once again designed by Jo Ford Howell, won the award for best utilization of the fair's theme, "Rock-a-doodle Doo," and a \$100 prize.

The first-place float from Alliance Title and Escrow in Homedale captures \$75, while Homedale Senior Citizens finished second (\$50) and Owyhee County Probation (\$25) was third.

In youth floats, the standings were: 1. Liddell Wass Family, \$50; 2. Kid's Kampus Day Care, \$25; 3. Donna's Day Care, Ribbon

In the horse category, Cheryl Verkerk won first place with a \$50 prize and a ribbon in the wagons and buggies category.

There were several other wagon entries, but the drivers declined to be judged, parade coordinator Mary Tibbett said.

"Carl Morris from Parma came with a nice two-horse hitch," Tibbett said. "Many times, these horses can't sit and wait that long. I noticed him, though, down at the lineup, keeping his team moving and relaxed prior to the start of the parade."

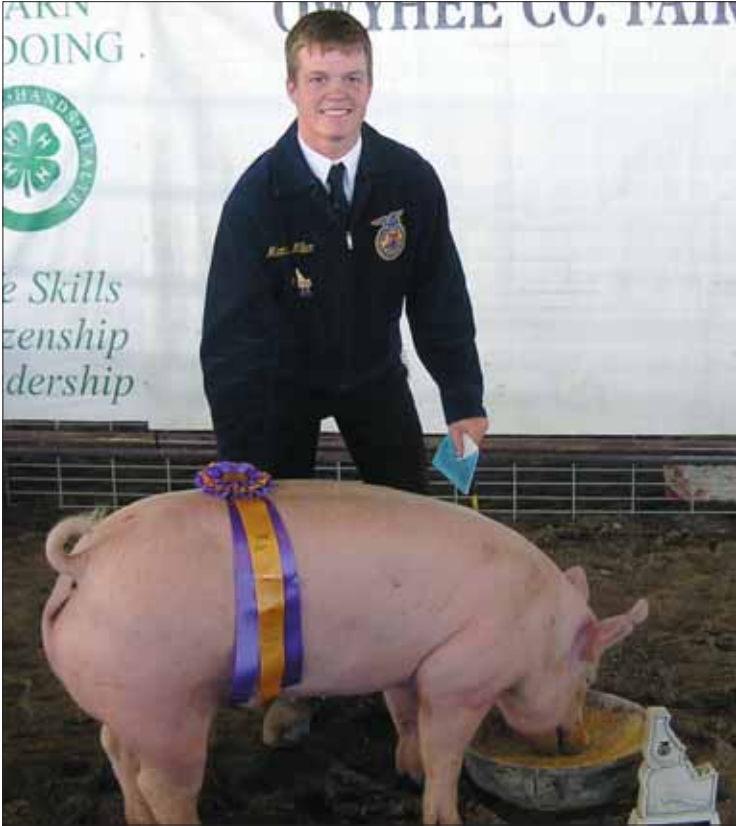

## Fifth annual drill team competition

### Contest founder steps down as fair parade chair

After eight years of herding parade entries, Owyhee County Fair and Rodeo Parade coordinator Mary Tibbett is ready to spend time with another bunch of folks.

Her grandchildren. Tibbett submitted her letter of resignation late last week to fair secretary and manager Teri Nielsen.

“(The parade) needs a new face,” Tibbett said Saturday afternoon. “Mary wants to chase grandkids and out-fish her husband.”

Tibbett, who initiated the Owyhee County Fair and Rodeo Drill Team Competition five years ago, said she decided to walk away from 10 years with the parade about a month ago. She said the work organizing the parade has become too time-consuming and she wants to focus on her Homedale business, the Homedale Men’s Hair Shack, and spoil her grandchildren, including newborn Anna Marie, 5-year-old Victoria and 12-year-old Brandon.

“It will be hard to find somebody to fill her shoes,” Nielsen said. “She just stepped up and did it.”

Nielsen said Tibbett made a lot of difficult work involved with the parade look easy.

Tibbett said she still plans to enter the fair as part of the Owyhee Silver Express drill team, and that the team will continue to sponsor the drill competition inside the rodeo arena after the

parade.

Nielsen said the drill team competition has been a great addition to the fair.

“They just get piles of people in the grandstands for that,” Nielsen said.

Tibbett will continue to compete with the Owyhee Silver Express in the drill team competition.

Tibbett said she was pleased with the turnout for her final parade.

“Float-wise, I thought it turned out pretty good. I was really impressed with the floats,” Tibbett said.

Tibbett said about 10 volunteers helped with the parade this year.

Although Tibbett is leaving after a decade, she says she won’t leave the fair board high and dry in its search for a new parade chairman.

“I have no problem with that,” she said when asked about serving as an advisor for the candidate search.

But Tibbett couldn’t leave without acknowledging those who helped.

“My most gracious thanks to the fair board and rodeo board for allowing me the honorable title,” she said. “I am deeply humbled when I see all the people that take the time and effort to be part of our ‘Great Big Little Parade.’ I thank them all from the bottom of my heart.

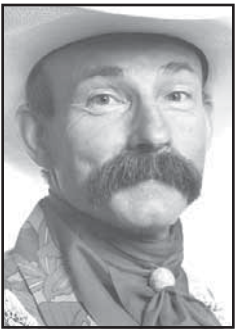

Our granddaughter was looking up at me. A minute earlier she had been laughing and chattering happily. Now, however, there was a look of extreme sadness on her face. Her lower lip was stuck out a-trembling and there appeared to be tears forming in her eyes.

“What’s wrong, Grace?” I asked. “Why are you sad?”

“Grandpa,” Grace said in a tiny, quavering voice. “I’m just a little girl. I don’t know how to find my house.”

I realized Gracie had been listening when I joked about making her walk home from the Interstate. She did not understand that Grandpa was trying to be clever. In her mind, Grandpa and Grandma were going to leave her beside a road and expected her to find her mom and dad on her own.

Over the years, I have said many things I have regretted. But I have never felt as bad as I did when I saw that look on Grace’s face and heard her words.

I picked her up. I told her I was sorry. I told her I was joking. I hugged her tight and told her that Grandpa and Grandma would NEVER, EVER leave her by herself. Her grandmother told her the same thing. I told her we loved her more than anything, and then I hugged her some more.

The rest of Grace’s overnight stay with us went well. But as we drove her home the next day she seemed unusually quiet. When we were about a block from her house we spotted an interesting-looking garage sale and discussed stopping. Grace immediately piped up and stated that she just wanted to go home.

At her house, she hugged her parents and told them she had been “worried.” I speculated that was a reference to my utterly stupid statement the previous day. Her mother said “worried” was just Grace’s way of saying she had missed them. But I’m still not sure.

A person is supposed to become wiser as they get older. Obviously, I am the exception.

I still feel bad.

## Summary Judgment

### Hunting by race in Montana



Later this month, opening briefs will be filed with the U.S. Supreme Court in two landmark civil rights cases addressing race-based decision-making by public schools. The Court’s ruling may turn on its 1995 decision in *Adarand Constructors, Inc. v. Peña*, in which the Court repudiated its 15-year abandonment of the Constitution’s guarantee of equal protection.

As the Court determines whether, in Justice Scalia’s words, “we stand by [our] insistence that ‘[r]acial classifications are suspect,’ and that [we will] ‘smoke out’ illegitimate uses of race’ ” when public schools assign students based on race, another lawsuit seeking to determine if the Court meant what it said in *Adarand* begins its long journey to the Court.

In 1995, Colorado Springs highway subcontractor Randy Pech, who, despite having submitted the lowest bids, had been denied contracts to install guardrails on federal highway projects, urged the Court to rule that the Constitution’s equal protection guarantee applies to the federal government. The United States argued, Congress is exempt from that provision. Justice O’Connor, writing for the Court, rejected the government view and ruled that the Fifth Amendment guarantee is “for *persons*, not *groups*,” and is a “personal right to equal protection of the laws [that may not be] infringed.”

In urging against and dissenting from the majority’s

opinion, Justice Stevens noted that the Court’s *Adarand* ruling would imperil the Court’s 1974 ruling in *Morton v. Mancari*, in which the Court upheld the constitutionality of an American Indian hiring preference utilized by the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA). Subsequently, legal scholars agreed with Justice Stevens; in fact, in 1997, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit concluded that, if *Adarand* controls, “*Mancari’s* days are numbered.”

If *Mancari* is doomed, Randy Roberts of Billings, Mont., is eager for its demise. That is the case because the State of Montana, and more specifically, its Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks, is using *Mancari* as its basis for barring owners of private property, like Roberts, from engaging in big game hunting on their own land if that land lies within the exterior boundaries of one of Montana’s seven Indian Reservations. In fact, for the last 35 years, Roberts has been barred from hunting on 1,500 acres of deeded land on which he would otherwise have the right to hunt if it did not lie within the Crow Indian Reservation; in Montana’s view, only American Indian tribal members may hunt there.

Roberts is not the first hunter to run afoul of Montana’s race-based, big game rules. Sandra Shook of Sanders County in northwestern Montana was charged with hunting

## Accuracy In Media

### Media ignore Hillary’s Senate foe because of her potential

We all know that Sen. Joe Lieberman, a supporter of the Iraq war, lost last week’s Connecticut Democratic Senate primary to left-wing opponent Ned Lamont. But how many know that Sen. Hillary Clinton (D-N.Y.), a supporter of the Iraq war, has a left-wing primary opponent as well? The lack of national media attention given to this candidate, Jonathan Tasini, confirms his suggestion that the “Big Media” are working to sabotage his campaign by ignoring him. It also demonstrates how the media are protecting Hillary Clinton as she prepares her presidential run.

Sen. Clinton’s attack on Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld over Iraq War policy, delivered at a Senate hearing on Aug. 3, was orchestrated by her campaign and covered by the media in order to convince liberal Democrats that she is really one of them, despite her vote in favor of the war. “Hillary Clinton goes on the offensive” was the typical headline of the cable news commentators. Later, she called for Rumsfeld to resign. This was important for Hillary because Tasini is attacking her from the left on the Iraq War and other issues. “My position [on the war] is embraced by a majority of the Democratic primary voters, while the position of my opponent has very little support,” he points out. Tasini could be Hillary’s Ned Lamont if only the media would give him the coverage he deserves.

WNBC in New York reports that, according to the latest

poll, Clinton is viewed favorably by 77 percent of those surveyed while Tasini is largely unknown, with 88 percent of the Democrats not offering an opinion. He’s unknown because the major media have decided that he does not merit the same kind of coverage accorded Ned Lamont. And why is that? The answer has to be that Lieberman’s future as a national Democratic candidate is over, since he ran as a vice-presidential nominee and went down to defeat with Al Gore, while Sen. Clinton has a future as a presidential candidate and, in fact, is widely considered to be laying the groundwork for a run in 2008. That means that Lieberman can be savaged while Hillary has to be protected at all costs.

Clinton’s future as a Democratic presidential candidate in 2008 is viable only if she wins her Democratic Senate primary on Sept. 12 and wins it by a substantial margin. Hence, Tasini is subjected to the behavior of what he calls the “Big Media Censors.” Objective media watchdogs have to admit that he has a valid point.

His specific complaint concerns New York City’s 24-hour news channel NY1 (which is owned by media giant Time Warner), which says that he cannot participate in a Town Hall debate because he has not raised or spent \$500,000. The Tasini campaign has called for a simple criterion for participation — any candidate who has qualified for the ballot should be allowed into the debate. That sounds reasonable. Raising that kind of money, of course, means spending quite a bit of it on advertising

on cable outlets such as NY1. Perhaps the channel has a special interest in making campaign spending a measure of whether one is a valid candidate or not.

Hillary Clinton, who showed up at the Aug. 3 Senate hearing to get face time on the networks by blasting Rumsfeld, not only refuses to debate Tasini, she even refuses to talk about debating him. As Helen Kennedy of the New York Daily News put it, “Clinton has ignored his attempts to get her to agree to a League of Women Voters debate Sept. 6 ahead of the Sept. 12 primary.” Such a strategy can only succeed with the acquiescence of the media.

While Tasini may not have the personal fortune at the disposal of multimillionaire Ned Lamont in Connecticut, he has the support of some of the leading lights of the anti-war left. They include Medea Benjamin of Code Pink, writer Barbara Ehrenreich, filmmaker Barbara Kopple, actress Susan Sarandon, Howard Zinn and Daniel Ellsberg.

“Vote for What You Believe In” is Tasini’s campaign slogan. One has to admire his willingness to take on Sen. Clinton — and her media allies. Tasini, a former president of the National Writers Union, is realizing rather quickly that while the media clearly share his passion for liberal causes, including opposition to the war in Iraq, they believe in Hillary above everything else. While the media are prepared to write Lieberman’s political obituary, they can’t afford to let Hillary fail.

### Government plan could affect Idaho

On July 31, the Western Livestock Journal (WLJ) revealed a government plan that may come as a surprise to many Americans.

According to WLJ, “The Energy Policy Act of 2005 charged the secretaries of Energy, Agriculture, Interior, Commerce and Defense to designate corridors for oil, gas and hydrogen pipelines and electricity transmission facilities on federal land in the 11 contiguous western states (including Idaho).”

Corridors 3,500 feet wide are currently under consideration. The proposed Trans-Texas Corridor is only a third that size and includes truck, vehicle, and rail lines with a 200-foot utility right-of-way. Heather Feeny, Bureau of Land Management spokesman, explained that “[T]his 3,500 feet is a working width...[w]e have started with the assumption of this width because of the Energy Policy Act, Sec. 368, which was designed so that more than one project can be located along these right-of-way corridors.” Private property owners and ranchers in the path of the corridors are complaining they have been left out of the planning and research phases of the project. Information on the West-Wide Corridor site indicates similar corridors being planned for the rest of the states as well.

Federal government officials are venturing into America’s hinterlands for the first public hearing of the president’s “cooperative conservation” plan. Attendees are being given 2 minutes to express their views on a variety of conservation issues all beginning with the question: “How can the federal government...?”

The first session was held in Spokane, Wash., last Wednesday, Seven more events are planned across the country.

More than 180 people signed up to speak at the Spokane event, including private property advocates and representatives of environmental groups. Washington State Rep. Joel Kretz spoke on behalf of private property owners when he said those rights must be protected from bureaucrats and special interests.

“Only the private property owner has anything tangible on the table,” Kretz said.

Kretz pointed out that millions of dollars have been squandered in recent years on salmon recovery.

“We have developed a salmon recovery industry,” he said, fueled by electricity ratepayers and “the urban ignorant.”

The Endangered Species Act and other inefficient environmental regulations came under fire from participants. Robin Meenach, vice president of the Washington Farm Bureau, noted that any cooperative ventures must be voluntary and that property owners must be compensated if their land is lost to environmental regulation.

Phyllis Schlafly writes that business interests, aided by the U. S government, are planning to set up a cargo inspection port run by Mexican officials in downtown Kansas City, Mo. An e-mail obtained through Missouri’s Sunshine law read; “The space [in Kansas City] would need to be designated as Mexican sovereign territory.”

The project is being spearheaded by a newly-formed nonprofit economic development corporation, Kansas City Smartport, Inc. Smartport’s Web site discloses plans to ship Chinese-made goods from the port of Lazaro Cardenas in southern Mexico up “the evolving trade corridor” (NAFTA Super Highway) to the Kansas City site for inspection.

According to Schlafly’s report, “A key purpose of the project is to take jobs away from U. S. longshoremen in Los Angeles and Long Beach, Calif., who earn \$140,000 a year, and replace them with Mexican laborers at \$10,000 a year. U. S. truck drivers and railroad workers will likewise be replaced by Mexicans.”

Smartport applied for a \$1.5 million grant from the U. S. Economic Development Administration to pay for gamma-ray machines to scan the containers after Mexico refused to pay the cost. The Kansas City City Council has already approved \$2.5 million in loans and \$600,000 in direct aid to Smartport to help get the project underway.

The U. S. State Department must now approve Mexico’s invasion of U. S. soil. It has already been approved by U.S. Customs Department.

illegally, even though she had a deer hunting license and tag and her neighbor’s permission to hunt on his land, because the land is within the Flathead Indian Reservation. The Montana Supreme Court rejected Shook’s constitutional claims and, relying on *Mancari*, held that “laws that afford Indians special treatment are constitutional [if] [they] can be tied rationally to the fulfillment of the unique federal obligation toward Indians.” Therefore, held the court, because “federal Indian law regarding the rights of Indians is binding on the state,” Montana’s hunting rule “is rationally tied to the fulfillment of [Montana’s] unique obligation toward Indians.”

Apparently lost on the Montana Supreme Court was the following: first, *Mancari* related to the authority of Congress and, as a result of the delegation by Congress, the authority of the BIA vis-à-vis American Indians — no similar authority has been given to Montana; second, although Congress has a special relationship with American Indian tribes, Montana has no such relationship; and finally, given *Adarand*, *Mancari* is likely unconstitutional. Nonetheless, the U.S. Supreme Court declined to hear Shook’s appeal.

Randy Roberts is not waiting to be cited for hunting on privately owned land and a futile appeal to the Montana Supreme Court. Instead, he filed his lawsuit before the Montana federal district court. Today, his case is briefed and awaiting argument and a ruling.

## 140 years ago

August 11, 1866

The liberality of this firm enables us to knowingly testify to the excellence of their honey and preserves and if anybody is a judge of those articles, we are, having practiced tasting much “goodies” from a very early period of our existence. See B & O’s programme.

MEMORIAL, FTC. A citizen is getting up a lengthy and carefully written statement in regard to the Indian depredations in the Owyhee country, the wants of the people &c. for the purpose of presenting to Congress, President and Gen’l Grand for their respective and respectful consideration. It will be circulated for signatures in a day or two, and forwarded soon as possible. The main object is to get authority to organize a volunteer force at the expense of Government. It is a move in the right direction.

REMOVAL. Hereafter The Avalanche will be issued in Silver City, upstairs in J. F. Dye & Co’s building, Washington St. This location is chosen from true business principles. The merchant and mechanic each attach great importance to eligible locations, and as we have their objects in view, we are governed accordingly. Our paper has been published one year in Ruby and we have no fault to find with its citizens, location or patronage. See notice of dissolution, etc.

SELLING AMMUNITION TO INDIANS. We received positive information about two weeks ago that Indians were caught coming towards Snake River from Boise City, with boxes of powder and lead. One squaw was caught with a boxful, and the ammunition captured. Others were seen with suspicious boxes lashed to their backs and making tracks for the Owyhee country. On receiving the news, we thought it might be imprudent to make a public announcement of the fact and wrote to Capt. Eckerson, commanding Fort Boise, for advice in the premises. He immediately replied that he would confer with Governor, Ballard, and now writes us a letter — the sentiments of which we heartily endorse, and persons sought in the act or proven guilty surely deserve the severest punishment!

ELECTION. Monday next, August 13, the general election in Idaho Territory takes place. Although it is useless to offer a word of caution, we’ll do it anyhow. The excessive use of liquor should be avoided; angry disputes which are most certain to lead to painful knockdowns should be guarded against; as men love freedom from prosecutions, they ought to studiously avoid illegal voting, if challenged, submit patiently for if you are a legal voter the challenge can work no injury, and if not a legal voter, the challenging party is doing his duty and trying to prevent you from perpetrating a crime which might cost you years in the penitentiary, consider that each party has rights at the polls, and as you wish your own respected pay equal regard to the rights of your opponent. A great many look upon election day as a fit one upon which to have broils and settle old grudges whereas it is the most unfit one that could be selected. An election is conducted with sufficient earnestness to be safe, without any outside issues to aggravate the “sovereigns.” We have no sympathy with the man who provokes a difficulty on election day and gets a sound hasting. If there is a day in the three hundred and sixty-five on which men should preserve their tempers, it is election day.

THRILLING ADVENTURES IN EASTERN IDAHO—DAN’L BOONE REVIVED.—PROBABLE DISCOVERY OF ANOTHER GOLD FIELD.  
Some two months since, D. D. Patterson, with two other men, started from Idaho City to carry out a long cherished intention namely, to explore the country lying east of Fort Hall at the western base of the Wind River Mountains, with a vein of the discovery of gold, which, from the location the country and character of the sand and granite found on Snake River at the Fort and elsewhere, led him strongly to suspect existed somewhere near the head waters of that stream. Arriving at Taylor’s bridge and knowing the rugged character of the country before them they procured the services of a herder to accompany them as far as it was practical to ride, and then left him in charge of the horses. Shouldering their blankets, Henry’s rifle, grub &c., they started for the place of their destination in the unknown region east of the Belt Range. Two or three days clambering over one of the most precipitous, rugged and difficult mountains in the world, they found themselves on a ridge above one of the branches of the Snake, that roared and foamed far below through rocky gorges in the mountains. Nothing worthy of special notice had occurred up to this time, when they suddenly came upon a fresh Indian trail that afterwards proved to have been made by a thieving part of Bannocks that had been making a raid into the Crow and Flat Head country and were returning with the plunder, hotly pursued by the Crows and Flat Heads. Patterson and his companion, apprehending trouble hurried down to the river, intending to try to cross as quick as possible, in order to avoid discovery and pursuit; but scarcely had they reached the water when the Flat Heads and Crows in pursuit of the flying foe discovered the footprints of white men crossing the trail and with all the eagerness of bloodhounds set up their hideous war hoop and struck out after the prospectors. Hearing this, our friends hastily collected in few dry cottonwood chunks, which they tied together with the ropes from around their blankets and pushed off into the stream, just as the red fiends came in sight and raised the cry of victory. Finding the current more rapid than they expected and their raft unmanageable, they were carried downstream at so furious a rate that it was impossible to make a landing. They found however that with all the exertions the Indians were making the raft was out-running them and hope revived. Sometimes they ran over rapids that would submerge their frail bark and it was with difficulty they were able to keep themselves and their baggage on board: but they clung to it until they entered a canon so rapid that they expected every moment to be dashed to pieces over some cataract. During this fearful and rapid passage they out-ran their pursuers several miles and finally came to the end of the canon, swung into the mouth of a small creek and came to land. Here they holstered as to the surest means of escape and decided upon the following expedient: Planting two pine bough upon the raft they tied the leaves and brush together at the tops in such manner as to give them the semblance of human forms. On these they placed their coats and hats and pushed it out into the current, which carried it swiftly away downstream, bearing its crew of imaginary fugitives. By the time these arrangements were completed, the savages were again in plain view, bent upon the capture of the hapless adventurers who betook themselves to the middle of the small creek, up the channel of which they waded some eight miles and left their would-be captors to pursue the flying raft and its phantom passengers.

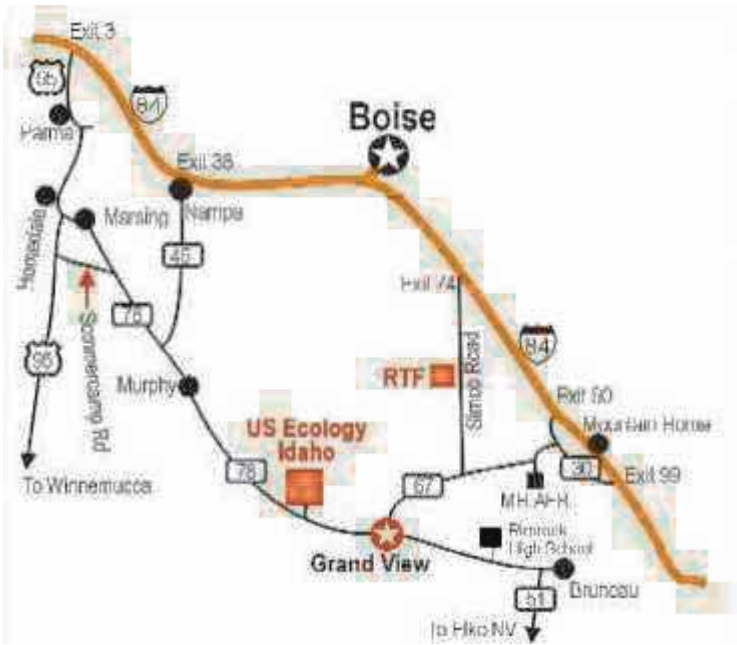
The purpose of this Public Notice is to familiarize the public with the location and provide a description of the proposed facility, description of the proposed actions, description of the procedure by which a siting license may be granted, and the location where the complete application package may be reviewed and where copies may be obtained. This is not an invitation for public comment. The public comment period will take place later in the process after a draft license is completed. Notice of the public comment period will be provided.

**BACKGROUND INFORMATION:** USEI has proposed to expand the existing permitted hazardous waste treatment, storage and disposal facility located near Grand View, Owyhee County, Idaho. Specifically, this siting license request is for siting the remainder of the land area of Section 19 and phased construction of new land disposal cells within this area. These new land disposal cells will be utilized after the existing land disposal cell reaches capacity. The siting license application was received by DEQ on June 30, 2006. The siting application was determined to be complete by DEQ on July 25, 2006.

**FACILITY LOCATION:** The facility to be expanded is located 10.5 miles northwest of Grand View, Idaho on State Highway 78, off of Lemley Road. A map depicting the location is appended hereto.

### HAZARDOUS WASTE FACILITY LICENSE APPLICATION:

The Idaho Hazardous Waste Facility Siting Act, Idaho Code § 39-5801, *et seq.*, requires an applicant to submit a complete siting license application to the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality. The Act is not intended to



duplicate the existing Hazardous Waste Management Act permitting process as set forth in Idaho Code § 39-4401, *et seq.* The site license is based on a preliminary, general review, as compared to the specific, detailed information required for the Hazardous Waste Management Act permit. As set forth in Idaho Code § 39-5813(1), an application must include the following:

- The name and residence of the applicant;
- The location of the proposed hazardous waste treatment, storage, or disposal facility;
- Engineering or hydrogeologic information to indicate compliance with technical criteria as adopted in the Hazardous Waste Management Plan (for disposal facilities);
- A description of the types of wastes proposed to be handled at the facility;
- Information showing that harm to scenic, historic, cultural or recreational values is not substantial or can be mitigated;
- Information showing that the risk and impact of accident during transport of hazardous waste is not substantial or can be mitigated; and
- Information showing that the impact on local government is not adverse regarding health, safety, cost and consistency with local planning and existing development or can be mitigated.

### SITE APPLICATION

### REVIEW:

Upon receipt of a complete application, the Department performs a review of the Minimum Technical Siting Criteria contained in the Hazardous Waste Management Plan approved by the Idaho Legislature, March 9, 1987, as set forth in Idaho Code § 39-5806 and prepares a draft site license. A Site Review Panel is created consisting of members of the public, state government, and the hazardous waste industry. The panel consists of ten members which, when reviewing the draft license, shall consider, among other things, the risk and impact of accident during transport, the risk of fire and explosion, the impact on local units of government, and the nature of environmental impact. The panel shall set a date for and arrange for public notice of a public hearing in a newspaper having major circulation in the vicinity of the proposed site. The public can submit comments to the panel either at the hearing or in writing for a period up to 15 days following the public hearing. The panel's primary responsibility is to consider the concerns and objections raised by the public as part of the public comment period. The panel shall facilitate efforts to provide that the concerns and objections are mitigated by proposing additional conditions regarding the construction of the facility where determined necessary. The panel may propose conditions which integrate the provisions

of city or county ordinances, permits or regulations. Within 90 days after creation of the Panel, the Panel recommends to the Director of the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality whether the site license should be granted as drafted, modified or denied. The Director shall issue a siting license if he/she determines that:

- the technical criteria are met;
- the harm to scenic, historic, cultural or recreational values is not substantial or can be mitigated;
- the risk and impact of accident during transportation of hazardous waste is not substantial or can be mitigated;
- the impact on local government is not adverse regarding health, safety, cost and consistency with local planning and existing development or can be mitigated;
- No other major concerns have been raised by the panel regarding public health or the environment which cannot be mitigated.

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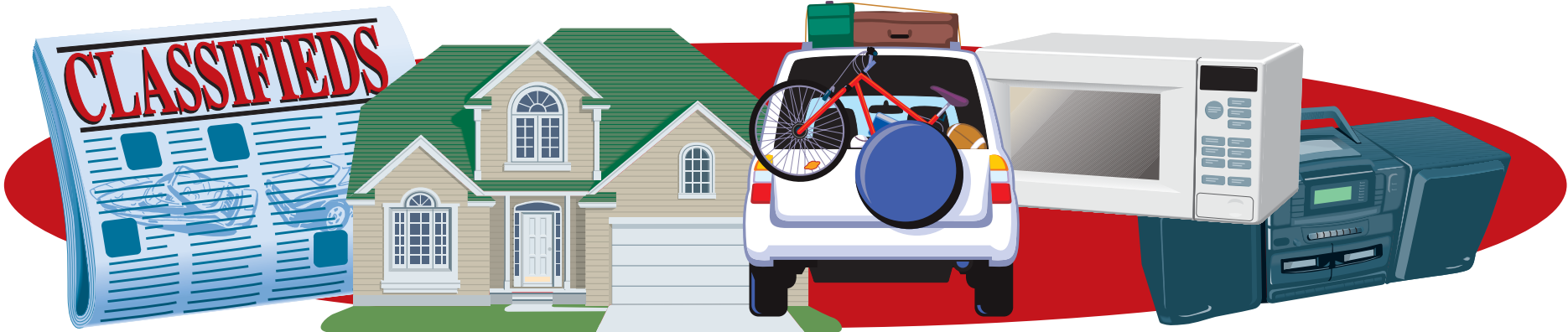

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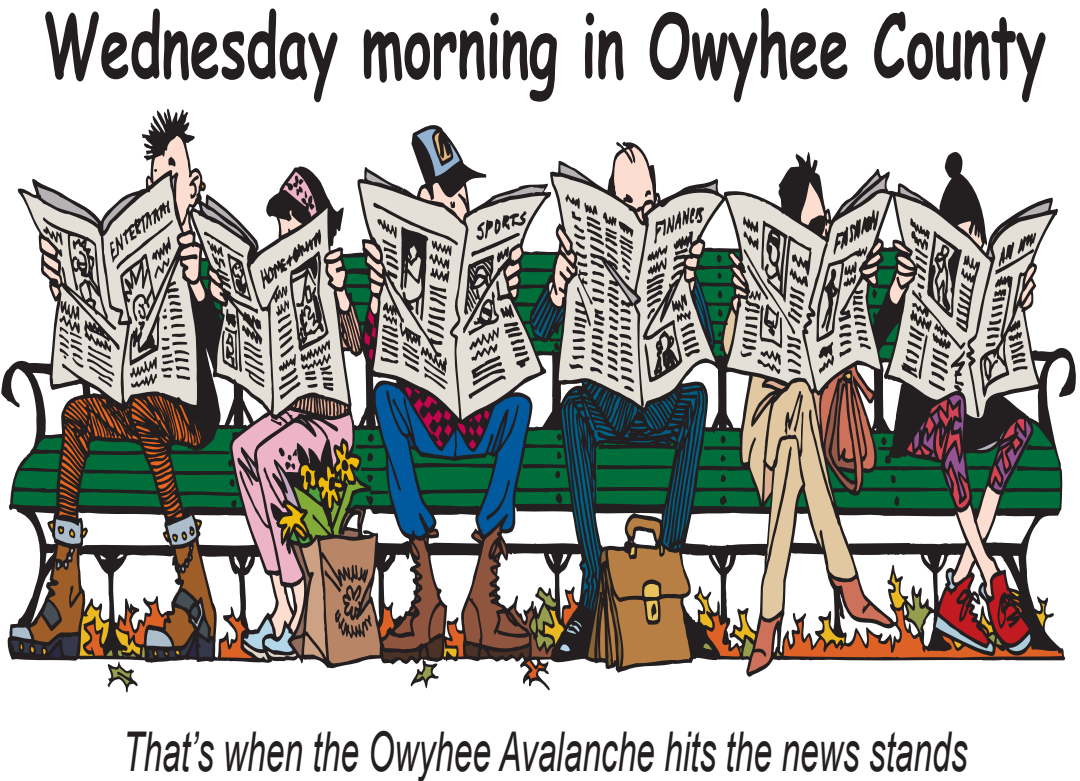
