Pegram, Trojans extend mastery of River Bend

Jordan Pegram posted identical 1-over-par 37 scores in two tournaments last week despite diverse weather conditions at River Bend Golf Course.

Pegram had the second-best individual score Thursday to lead the Homedale High

School's golf team to their second consecutive 3A Snake River Valley conference tournament victory in Wilder.

"The wind conditions (Thursday) were better than (April 9), and the rain (Wednesday night) softened the course consider-

ably," Trojans coach David Thompson said. "Overall, there more scores in the 30s and low 40s than I can ever remember at an SRV match."

Bryce Glarborg from Weiser shot an even-par 36 to win medalist Thursday, but

the Wolverines were fourth, 12 strokes behind Homedale.

With Reece Landa grabbing a 39 and sophomore Grant Sweet carding a 40,

Owyhee athletes excel at Stewart

Trojans' Liddell,
Marsing's Heller
earn sweeps

Owyhee County's three high school track and field programs all showed up at the same event Saturday, with Homedale continuing an impressive boys season.

Senior David Liddell swept the sprints at the John Stewart Invitational in Payette, winning the 100 meters in 11.05 seconds and taking the 200 in 22.55 — nearly a full second faster than the second-place competitor.

Marsing's Tyson Heller also brought home dual gold. The freshman swept the throws, winning the shot put (43 feet, 8 inches) by more than two feet and capturing the discus (128-2) by six feet.

Homedale's Austin Emry swept the jumps, while Rimrock senior Mike Myers also collected top-five showings in the jumps.

A sophomore, Emry grabbed the high jump with a mark of 6-4. Teammate Austin Ferguson, a junior, was third at 6-1. Myers was fourth at 5-8, and fellow Rimrock athlete was fifth (5-5).

Emry won the long jump with a try of 20-3. Myers was fourth at 17-10, and Marsing junior Ethan Sauer was seventh (17-7).

In the triple jump, Emry paced the field at 39-5 1/4. Myers was fourth at 36-6 3/4.

Homedale senior hurdler Chris Anders turned in a consistent

Rimrock softball hits all cylinders to sweep week

Raiders' pitcher
strikes out 18
during two wins

Having played just five games three weeks, it's perhaps too early to say the Rimrock High School softball team has hit its stride.

The same probably can't be said for Raiders pitcher Shelby Chandler.

Chandler struck out 18 and scattered four hits last week as Rimrock collected a pair of wins.

She fired a one-hitter April 11 to help the Raiders open the 1A Western Idaho Conference season with a 15-3 victory on the road at Horseshoe Bend.

"Once again, keeping them off the bases was a key in the win,"

Rimrock coach Mike Chandler said.

Although the Mustangs beat Rimrock 5-2 in the Raiders' season opener on March 20, last week's matchup was the first league encounter of the year between the teams.

Freshman shortstop Jackie Thurman went 4-for-4 with five RBIs against the Mustangs. She hit her second double of the contest in the top of the sixth inning as part of the Raiders' game-clinching six-run uprising.

Breanne Merrick went 3-for-5 with a triple and two RBIs from the top of the batting order.

Shelby Chandler allowed a two-out single in the second inning. She held the Mustangs to one run until Horseshoe Bend

Brandon Valadez's base hit in the top of the seventh inning brought home Rodrigo Villarreal and sent Homedale High School to a non-conference junior varsity baseball victory April 9.

The Trojans sealed a 10-9 win over host New Plymouth by turning a double play and getting a strikeout in the bottom of the seventh inning. Joey Cline struck out the Pilgrims' final batter.

Cline, who relieved sophomore Tyler Gibson with two outs in the second inning, got the win with six strikeouts and two walks.

Villarreal scored three times for Homedale. Jesus Gonzalez had two singles and two RBIs.

Gibson doubled and scored twice, while Tyler Ford collected a base hit and scored two runs for coach Brian Beard's JV Trojans.

Rounding out Homedale's

offense for Homedale was Ryan Vance's triple and Mitch Quintana, who singled and scored.

The Trojans (5-6 overall by week's end) were no-hit by Fruitland on April 10 and had their Friday 3A Snake River Valley conference game canceled because McCall-Donnelly no longer has a JV squad.

Homedale JV assistant coach Mark Thatcher said it was a tale of "hitting 'em where they ain't" for the Grizzlies.

"The problem was that Fruitland not only hit well, but they also got several blooper hits and grounds in hard-to-field spots," Thatcher said. "Without those blooper hits, we would have been able to get out of the innings faster."

"As for our hitting, we hit the ball well, but it was usually right at their fielders for an out."

Homedale ran away with a 158 and a five-stroke victory over Payette. Ryan Garrett shot a 42.

“Grant Sweet and Ryan Garrett have been like clockwork all spring and continued their fine play,” Thompson said.

The Pirates’ Colin Hershey tied Pegram for second in the individual race with a 37.

Ryan Ryska closed out the Trojans’ scoring with a 44.

On the junior varsity side, junior Jonathan Verwer tied for medalist honors with a 44 and helped Homedale to the team title.

Aaron Wheeler added a 47 and Zach Tolmie chimed in at 48. Dustin Regis fired a 56 in his first match of the season, and Dylan Kushlan also logged a 56.

“More than being happy with the results, I am most pleased about the kids’ willingness to improve their golf games and manage the course and environmental elements,” Thompson said.

“(Varsity leaders senior Trevor Krzesnik) and Jordan are setting the example, and our younger guys are buying into the need to be efficient, patient and play the game one stroke at a time.”

Pegram began the week on April 9 with another red-hot round despite cold and windy conditions during the Parma Invitational at River Bend.

The junior fired a 1-over-par 37

to win medalist honors and help the Trojans to another golf tournament championship this season.

“Considering the extremely windy conditions, that score was super,” Thompson said.

The rest of the Homedale bunch followed close behind Pegram as the Trojans won

the team title by 11 strokes over Nampa Christian. Sweet carded a 42 and Krzesnik added a 44 as Homedale scored 168 during the blustery day.

Garrett shot a 45, and Reece Landa chimed in at 52.

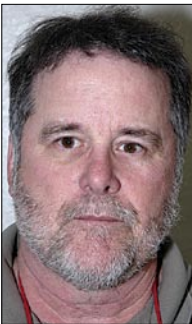

Uria’s homer highlights victory

Trojans just miss in Vale

Homedale boys collect five individual events, but lose team title

An Idaho High School Activities Association prohibition and a piece of scoring viewed as less than customary by Homedale High School may have cost the Trojans’ boys track and field team a meet championship early last week. “We lost by a very small and interesting margin,” Trojans coach Thomas Thomas said. “Vale picked up nine points in the javelin, which we cannot do. “They also scored two of their relay teams in the 4x400, which is not the usual procedure.” Consequently, the Vikings won their own Viking Invitational by 3 1/2 points over Homedale. Vale garnered 142 points. Bolstered by sophomore Austin Emry’s sweep of the jumps, the Trojans posted 138 1/2 points. The javelin is allowed by the Oregon high school athletics governing body, while Idaho outlawed the sometimes dangerous event. Homedale athletes won five

individual events during the April 10 meet. Senior Chris Anders won the 300-meter intermediate hurdles in 18.25 seconds and was runner-up in the 110 hurdles. David Liddell ran the third leg of the Trojans’ winning 4x100 relay squad (45.95). Rounding out the team were Mark Vance, Matt Holloway and Trent Acree. Liddell also finished second in the 100 and third in the 200. Holloway was fifth and Acree seventh as Homedale racked up three top-10 finishes in the 200. Emry initiated a Trojans sweep in the high jump with a winning effort of 6 feet, 5 inches. Holloway was second and Austin Ferguson grabbed third. Emry’s 6-5 is the best height by a 3A athlete in Idaho this season, and only one inch behind the top state mark. Emry won the long jump with 3A state-best 21-1, which was six inches better than Liddell’s second-place performance. Emry won the triple jump, and Vance

was third. Tyler Gibson and Jake Tolmie scored points for the Trojans in the 1,500-meter run. Gibson was third (4:49.43) and Tolmie fourth (4:50.05). Gibson was fourth in the 800 (2:18.57), and Tolmie crossed the line in sixth (2:21.9). Junior Jaime Uriarte finished sixth in the shot put (37-8), while ninth-grader Aaron Proferes was fifth in the 110 hurdles and sixth in the 300 hurdles. On the girls side, Sarah Black cleared 7-6 in the pole vault to finish a distant second to Vale’s Heather Noble, who topped out at 10 feet. Annamaria Salas finished second in the long jump (15 feet) and third in the triple jump (28-7 1/4). Kindra Galloway was sixth in the 100 meters (13.87) and the 200 (28.8). Katie Holloway grabbed fifth in the 100 high hurdles (19.02) and tied for third in the high jump at 4-4.

From Page 1B performance with second-place finishes in the 110 high hurdles (17.72) and the 300 intermediate hurdles (42.89). Teammate Aaron Proferes, a freshman, was fourth in the 110 HH and sixth in the IH. Rimrock was the only county school to place in the boys relays. Coach Kermit Tate’s squad was third in the 4x200 relay (1:48.24) and fourth in the sprint medley relay (5 minutes, 11.33 seconds). Antonio Ayala, Daryl Langfitt, Chris Hipwell and Brian Simper ran the 4x200, while in the sprint medley, Hugo Araujo and Ayala both raced the 200 legs, Kevin Barroso ran the 400 and Kody Schiermeier took care of the final 400 meters. A sophomore, Ayala was eighth in the 200. Araujo, a senior, was sixth in the 800. Other Homedale bright spots included Ferguson taking third in the 400, while teammate Tyler Gibson tied for second in the 800 with Ontario, Ore.’s Tad Anzaldúa. Both finished in 2:12, one second behind winner Zach Waynetska of Payette. Gibson was fourth in the 1,600 (5:09.75). Rimrock’s Brian Meyers was sixth in the 1,600. Sophomore Joseph Morrison collected seventh in the discus (107-6).

Girls meet The girls portion of the Stew-

art Invitational saw Marsing’s Holly Heller — the sister of Tyson and former 2A state champion Cody — show signs of finding her track form after battling back from a basketball injury. Heller sat out parts of two basketball seasons with a debilitating back injury. But on Saturday, the junior resurfaced to finish fourth in the discus (89-6) and fifth in the shot put (29-4 1/2). Another multi-sport athlete, Homedale’s Taryn Corta added some depth to coach Thomas Thomas’ girls track and field team one day after starting on the infield for the Trojans’ softball team coached by her father. Corta showed no signs of fatigue as she turned in the top preliminary distance in the triple jump at 32-9. She also had the third-longest qualifying distance in the long jump at 14-7 1/4. Fellow softballer Hannah Johnson was fifth in qualifying at 12-4 1/4. Corta also was third in the 200 (28.55) and fourth in the 100 (13.37). Johnson was 10th in the 200 and 11th in the 100.

Sophomore Hannah Johnson, the catcher from the Trojans’ softball team, was 10th in the 200 and 11th in the 100. Meanwhile, Homedale track regular Kindra Galloway, a freshman, finished fifth in the 200 (29.28) and ninth in the 100. Homedale freshman, Katie Holloway, was fourth in the 100 hurdles and seventh in the 300 hurdles. Marsing’s Jessica Freeman, another ninth-grader, finished seventh in the 100 hurdles. Another freshman, Nickole D’Alessio, continued to shine for the Trojans. She was third in the shot put (29-8 1/2). Elisa Moreno, a two-sport athlete from Marsing, finished fourth in the 200 (28.85) and seventh in the 100 for the Huskies. Owyhee County resident Emily Romero helped Melba snag four of the top six spots in the pole vault. Romero cleared 8-2 for third place. Fellow senior Genie Coats won the event at 8-7. Romero also served on the Mustangs’ victorious 4x400 relay team. She ran the final leg to cap a 4:48.83 effort. Her teammates included Coats, Katie Brinkerhoff and Britney Baker. Rimrock freshman Anna Cantrell, the younger sister of 2006 1A state meet qualifier Ellie, was second in the 400 (1:05.7) and eighth in the 200.

Homedale lumber awakes from slumber

Coach encouraged by clutch hitting during SRV baseball split

Tim Fulwood has been looking for a key hit all season. On Friday, the Homedale High School baseball coach finally saw it.

Sophomore Ryan Davis drilled a walk-off double in the bottom of the seventh inning as the Trojans beat McCall-Donnelly 4-3 in a home 3A Snake River Valley conference game.

Davis' clutch hit brought home senior catcher Josh Jolley, who beat out an infield single to start the rally.

Homedale (4-8 overall, 1-3 3A SRV at week's end) snapped a three-game conference losing streak.

The win also may have signaled a turning point for the Trojans' offense.

The Vandals reached starting pitcher Darren Burdine for the game's first three runs before Homedale mounted a comeback with two runs in the bottom of the fifth inning. Burdine would get credit for the victory while striking out four.

Ryan Johnson was 3-for-4 to account for the bulk of Homedale's eight hits. The senior knocked in two runs and doubled.

Fruitland 7, Homedale 5

The rumblings of Friday's come-from-behind victory may have originated with the Trojans' April 10 loss at home to 3A SRV foe Fruitland.

"I was please with our kids' effort," Fulwood said. "We stepped up and competed and played hard."

Fruitland held a 3-1 lead before

pulling away with four runs in the top of the seventh inning.

The runs came in handy for the Grizzlies, though. The Trojans fired back with four runs in the bottom of the seventh. Jared Brockett, Eric Wilbur and Josh Jolley all drove in runs during the rally. A third run scored when Ryan Johnson reached on an infield error.

Wilbur is one of three co-op players from Notus. He joins fellow seniors Dillon Harris and Burdine from the defunct Pirates squad.

Johnson made the start and took the loss despite giving up just five hits and five walks in 6 1/3 innings.

"We shot ourselves in the foot with a couple of errors that cost us some runs," Fulwood said. "Five of their seven runs were unearned."

"If we make one or two of those plays, we probably win the ballgame."

Fruitland cobbled together its insurance rally in the top of the seventh with two singles, an error on Homedale second baseman Brandt Graber, a walk and two batters hit by pitches.

Fulwood was optimistic about the performance against the Grizzlies (15-2, 4-0 3A SRV), who led the conference by one game at week's end.

"I think we're close and we're making progress," Fulwood said. "We just have to stop making a few mistakes, and we'll be right there."

A junior who plays shortstop for her father's softball team, Corta finished the week 5-for-7, but the Trojans were saddled with a pair of 3A Snake River Valley conference losses.

Homedale (3-7 overall, 0-4 3A SRV through last week) played Nampa Christian in a non-conference game Monday before receiving the league bye Tuesday.

Corta turned out to be a leading hitter for the Trojans in both games last week.

On Friday at Sundance Park, she was 2-for-4 with an RBI and a run scored, but McCall-Donnelly outslugged Homedale for an 18-11 decision.

The Vandals scored eight runs in the third to take a 12-4 lead.

Bolstered by Hannah Johnson's 3-for-5 outing and a 4-for-4 day by Sierra Aberasturi, the Trojans tried to climb back into the game.

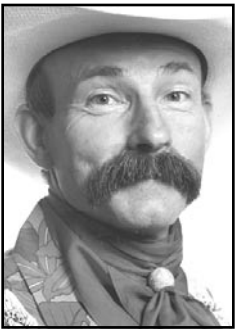

On the edge of common sense

Kosher cows and woolless sheep

Diversified farming has always been considered a legitimate alternative for farmers and ranchers. Midwestern farmers have done well using corn, soybeans and a pen of feeder steers.

But there are many producers like Kansas wheat growers or Nevada ranchers who only have one basket for all their eggs. Low cattle markets over the years drove cow producers to dabble in buffalo, elk, ostrich, longhorn, llama, all-natural beef, game hunting, even a dude ranch bed and breakfast to keep from taking a job in town.

These “fad” alternatives worked for some, others got taken for a ride.

But, if we are willing to look at life as an adventure, my admiration goes out to those innovative hog farmers who still have the empty emu corrals behind the farrowing barn.

Even though the U.S. lamb market has been strong, circumstances have piled up that make it tough to raise sheep. Our government, in its wisdom, increased the amount of New Zealand lamb we can import and eliminated our producer’s subsidy on wool. It now costs more to have your sheep sheared than the wool is worth.

In a world where we are screaming for sustainable fuels and less dependency on foreign markets, polyester, a product of fossil fuel, and imported from China, has driven wool out of business. Ah, the hypocrisy of it all.

But I met a lady in Iowa who raises Katahdin sheep — haired sheep. They run behind the cows and stay out all winter. No wool to cut, no hay to feed, dogs live with the flock and she has shown a profit 10 years in a row. Then I visited with a man in Maryland who has been selectively breeding and marketing Kosher Angus cattle. It’s not easy or simple but neither is raising buffalo.

Grass fat beef, organic chicken, all-natural catfish, and range pigs can be successful niche markets. In the future, we might see cloned turkey, white tail deer brought down by bullets blessed by P.E.T.A., baby seals taken by Native Americans using the approved humane Sierra “Club” or the Nature Conservancy selling out to the Saudi sheiks who will put all their money behind raising goats and camels!

The dedication, diligence and ingenuity of the American/Canadian Ag community have made us the horn of plenty, the envy and food bank of the world. I am sometimes incredulous, sometimes impressed and sometimes tickled by our creativity, but never surprised. After all, who could have imagined a market for lamb shanks!

Not important ... *but possibly of interest* Europe 101



If you are planning to visit Europe, pack a washcloth.

That was one of the important pieces of information I picked up as a member of a family expedition that visited six European countries in 16 days.

When Sara announced last year that she and two of her brothers and their wives were making plans to visit Europe, I didn’t exactly jump up and down with joy. First off, such a trip was gonna cost some serious money. Second, I felt much like my late father who once observed, “Why should I go to Europe? There are parts of Owyhee County I haven’t seen yet.”

But now that the biggest vacation of our lives is behind us, the jet lag is about gone and my right shoulder is almost back to normal (more about that later), I have to admit I’m glad I went to Europe. In fact, I had a ball. And just maybe I’m a little smarter than I was before the trip.

We learned a lot during those two weeks. As noted in the beginning, one important lesson was to take your own washcloth. Apparently Europeans don’t use washcloths when they bathe, as only one of the seven hotels where we stayed had that item. But whatever alternative method they use must work because the natives I met smelled OK.

There were some lessons more important than washcloths. One was that a lot of folks in Europe actually like most Americans. And the Yanks who are “Ugly Americans” would be jerks in the USA, too. It’s amazing what a few words can accomplish. If you buy something in a French or German store and say “*Merçi*” or “*Danka*” instead of “thank you,” it often brings a smile from the clerk. Now it may be that he or she is smiling because a silly American just butchered a word. But I got the feeling the smiles were because they appreciated we were trying,

in a small way, to fit into their culture rather than expecting them to interact on our terms.

My analysis may be unscientific, but our experience also leads me to believe the claim that Europeans know more about America than Americans know about Europe is a great big myth. Yes, Europeans know what the Hollywood stars are doing and may have some vague information about the latest actions of our government. But the “average” European is a lot more likely to be checking on the latest soccer scores or local weather report than listening to George Bush’s comments on global warming or Iraq — just as their American counterparts care more about the latest NASCAR or American League standings than about the latest European Economic Union agreement. Most Europeans probably have stereotypical views of Americans — just as we have stereotypical views of them. One of the best ways to eliminate such misconceptions is to meet folks on their own turf.

We saw many beautiful things and places during our tour, and all of us now have a better grasp of European history. But probably the most valuable thing we brought home is the realization that it really doesn’t matter what you eat, how the toilets flush or if the plug-ins on the wall are 110 or 220 volts. The bottom line is people are pretty much the same no matter where you go. The world is full of folks (the odd terrorist excluded) just trying to get along as best they can.

In the columns to follow over the next several (months?) I will attempt to recount our adventures abroad in the hopes that it might help future pilgrims. I also hope to dispel the vicious rumors circulating in our family that French wine had something to do with me falling on my face at the base of the Eiffel Tower.

From Washington Craig-Wyden must be reauthorized

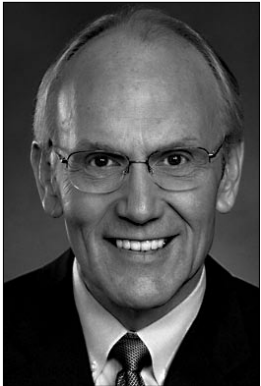
“Clear-cuts for kids.” That is what the national environmental activists dubbed the bill Sen. Ron Wyden (D-Ore.) and I introduced in 1999. It was a compromise proposal to help timber-dependent communities cope with the dramatic decline in timber harvesting from our federal lands.

I can still remember the day back in 1999, when Senator Ron Wyden and I sat down to hammer out an outline of what became the Secure Rural Schools and Community Self-Determination Act of 2000, or Craig-Wyden.

We crossed the political aisle and many ideological boundaries and found common ground to solve a problem. It was a true compromise because neither side got everything they wanted, but we could all agree on one thing — it looked like it just might work.

The law has achieved remarkable results. Not only did it help local communities fund schools and maintain roads, it is the one and only time in history that local, collaborative groups have had a checkbook enabling them to directly choose and fund projects on our national forests. It is these Resource Advisory Committees (RACs) that helped shape Craig-Wyden into the success we see today.

That law expired last fall; it was a six-year temporary safety net. It is clear to me that the safety net payments need to continue, but in a manner that encourages and focuses on building collaboration — one of the

cornerstones of this Act.

As the time has passed to reauthorize the law, we have a new compromise. Once again, we had differences in opinions about how the law should be shaped for the future. However, the foundation for the compromise was shaped by discussions I had with Sen. (Jeff) Bingaman (D-N.M.) earlier this year. In the end, a large, bipartisan group of senators came together and agreed to put aside our differences in order to ensure success for our rural schools and counties.

Our new bipartisan compromise, which the Senate voted 74-23 to include as part of the FY2007 Emergency Supplemental Appropriations bill, incorporates the successful principles of the original Act. It recognizes the fact that communities want economic activity more than a check; the formula needs to be more equitable to be passed by Congress; and the greatest achievement of the original law was as much about the RACs as the safety net payments.

While the fate of the FY2007 Emergency Supplemental has yet to be determined, I will continue working for a successful outcome for our timber-dependent schools and counties.

As I look back over the past six years, I couldn’t be prouder of the accomplishments we have seen from this law.

I can’t wait to see what the next six years bring with the new law. One thing I know for sure — there won’t be any “clear-cuts for kids.”

Accuracy In Media

NBC suits went cowardly route in dealing with Imus

It has come as a surprise to many people to learn that racial provocateurs Al Sharpton and Jesse Jackson, who have been in the forefront of criticizing Don Imus, have their own radio programs. But here’s an interesting twist: Jesse Jackson’s radio program is syndicated around the country in more than 40 markets by Premier Radio Networks, which brings Rush Limbaugh to hundreds of radio stations. Premier, which also serves as the authorized advertising sales representative for the Sharpton radio show, is a subsidiary of Clear Channel Communications, often criticized by the “progressive” left for being too conservative.

Consider the irony. Jackson, a prominent member of the “media reform” movement that wants to bring back the Fairness Doctrine, frequently complains about “progressives” not getting enough access to the media. But his show is part of the Big Media!

If you are starting to get the idea that the get-Imus campaign is really designed to get Jackson and Sharpton more face time in the media (perhaps more stations for their own radio programs or even national television programs of their own), then you are catching on. It is a clever campaign initiated by Media Matters, the George Soros-funded group that boasts that it was the first to “post” Imus’ racist comments on its own Web site. It is apparent that the group fed the information to the “civil rights” community.

Sharpton and Jackson pounced on it. According to the Jackson radio program Web site, Sharpton has been a guest on Jackson’s show. But Sharpton has had his own share of provocative programs. The Sharpton radio program Web site says that he was granted special access to an interview that was conducted with O.J. Simpson by James T and Joy Ann on Syndication One’s Miami affiliate radio station WTPS. Syndication One, a joint venture of Radio One and Tom Joyner’s REACH Media, brings the Sharpton radio show into 21 media markets. Excerpts of the Simpson interview, in which he (once again) proclaimed his innocence, were aired on Sharpton's radio show.

Consider the situation. Sharpton airs excerpts of an interview with someone widely believed to have killed his wife and her friend (Simpson was acquitted in a criminal trial, but a civil court held him accountable for the murders). But that’s not controversial. Yet, when a shock jock makes racist and sexist comments about a college basketball team, Sharpton helps provoke a national firestorm and Imus is fired from MSNBC.

Imus’s first mistake was going on the Sharpton show without exposing the “Reverend” as the convicted liar

he is. The other problem is that Imus was working for wimps at GE and NBC News who decided to feed him to the wolves. Tim Russert, the senior vice president and Washington Bureau chief for NBC News, has been a frequent guest on the Imus program. But he was an invisible man during the recent controversy. He basically abandoned his friend of many years. Instead, the job of defending Imus was delegated to David Gregory, chief White House correspondent for NBC News, who did a bad job.

On MSNBC-TV on April 10, Gregory meekly tried to bring up Sharpton’s involvement in the Tawana Brawley hoax, in which a black woman falsely charged a group of white men with rape. In the case, the jury found Sharpton guilty of making seven defamatory statements about Steven Pagonis, a former prosecutor. Incredibly, Sharpton defended his conduct, saying he was making accusations against an individual, not a group, and that he still does not apologize for his involvement in the case. So Sharpton, in a case that is much more serious than that involving Imus, wouldn’t even go as far as Imus in apologizing for his statements and actions.

Here’s an edited transcript:

Gregory: But, in your case, as critics would point out, you didn't go as far as Imus in a controversy that had to do with you and the Tawana Brawley case, a woman who the court ...

Sharpton: Nor did I castigate a whole race of people.

Gregory: ... You didn't go as far as apologizing to the people who you hurt through that incident. This was, the courts have concluded, a hoax, accusations against whites by a young black woman about a race-based assault. A court ordered you to pay restitution for a defamation suit against people whose reputation you hurt. You didn't apologize for that.

Sharpton: And I still don't apologize. This was a case, as you said, of a young lady accusing people of doing something to her. To compare that to a man castigating a whole race — nobody came to him, like this young lady came to me. He was not talking about did he believe in a case ... This man [Imus] was talking about a race of people and a sex of people. There is absolutely no comparison. And, when the courts ruled against us, we paid that. That case happened 20 years ago. We're not talking about that.

Later, Sharpton added that “If I believed that young lady was telling the truth, as I do, what am I apologizing for? And how do you compare that to a man condemning a whole race? Did I go and condemn a whole race of people? Or did we say we believed this young lady’s

statement about an individual? I don’t how you even compare the two.”

At that point, the mild-mannered David Gregory let the matter pass.

Let’s understand what’s being said. Sharpton admits, in effect, that he was convicted of defamation in the Brawley case for making what the court found were false accusations. But Sharpton still believes the falsehoods! And this is the guy that Media Matters and the rest of the “media reform” movement want to police the public airwaves.

Not all liberals and left-wingers are happy about this. A posting on the “My Left Wing” Web site by someone named “nonpartisan” called Sharpton’s prominent role in the movement to fire Imus “the most hypocritical action ever from our side.”

Nonpartisan commented:

“Here’s a question for the moralists among us. Two guys, two ridiculously offensive statements. Guy One compares black female basketball players to ‘nappy-headed hoes’; Guy Two was convicted of defaming an assistant district attorney by claiming publicly and repeatedly (and falsely) that the man had raped a fifteen-year-old black girl.

“Which statement is the most offensive?

“Hard choice, isn’t it? Now what if I told you that Guy One is a shock jock by trade, whose job is to offend the sensibilities of his listeners (not, of course, to the extent that he did, but to a certain level), and that Guy Two is a respected community leader who has run for president? Now which one is the most offensive?

“Now what if I told you that Guy One has apologized loudly and repeatedly for his comments, while Guy Two has repeatedly refused to apologize even after he was convicted of defamation in civil court? Does that change anything in your view?”

The “My Left Wing” Web site went on to bemoan the elevation of Guy Two, the “odious” Al Sharpton, to the position of “the new Democratic obscenity cop.” He added, “If an unspeakable human being like Sharpton can take Don Imus to task on offensiveness, the inmates are apparently running the asylum.”

I thought that GE, the parent company of NBC News and MSNBC, would stick with Imus. I thought that his corporate connections to the top brass would save his job. I didn’t think they could be so intimidated by the likes of Al Sharpton and Jesse Jackson.

The “C” in NBC apparently stands for coward. Tim Russert in particular ought to be ashamed of himself for not standing by his longtime friend.

Large slate of candidates file for Owyhee offices

Four Republicans and one Democrat have filed for the Owyhee County Commission position in District One, and the present commissioner was not among them.

Ernie Bahem, who is the commissioner from that district – which runs from Oreana to Pleasant Valley – did not file a petition.

Four Republicans did file, and they are N. Barry Larsen, Richard Bass, Jerry D. Stanford, and John W. Jones. Filing for the Democratic ticket was Harold C. Biggs.

Donald L. Davis, incumbent, filed for re-election of Commissioner District Three of the Democratic ticket.

Republican candidate filing was Samuel Ward, also of Bruneau.

Three Republicans and one Democrat have filed for County Coroner. GOP candidates are incumbent David C. Campbell, Harold Craven, and Thomas L. Freitag. Robert F. Malmberg Jr., is the Democratic candidate.

Other county positions uncontested were filed by incumbents, all Republican. They include Barbara Jayo, clerk, auditor and recorder; Clayton Andersen, prosecuting attorney; Tom Brunzell, assessor, and Joan Bachman, treasurer.

Filing for precinct committeemen on the Republican ticket were:

Sandra Hinton, North Homedale; Martha J. Grimes, South Homedale; Eleanor Loucks, North Marsing; Robert K. Caldwell, South Marsing; William A Lowry, Pleasant Valley; Maxine Emerson, Wilson; Opal Ward, Grand View; Kenneth Tindall, Riddle.

No candidates filed for precinct committeemen on the Democratic ticket.

Vacancies that exist include the four Democratic party slots: county clerk, prosecuting attorney, treasurer, and assessor, and all eight precinct committeemen. Owyhee County Democratic Central Committee has ten days to submit names of candidates who then have 17 days to qualify.

If no nominations are made by the Central Committee, the vacancy cannot be filled, either for the primary or general election.

The primary election is May 25.

Memorials pay for ambulance equipment

The Homedale Volunteer Ambulance Service has acquired several pieces of equipment recently and has done so without the use of tax money.

The volunteer service operates under the auspices of the Homedale Fire Department and receives some tax money through the fire district levy. But that money has not been used to purchase this equipment, Blanche Johnson, one of the volunteers, said.

The equipment has been paid for through memorial fund contributions. Last Wednesday Mrs. Johnson gathered all the items together that had been paid for out of the donations to the memorial fund. The included:

KED, used during extraction to immobilize a patient with a possible cervical or spine injury;

Elder Valve, a sophisticated face mask connected to a portable oxygen bottle, used in aiding respiration during CPR and other emergency procedures; A child sized blood pressure cuff; A simple facemask used during mouth to mouth ventilations in resuscitation procedure; A winch, which has been installed on the ambulance to aid in extraction, especially with automobile accidents; A jump kit box, which holds most of the supplies needed to aid a patient away from the ambulance, including dressings, bandages, tape, scissors, blood pressure cuff, etc.

Homedale Ambulance Service crew members have made 34 runs during January, February and March of this year.

The volunteers also attend classes and sponsors other classes for the public, Johnson said. Classes attended since January include one on sudden infant death syndrome, hypothermia class, back country rescue, Owyhee County disaster plan, child abuse, management of the disruptive patient, and Canyon County Civil Defense.

140 years ago

April 13, 1867

THE RUSSIAN POSSESSIONS. The telegraph has informed the public of the purchase, by Uncle Samuel, of the Russian Possessions in North America, for the comparatively small sum of \$7,000,000. It is hinted that the complications undoubtedly pending in Europe has something to do with Russia's rather wanting to get rid of her American Provinces – that in case of war at home these far-off Possessions would be a source of weakness to her, and that by ceding them to the United States for a nominal price, the friendly relations proverbial between the two great Powers will further strengthened.

From contemporaneous speculations on the subject, we gather the following information concerning the character and value of the purchase afore-mentioned: Russian America is bounded on the north by the Arctic Ocean; east by British America; south by the Pacific Ocean and west by the Pacific and Artic Oceans and Bering's Straits – the latter being about thirty-six miles wide, half of which and the other waters adjoining included in the purchase. It – the land exclusive of the adjacent islands – numbers 516,345 square miles; altogether, has a population of 64,000 – about 6,000 of whom are Russians, Creoles and Islanders, and the remainder Esquimaux. The Capital and chief town generally is New Archangel, on Sitka Island: contains a resident population of 1,000 is the headquarters of the Russian Fur – constantly employing from fifty to sixty vessels, is an important military-post also. The purchase includes many islands – the Aleutian, Kodiak and King George Archipelagoes, and the Peninsula of Alaska. The coast is generally bold, presenting a succession of lofty volcanic peaks, two of which, on the west side of Cook's Inlet, have the respective hights of 11,270 and 12,066 feet. Within its boundaries is Mt. St. Elias, the highest mountain in North America – 17,066 feet. The climate is not so cold as generally believed, but too much so for agricultural purposes. Little is known of the interior, but the country along the Artic is flat while the west coast is very rough. Two large navigable rivers flow through it – one of which empties into the Polar Sea. The chief value of the country is its fur and fishing interests – both extensive and highly important.

BIGFOOT ALIVE YET. Pleasant Valley, April 5th, 1867

EDS. AVALANCHE: Some time ago it was reported that the notorious Indian depredator, known as Bigfoot, was killed. I am informed by Mr. Reid, a famous mountaineer, who is now with Gen'l Crook, that this Indian is known among his compatriots under the name of Oulux. Reid once had a hand-to-hand combat with him and says he is considerably more than six feet in height, of powerful build, and that his foot is fourteen inches.

After Gen'l Crook's battle on Tearass Plain, in January, some of the captured squaws said that Oulux was killed in the fight. Such could not have been true, as Mr. Geo. Hill and party, who followed the Indians that run off the stock in Jordan Valley some two weeks ago, in the neighborhood of the Owyhee Ferry, discovered the unmistakable mammoth foot-tracks which bore evidence of having been impressed by something more substantial than Bigfoot's ghost.

For three years he has been quite a terror to this country – rapid in his movements, striking where least expected, here, there and everywhere. But if he does not migrate to some other locality his career will, one of these days be at an end, as the whole community have vowed him vengeance and are watching him closely. ORDINANCE NO. 07-01
AN ORDINANCE MAKING IT AN INFRACTION TO PARK

AVEHICLE WHERE PARKING HAS BEEN PROHIBITED AND POSTED BY GOVERNMENT AUTHORITY, MAKING A REGISTERED OWNER OF AN UNATTENDEDUNLAWFULLY P A R K E D V E H I C L E RESPONSIBLE, DEFINING VEHICLE, SETTING THE PENALTY AT \$100.00 PLUS COSTS CONSISTENT WITH IDAHO INFRACTION RULES, AND EXEMPTING REGULAR L A W E N F O R C E M E N T ACTIONS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE OWYHEE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Purpose. The increasing number of vehicles used for recreation in Owyhee County has resulted in threats to health, safety and protection of private property. In order to prevent safety and health hazards which result from parking vehicles in roadway right of ways and on property where recreational activities take place, and in order to prevent damage to private property resulting from parking on such property without consent or blocking access by such parking, this ordinance is enacted.

Section 2. Unlawful Parking. It shall be unlawful to park a vehicle where parking has been prohibited and posted by county, federal or state authority. The registered owner of an unattended, unlawfully parked vehicle is responsible and may be cited.

Section 3. Definition of vehicle. The term vehicle as used in this ordinance means any device in, upon or by which any person or property may be transported.

Section 4. Violation an Infraction. Violation of this ordinance shall be an infraction, and shall be punishable by a fine of \$100.00 plus costs consistent with Idaho Infraction Rules.

Section 5. Law enforcement exemption. Law enforcement action in the regular course of law enforcement work is exempt from the terms of this ordinance.

Section 6. Effective Date. The effective date of this ordinance is the date of publication in the Owyhee Avalanche.

AN ORDINANCE MAKING IT AN INFRACTION TO DISOBEY A SIGN PLACED BY OWYHEE COUNTY REGARDING USE OF PUBLIC LAND, DEFINING PUBLIC LAND, SETTING A PENALTY OF \$100.00 PLUS COSTS CONSISTENT WITH IDAHO INFRACTION RULES, AND EXEMPTION REGULAR LAW ENFORCEMENT ACTIONS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF OWYHEE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Purpose. The increase of public usage of the public lands and adjoining private lands in Owyhee County as the population of the entire area grows threatens and causes damage to the land, and threatens and causes dangers which result in accidents and personal and property damage. This ordinance is designed to

assist law enforcement, and county, federal and state resource agencies in protecting the public land by properly signing where and how it can be used.

Section 2. Obey signs. All persons shall obey any sign placed by Owyhee County or any federal or state agency regarding the use of public land.

Section 3. Public land defined. The term public land as used in this ordinance means land managed by federal or state government.

Section 4. Infraction penalty. Violation of this ordinance shall be an infraction, and shall be punishable by a fine of \$100.00 plus costs consistent with Idaho Infraction Rules.

Section 5. Law Enforcement exemption. Law enforcement action in the regular course of law enforcement work is exempt from the terms of this ordinance.

Section 6. Effective date. The effective date of this Ordinance is the date of publication in the Owyhee Avalanche.

ORDINANCE NO. 07-03
AN ORDINANCE MAKING IT AN INFRACTION TO ENTER ON OR CROSS PUBLIC LAND IN A DISTURBING, OR DESTRUCTIVE WAY, SETTING A PENALTY OF \$100.00 PLUS COSTS CONSISTENT WITH IDAHO INFRACTION RULES, MAKING PERSONS VIOLATING THE ORDINANCE RESPONSIBLE FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT AND EMERGENCY COSTS AND EXEMPTION REGULAR LAW ENFORCEMENT ACTIONS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF OWYHEE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Purpose. The increasing number of people using the public lands for recreation, with said number increasing as the population of the entire area increases, causes damage to the public land when people bypass the designated recreation areas and strike off across country where recreation is not allowed. This causes damage to the public land, but it also creates a hazard to public safety and health because vehicles are operated in areas which are unsafe and people get lost and broken down in areas where rescue must be undertaken by law enforcement and emergency services of the county. This ordinance is designed to help prevent unlawful entry on to and across public land.

Section 2. Unlawful to enter or cross public land in a disturbing, harmful, damaging, or destructive way. No person shall enter upon or cross public land in a manner that is disturbing, harmful, damaging or destructive to public land.

Section 3. Infraction and penalty. Violation of this ordinance shall be an infraction, and shall be punishable by a fine of \$100.00 plus costs consistent with Idaho Infraction Rules.

Section 4. Owner and operator responsible for costs. The owner and operator of any vehicle which is operated or left unattended in violation of this ordinance shall be

jointly and severally responsible for all costs of law enforcement and emergency response, rescue, or retrieval efforts connected with this violation.

Section 5. Exemption of regular law enforcement. Law enforcement action in the regular course of law enforcement work is exempt from the terms of this ordinance.

Section 6. Effective date. The effective date of this ordinance is the date of publication in the Owyhee Avalanche.

ORDINANCE NO. 07-04
AN ORDINANCE MAKING IT AN INFRACTION TO PARK A VEHICLE ON PUBLIC LAND WHICH HAS BEEN RESTRICTED BY CLOSURE OR OTHER RESTRICTION PLACED BY THE MANAGER OF THE PUBLIC LAND, SETTING A PENALTY OF \$100.00 PLUS COSTS CONSISTENT WITH IDAHO INFRACTION RULES, AND MAKING A VIOLATER RESPONSIBLE FOR COSTS, AND EXEMPTION REGULAR L A W E N F O R C E M E N T ACTIONS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF OWYHEE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Purpose. The increasing number of persons using the public lands and adjoining private lands in Owyhee County have resulted in shortage of parking in signed areas and this has caused people to drive their vehicles on to public land that has been restricted by the land manager for purposes of safety, protection of the land and the environment, and protection of adjoining private land. This ordinance makes it possible to protect the public land, public health and safety, and private land by making it unlawful to park or operate a vehicle on restricted public land.

Section 2. Unlawful to operate in restricted areas. No person shall operate or park a vehicle on public land that is restricted by either permanent or temporary closure or where use has been restricted by trail designation or other travel restriction imposed by the manager of said public land. The registered owner of an unattended vehicle which is unlawfully on public land is responsible and may be cited.

Section 3. The term public land as used in this ordinance means land managed by federal or state government.

Section 4. Violation of this ordinance shall be an infraction, and shall be punishable by a fine of \$100.00 plus costs consistent with Idaho Infraction Rules.

Section 5. Liability for costs. The owner and operator of any vehicle which is operated or left unattended in violation of this ordinance shall be jointly and severally responsible for all costs of law enforcement and emergency response, rescue, or retrieval efforts connected with the violation.

Section 6. Exemption of regular law enforcement. Law enforcement action in the regular course of law enforcement work

is exempt from the terms of this ordinance.

Section 6. Effective date. The effective date of this Ordinance is the date of publication in the Owyhee Avalanche.

BE IT ORDAINED, BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HOMEDALE, COUNTY OF OWYHEE, STATE OF IDAHO:

Section 1: That the following described real property is adjacent to the City of Homedale, Idaho and the same is hereby annexed, pursuant to Idaho Code §50-222(3)(a) and Idaho Code §50-222(5)(a). That said property is shown on Map A attached hereto and identified on said map as the “Woods” property and by this reference made a part hereof. That said real property is more particularly described as follows:

Section 5: That the Clerk of the City of Homedale shall within ten (10) days following the effective date of the Ordinance, duly file a certified copy of this Ordinance with the Owyhee county auditor, the Owyhee county treasurer and the Idaho state tax commission. Further that the Clerk of the City of Homedale shall cause one (1) copy of the legal description and a map prepared in a draftsman like manner which shall plainly and clearly designate the boundaries of the City of Homedale as altered, to be recorded with the Owyhee county recorder and filed with the Owyhee county assessor and with the Idaho state tax commission within thirty (30) days following the effective date of this Ordinance, but no later than the tenth day of January of the year following the effective date of this Ordinance, all in

compliance with Idaho Code §50-223 and §63-215.

Section 6: Should the court having jurisdiction declare any part of this Ordinance invalid, unauthorized or unconstitutional or in conflict with any other part of this Ordinance, then such unconstitutional, unauthorized or invalid part shall be stricken from this Ordinance, and shall not affect any other part whatsoever of this Ordinance. The Mayor and City Council of the City of Homedale, Idaho, declare that it would have passed this Ordinance, and each part hereof, irrespective of parts declared invalid, unauthorized or unconstitutional.

ORDINANCE NO. 372**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HOMEDALE, OWYHEE COUNTY, IDAHO, AUTHORIZING AND PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF A PARITY LIEN WATER REVENUE BOND, SERIES 2007, IN THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$2,265,000, FOR THE PURPOSE OF FINANCING THE CONSTRUCTION AND INSTALLATION OF IMPROVEMENTS TO THE DOMESTIC WATER SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF HOMEDALE; DESCRIBING THE BOND; PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION AND DISPOSITION OF REVENUES; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON THE BOND; ESTABLISHING FUNDS AND ACCOUNTS; PROVIDING COVENANTS RELATING TO THE BOND; PROVIDING FOR THE SALE OF THE BOND TO THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA; PROVIDING FOR RELATED MATTERS; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

A summary of the principal provisions of Ordinance No. 372 of the City of Homedale, Owyhee County, Idaho, adopted on April 11, 2007, is as follows:

Section 1: Defines the terms and phrases used in the ordinance.

Section 2: Describes the water improvement project to be constructed with the proceeds of the Bond authorized by said Ordinance, and states that \$2,265,000 of the cost thereof is to be paid from the sale of the Bond of the City described in Section 3 and authorized at a special election held on May 23, 2006, and the balance of which is to be paid from grant funds and other legally available funds.

Section 3: Describes the City of Homedale Parity Lien Water Revenue Bond, Series 2007 (the “Bond”), and provides for the terms of payment and the maturity of the Bond.

Section 4: Provides for the manner and method of execution of the Bond.

Section 5: Provides for the place and manner of payment of the Bonds.

Section 6: Appoints the City Treasurer as Bond Registrar.

Section 7: Provides for the prepayment of the Bond.

Section 8: Provides for water rates and charges.

Section 9: Pledges the Net Revenues of the domestic water System for the payment of the Bond, on a parity of lien with the Series 1978 Bonds of the City.

Section 10: Establishes the “City of Homedale Water Project Capital Improvement Fund.”

Section 11: Establishes the “City of Homedale Water Revenue Fund.”

Section 12: Establishes the “City of Homedale Water Revenue Bond Fund.”

Section 13: Provides for a Debt Service Reserve Fund.

Section 14: Provides for the disposition of surplus funds.

Section 15: Establishes the conditions of the limitations on the issuance of additional bonds or other obligations.

Section 16: Provides for the investment of surplus funds.

Section 17: Provides certain general covenants of the City with the Registered owner of the Bond.

Section 18: Provides certain special covenants of the City with respect to the exclusion of interest on the Bond from income taxation.

Section 19: Provides for method of amending the ordinance and adopting supplemental ordinances.

Section 20: Recites that the Bond is issued pursuant to the Idaho Revenue Bond Act.

Section 21: Provides for remedies of the Registered owner of the Bond.

Section 22: States that the Ordinance constitutes a contract with the Registered Owner of the Bond.

Section 23: Provides for severability.

Section 24: Repeals prior inconsistent ordinances, to the extent of any inconsistency.

Section 25: Provides for issuance of bond anticipation notes or other interim financing obligations.

Section 26: Authorizes the Mayor, City Clerk, and City Treasurer to execute any additional documents necessary to sell and deliver the bond.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HOMEDALE, OWYHEE COUNTY, IDAHO, AUTHORIZING AND PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF A SEWER REVENUE BOND, SERIES 2007, IN THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$1,200,000, FOR THE PURPOSE OF FINANCING THE ACQUISITION, CONSTRUCTION AND INSTALLATION OF IMPROVEMENTS TO THE SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF HOMEDALE; DESCRIBING THE BOND; PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION AND DISPOSITION OF REVENUES; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON THE BOND; ESTABLISHING FUNDS AND ACCOUNTS; PROVIDING COVENANTS RELATING TO THE BOND; PROVIDING FOR THE SALE OF THE BOND TO THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA; PROVIDING FOR RELATED MATTERS; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

Section 13: Provides for a Debt Service Reserve Fund.

Section 14: Provides for the disposition of surplus funds.

Section 15: Establishes the conditions of the limitations on the issuance of additional bonds or other obligations.

Section 16: Provides for the investment of surplus funds.

Section 17: Provides certain general covenants of the City with the Registered owner of the Bond.

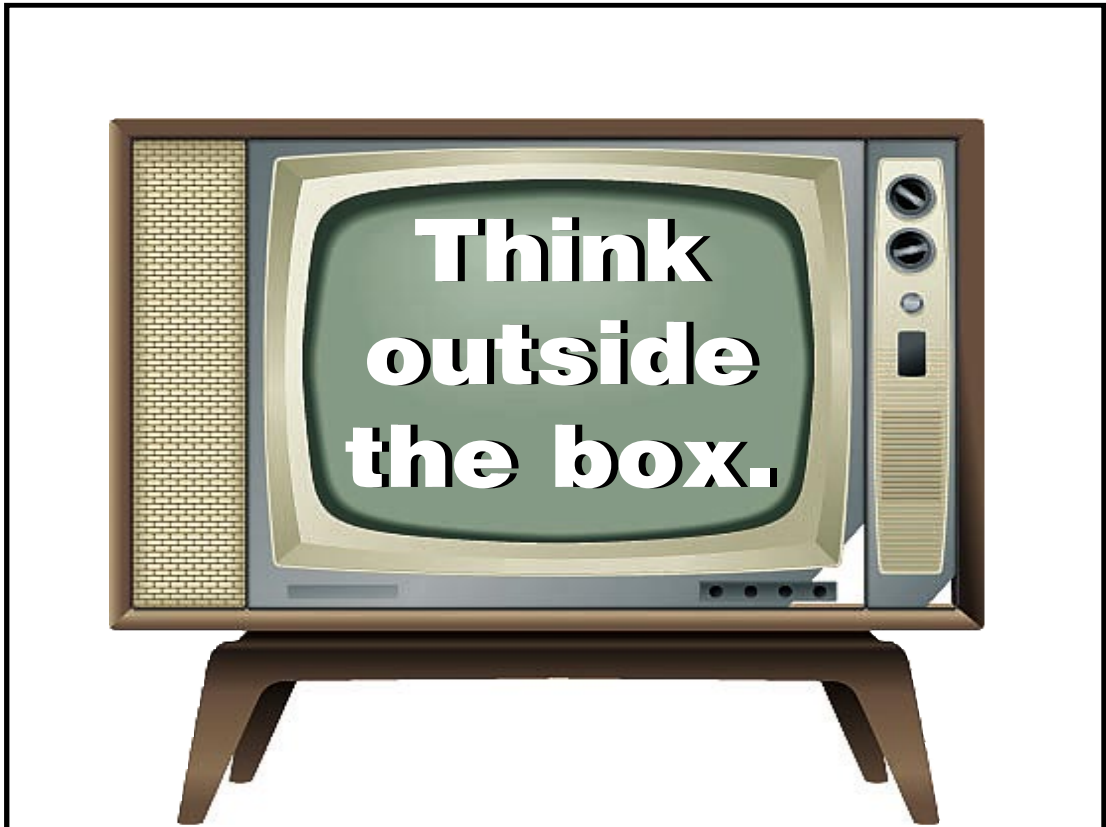

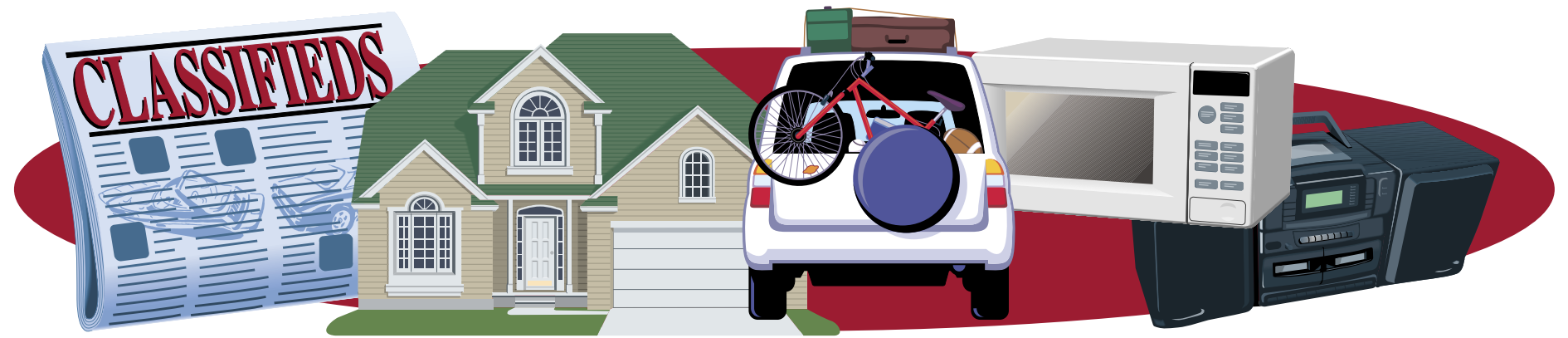
