

# TVCC athletes with county ties head to national rodeo in Wyoming

Cowboys and cowgirls hailing from Owyhee County will make the trek to Casper, Wyo., for the College National Finals Rodeo, which begins Sunday.

The rodeo runs through June 16 at the Casper Events Center.

Scott Roeser, 20, of Marsing placed third in the Northwest Region of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association (NIRA) in team roping with partner Brady Black, a 20-year-old Weiser resident who used to live in Homedale.

# F&G says fishing is free Saturday

Saturday has been set aside as Free Fishing Day in Idaho by the state Department of Fish and Game.

Any angler regardless of age or whether or not they are a resident or a non-resident of Idaho can fish without a license. All other rules, such as limits and tackle restrictions, remain in effect.

"Free fishing day provides a great opportunity for novices to give fishing a try and perhaps develop it into a lifelong pursuit," Fish and Game regional fish manager Jeff Dillon said. "Parents are encouraged to bring their children out for a day of fun fishing excitement."

Lack of fishing experience is no excuse. At special locations around the Fish and Game's Southwest Region, equipment will be available for use and fishing experts will be on hand to help novice anglers learn the ins and outs of fishing.

In addition, all these locations will be stocked with hatchery rainbow trout prior to the special day

No special events are planned in Owyhee County, although fishing at various spots in the county still is possible with a license Saturday.

Yellow perch numbers and sizes are outstanding. The same holds true for bluegill.

Yellow perch already have headed deep, and anglers should target depths of 15 to 30 feet in the main pool.

For bluegill, look for flooded brush and fish as tight to the brush as possible.

Crappie fishing has also been good, although most of the fish are in the 7- to 9-inch range, with a few larger fish coming in. The future for crappie fishing at CJ Strike looks bright indeed.

Marsing pond gets stocked

Personnel from the Department of Fish and Game's Nampa hatchery will be releasing more than 40,000 catchable-sized rainbow trout in southwest Idaho waters this month.

Marsing's Island Park pond will receive 500 trout sometime in June.

The number of trout actually released may be altered by weather, water conditions, equipment problems or schedule changes. If delays occur, trout will be stocked when conditions become favorable.

# Humane Society going to the dogs

How many of you think of the Humane Society of the United States as a benevolent benign group whose focus is to rescue, care for, and/or humanely dispose of the hundreds of thousands of unwanted dogs and cats? So did I. I have always looked at them with respect and lent my support. I am saddened to see their transformation into a radical animal rights group now aligned with PETA and the Farm Sanctuary.

They are, by far, the wealthiest non-profit animal rights group. In 2005, they dedicated \$11 million (9.2 percent of their budget) to "campaigns, legislation and litigation," and \$28 million to "regional and local programs." I have seen them in action in my state.

Why have they taken the activist approach? Money. They have so much, and greed is addictive. They display the mask of their kindly historical image as they continue to seek donations and invest their cash. But behind the puppy face, they appear to have a darker agenda — eliminating animal agriculture as we know it.

If they were truly concerned about improving the welfare of food animals, it would be logical to assume they might build their own hog farm or veal barn. They could spend some of their wealth and effort into trying to understand the complexity of producing food at a price affordable to the masses, and improve it if they could. Then, at least, they would have some credibility with the producers they are trying to put out of business.

But they are basically a big-money bully corporation. And it has become clear that they are not trying to improve modern animal agriculture, they are trying

In my discussions with representatives of the anti's, I have observed they have very little knowledge, much less experience, in the businesses and methods they are trying to destroy. I would be embarrassed for them if they were not so shamelessly righteous.

# Italy: The first culture shock

Our first exposure to things Italian comes at a highway rest stop between Innsbruck and Venice. It's a busy place because this is the main road from Germany to Italy and Eastern European points.

Inside the modern building we find two eating options. We can go through a buffet where every item has a price and you can easily spend 20 Euros (\$30). Or you can go to the sandwich shop where they have beverages and a variety of tasty-looking sandwiches. We decide to go the sandwich route.

In Italy, we can't just walk up to the counter and point out the sandwiches we want and pay for them. We have to decide what we want. Then we go over to the cashier and tell him (hoping we pronounce the name of the sandwich properly). We pay for the sandwiches, and the cashier gives us a receipt. We take the receipt back to the folks at the sandwich counter who try to give us different sandwiches than the ones we thought we ordered.

Our guide tells us there is a reason for this awkward procedure. Thievery is rampant in Italy — on the street and in the workplace. The only way to keep the money in the till is to only allow one person — the cashier handle the money.

Actually, my sandwich is very good. It is made with freshly baked bread. The ham is sliced paper thin and very salty, and it's all covered with a layer of the ever-present cheese, plus lettuce, tomatoes and onions. And it only costs 3 Euros.

Coffee is another matter. I order coffee and for 1.80 Euros, and I get a tiny cup with maybe an ounce of very dark, very strong, hot liquid in the bottom. You are supposed to throw it down in one gulp — like a shot of whiskey. I see a truck driver nearby who has five shots lined up on the counter and he tosses them down one after the other. He shouldn't have to worry about dozing off behind the wheel for at least 30 hours.


We learn if you ask for "espresso" you get about the same amount of coffee in a larger cup partially filled with whipped cream. The guide tells us that if we want our definition of coffee we should ask for "coffee American," which we learn doesn't compare to what you get back home at Starbucks or even at the bowling alley lunch counter. Real culture shock is hitting us for the first time.

Sara gets a bottle of water. Turns out to be some sort of seltzer. She gives it to me, and I discover I'm even thirstier after drinking it.

Downstairs we find the bathrooms. Although the building is modern, the facilities are similar to what we will encounter in most public places in Italy. They aren't very clean. The seats are missing off most of the toilets — maybe they never had seats. And when you come out you are supposed to tip the man or woman at the entrance who is supposedly taking care of the restroom. Gives me the same sort of feeling I get buying gas in Oregon.

Maybe it's because of the hustle and bustle of the highway, but our first pause in Italy has a different feel than previous stops. In Germany, nearly everyone we met had a smile, and most were patient, if not amused, with our primitive attempts to speak their language (by the time I learned to say "excuse me," we were out of the country). At the highway stop, smiles are scarce. Although we're on an international road, no one seems to understand anything but Italian and seem irritated by our attempts to communicate. But maybe I'm just prejudiced by my Anglo Saxon heritage. Heck, I don't even like spaghetti.

Our hunger and other physical needs at least partially satisfied, we climb back on the bus, and Raymond gets us rolling again toward one of the tour's premier stops — Venezia.

# Sending out an S.O.S. on fed spending

In 1906, the International Conference on Wireless Communications at Sea was held in Berlin, Germany. The purpose was to come up with a standardized distress call that would be used by all ships at sea, regardless of their country of origin or the wireless radio company they used.

The participants settled on the call "S.O.S. The letters didn't stand for "Save our ship," but rather, they were chosen because it was an easy message for operators to transmit in Morse code, and was nearly unmistakable.

Now, more than 100 years later, my colleagues in the Senate and I have come together to send another unmistakable message. The federal budget and American taxpayers are in trouble. We're sending out the S.O.S., and this time the letters do stand for something — the "Stop Overspending Act of 2007."

Why is S.O.S. necessary, and how will it fix the problem?

First, as you may know, the federal budget proposed by Congressional Democrats for 2008 fails to extend most of the tax relief measures approved by Congress and signed by President Bush in 2001 and 2003. The result will be an unbelievable tax hike totaling more than \$700 billion. In 1993, President Clinton and the Democrat-led Congress approved the largest tax hike in American history, but Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-Calif.) and Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-Nev.) are determined to outdo themselves. The tax hike they're pushing would be three times bigger than the 1993 tax hike.

As if that weren't bad enough, they also want to complete their favorite one-two punch to your wallet — tax and spend — by ratcheting up spending by \$400 billion over

the next five years.

The Stop Overspending Act would end this kind of fiscal recklessness by restoring sanity to the way Congress spends taxpayer dollars. S.O.S. would legally cap discretionary spending - the part of the federal budget that Congress controls through the yearly appropriations bills. This makes up roughly one-third of the annual federal budget. S.O.S. would gradually eliminate the yearly deficits by 2012.

The other two-thirds of the annual budget goes to mandatory spending - also known as entitlements — programs whose spending formulas are set and don't change from year

to year. Social Security and Medicare are entitlement programs. The costs of these two programs are about to swell into a tsunami that threatens to swamp taxpayers and the economy, as more and more Baby Boomers retire and become eligible to receive benefits. As much as we have heard about the looming crisis with Social Security, Medicare is in even worse shape.

# Freedom of Information Act Senator puts secret hold on bill to curb secrecy

Congress, apparently content to explore ever-new depths in public disapproval, is on the verge of having a single member derail the most meaningful reform in years of the federal Freedom of Information Act.

How, you ask, when overwhelming majorities support the legislation in both the House and Senate?

The secret hold, of course. Ever heard of the secret hold? It's a beauty — a real relic of the stuffed shirts of yesteryear, smoke-filled rooms and fat cats with stogies guffawing over the latest bamboozle of the taxpaying schmucks. Think country clubs, secret handshakes and bizarre rituals

Members of the Society of Professional Journalists, the nation's largest journalism-advocacy organization, used the power of the blogosphere to find out whose legislative bludgeon was buried in the back of open government. We called every senator, one by one, until at last — when it became clear he could hide no longer — Sen. Jon Kyl (R-Ariz.), came blinking and grimacing into the sunlight and admitted that it was he who placed a secret hold ... on a bill that addresses secrecy in government.

You can't make this stuff up.

This is how it works in Washington, kids: Sen. Kyl—this year's Secrecy Champion—has several as-yet-unstated objections to the Freedom of Information Reform Act, a truly wonderful bill that would significantly im-

prove one of the strongest tools Americans have to supervise the inner workings of government and to hold elected officials accountable.

The bill has plenty of bipartisan support. It is the product of tireless work and advocacy by many open government and press freedom groups and fine legislative craftsmanship by Senate Judiciary Committee members John Cornyn (R-Texas) and Sen. Patrick Leahy (D-Vt.). The U.S. House of Representatives in March approved a version of the bill with 80 Republicans joining 228 Democrats for a 308-117 vote.

The Senate Judiciary Committee then unanimously sent the measure forward to the full Senate for a vote.

In your civics book, this would be the moment where our senators hold a public debate on the merits and demerits of the legislation at hand, then vote. The votes are then counted, and if the senators who support the bill outnumber those who oppose it, well, you get the idea.

But no, not when senators, using an archaic parliamentarian parlor trick, can stop a bill dead in its tracks merely by telling their party's Senate leader or secretary that they wish to place a hold on the bill. That's when Sen. Kyl—who routinely charts a brave course on the immigration debate, and can often be counted on to reason rather than bloviate—slipped in the hold.

The practice of honoring secret holds has no basis in law and has no support in Senate rules. It's a good-ol'- boy creation and another of the seemingly endless perks of the Senate, where the rules always seem to benefit the representatives far more than the pesky public.

Oh, I know what's coming: the inevitable blathering about the world's greatest deliberative body and its need for timeless soul-searching and "candor" and how terribly hard legislating can be. We'll hear all about collegiality and efficiency and the grand traditions that make the Senate "special."

Spare me. Tear down the whole argument in favor of secret holds, and it comes down to cowardice: it allows a senator to cower behind anonymity while signaling their dislike for a piece of legislation. More to the point, it takes what would be a single losing vote on the floor of the Senate and converts it, magically, into stoppage of legislation.

That's awesome power with absolutely no accountability

Sen. Charles Grassley (R-Iowa), who discloses his holds as a matter of practice, introduced an amendment in 2006 to force all senators to identify themselves when placing a hold on a bill. That proposal has gone nowhere fast.

Are you surprised?

The entire federal budget for Fiscal Year 2007 was about \$2.7 trillion. Without the reforms outlined in S.O.S., costs for Social Security over the next 75 years will balloon to \$4.7 trillion alone. Medicare costs will reach an unimaginable \$33.9 trillion. If an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, then clearly, we must act now

to head off these truly massive costs. We can't stick our children and grandchildren with these kinds of bills.

S.O.S. also would create a commission to review federal programs and make recommendations to Congress on ones that are inefficient, ineffective or no longer needed.

Cutting the fat from federal programs now and then will help. But we can all agree that it's better, in the long run, to consistently restrain and moderate spending through aggressive oversight.

When looking at the numbers in the federal budget, it doesn't take long to get the unmistakable message. When Congress overspends, it's taxpayers who are in trouble. I'm sending out an S.O.S.

### Nuclear plant developer not obligated to provide cheap energy

Bruneau has been targeted by Virginia businessman Don Gillespie for a private nuclear power gamble. Are you ready to risk a Chernobyl-type nuclear disaster to heat Hollywood hot tubs? Why give our enemies a devastating nuclear target, when Idaho has enough clean geothermal and wind power to double our present electric consumption?

I attended the Bruneau "Open House," where Gillespie promised, often, to sell cheap power to Idaho. That's not what Don says when selling stocks. Don emphasizes the free market profit to stockholders, and brags he can supply the West Coast market. Anybody remember the rolling blackouts in California when prices went sky high? Why does Don promise Idaho low prices, and stockholders high profits, if he is as honest as he portrays himself? Idaho Power remains (lamely) regulated, but Don knows as a private company, he has no obligation to sell to Idaho Power or obey PUCO rates. Their stockholders will sell to the highest bidder, like California. who won't allow this nuclear disaster

to be built in their state. Deregulation means Idaho will have to outbid California before IDACORP can take their profit, before selling it to their sister company Idaho Power.


Idaho could double its present electric consumption with viable wind power, according to Idaho Department of Water Resources engineer Gerald Fleischmann.

For the whole country's geothermal power, The Energy and Geosciences Institute of the University of Utah says geothermal can provide "five times the total U.S. electrical production in 1990."

### Cy Radcliffe leaves for 5-month tour of Europe & Asia

Cy Radcliffe, former owner of the Homedale Tractor and Equipment Company, left Sunday from Boise to fly to Washington, D. C., for conferences with the state department before beginning a five-month tour of the Iron Curtain countries of Europe.

The purpose of the round-the-world trip is to gather material for a lecture concerning the economic and political affairs of the world.

His journey will include visits to 25 foreign countries including six Russian satellites, Arab and Jewish countries, seven countries in Southeast Asia, Japan and Hawaii.

### 140 years ago

### **June 1, 1867**

FOR IDAHO. John O'Neal will load twenty-two teams (says the Chico, May 10<sup>th</sup>) for Idaho in a few weeks. One hundred and fifty-five thousand pounds of Government freight has been contracted for, to be delivered to different posts. Several other parties are preparing to load teams for the mines east of Chico, extending to Idaho, which will make freighting very lively the coming season.

DIED. In Silver City, last night at 10 o'clock, Mr. Dowdle, the man who was shot by Casper Haupt, in a fracas, last Sunday. Mr. Haupt, who was severely wounded in the groin by Dowdle, at the time, is still in a very precarious condition. Gold Hill (Nev.) News, May 17.

The subject of this obituary was undoubtedly John Dowdle, well-known in Owyhee for a year or two as a blustering, dissipated character – always more or less in trouble. He went from here to Montana in '66 and since returned to the land of Washoe zephyrs, from whence he has made another journey as above stated. He was a native of Canada and about 30 years old.

TAX DECISION – GREENBACKS A LEGAL TENDER FOR TERRITORIAL AND COUNTY TAXES. Judge Cummins has rendered a decision (published in Statesman May 28th) in the case of the Assess or of Ada County vs. Misener & Lamkin, that settles the question of taking Legal Tender notes at their face in payment of taxes. The Assess or demanded of defendants the payment of their taxes in gold or silver coin or its equivalent in greenbacks at two per cent above San Francisco quotations, or in gold dust in accordance with a law passed by the last Legislature. The Judge decides that permanent improvements on lands belonging to the United States or to the Territory or County are real estate within the meaning of the statutes in relation to taxes and that, the defendant being possessed of such real estate, the plaintiff had no right to demand payment, but that the collection belonged to the Tax-Collector at the proper time, and that if plaintiff had any right to collect taxes from defendants he should have received the Legal Tenders at par when offered in payment. The Judge reviews the decisions of the California and Nevada Courts, concurring fully with the able decision of the late Judge Brosnan of Nevada, and repudiates the doctrine of the California Court that taxes are not a debt within the meaning of the Act of 1862 making greenbacks "a legal tender for all debts public and private." He says the Legislature has just as much right to designate the denomination of coin or notes in which debts shall be paid as to discriminate between the legal representations of values as established by Congress; or in other words, that in contemplation of law, a dollar is a dollar whether is be metal or paper, and that neither Territorial Legislatures nor Courts have any right to place a higher valuation upon the one than the other. We presume if the case is carried to the Supreme Court the decision will be the same, and this may be considered as expressive of the views of the Court on the Specific Contract Act, and the same as conclusive on the tax question.

COURT ROOM. An apartment for the coming session of the District Court is fitting up on Jordan Street – opposite A. J. Stucker's Wagon Shop. We hear that two or three saloons are likely to be opened in that vicinity to aid in a more free dispensation justice. Nothing like having aids near about.

In accordance with the petition of the Owyhee Attorneys, the opening of Court has been postponed until June 10<sup>th</sup> – one week from next Monday. Jurors and witnesses can rely on this, and their attendance deferred accordingly.
