Owyhee Primary '08 County turnout belies state draw

Dolly Hyer was dumbfounded by the number of folks who were unaware there was a primary election on May 27.

The wife of the man who would wrest the Owyhee County District 2 commission seat away from incumbent Harold "Hal" Tolmie, expressed her surprise on Election Night and wondered if it would

affect the turnout.

George Hyer, Dolly's husband, also was astonished, but he placed the blame on the quirky election immediately following the threeday Memorial Day weekend.

"It amazed me how many people I talked to (May 27), because



Open house focuses on transportation

The City of Homedale seeks the public's input as it builds a transportation plan for the area.

The transportation plan steering committee has set an open house for 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. on Thursday, June 12, in the lobby of City Hall, 31 W. Wyoming Ave.

Kent Fugal, a senior transportation engineer at Project Engineering Consultants, Ltd., in Nampa, said the objective of next week's open house is to present information already gathered through steering committee meetings and also to find out what concerns residents have about traffic patterns in and around Homedale.

"We're looking for any type of input they can give us so that we can make sure that the issues are taken care of in the planning process," Fugal said.

Fugal said the committee is looking for input on any aspect of transportation in Homedale's area of impact, including north

across the Snake River into Canyon County and areas of impact in Owyhee County. Topics he suggested included safety for schoolchildren or the need for a new road or new crosswalks, but he stressed that input on all related issues should be given.

Fugal also said that the open house will be used to present the findings of the committee thus far in the process, including expected growth in traffic.

"We've gone through and done a lot of data collection with traffic volume and where crashes are and where we having lighting and where we don't," Fugal said.

The city's transportation plan is one of three in the works regarding Homedale-area roads. The Idaho Transportation Department currently is working on plans for both Idaho state highway 19 (Idaho Avenue) and U.S. Highway 95.

Block party makes its return

A day of entertainment is planned Saturday as the Homedale Chamber of Commerce brings back the community Block Party after a one-year absence.

Originally formed by former City Clerk Susan Mansisidor, the Block Party has been revived by the Chamber and turned into a daylong City Park extravaganza.

This year's event, which has been coordinated by Chamber secretary Robin Aberasturi, features entertainment, art and crafts booths, vendor booths, food and games and also takes place during the waning days of the Fun-Time Carnival at the Amalgamated Sugar Co.'s beet dump adjacent to the park.

The Block Party begins at 10 a.m. with a clown magic act on the main stage, which will feature music, dancing and other entertainment throughout the day.

At 10:30 a.m., the only nondance or non-music event scheduled for the City Park stage takes place with a storytime of The Gingerbread Man read by Homedale Public Library staff. There will be cookies and a book for every child in attendance.

A pet costume contest will be held at 4 p.m.

A beer garden enclosed in the tennis courts opens at noon, and a street dance to DJ music will cap the day from 7 p.m. to 11 p.m.

Idaho Pizza's formal grand opening also will take place Saturday.

The Fun-Time Carnival will be open Thursday through Sunday at the beet dump.

Scott Roper from the Payettebased carnival company said most rides will be available for two to four tickets and that tickets are \$1 each or a sheet of 24 for \$20.

He also said that his carnival usually has unlimited ride wristbands available on certain night hours on the weekend. Wristbands are \$15.

Rides that carnival enthusiasts can expect to see include an array of children's rides as well as the Sizzler, Rock-o-Plane, Roll-o-Plane, a rollercoaster and Spin the Apple.

Roper said adult rides will cost between three and four tickets each. The children's rides cost two tickets.

Roper said Fun-Time Carnival appeared at the Owyhee County Fair years ago. The 9-year-old carnival outfit travels to Arizona, Montana, Utah and Nevada.

Roper expected to arrive in Homedale on Tuesday with set up and testing slated for today.

The next Chamber meeting is scheduled for noon Thursday at the Owyhee Lanes Restaurant.

Free Fishing Day, **Breshears** coincide

State, county volunteers ready for another fun day of helping kids fish in memory of longtime outdoorsman

opening the outdoors to children, and on Saturday volunteers will carry on that mission by introducing kids to the world of fishing.

The ninth annual Leroy Breshears Memorial Kids Fishing Day takes place from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, and is presented by personnel from the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, the Owyhee County Sheriff's Office and the Sheriff's Posse.

Breshears was a longtime Hunter Education instructor working with Fish and Game.

This year's event coincides with Free Fishing Day throughout the state. Anglers of all ages, including residents and nonresidents, will be able to fish any of Idaho waters without a license. All fishing regulations must be obeved.

The Breshears event at the Marsing Pond at Island Park is one of Fish and Game's many events geared to introduce children to fishing. Only children through the sixth grade will be allowed to drop a line in the water during the five hours of the event at the pond. No adults will be allowed to fish, but they are encouraged to help their children with their angling.

As in the past, the organizers will loan rods and reels and bait and tackle to any children who do not have their own equipment.

The pond will receive a special plant of trout for the derby. Organizers pay for the fish with donations from the public. To donate, send a check made out to Leroy Breshears Fishing, c/o Owyhee County Sheriff's Office, P.O. Box 128, Murphy, ID 83650.

Although the event is free for children, registration is required. Young anglers can register at the

Leroy Breshears spent his life event, or they can pre-register by picking up a form at several locations, including both city halls in Homedale and Marsing, Snake River Mart in Marsing and Matteson's Owyhee Auto Sales convenience store in Homedale.

> Owyhee County Sheriff's Chief Deputy Bruce Cameron said organizers are asking participants to bring donations of nonperishable food items to the event. Barrels will be set up at the entrance to the park.

> Fish and Game conservation officers as well as posse members will be present at the event to hand out loaner rods and reels and give children types on proper fishing techniques and procedures.

> "Several volunteers will be on hand to help kids not familiar with the equipment, to show them how to bait a hook and untangle poles," Cameron said.

> Hot dogs and ice cream will be served to the participating children.

> Prizes also are available, including first fish caught, first legal limit reached, largest fish caught by a boy and a girl.

"Bring sunscreen and lawn chairs and be prepared to spend some quality time with your kids," Cameron said. "Bring a camera so you can take a picture of your kids fishing."

The Breshears event is just one of many throughout the state in which Fish and Game participates to spread the awareness of fishing as a family pastime.

"Free fishing day provides a great opportunity for novices to give fishing a try and perhaps develop it into a lifelong pursuit," Fish and Game Southwest Region fish manager Jeff Dillon said.

"Parents are encouraged to bring their children out for a day of fun fishing excitement."

City offers facility rental, family passes again

The Homedale City Pool is open for summer after some much-needed TLC.

City public works supervisor Larry Bauer announced that the pool at Riverside Park opened Friday and will probably be in operation until the first day of school in August.

Homedale High School graduate David Liddell, now attending Boise State University, is the pool manager this year. Bauer said Liddell has served as a lifeguard at the pool for at least the past three summers.

Also serving as lifeguards this summer are Whitney Tackett, another Homedale grad who is home from her first year at Idaho State University in Pocatello, and Hannah Johnson, who just completed her junior year at Homedale High. The fourth lifeguard is Kelsie Perryman, a high school student from Caldwell.

Liddell and Tackett spent part of Thursday afternoon — sometimes standing in the spring rain cleaning the freshly filled pool and its deck as well as getting familiar with the equipment.

The pool will be open from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday, and from 7 p.m. to 9

p.m. Monday through Friday for an evening session.

The daily swim fee is \$2 per person, but the city again is offering family passes. A onechild family pays \$45 for the summer, while a two-child family pays \$65. A family pass for three children will cost \$80, and a fourchild family pass is \$100. Passes for families with five or more children run \$120.

The pool is available for rental from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Friday, 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Saturday and noon to 9 p.m. on Sunday.

Rental fee is \$35 for one hour or \$50 for two hours. Reservations can be made by calling the pool manager at 249-0349.

Quick action limits canal break damage

Crews worked about 90 minutes Sunday morning to fix a canal break in the Gem Irrigation District, according to reports.

South Board of Control manager Ron Kiester said Monday that water was lost at a rate of 20 cubic feet per second when a gopher hole comprised C canal about 400 feet north off of Thompson Road.

Kiester said the quick action of an area farmer and Marsing contractor Brion Showalter as well as the timing of the breech reduced the loss of water and the amount of damage to neighboring properties.

"Brion Showalter brought a loader down and pushed the break in until we were there to finish the process," Kiester said.

The emergency repair will cost the district between \$600 and \$1,000, Kiester estimated.

Damage was limited to flooded

gardens and possibly septic tanks, Kiester said, but he said the leak wasn't active long enough to cause extensive damage.

He estimates the break occurred at around 5:30 a.m., about two hours before the area farmer discovered it.

"We had it back in service right around 9 o'clock (Sunday) morning)," Kiester said.

Kiester said the South Board of Control board of directors voted earlier this year to increase the bounty for gopher tails to \$2. South Board has a \$28,000 budget for gopher tail bounties.

The criteria is the person claiming the bounty must own property within the Gem or Ridgeview Irrigation districts. After tails are turned in at the South Board office, 19 S. 1st St. W., a check will be issued when the board approves the expenditure.

of the holiday, didn't even know it was Election Day," George said.

As it turned out, Dolly nor George needn't have worried about voter turnout in the county.

Numbers from the Owyhee County Clerk's office show that 44 percent of registered voters cast ballots in the May 27 primary election. That's 19 points higher than the statewide turnout reported by The Associated Press.

Still, the tallies in the home precincts for Hyer and Tolmie in Homedale showed that some voted for sheriff between incumbent Gary Aman and challenger Daryl Crandall but didn't bother to check off for commissioner.

The four Homedale and Marsing precincts had some of the lowest voter turnout of the election. Only 37 percent of the 601 registered voters in North Marsing visited the polls, a precinct that Hyer won handily and Crandall eked out by eight votes on the way to winning the primary.

Crandall takes on independent candidate Perry Grant, a Home-

dale Police corporal, in November. Crandall didn't respond to an e-mail or a voicemail placed by The Owyhee Avalanche seeking comment on his primary victory.

The largest turnout came from absentee voters at 92 percent, while the lowest was Riddle with 30 percent (31 of 104 mail-in ballots).

The highest turnout was reported in Three Creek, another mail-in sector, where 83 percent (15 of 18 ballots) participated. The highest turnout in a walk-in precinct was 57 percent (126 of 222) in Murphy.

second time in 20 years, giving the Homedale native a two-year term as District 2 commissioner beginning in January.

The May 27 Republican primary election served to settle the race because with no Democratic nominee for District 2, a general election in November is unnecessary.

But Hyer says he was disappointed to learn that incumbent Sheriff Gary Aman had been beaten in the Republican primary by challenger Daryl Crandall, an Owyhee County Sheriff's deputy.

"It showed people through the whole general county were unhappy with the incumbents," Hyer said of the two races in which incumbents were facing direct opposition.

"Most of these elections go down to 20 or 30 votes a lot of times in the past, so there was a pretty good statement, in my belief, (that) people wanted change."

According to unofficial election results, Hyer beat Tolmie by 267 votes (977-710) as he garnered 57.9 percent of the vote.

It was the second time in 20 years that Hyer had beaten Tolmie. In 1988, the father of six ousted incumbent Tolmie while running as a Democrat. He lost to Tolmie in 1990 as a Democrat and again in 1994 as a Republican.

Hyer said his rebound 14 years after his last defeat at the polls can be traced in part to the influx of new people into Owyhee County. Hyer, who last sat on the Board of County Commissioners in 1990, said that there were two key issues that he believes led to the fall of the incumbents in the 2008 primary race.

The first was the Idaho County Risk Management Program-suggested resolution adopted by the county in January that gave supervisors the power to fire an employee if that subordinate was disruptive to county business while running for the same elected office as his boss.

Hyer said the commissioners were hasty in adopting the policy, which was turned into a major issue in the sheriff's race with Crandall challenging Aman.

"When I first heard it, I did not agree with it," Hyer said. "Whenever ICRMP brings something to you, you have to take it serious, but whoever brings it to you, you still have to step back and take some thoughts about it."

The second factor in the election in Hyer's mind was the late February closure of access to much of the county's backcountry.

The commissioners voted to close roads to cut access to the backcountry, which was deemed dangerous because of mud and snow. Part of the reasoning on closing the areas to everyone but landowners was to reduce the possibility of costly rescue operations if someone did get stranded. ers must improve their analytical approach to issues to avoid backlash in the future.

"The commissioners need to sit back and think," he said. "We have two commissioners (Jerry Hoagland, District 1 and Dick Freund, District 3), in my opinion, still pretty green.

"The commissioner I defeated (Tolmie) has all the experience in the world, and he should have taken some leadership. And I feel that is why he was defeated."

Hoagland, the board's chair,

faces a challenge to his re-election from Marsing Democrat Joe Gannuscio. The two men square off Nov. 4 for a four-year term.

Hyer is hopeful that his previous time on the board can help Freund and whoever wins the District 2 race deliver pragmatic decisions.

"I just want to go in and work with the two commissioners and hope that with my experience we can guide them through some of these issues that came up and blew up on them," he said. As for working with a new sheriff, Hyer says he foresees no problems even though he has expressed disappointment that Aman lost. Crandall still must face independent Perry Grant in the November general election.

"I really don't think there will be a problem because the commissioners do the budget and what Crandall does stands on his own, and he has to prove himself now.

"He'll have the support of the commissioners."

"We have a lot of new people in the county. The county has changed," he said. "There are so many new people who moved to Owyhee County, and then there were people who listened to the campaign. I think I worked 10 times harder than Hal did."

Campaign financial disclosures would bear that theory out. Tolmie spent only \$489, according to the seven-day pre-primary report form he filed with the county clerk's office in Murphy. None of Tolmie's money was raised from contributions to the 2008 primary drive.

Hyer raised and spent \$2,636.40, according to his form.

"I did agree with the closure," Hyer said. "It was necessary, but it just really upset a lot of the old timers in the county.

"These are people who have enough sense to not get in trouble, but face the facts, we have people who don't have enough and get in trouble and want the county bail them out."

Hyer said that more discussion and input should have been sought.

"They should have just had a couple weeks to inform the public before, even if they had to hold a meeting," Hyer said. "Give the people a chance to voice their opinion."



THE TOOLS WE USE

The most common tools used by a goldsmith are the ring mandrel, a ring seizer, a leather mallet, a welding device (a laser welder and/ or a gas heated torch), a variety of small files, special hammers, magnification for better eye sight such as a head mounted device, a ten power eye loop, electric buffers, a special jeweler's work bench, special lighting, a steamer, a heated and vibrating liquid bath ultrasonic, drills, pliers, a special device for rolling gold, and even a miniature anvil made of polished steel. Hence, the typical goldsmith shop can cost from between five and thirty-five thousand dollars.

Did you know there is no International standard for the manufacturing of ring seizers and those long metal mandrels used to measure rings? So it is wise to use a jeweler who has uniformity between the mandrel used at the front counter with the mandrel used by the goldsmith in the shop because the variance between tool manufacturers can be as much as 1/8 of a ring size.

As your typical goldsmith gains experience and zooms in on their area of specialization he or she will most generally manufacture some of their own handheld tools unique to their needs. My husband, for example, has made a tool used to aid him in the untangling of gold chain. It's a simple pointed device manufactured from a long pointed needle protruding from the cork of a wine bottle. He will usually hold the tangled chain in place

Another one was his modification of a medical steamostat used for holding jewelry in place long enough for it to be laser-welded. A third is a device made of leather used for holding jewelry while he polishes it. Other goldsmiths have been known to manufacture measuring jigs that help them determine how much gold to cut from a source plate that might be used to reconstruct the shank of a ring.

said he hopes to work with the man he will succeed, Matthew Faulks, in transitioning into the job.

"In the fall of this year, I would welcome the opportunity to meet with Matt Faulks and the other county officials to discuss the fiscal 2008-09 office budget, to review upcoming agenda items and cases set for trial in early 2009," Emery said in an e-mail to The Owyhee Avalanche.

Emery served under Faulks as the county's deputy prosecutor in parts of 2007 and 2008 before resigning to launch his campaign for the top job in March.

Now a Nampa resident, Emery has said he plans to move to the Marsing area prior to the start of the 2008-09 school year. Idaho Code gives prosecuting attorneys a year after their election to move into the county they will serve.

Emery said he plans to continue the position of deputy prosecutor, which was created by the county Board of Commissioners for the current fiscal year.

"A deputy prosecutor is needed to assist with the case load in the office, although the position does not pay much," Emery said. Jim Rice, who last week lost a Republican bid for a Canyon County Board of Commissioners seat, currently holds the Owyhee deputy prosecutor position.

Emery said he will "interview all suitable candidates and consider all options in selecting the right deputy prosecutor for the office."

"The elected prosecuting attorney should be able to select his own deputy based upon a number of qualifying factors, including educational background, criminal trial experience, civil advisory work, research and writing abilities, personality team work, etc.," Emery said.

With Emery's election and Sheriff Gary Aman's defeat in last week's election, Owyhee County will have new leaders for both arms of the legal system come January. Republican nominee Daryl Crandall and independent Perry Grant will face off in the November general election.

"I am optimistic and look forward to cultivating a professional relationship with the elected Owyhee County sheriff in prosecuting crimes perpetrated against the people and property of the

"The interests of Owyhee County must continue to be addressed."



Thistle Creek Ranch, located in Wilder, offers a relaxed trail activity. Stacie L. Harvey says the challenge is about rider and horse, not throwing money after tack, clothing and trainers.

"Our trail horse challenge is about what you and your horse can accomplish together," Harvey said. "We offer a unique equine event that will encourage you and your horse to develop a partnership based on trust."

It's a no-pressure event, with no judges in sight and a lack of what Harvey calls the "show ring" breed show trail classes.

Thistle Creek's trail challenge features obstacles that represent those actually found on the trail, such as logs, water crossings, ditches, and switchbacks, high and low bridges and other bridges that rider and horse will go under.

And it sounds like the course is ever changing.

"We even have a few hides and replicas of bears and dears that show up from time to time," Harvey said. "The course is meant to be a challenge, so there is always something new."

While there are no judges, the mountain trail challenge is held in an open field, which allows spectators to view the entire course from bleachers. The event is open to all kinds of equine regardless of breed. Most types of saddles and bridles are acceptable as long as they are humane. The appropriate tack and attire for the event is the same as a rider would use when in the hills, Harvey said.

There are basic competency requirements for the horses, too. To compete in the trail challenge, a horse must be consistent at the walk, trop and lope. He must be in control at all times. He must also be able to back up, side pass, turn on the haunches and forehand, stand quietly, and ground tie.

"We like to see horses that are confident enough in his/her rider to take all the obstacles — even the spooky ones — in stride," Harvey said.

"We provide a fun atmosphere, based on learning, fun and fellowship with other horse enthusiasts."

Thistle Creek Ranch presents the Idaho Mountain Trail Challenge twice each year. The first was held May 9-10, and the second is scheduled for Aug. 8-9. The event includes a catered dinner on Friday, along with musical instruments that some of the guest bring and play around the campfire.

"It's just a fun and relaxing time," Harvey said.

Harvey added that the ranch eventually would like to build an indoor arena for a year-round schedule, including championships in the winter.

When the ranch isn't staging mountain trail challenges, there are clinics put on in conjunction with Mitch and JoLinn Hoover of the MJ Rising H Ranch in Richland, Ore. The Hoovers both have won multiple Mountain Trail Horse Challenge championships, and Harvey says they are leading clinicians on trail events.

One clinic already has been held, but there are still openings for the second clinic, which will be held at Thistle Creek on June 27-28.

Harvey said 4-H members who want to participate in the challenge receive a 50 percent discount on entry fees. She also said there are classes for every age group.

The Wyoming trip, which also includes stops in Utah and eastern Idaho, turns into a 16-hour day. The next day, back in the Treasure Valley, we join J.R. to tour some of his local operations. He seems to have recovered better than 70-something Louie and 50-something me.

We are driving between Mountain Home and Grand View — headed for the Simplot cattle operation. Just before dropping into the Snake River Canyon, we pass a plot along the road with a double-wide mobile home and a couple of angus in a pasture.

"See there!" says J.R. pointing to the little homestead. "The man's got himself a house and a little piece of land. That's what she's all about!"

And I think to myself, there are people who claim J.R. Simplot is ruthless or downright crooked. But here's a man worth more than a billion dollars who still appreciates the initiative of someone who has the nerve to try to put down some roots in the middle of the desert. And this same man can remember the name of an employee who worked for him decades ago.

A lot has been made over the years about how J.R. Simplot became a success with only an eighth-grade education. But what I learned from spending some time with this man was that being "smart" isn't necessarily something you get from teachers or books. J.R. was successful because he had uncommon judgment when it came to choosing the people to run his company. And he never lost his respect for the men and women who worked for wages and struggled to get their own "little piece of land."

J.R. Simplot died May 25 at age 99. It is unlikely that we will see the likes of him again. And that's a shame.

Disaster preparedness is crucial

A devastating cyclone in Burma; a major earthquake develops a critical relationship between the Border across Sichuan Province, China; a volcanic eruption in Patrol and those living adjacent to international borders. Chile; powerful deadly tornados in Missouri, Oklahoma, Georgia and Virginia: It's been a spring rife with natural disasters at home and abroad. The world is mobilizing to assist those in need and, while we help those who are suffering, we must be prepared for disaster ourselves, whether it be earthquake, fire, flood or even an act of terrorism. It's important to utilize federal, state and local resources to engage in prevention and intervention of catastrophe, whatever the source. It's good to know that Idahoans are taking important steps toward preparedness. In April, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) funded a report citing Boise as vulnerable to terrorist attack, largely due to historical geophysical hazards - in particular, wildfire and flood events in recent decades. The National Interagency Fire Center, a coalition of eight federal agencies and organizations, provides fire survivability and prevention tips for those living at wildland/urban interfaces. Many state and local agencies provide this information as well.

Remote regions such as the 308-mile border section spanning northern Idaho, eastern Washington and western Montana present an attractive illegal crossing point for drug smugglers, criminals and terrorists. Cooperation between local citizens and the Border Patrol helps preempt disaster. Our border isn't the only place that Idahoans are involved in citizen-based disaster and security response. Idaho has 27 Community Emergency Response Teams (CERTs). Operating in conjunction with DHS, CERT programs train citizens in the techniques of disaster response, fire suppression, emergency medical care and light search and rescue. In addition to CERT, the Idaho Bureau of Homeland Security works with every state agency, county emergency coordinators, county commissioners, Idaho Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster, Idaho Citizen Corps and others.

Farm Bill bolsters Idaho ag

It's been a long fight, but I'm happy to declare a victory for agriculture, particularly one that has vital implications for the health of our farms, ranches and rural communities, and the food security of our country.

After nearly two years of work leading to the reauthorization of our farm and food programs, a Congressional vote overriding President Bush's veto has resulted in a 673-page document containing the future of food and agricultural policy, now known as the Food, Conservation and Energy Act of 2008.

This comprehensive piece of legislation, commonly referred to as the Farm Bill, is one of the most complicated pieces of legislation taken up in the U.S. Congress, and it is arguably one of the most important.

Unlike many bills considered by Congress, this is one that will touch each and every citizen of our nation. Whether you are a potato grower in Rupert, a resident of a rural community such as my hometown of Midvale, or a parent to an elementary school child in Coeur d'Alene, this piece of legislation affects you.

In an age of skyrocketing energy prices, economic uncertainty, and now what some have deemed a global food crisis, we should at least be certain about one thing: our nation's agricultural and food security. We cannot take for granted our ability to feed ourselves. If we do, we may find ourselves in the same situation as we do with oil today — dependent on other nations.

This bill will do a number of things to ensure our food security. First and foremost, it will keep our food producers productive and profitable, and it will ensure access to those foods for underprivileged Americans. This includes things like a safety net to protect Idaho's farmers from volatile price swings and nutrition programs that give access to free fresh fruits and vegetables to millions of low-income children in schools around the country and in Idaho.

This bill also encourages the best possible stewardship of our agricultural lands through a number of conservation programs. These programs will ensure that our agricultural lands remain a resource for future generations. They will help our dairies better deal with new environmental challenges as their industry continues to evolve. And they will help American agriculture continue to diversify to meet evolving demands for innovative renewable energy solutions — including methane digesters for our dairies and cellulosic ethanol technology — beyond our current burgeoning corn-ethanol industry.

I have worked, along with my colleagues on the Senate Agriculture Committee, to ensure that Idaho's priorities are included in this bill — ranging from maintaining vital commodity programs to inaugurating programs for the long-neglected U.S. specialty crop industry. Some may not know this, but the Idaho potato itself is a specialty crop and has not been included in previous farm bills.

In fact, approximately 45 percent of Idaho's crop cash receipts are from specialty crops, including potatoes, nursery crops, onions, mint, apples, hops, peaches, cherries — crops that will now have a place in federal farm policy.

Though I know this is not a perfect bill in many ways, it is overall a great bill for Idaho — for our farmers and ranchers and for the future of our food and agricultural security. This legislation shows that we can be an effective Congress when we put our mind to it, for the good of agriculture and for the good of the nation.

Sen. Larry Craig (R-Idaho) to help identify potential sites in Idaho that might accommodate and welcome the enrichment plant. Craig set the wheels in motion, and state government, economic development groups, legislators, city and county officials and local citizens groups went to work. Within 12 days, AREVA had an initial proposal in hand.

Local economic development professionals in Bonneville, Bannock, Bingham and Power counties quickly realized the benefits of working as a team, and on July 30, 2007, they made a presentation to AREVA with a single message: "We want you in Idaho!"

That message was carried to the 2008 session of the Idaho Legislature thanks to the leadership of Sens. Bart Davis (R-Idaho Falls), Jeff Siddoway (R-Terreton), and Brent Hill (R-Rexburg) and Reps. Dennis Lake (R-Blackfoot), Scott Bedke (R-Oakley) and Janice McGeachin (R-Idaho Falls). No other state in the running for this world-class facility had presented a coordinated, united regional approach to hosting AREVA. Most actually saw cities or counties competing with one another. Company officials recognized and appreciated that Idahoans were working as a team.

AREVA's personnel were consummate professionals and processes were crystal clear — working with everyone in a straightforward and open manner to explain the company's needs, expectations and decision points. Thanks go to the AREVA team led by president Mike McMurphy.

AREVA's thoroughness enabled us to effectively display such benefits as our highly trained and qualified workforce, the longtime U.S. Department of Energy presence in eastern Idaho, and our state's willingness to invest in the future with the Center for Advanced Energy Studies.

Along with that infrastructure and expertise, government regulations, market forces and, most of all, the watchful eyes of 1.4 million Idahoans will ensure that the plant will be safe, clean and an enormous economic benefit. AREVA's decision is a testament to the hard work and progressive mindset of Idaho's people, and the growing diversity and dynamism of our economy. There is a long way to go before AREVA's promise becomes reality, but we already have proved that nothing is beyond our capability.

a place to go if your home is rendered unlivable, and establishing an emergency cash reserve.

Ensuring effective and adequate funding for the many federal agencies involved in disaster mitigation and response is Congress' responsibility. Through the Senate Budget Committee, I support budget items necessary for the Departments of Homeland Security, Interior, Agriculture and Defense to accomplish their multifaceted disaster preparedness and response missions. I've supported substantially increased funding for more border patrol agents — as of next year, at more than 18,000, the number of Border Patrol agents will have doubled in eight years. I've also supported border fencing, National Guard troops on the border and advanced electronic monitoring. My position on the Senate Finance Committee gives me direct input into the manner in which revenue is raised for these important programs and initiatives.

Supporting legislation is just one way for public officials to effect policy change. We also contact federal agencies and entities directly with constituent concerns. Currently, the Senate delegations from Washington state and Idaho are working with the Defense Department to ensure that the 36th Rescue Flight, based at Fairchild AFB and responsible for more than 600 remote rescues and medical evacuations, stays in place.

Natural disasters will happen. In today's world, terror attacks are a very real possibility as well. Homedale swimming pool to open this Saturday

After many years of being nothing but an eyesore, the Homedale swimming pool will open to the public this Saturday, June 11.

A complete restoration is nearly finished, and the grounds have been cleaned up. The facility is presently being tested and checked.

The pool was built through the efforts of a non-profit corporation, the Homedale Swimming Pool Association, in 1971. After several years of operation, the association turned it back to the Farm Home Administration, which had financed the construction.

In 1978 the FHA put the facility up for bids, and the Homedale Chamber of Commerce purchased it for \$1,000.

After one season of interrupted operation the chamber abandoned the facility.

It was last year when several members of the chamber took a positive outlook at the facility, and began studying the feasibility of reopening the pool.

The committee of three, comprised of Mike Blankenship, Paul Bull, and Hal Tolmie, was appointed to make an effort to get the pool back in operation.

The Chamber has a dedicated fund of approximately \$18,000 raised through early community auctions. This fund was earmarked for "community development."

At the Chamber's budget setting, the board earmarked \$20,000 to refurbish the facility, plus an additional \$5,000 to operate it for the first season.

They possess the foresight to secure valuable privileges, and are posted as to what the merits and needs of the Territory will warrant. They intend to make an accurate survey as early as it can be done. The road and branches projected by this Company are designed to be the shortest practicable from the Central Pacific Railroad to the Owyhee and South Boise Mines and Boise City. The natural formation of the country shows that it must ever be a commanding thoroughfare — no matter how soon all projected railways may be constructed. The Company who have the work in hand will make the best possible road and keep it such. It is their intention to put their own money into it and make it a stock paying property. The main line and branches will pass through much valuable agricultural and more choice grazing lands, and the richest quartz mining sections of the world. Prominent men of means who fully understand the value of the enterprise and reside in Idaho intend to seek stock in the Company. Inasmuch as definite surveys are not made, we cannot more accurately describe the proposed line of road than can be seen in the Company's advertisements in the Avalanche.


