## Girls push Grizzlies to brink

Turnovers in 2nd OT cuts Homedale comeback short at home

Homedale High School's girls basketball team showed its fire on Jan. 8, climbing out of an eight-point hole to force conference-leading Fruitland into double overtime before losing.

The Grizzlies remained unbeaten by pulling out a 56-52 victory on the Trojans' floor.

"I was very happy with our hustle and effort in this game," first-year Homedale coach Jeremy Chamberlain said. "We got after a lot of loose balls and forced Fruitland to turn the ball over more than they usually do."

Junior Kendall Rupp drained two free throws with four seconds left in regulation to force the first overtime. Homedale built a three-point lead in the second OT, but Fruitland capitalized on a couple turnovers to eke out the win.

Homedale (7-8 overall, 2-2 3A SRV at week's end) chipped away at Fruitland's eight-point third-quarter lead. Rupp finished with 15 points and seven assists. She

connected on six of eight field-goal attempts, and Homedale shot 52.3 percent (23-for-44) for the game.

Mikal Mackenzie added 13 points for the Trojans, and she grabbed five of her seven rebounds on Fruitland's end of the court. Homedale out-boarded the Grizzlies, 33-27, overall and 23-14 on Fruitland's glass.

"Mikal Mackenzie and Kendall Rupp played very well, leading the way on the offensive end," Chamberlain said. "We also played great team defense, not giving Fruitland any open looks."

"Both teams worked for everything they got."

Fruitland nailed 13 of 18 free throws. Homedale was 4-for-12 from the charity stripe.

The Grizzlies wouldn't stay unbeaten for much longer. Weiser ended the 3A Snake River Valley conference front-runner's perfect string with a 40-33 victory Thursday.

## Owyhee nips Rimrock in clash of titans

Two of the top 1A girls basketball teams in the region hooked up last week south of the border.

Holly Thomas scored all six of Owyhee High School's points in the extra period Jan. 7 as the hosts knocked off top-ranked Idaho team Rimrock, 49-47, in a non-conference heavyweight matchup in Nevada.

Owyhee (10-3 overall after the game) is the defending Nevada 1A state champion, while the Raiders (11-2 through Sunday) are the top 1A team in a poll of Idaho's media.

Rimrock cut into an 11-point halftime deficit with a dominating third quarter. Shelby Chandler hit one of her 3-point goals and scored five of her team-high 15 points during the Raiders' 13-4 run.

Shoni Gennette took over for Rimrock in the fourth quarter, scoring seven of her 11 points as the Raiders forced the overtime.

Chandler and Jackie Thurman scored baskets in the overtime, but Thomas was one bucket better to lead the Braves.

## Ensley rolls to MV title

Trojans grab sixth at two-day event

Homedale High School freshman Justin Ensley's stock could be rising after an unbeaten weekend of wrestling at the Magic Valley Classic.

The younger brother of four-time state champion Jeremy Ensley, Justin collected his third tournament championship of the season and pinned 2007 state runner-up Dusty Lish to win the 112-pound championship at the Magic Valley Classic on Saturday in Wendell.

"Ensley looked great," Trojans coach Toby Johnson said after the ninth-grader went 4-0 during the two-day tournament.

The Trojans put two athletes in championship matches and rolled up 132 points to finish sixth in the team standings. Twenty-one schools attended the tournament, with second-place Parma the only Treasure Valley school to finish higher than Homedale.

Kevin Mercado also reached the championship round at 160 pounds, settling for second place.

## Local novices leave mark in Marsing

Duals offer less-experienced wrestlers valuable experience

The junior varsity team from Vallivue High School won the Marsing Duals wrestling meet on Saturday.

The 5A Falcons went 4-0 in dual matches against varsity squads from 2A Marsing and Oregon 1A Adrian, and 3A Homedale and 4A Nampa JV teams to take the trophy. Homedale, Marsing, and Nampa all were 2-2, while Adrian went 0-4.

Marsing coach Rick Folwell said that the meet was more about wrestlers getting experience than it was about individual victories or team wins or losses.

"The purpose of this isn't winning it. We could buy our own trophy if that's what we wanted," Folwell said. "The purpose is to get as many

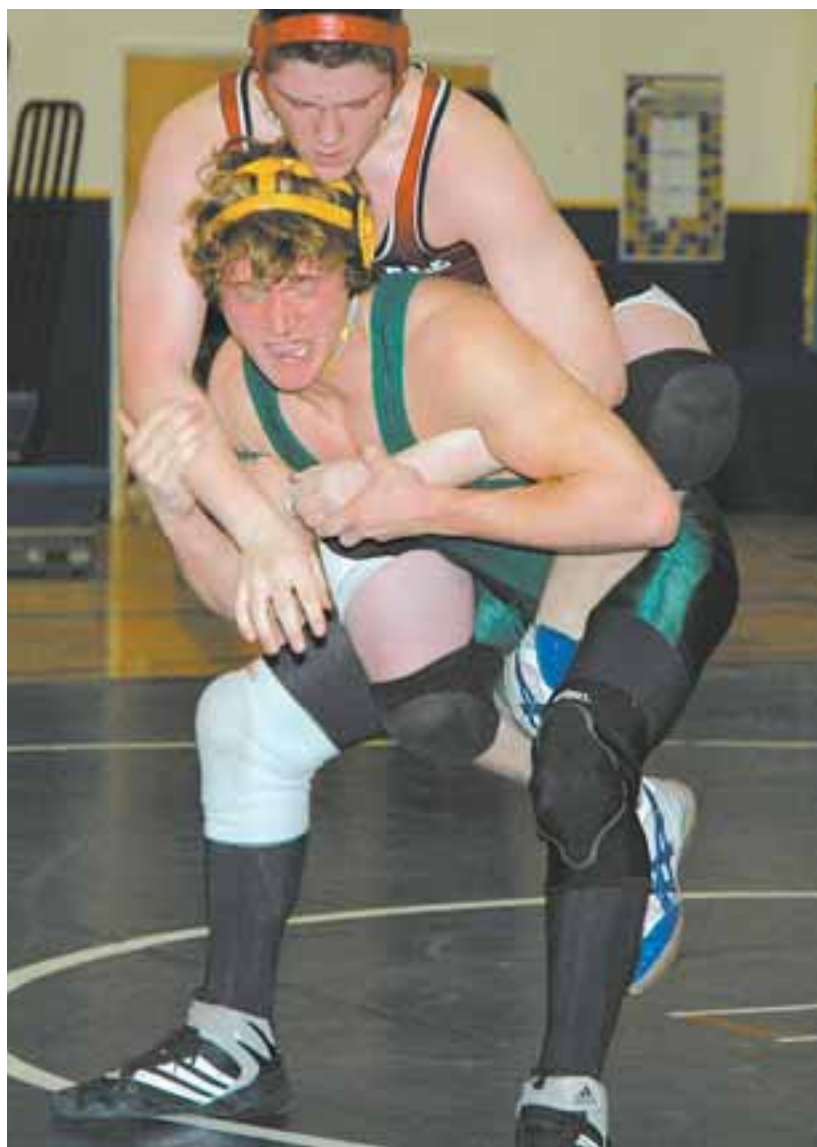
matches as you can so the kids get experience, and those kids from Vallivue and Nampa, those JV kids are good competition for our young kids. They push them."

"A lot of our kids lost their matches, but it's a little bit higher level than what they're used to, which is what they need."

Some of the less experienced wrestlers had success at the meet. Homedale's Kenny Cockrum at 103 pounds, Theron Perkins at 135, and Mario Gaeta at 285 all earned their first high school wins on the mat.

"That's important, especially if you're new to the sport," Homedale coach Toby John-

Trojans JV streak at 12

Homedale beats Fruitland at home in SRV opener

The Homedale High School junior varsity boys basketball team has started the season with 12 consecutive victories, including Saturday's win in the Trojans' 3A Snake River Valley conference opener against Fruitland.

Three players scored 16 points apiece as Homedale ran away from Fruitland, 65-57, at home.

Justin Harrel scored 16 points and snatched 11 rebounds, and Alex Mereness had 16 points and eight boards.

First-year JV coach Mark Shafer pointed out that the Fruitland frontcourt was larger than its Homedale counterparts.

Ryan Ryska also scored 16 points against the Grizzlies, while Reece Landa and Mitch Quintana both nailed 3-pointers to stop Fruitland runs.

Landa and Quintana scored

eight points each.

Shafer said contributions from several players has been a key to the Trojans' 12-0 start.

"So far this season we have had some pretty good balance," Shafer said.

Justin Harrel, Ryan Ryska and Alex Mereness are the Trojans' leading scorers, while Mereness and Harrel pace Homedale's rebounding efforts.

"We have had great contributions off the bench from Tyler Ford, Jose Gonzales, and Drew Farwell," Shafer said.

The coach said that the team's

road to 12 wins has been full of twists and turns lately.

"Our season, obviously, has gone pretty well," Shafer said. "... However, we have had some nail biters the last four or five games."

The Trojans opened the week Jan. 7 with a 46-43 non-conference victory over visiting Cole Valley Christian.

Mereness scored 15 points and snagged eight rebounds in the effort.

Harrel added 15 points and 10 rebounds, while Ryska tossed 10 points.

Marsing boys get slow start on new year in WIC

The Marsing High School boys basketball team went into a two-week break on a high note, handing the Jordan Valley Mustangs just their second loss of the season at the Husky Classic.

New Plymouth ended the Huskies' reverie with a 74-41 jolt in a 2A Western Idaho Conference game Thursday.

"We didn't play as a team," Huskies

coach Jake Walgamott said. "We may have had too long of a break after the Jordan Valley game and forgot how we played in that game. We didn't have the poise that we showed against Jordan Valley."

Jose Paramo scored nine points to lead the Marsing effort.

The Pilgrims lead 28-20 at halftime after shooting 55.6 percent (15-for-27) from the

floor in the first half.

Wes Hooten hit seven of 10 shots and finished with a game-high 19 points for New Plymouth.

The Huskies bounced back after the wake-up call and played a better game in a 34-31 2A WIC loss at Parma on Saturday.

Parma gained the edge with a 13-8 run through the second quarter, and both teams

combined for just seven points in the first eight minutes of the second half.

Taylor Nielsen chimed in with 16 points and 10 rebounds for the Huskies.

The Panthers had a balanced attack led by nine points from Bryant Timmons.

The Huskies hosted Melba on Tuesday, with results not available at press time, and next travel to Nampa Christian on Friday.

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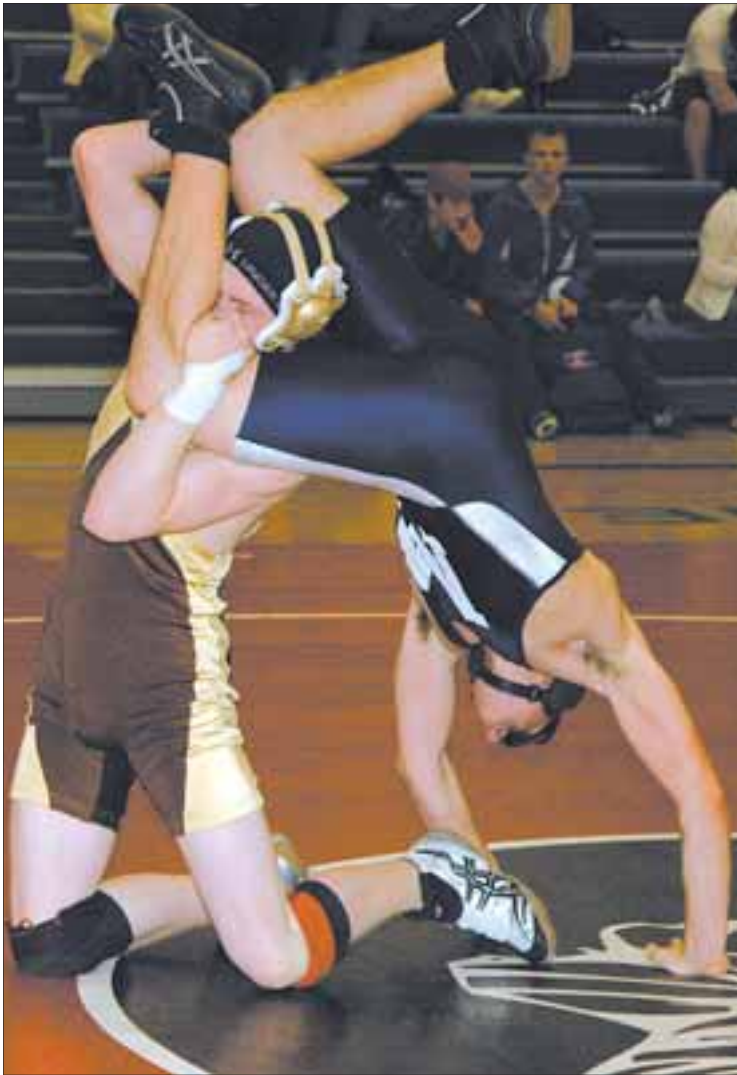

## Marsing girls oh-so-close against Cole Valley

Marsing High School hosted a close 2A Western Idaho Conference girls basketball game against Cole Valley Christian on Jan. 8. The Huskies led for a good portion of the contest before falling, 39-37.

Marsing then visited New Plymouth on Friday and were pounded by the Pilgrims, 57-22.

New Plymouth is 12-4 overall and second to Parma in the WIC at 5-1.

Huskies coach Don Heller said that his team got off to a great start against Cole Valley.

“We should have been up by 20 at the half,” Heller said. “We were really beating

them with our press.”

Heller said that the Huskies (1-15 overall, 0-6 2A WIC at week’s end) again failed to make free throws and high-percentage shots, keeping the Chargers (3-7, 1-4) in the game. Another reason Marsing didn’t pull away was fatigue, as Jessica Freeman, who logs a lot of minutes for the Huskies, missed game with an illness.

In contrast to most games this season, the Huskies were able to break down their opponents’ zone defense.

“We were running our zone offense real well, and we ran our early fast-break offense really well,” Heller said. “Our

guards were hitting like crazy. Kim (Garza) had 11 points. She had two 3s, hit a couple shots outside. She had a good night. She played well.”

The Huskies had a 10-point lead with just over two minutes remaining in the third quarter, when the Chargers called timeout. Heller said that after the timeout, the Chargers switched their defense. The change put his team off-stride, allowing Cole Valley to come back.

“We just couldn’t get anything going, and I called the press off for a while, because we were getting tired, and they came back and tied. It was tied going into the fourth,”

the coach said.

The Huskies fell behind in the fourth quarter, and then made a comeback of their own, with two chances to tie in the last 10 seconds, but the ball wouldn’t go down. Still, Heller took some positive out of the game.

“There is a lot of good when you lose a game by two points missing 17 free throws,” Heller said. “Two different people make one free throw, and we go to overtime.

“We keep battling. We did everything we needed to win the game except make the shots and the free throws.”

## Grizzlies maul Trojans in 3rd

Stymied by a fierce defense in the third quarter, Homedale High School’s boys basketball team managed just two points Saturday and fell 68-48 to Fruitland in the Trojans’ conference opener.

The Grizzlies (11-3 overall, 2-0 3A Snake River Valley conference through Monday) erased a two-point halftime deficit with an 18-2 run through the third quarter to take control.

Homedale (8-4, 0-1 through Monday) owned an early 7-2 lead with a fast start fueled by turnovers and a crisp transition game.

Mitch Quintana fired a fantastic interior pass to Austin Emry and then muscled his way in for a running layup within the first two minutes of the second quarter to stake Homedale to a 15-9 lead.

But after Zach Tolmie capped a short 6-2 run and gave Homedale a 23-19 advantage with a tough layup, Fruitland clawed back.

Austin Emry finished with 14 points and six rebounds for the Trojans. Tyler Gibson scored 10 points and grabbed 11 rebounds.

A cold-shooting night sent Jordan Valley High School to its second league loss and helped Crane retain its share of the lead in the High Desert League boys basketball standings Friday.

Dallen Davies was perfect from the foul line and nailed five 3-point goals to lead all scorers with 25 points as Crane routed Jordan Valley 77-54 in Harney County.

In Saturday’s junior varsity action, Crane handed Jordan Valley a 58-50 defeat. It was the first league loss of the season for Jordan Valley.

Homedale frosh boys nearly perfect as conference starts

The Homedale High School freshman boys basketball team head into next week’s non-conference finale against Nampa Christian on a pretty good roll.

Coached by Dave Thompson, the Trojans have won 10 of 11 games against non-league opponents.

The only loss in the non-conference season was a five-point setback to host Melba on Dec. 8, but the Trojans rebounded to beat the Mustangs by 23 points 10 days later.

Homedale has swept its season series against Marsing, New Plymouth, Parma and Cole Valley Christian. And the Trojans hit the road to knock off Nampa Christian. The two teams of Trojans will face off against on Monday in Homedale.

“I am very pleased with the team’s development,” Thompson said. “We are scoring 56.7 points per game while allowing only 31.2, and the differential is because of the effort the kids put in on the defensive end of the floor.”

Kenny Esparza leads the team with per-game averages of 13.2 points, six rebounds, 1.5 assists, three steals and 1.5 blocked shots. His season high is 26 points from a Dec. 11 victory over New Plymouth.

“Our numbers show that the kids rebound well, maintain a 43.9 shooting percentage on 2s and 21.5 on 3-pointers,” Thompson said. “We average only seven turnovers per game while we get almost 12 steals per contest.”

Trevor Gibson has logged three double-doubles this season. He averages 5.6 points and nearly 10 rebounds per game. He has a team-high single-game effort of 15 rebounds in one of the Trojans’ victory over Cole Valley Christian.

Mario Gonzalez is shooting almost 57 percent from the floor

and is averaging eight points and nearly five rebounds per game.

Walter Almaraz, who was one of the leading scorers for the Homedale Middle School eighth-graders last season, scored 17 points against New Plymouth on Dec. 11. He’s averaging almost 10 points a game.

Thompson said Colin Lootens has emerged as the team’s defensive specialist.

“There have been several occasions when I’ve asked Colin to guard an opposing player that has been making some shots, and he has stepped up for us,” Thompson said.

Tanner Lair scored seven points and grabbed eight rebounds in a victory over Parma.

“Tanner has been a pleasure to coach,” Thompson said. “He is like a sponge and absorbs everything and tries to put it to use.”

Thompson also credited Jonny Stacey Manuel Castilleja and Sergio Renteria with big contributions and playing “significant” minutes off the bench. The coach said while the reserves may not score a bucketload of points, they make great contributions through “defense, rebounding and hustle.”

The Homedale freshmen opened the 3A Snake River Valley conference season Saturday at home against Fruitland. Results of that game weren’t immediately available.

“I hope we are prepared for league,” Thompson said. “The kids get more physical each outing and are working together as a team.

“The teams in this league are tough. They have good programs, and this group has competed well against their counterparts at the junior high level, so they should be ready for the challenge.”

- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 teaspoon minced garlic
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 package (16 ounces) Johnsonville All Natural Ground Italian Sausage

Cook/Prep: 20 minutes Bake: 15 minutes

#### Davis re-elected chairman

Owyhee County Commissioner Don Davis was re-elected chairman of the board of commissioners last Monday during reorganization of the board. Davis, who has served 16 years as a commissioner, was re-elected to serve another term last November by defeating Sam Ward in District Three.

#### Claude Dallas sentenced to 30 years

A crime that was committed in Owyhee County two years ago has landed a 32-year-old Nevada man in the Idaho State Penitentiary on a 30-year sentence. Claude L. Dallas, accused of killing Idaho Fish and Game officers Bill Pogue and Conley Elms, was handed the sentence by Judge Edward Lodge last Tuesday in Caldwell. Dallas could be eligible for parole in ten years, however. Lodge sentenced Dallas to three consecutive 10-year prison terms — one for the killing of Pogue, a second for the killing of Elms and a third for using a firearm in the commission of both crimes. Dallas received an additional six-month term for a misdemeanor charge of concealing evidence. He will receive about 210 days of credit for time he served at the Canyon County jail before his conviction. The sentence came nearly two years to the day after Dallas shot game officers Conley Elms and Bill Pogue in a dispute at Bull Camp, Dallas’ remote Owyhee County trapping site on Jan. 5, 1981. Dallas’ attorney, Michael Donnelly plans to appeal the case, but said Tuesday evening he was unsure whether he would appeal the jury verdict, the sentence or both. Donnelly had asked Lodge to place Dallas on probation.

#### Chad Gibson is new agent

Chad Gibson, Owyhee County’s new Cooperative Extension Agent, has been becoming oriented into his new office and territory following his transfer the first of the year from Adams County. Gibson, who was raised on a cattle ranch around Crane Creek, Idaho, graduated from the University of Nevada. His first job was that of Extension Agent at the Duck Valley Indian Reservation, working out of the Elko, Nevada, office. He was then transferred to Adams County and held that position for 14 years. ## 140 years ago

### January 11, 1868

RAILROAD CONVENTION. We take from the Statesman of the 7<sup>th</sup> the following proceedings of the railroad Convention held at Boise City on the 6<sup>th</sup> inst.: The delegates to the convention called to consider the subject of memorializing Congress in favor of the Idaho and Oregon Branch of the Pacific railroad, and to take such other steps as may best secure the building of the road, met at the court house in this city to-day at 11 o’clock. S. A. Merritt of Boise county called the meeting to order, and Hon. John R. McBride of Boise county was chosen temporary chairman, and Jas. S. Reynolds of Ada county temporary Secretary. Mr. Henley of Boise county moved a committee of five upon a permanent organization, which was carried, and a chair appointed Messrs. Henley and Merritt of Boise; Alvord of Idaho; Crane of Owyhee; and A. G. Brown of Alturas. On motion of Judge Cummins the chair appointed one from each county a committee on credentials as follows: Messrs. Cummins of Ada, Foot of Boise, Brown of Owyhee, Jacobs of Ada, Ranney of Alturas, Kelly of Nez Perses, and Alvord of Idaho. Gen. Cartee moved that when the convention adjourn, it adjourn to meet to-morrow at 11 o’clock, am, which was carried, and the convention then adjourned. John R. McBride, Ch’n. Jas. S. Reynolds, Sec’y.

THE WEATHER. The storm is over, and we have bright lovely weather once more, a bracing atmosphere, clear and cold, causes one’s blood to circulate briskly. Fahrenheit’s thermometer, during the day, ranges at from 20° to 30° above zero, and falls as low as 10° below at night. The snow is about twenty inches deep on the level.

ALMOST A FIRE. On last Tuesday morning, about nine o’clock, huge puffs of smoke and jets of flame were seen to issue from the roof of Col. Webb’s dwelling. Immediately was raised the alarming cry of “fire!” A frightened community rushed to the scene, and by a lively application of water and snow soon succeeded in extinguishing the flames. It was found to have originated in the roof, in consequence of the hole through which the stove pipe passed not being large enough. Carpenters and people generally are much to blame for carelessness in such matters — criminal carelessness, we may say, which endangers the safety of the whole town. The wood round a stove-pipe should not be any nearer than at least three inches — nearer than which a red-hot stove-pipe will ignite dry, pitchy, fir lumber. Be careful, neighbors, we don’t like the idea of being turned out of doors this time of the year.

WINDY. A week ago last night there raged over our mountains the most terrific storm of wind and snow combined that has ever been the lot of the “oldest inhabitant” to experience. The miners at the Poorman, which is situated near the summit of War Eagle, went to the boarding house for supper and were compelled to remain all night, being unable to make their way to the sleeping rooms, about one hundred and fifty or two hundred yards distant — so great was the violence of the storm.

BALL. The Silver City Brass Band are preparing to give a grand ball on the evening of February 22d. This as every one knows is the anniversary of Washington’s birth. We hope to see a large turn out. Give the Band a benefit.

## On the edge of common sense



### Squeeze chute injuries

Early in my veterinary career, I developed a respect for the machinery used to restrain large beasts. No, I'm not thinking of ropes, twitches or even classical music in the dairy barn, although at one time or another I have used them all.

In particular I am thinking of the devil's playtoy — the squeeze chute. All of us who own them know down deep that we are teasing a tiger.

I would estimate in my lifetime of working cows, not including the uncountable number of feedlot opportunities, I have been hands-on, within striking distance of the "Jaws of the Devil" over 100,000 times. The fact that I am not personally disabled is due primarily to reliable equipment, fast hands, hard hats and good help.

One fall I headed up to Grouse Creek for four days of fall works. They had a brand new green Powder River squeeze chute. Often, as the vet, I would drop a side bar and lean in behind the cow and palpate her for pregnancy. It was quicker, and since we had 2,200 cows to do, every bit helps.

But, the ranch manager had thoughtfully built a stopping gate between the squeeze chute and the approach alley. I would swing it across the narrow alley and be positioned directly behind the cow. At that point, one of the helpers would open the tailgate and I would reach in like a mother chimpanzee deftly plucking cockleburs from her baby's ear. It is significant to note that the tailgate on this particular model (now discontinued) split down the middle and opened to both sides like birds' wings.

Right before lunch, already 300 head under my belt, the tailgate operator and I were moving like two acrobats coordinated in ballet-like precision: open-plunge-retract-close, open-plunge-retract-close, when suddenly someone stepped on my tutu! The two scissor-like gates smashed together precisely as my right hand presented itself like it was shaking hands with the cow's escutcheon! The plastic sleeve was little help. Within an hour my hand was the size of my foot. Thank goodness I only had 1,900 head left to do!

So when Garret told me about his Uncle Chris climbing down behind his brand new hydraulic squeeze chute to push in a stubborn calf, my right hand began to throb. Just as he shoved in the critter, his arms still extended, Aunt Barb hit the lever. Anyone who has used hydraulic chutes understands that they require some finesse. It is a developed skill. Aunt Barb pushed it like she was slamming a door!

The pictures they took were too gruesome to describe here, but I'm hoping with some crazy glue and hog rings they'll be able to make his ears look symmetrical again!

## Presidential records Congress tries to keep history accessible

The next time you're shopping in a bookstore, take a moment and do me a favor.

Ask for the section on presidential history, and go take a peek. I'll hazard a guess you'll find literally hundreds of works of presidential history, from the scholarly tomes with hundreds of footnotes to the downright silly works on presidential pets.

Now, take a moment and imagine it's 2033, and you're looking for a nice downloadable e-book history of the Clinton or Bush presidency.

What you find is truly disappointing: they look and feel like history, but sit down and read one for a moment, and the experience is wholly unsatisfying. Where is the background, the context provided by all of those once-classified memos detailing the West Wing intrigue that makes history truly come to life? Instead, we get the learned best guesses of the nation's finest historians working without their tools: the primary documents that make history, well, history.

Sounds like a nightmare, eh? It's reality, for the moment, and it will rob us of our nation's historical record unless We The People wake up and do something about it.

A bit of history we do know: In November 2001, just as the National Archives was preparing to release a small portion of the records of the Reagan administration, President George W. Bush issued Executive Order 13233. The order gives former presidents and their assignees the right to prevent the release of presidential papers — forever. It also allows a sitting president to block the release of a former president's records, even after that former president has signaled his approval. It requires that those who challenge the action of either a former president or the sitting president seek redress in court.

Historians, most of Congress and Americans who know that our history begets our future, howled in protest, and our elected representatives slowly but surely swung into action. The House passed The Presidential Records Act Amendments of 2007 (H.R. 1255/S. 886) by a veto-proof margin (333-93) with 104 Republicans breaking ranks with the administration.

The bill would nullify the Bush executive order and re-establish procedures to ensure the timely release of presidential records that the Presidential Records Act was designed to ensure. The bill also has broad bipartisan support in the Senate, and cleared the Senate Homeland Security and Government Affairs Committee by voice vote earlier this year.

We were well on our way to reclaiming our history, when on Sept. 24, 2007, Sen. Jim Bunning (R-Ky.) objected to floor consideration of H.R. 1255/S. 886 under unanimous consent, holding up a vote on the bill. Despite repeated requests from a host of

historical, news media and open government organizations, Senator Bunning has refused to state the reasons for his opposition to the bill. Recently, the White House reiterated its threat to veto the bill should it pass Congress.

For the second time this year, a lone senator has acted in the least democratic way possible to commit an act of legislative hostage taking.

You may recall Sen. (Jon) Kyl's secret hold on meaningful reforms to the federal Freedom of Information Act. Sen. Kyl (R-Ariz.), to his credit, ultimately chose to voice his objections and work to address them. No such luck with Sen. Bunning, who prefers his lawmaking be done in silence. The World's Greatest Deliberative Body is neither great nor terribly deliberative in this instance.

When the history of this sad spectacle is written, it will note that the Presidential Records Act gutted by the president and aided and abetted by the callous silence of Sen. Bunning comes with a rather remarkable history of its own.

It’s worth remembering that the Presidential Records Act of 1978 emerged from the tattered remnants of the Nixon presidency, in direct reaction to another presidential power grab. It’s a remarkably straightforward piece of legislation: Under the law, the U.S. government asserts complete “ownership, possession, and control” of all presidential and vice-presidential records. Upon conclusion of the President’s term in office, the National Archivist is required to assume custody of the records, and to make them available to the public when permissible under the PRA. Access to the records can be denied after the end of the 12-year embargo only if a former or incumbent president claims an exemption based on a “constitutionally based” executive privilege or continuing national security concern.

It’s simple, really: the Bush administration wants to write its own history. Future presidents, Republican or Democrat, will find that sort of control downright intoxicating. If this Executive Order is not overturned by Congress it will allow any president, their heirs, and — for the first time — the vice president and heirs, to deny the American people access to the full historical record of all future administrations.

And that is guaranteed to produce some tired pickings at your local bookstore in the near future.

The secret of Ron Paul’s success

Many in the media are intrigued by Rep. Ron Paul’s (R-Texas) success in the presidential campaign but usually focus on how much money he is raising. In terms of issues, some think he is rising in the polls because of his opposition to the Iraq War. That may be a factor, but my research convinces me that he is doing well primarily because he has a traditional Republican message of returning to smaller and less expensive government. More than that, however, he is talking about the threat posed by global institutions.

The media, which adore the U.N. and believe it is the last best hope of mankind, do not recognize the appeal of Ron Paul’s no-global-government message. Most reporters probably think it is rather silly. But it is becoming a major issue among the conservative Republican grassroots. It is so big that it could sink Sen. John McCain (R-Ariz.), who is on record in support of U.S. participation in the U.N.’s notorious International Criminal Court (ICC).

The ICC could become a major issue, regardless of what happens in the presidential campaign, as the \$6.4 billion left-wing MacArthur Foundation has indicated that it will spend tens or perhaps even hundreds of millions of dollars in a campaign to force U.S. acceptance of the ICC and “raise the profile of international justice issues during 2008.”

In a speech entitled, “The Case for an International System of Justice,” MacArthur President Jonathan Fanton declared that the ICC has jurisdiction over “hate speech,” a comment suggesting that this U.N.-backed tribunal could even be given the go-ahead to prosecute talk-radio hosts like Michael Savage for being critical of radical Islam. The Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR) has been trying to force Savage off the air by threatening his advertisers.

It just so happens that the main author of the ICC is a Muslim associated with CAIR by the name of M. Cherif Bassiouni, a Professor of Law at DePaul University.

While the ICC looms as a major issue, conservative activists have been currently trying to defeat the U.N.’s Law of the Sea Treaty, which is now pending in the U.S. Senate. They found that Ron Paul had come out against it many years ago. He was way ahead of his time in confronting the dangers posed by international arrangements, treaties and institutions that sap U.S. sovereignty.

He introduced a bill to get us out of the U.N., which not only would have saved some of our sovereignty but billions of American tax dollars that ended up in the coffers of corrupt bureaucrats.

Mike Huckabee (R-Ark.) has tapped into conservative sentiment on this issue as well, such as when he told the “Values Voters” summit in Washington that he not only opposed the Law of the Sea Treaty but wanted to see federal judges impeached for using foreign law in their judicial decisions. The comments drew strong applause. After that speech, most of the Republican candidates started falling in line against the Law of the Sea Treaty. McCain, who once supported it, now suggested he was opposed but would have to study it.

Paul goes much further. His Web site includes an issues category labeled “American Independence and Sovereignty.” Among other things, it declares, “So-called free trade deals and world governmental organizations like the International Criminal Court (ICC), NAFTA, GATT, WTO, and CAFTA are a threat to our independence as a nation. They transfer power from our government to unelected foreign elites. The ICC wants to try our soldiers as war criminals. Both the WTO and CAFTA could force Americans to get a doctor’s prescription to take herbs and vitamins. Alternative treatments could be banned.”

Paul also denounces the U.N. for promoting a global tax on America, saying, “... if we are going to stop ongoing

attempts of this world government body to tax us, we will need leadership from the White House.” Such a tax was proposed at the recent U.N. climate change conference, where the Bush administration promised to help draft a new global warming treaty tougher and potentially more damaging to our economy than the first one that it rejected.

A fascinating article has just appeared in the San Francisco Chronicle on where the candidates stand on the U.N.’s International Criminal Court. In looking at Democrats and Republicans, it notes, “At one end of the spectrum is Mike Gravel, a former senator from Alaska and one of the Democrats who backs U.S. membership in the court. In a recent San Francisco appearance, he said he considers himself a ‘globalist’ and ‘a citizen of the human race, first and foremost. Only secondly do I consider myself an American.’ At the other end is Ron Paul, a Republican congressman from Texas, who said in 2002 that both the court and the United Nations ‘are inherently incompatible with national sovereignty. America must either remain a constitutional republic or submit to international law because it cannot do both.’ ”

“Unlike the rest of the Republican field,” reporter Bob Egelko said, “Sen. John McCain has said he would like to see the United States join the international court, although he would first require more protections for U.S. personnel.” The ICC would strip Americans of Bill of Rights protections if they were apprehended and put on trial for alleged international crimes. The article did not explain how McCain would change the institution, which is now in existence, in order to require those protections. Most of the rest of the world, led by the European Union, rejected any safeguards for U.S. citizens.

One of the most critical constitutional protections rejected by the ICC is trial by jury. Foreign judges preside over ICC cases. So it really cannot be “fixed” to accommodate American concerns.

The fact of McCain’s support for the anti-American ICC could prove fatal to his campaign, if it is widely publicized. It has gotten very little attention until now. However, I discovered a press release from the Citizens for Global Solutions (CGS) back in January of 2005 hailing McCain for his support of the ICC. While McCain was quoted as saying about the ICC, “I’m not satisfied that there are enough safeguards” for U.S. citizens, the CGS said that “his declaration at the World Economic Forum was the strongest indication to date that he would be in favor of the United States joining the ICC in the near future.”

One can understand why McCain wouldn’t want these comments publicized, as he seems to be gathering momentum in the presidential race (he won last week’s Republican primary in New Hampshire), and why he wouldn’t want the CGS “endorsement” of his views given any publicity. The CGS is the new name of the World Federalist Association, a group that openly favors world government financed by global taxes. Democratic Party presidential candidate Hillary Clinton (D-N.Y.) endorsed the group’s activities when she was First Lady.

That was on the occasion of the organization giving former CBS Evening News anchorman Walter Cronkite its global governance award. Cronkite used the event to promote the Law of the Sea Treaty, the International Criminal Court, and several other U.N.-backed measures.

It is interesting to note that Cronkite’s agenda is the same as that of Hillary and most national Democratic candidates. Will any of the national Republican presidential candidates other than Ron Paul and Mike Huckabee make a big issue out of it? By doing so, they will have to endure the ridicule of the national press. But it could help them capture the White House in the end.

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

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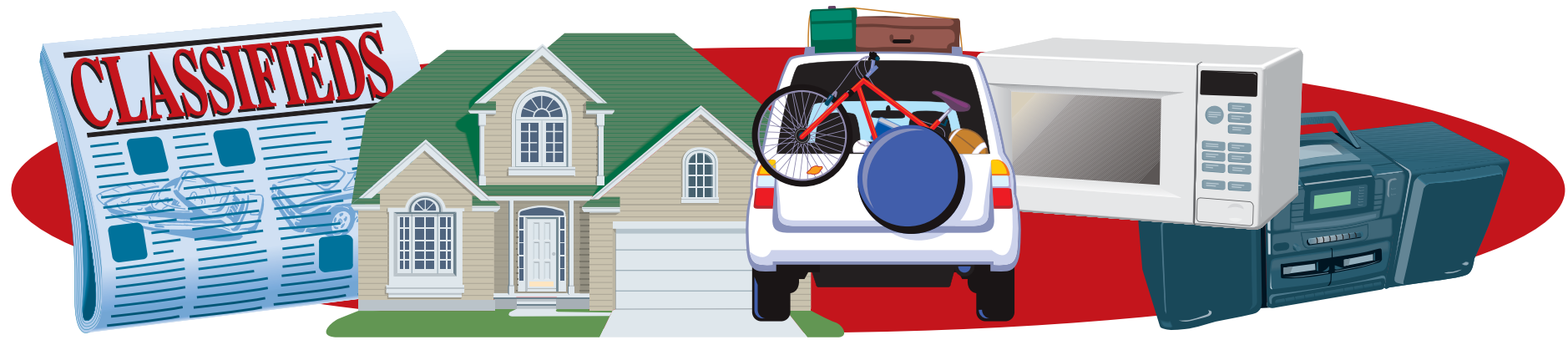
