Homedale Fire Chief Scott Salutregui said one family was given money from the

department's Burnout Fund "on the spot" when the fire broke out Thursday afternoon. The second family received assistance Friday, he said.

"The Browns were around, so

we gave them some money out of the Burnout Fund on the spot," Salutregui said.

# ITD begins widening Taxidermy bridge

Ongoing U.S. 95 work will close one lane

Homedale has been reduced to one lane of traffic as state workers continue a widening project.

On Monday, Idaho Transportation Department maintenance workers began widening the bridge that takes U.S. Highway 95 over a canal at Taxidermy Lane south of Homedale. There may be short closures of 15 minutes or

less occasionally, according to an ITD press release. A maintenance worker on scene Wednesday said the project is expected to last until February.

Reed Hollinshead, an ITD U.S. Highway 95 south of spokesman, said the construction is part of a larger project.

"It is being done as a necessary accommodation for the widening coming up next year," Hollinshead said.

The transportation department plans to widen U.S. 95 between Homedale and Marsing in 2010.

### Hunters found, Homedale man still missing

Homedale-area resident Dale Wilson, 71, was reported missing last Wednesday.

The Owyhee County Sheriff's Office and Homedale Police, along with firefighters, other emergency personnel and volunteers searched the area between Wilson's home off Hill Road near North Side Road to the Homedale city limits

# County emergency ops center taking shape

# Tech upgrade part of work at Murphy's McKeeth Hall

High-tech components and upgrades has transformed allow McKeeth Hall in Murphy into the county's emergency operations center.

"We have an excellent start on an EOC," county emergency services coordinator Jim Desmond said at a recent Board of County Commissioners meeting.

The upgrades are nearly unnoticeable, except for a couple new flat-screen monitors on the walls. The room will continue to be used as a community center, and Desmond said at last week's BOCC meeting it also could provide a continuity of government location should the county offices in the nearby courthouse require evacuation in an emergency.

The county utilized nearly every dollar of a \$35,000 Homeland Security grant to outfit the EOC.

Infrastructure work has been completed in the room inside the Owyhee County Historical Museum complex. Contractors installed 15 overhead network boxes featuring drop-down wiring to hook into phones, electricity and a Local Access Network for computers.

"Those boxes will be unobtrusively mounted in the false ceiling in McKeeth Hall," Desmond said. "We'll put tables under those drop-downs during training or an event."

The grant also brought two large flat-screen monitors, a motorized projector screen and a desktop digital projector to the EOC. Three whiteboards also have been purchased with grant money as well as 10 laptop computers and a storage cart that will allow them to remain stored and charged. Desmond said another grant will be written to try to push the laptop inventory to 20 machines.

The flat-screen monitors were installed by Geek Squad employees from Best Buy in Boise late last month.

An EOC would provide a central location to launch efforts during disasters such as the Rabbit Creek an Scorpion Creek flooding in the spring or the Silver City Road flooding from 2006. During the 2006 emergency, many officials had to travel to Gowen Field in Boise to use technology that now will be available in Murphy.

"The bottom line is with what we're getting we'll be able to really make some good use of that facility," Desmond said. "It will obviously be available for an emergency ops center and it will be a real benefit that way, but it's also going to provide the opportunity for a reasonable training location."

Once complete, the EOC will

provide more than a place to coordinate efforts during a disaster. The upgrades will be available for use outside of emergencies, too.

The EOC will feature a digital projector, a large projection screen and big-screen television monitors. Desmond said that the addition of those accessories to McKeeth Hall will allow the museum to make multimedia presentations during events such

as Outpost Days.

It would be an upgrade from the days when OCHS members had to "beg, borrow and steal a place to show" slideshows of summer field trips, Desmond said.

"We'll be able to do that now by running it through the computers and the televisions or through the digital projector onto the screen," he said.

Desmond also said the museum will benefit from a new highspeed phone system.

Desmond also envisions the possibility of McKeeth Hall hosting video teleconferences between governmental agencies or even fellow historical society boards of directors. The state still is working on bringing that technology to several areas in Idaho, though.

The State of Idaho has kicked off an initiative to bring broadband Internet to rural areas, and the county and OCHS have agreed to build a broadband tower on the west side of the museum complex, Desmond said. The permitting process still is being analyzed, including notifying neighboring property owners who would be affected by the 60-foot utility tower on which an eight-foot dish would be mounted.

The Planning and Zoning Commission will hear the county's conditional use permit application at 2 p.m. on Thursday inside the county courthouse annex.

The broadband tower is not part of the EOC grant, Desmond said.

# Rookie lifter sets state mark in first try

# Fouls on other presses prevent national record

Steve Rayborn knew Todd Bahem was a talent after watching him on the wrestling mat.

The Team Idaho powerlifting coach was blown away once he realized what the Homedale High School student pulled off during the sport's recent Idaho State Open Championships.

In his first-ever attempt in competition, the 16-year-old son of Christy DeVinaspre and Dave Bahem bench-pressed 205 pounds to break an age-group state record that had stood for 11 years.


"It's very impressive to walk on to the mat for the first time, especially at 16, and break the state record," Rayborn said.

The more Rayborn talked about Bahem's rookie performance, the more he realized just how big of a deal it was.

Bahem, who could not be reached for this article, weighs only 123 pounds. The one and only allowed lift he pulled off during the Nov. 21 meet at Columbia High School in Nampa outweighed him by 82 pounds.

The 2009 state meet wrestler for Homedale attempted two other lifts at 210 pounds — three-quarters of a pound better than the American single-lift record, Rayborn said — but both bench presses were disallowed because of technical violations.

Rayborn said the American record of 209½ pounds set in March by Jim Hyuk at a meet in Charlotte, N.C., is still within reach if

Bahem continues in the sport.

"We knew that he'd have a good bench because I'd already talked to him and he said he benched over 200," Rayborn said. "I didn't know he was that close (to the record), or I would have talked to him more about achieving that at the meet."

As it is, Rayborn has penciled in a recruiting speech on his todo list.

"If he's interested, I want him to be involved because he's already proven he's one of the top in the country and he hasn't even tried anything yet," Rayborn said.

"That's what's really impressive."

In a correspondence to HHS principal Mike Williams, Bahem's mother commented on

how well-received her son was by other competitors at the drugtested event.

"They cheered Todd on as a team member when they (had) never even met him until that day, and Steve coached him on his competition lifts," DeVinaspre wrote.

Homedale athletic director David Hart said he had promoted

Rayborn's meet on campus. Bahem was the only student who followed through. Rayborn said the meet has been held in Pocatello previously but was shifted to Nampa because of a scheduling conflict.


Rayborn insists that if Bahem wants to continue in the sport and dedicate himself to workouts, he

has a bright future ahead of him.

"Watching him lift that day, there are a number of things we can do to improve his lifting," he said. "He's very raw, very young and very inexperienced.

"As far as lifting, if he continues to lift and continues to work, he'll be a good bench-presser."

without success.

As of Monday morning, Wilson remained missing. His primary modes of transport — a bicycle and a pickup — remained at the home, Homedale Police Chief Jeff Eidemiller said.

Wilson, approximately 5 feet, 10 inches tall, weighing about 160 pounds, has gray hair and a gray beard, according to a Friday release from OCSO Cpl. Lynn Bowman

The missing man has been known to walk or bicycle to Homedale, Canyon County and Malheur County from his residence, the release stated.

Searchers Wednesday were worried that Wilson, who may be off his medication, was exposed

to a risk of hypothermia if he was outside at night.

Neighbors and those who know Wilson said he has, in the past, broken into homes or sheds while wandering.

Eidemiller has been checking at Wilson's house, hoping for some sign the missing man has returned, but has seen no such sign as of Monday, he said.

Anyone with information is asked to contact the sheriff's office at (208) 495-1154.

Monday calls to OCSO for details on the status of the search were not returned by press time.

### **Hunters found after** short nighttime search

Two Nampa hunters were

rescued by searchers at about 10 p.m. on Nov. 23 after they had been reported missing at 5:27 p.m. The men had been hunting in the area east of milepost 17 off U.S. Highway 95. Carl Dowell, 73, and Donald Randolph, 72, were found uninjured.

Sheriff Daryl Crandall, deputies and Posse members located the men after dark, thanks in part to shots fired by the missing men, which were heard by Deputy Slade Heeb.

Darkness slowed the search, even after the area was indicated by the shots, Deputy Jeff Wasson said. The pair were rescued at about 10 p.m.

# County sets business meal guidelines

County department heads and elected officials have more guidance on how to spend their meal money after commissioners passed a resolution.

Resolution 9-52, unanimously approved by the Board of County Commissioners, set the price limit for meals purchased by county employees while on business or training that requires an overnight stay or a six-hour absence outside

The employees are directed to use a county credit card when possible, and meal amounts are not to exceed \$10.75 for breakfast, \$13 for lunch or \$22 for dinner, for a total daily allowance of \$45.75.


Price limit for meals on outof-state trips will be calculated according to a federal government guideline that is available

The resolution also prohibits

using county funds to purchase meals for non-county personnel unless it is pre-approved by the BOCC or is a situation such as a prisoner transport by the sheriff's

The resolution, which had been drafted three times by county Prosecuting Attorney Douglas Emery, was adopted late during the Nov. 17 meeting after a lengthy discussion during the morning administrative session.

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# Marsing P&Z hearing on labor camp annexation

### County, Homedale also plan meetings

After months of discussion and effort, and the adoption of the Marsing Impact Area, the City of Marsing will move to annex the Marsing Labor Camp and Marsing Housing Authority, along with Island Park.

The annexation will bring about 40 water and sewer hookups at the housing authority and 57 at the labor camp inside city limits, something that has been a long-term desire of the city, which supplies the utilities to the properties.

The Marsing Planning and Zoning Commission will hold a public hearing at 7 p.m. on Monday at City Hall, 425 Main St.

Public comment will be taken during the meeting; the deadline to submit written comment is 5 p.m. on Monday.

In the past there have been concerns that any city crews having to perform repairs on the systems would be doing so without benefit of the city's insurance, which only covers maintenance and public works within city limits. The annexation could also add thousands annually in property tax money from the labor camp to the city coffers, money that currently goes to the county, not

the municipality that services the areas. The housing authority is federally operated and does not pay the city tax in any case.

The total area to be annexed, including Island Park, would be slightly less than

Plans are for the housing authority and labor camp to be zoned residential, while the park will be tagged as "open space".

The Owyhee County Planning and Zoning Commission's public hearing slated for Thursday at the courthouse annex building in Murphy will begin at 10 a.m. and includes four items.

Among the agenda items is the final plat

application for the Rio Vista subdivision off Idaho highway 78 south of the Walters Ferry Bridge. The hearing is scheduled for 11 a.m.

At 2 p.m., the P&Z commissioners will hear the county's conditional use permit application to build a 60-foot broadband tower near the Owyhee County Historical

Two other residential CUP applications in unincorporated Homedale also will be

At least one news report that quoted Dennis Davis — a member of the second affected family — said pets were lost in the blaze. Davis also expressed faith that the Homedale community would come through to help the families. The Owyhee Avalanche couldn't reach family members for this article.

Cause of the fire is still under investigation, Salutregui said. The blaze is believed to have started in the kitchen of the home at 316 W. Owyhee Ave., and then spread to the second home east of the first structure.

Brown residence, possibly at the kitchen," Salutregui said. "Actually, I think they weren't cooking or anything like that."

The chief added that the Browns spent Thanksgiving night in a motel. He was unclear on where the Davis family stayed. Homedale Fire also contacted the Red Cross to arrange clothing and shelter provisions for the families, Salutregui said.

In all, three structures were a total loss, the chief said, adding that a former grocery store that was converted into part of one of the homes also burned.

were on scene.

"I think we got it settled down pretty good," Salutregui said Friday morning in reference to the possibility of hot spots. "I have no idea on the amount of water

"It was a defensive structure fire there was nobody inside — so we used the master streams off the trucks."

Every piece of Homedale Fire apparatus was deployed during the night-long battle, Salutregui said.

Holiday fires are rare in Homedale, the 20-year fire department veteran said.

"We had one one Christmas eve that was a residence on the west side also, kind of down by the elementary school, that was pretty big," Salutregui said.

# $\sqrt{\text{Mayor:}}$ Pfrimmer claims county 911 line was busy during repeated calls

would have been a piece of cake," Pfrimmer said of the incident, through tears. "I'd never do it again. It doesn't pay to be the good guy."

A former Marsing mayor, Pfrimmer faces three charges of the misdemeanor offense of exhibiting a deadly weapon, filed by Owyhee County prosecutor Douglas Emery, in connection with an incident in Marsing on Sept. 5.

Emery declined to comment on the case, saying last Wednesday that he was "not at liberty to discuss the operative facts of a pending case."

Public defender William Wellman also reserved comment prior to the trial.

Multiple calls to the Owyhee County Sheriff's Office failed to contact either Sheriff Daryl Crandall or Chief Deputy Bill Detweiler for comment by press

Pfrimmer herself offered her own story, tearfully at times, in an interview with The Owyhee Avalanche.

After hearing loud noises, screaming and yelling at approximately 1 a.m. on Sept. 5, Pfrimmer said she made "four or five" 911 calls, but found the line to be busy.

"I thought, 'Oh my God, what is happening?' I thought someone was getting killed," Pfrimmer said. The sounds, from just over a block away, were loud enough

they caught Pfrimmer's attention over the sounds of the movie she was watching, in a sealed house.

"I got on the phone and called 911. It was busy. I tried five or six times ... it's busy." Still worried over the screaming and yelling, and unable to reach the sheriff's office, Pfrimmer said she made a decision.

"After four or five calls, I thought 'the hell with it' and jumped in the car," she said.

She then drove to the Marsing substation of the Owyhee County Sheriff's Office, but found no deputies present, she said. Following that, she drove to the alleyway behind Caba's where the noise was originating to see what the continuing hubbub was.

Pfrimmer, who is 75 and weighs just over 100 pounds, went to investigate and took her handgun, for which she said she has a permit.

Two versions of what happened next exist.

According to the charge sheet, Pfrimmer pointed a weapon at Matthew J. Elwood, Travis Barnhart and Amanda E. Fink.

According to Pfrimmer, she displayed the weapon nonthreateningly, to one male individual, not three people, who approached her car after she warned them to stay back from her vehicle and that she was armed.

Pfrimmer said she drove from the scene to the Marsing OCSO substation one more time, where she again failed to locate an officer, and then turned for home. On her way home, she was pulled over by a Homedale Police cruiser, in Marsing. The officers, who she described as "super nice and so sweet", spoke with her and asked her to exit the vehicle.

Shortly afterward, a deputy she identified as Jim Mackenzie arrived and cuffed her. She said that after a call to "someone in Murphy" she was uncuffed.

"Maybe it was stupid at my age to do it, but that's the kind of person I am; I have to help people in trouble. I just thought the worst was happening," she said of the decision to check on the noises.

Producers must return ballots to their local FSA offices by the close of business on Dec. 7. Newly elected committee members and alternates take office Jan. 1, 2010.



Johnston said the FSA county committee provides producers with the opportunity to help implement federal farm programs in their communities. She stressed that voting by all farmers and ranchers, especially women and minorities, is vital to ensure that opinions express in committee meetings reflect the area's agricultural sector.

FSA county committees help administer federal farm programs at the local level. Committee members make decisions on conservation programs; commodity price support loans and payments; disaster assistance payments; and other agricultural issues.



# A memorable anniversary

November 23 was a special day for me this year. On that date, one year ago, I went out on a foggy morning to get the newspaper. I was about halfway to the paper box when I noticed that the fog had frozen on the concrete driveway. At nearly the same moment I came to that realization, my feet flew out from under me. When I landed, I was facing south and my right foot was pointed north.

I have been pretty fortunate over the years. I've broken or cracked a few bones and had assorted other cuts, contusions, abrasions and even a mild concussion along the way. But the broken ankle was the first injury I have suffered that really put me on the sidelines and made me dependent on others for a protracted period.

Initially, I thought waiting for the bones in my broken ankle to heal would be the most difficult part of recuperation. But a healthy person's bones knit fairly rapidly. That turned out to be the easy part. Trying to get all those ligaments and tendons that were stretched way out of shape to return to normal is a whole different story.

In the beginning, the swelling and soreness went pretty much from the end of the toes on the damaged foot, all the way to my knee. Over the months, the affected area slowly reduced in size. But no matter how healthy you may think you are, when you are 60-something, you don't recover as fast as you do when you are 20-something.

Less than a month before I fell, we went on a whirlwind tour of China. During our visit we got a lot of exercise on walking tours of the Forbidden City, the Ming Tombs, the Shanghai Market and climbing the unevenly spaced stone steps of the Great Wall. By the end of January after my fall, the broken bones were pretty well healed. But it has only been in the past month or so that my ankle

has recovered to the point where I think I could handle another trip like our China adventure. And even now I suspect the damaged area would be pretty puffed up by the end of each day.

One thing my injury did for me was give me a better appreciation of what people with physical handicaps must endure. My restrictions only lasted a couple of months. Many folks have to deal with much worse problems for their entire lives. And although it embarrassed Sara, I still will not apologize for beating on a car with my fist after I discovered it was illegally parked across the only wheelchair access ramp to the local KFC, on an icy Christmas Eve.

On a recent morning I got dressed, slipped on a coat and went out to get the paper. It was still dark. It had rained during the night and the driveway was wet. I carefully tested the surface and ascertained that it was covered with water, not ice, before proceeding. Even then, I walked slowly and carefully tested the surface to make sure there weren't any slick spots.

I was just about to the paper box when I heard voices. Two women who live in the neighborhood were approaching — getting in their morning walk before going to work. One of the strollers, a gal in probably her mid-40s who knows what happened a year ago, shouted cheerfully, "Don't fall down!"

I was tempted to shout "Don't get any older!" to the lady. But that probably would have been bad form.

# Hunting, fishing part of Idaho, American heritage

— Theodore Roosevelt


Each year, thousands of Idahoans head outdoors to hunt, fish, camp and hike or simply enjoy Idaho's beautiful scenery and wildlife. The first chief of the U.S. Forest Service, Gifford Pinchot, said, "There are just two things on this material Earth — people and natural resources." As co-chair of the Congressional Sportsmen's Caucus, and as ranking member of the Environment and Public Works Subcommittee on Wildlife and Water, much of my time is spent on issues involving fish, wildlife, water, and the land itself. I also enjoy hunting and fishing and greatly appreciate this part of Idaho's culture and heritage. I hunt and fish because it is thrilling to be in the outdoors and enjoy this great Idaho tradition with family and friends.

Sportsmen have brought great benefits for all who enjoy the great outdoors. If you love wildlife, you should thank sportsmen first because they were first to advocate for wildlife. History shows, in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, many game species were in trouble, and sportsmen were the first to voice concern for species conservation and the first to consider how to do it. They insisted on rules and systems of hunting and fishing, and they were willing to pay for it. Sportsmen like President Theodore Roosevelt promoted rules of "fair chase" and periods when wildlife would be allowed to rest, grow and reproduce. Roosevelt established the Boone and Crocket Club, which was followed by many other sportsmen's groups that advocate for hunting and the management of wildlife as a renewable and precious resource

We should also thank landowners and wildlife managers. Without planning and vision, we would not have the abundant, healthy wildlife populations we have today. Private landowners have vital winter range and habitat with water, cover and all the necessary resources for fish and wildlife. Idaho law directs the Idaho Department of Fish and Game to manage our wildlife resources for the benefit of all and for the maximum benefit of hunting, fishing and trapping. Thousands of Idahoans enjoy these activities and look forward with anticipation and excitement to each season. Our state does a good job of managing all species in perpetuity as sustained and renewable natural

Wildlife populations, in general, are stable or increasing, which is remarkable amidst a growing human population. Deer, elk, antelope, bears, mountain lions,

# SEIU targets Boy Scouts, brings attention to union's thuggery

Nick Balzano, an executive board member of the Service Employees International Union's (SEIU) Allentown Local 32BJ chapter has resigned after threatening to file a grievance against the Allentown, Pa., city council for letting a Boy Scout clean up a walking path. The Scout, 17-year-old Kevin Anderson, was attempting to earn an Eagle Scout badge.

As reported by Michelle Malkin in the New York Post, Balzano bellowed at a city council meeting, "We'll also be looking into the Cub Scout or Boy Scout who did the trails. We may file another grievance on that ... None of them can pick up a hoe. They can't pick up a shovel. They can't plant a flower. They can't clear a bicycle path. They can't do anything. Our people do that."

Commented Malkin, "Balzano was ready to bludgeon the Boy Scout because his gung-ho volunteerism posed a threat to the SEIU labor monopoly." As contemptible as this incident was, it's just the tip of the iceberg of the SEIU's continued thuggery against ordinary Americans.

As it turns out, Anderson may have been lucky to escape with his life. Consider:

- The brutal beating of activist Kenneth Gladney in South St. Louis County, Mo., at a town hall event sponsored by Congressman Russ Caranhan (D-Mo.) by SEIU members. Gladney was handing out "Don't Tread on Me" flags.
- At another town hall meeting in Tampa, Fla., that

Congresswoman Kathy Castor (D-Fla.) appeared at, SEIU members pushed members of the public out of the event. As reported by Red State's Erick Erickson, "The event was conveniently held in a forum where only 250 people could fit. One thousand people showed up. SEIU members were given reserved seating that took up at least half of the 250 seats. As people came in who visibly oppose the Democrats' healthcare plan, SEIU members barred access to the room... Democrat(ic) event organizers slammed one senior citizen into the wall as he and his wife tried to enter. The couple were opposed to Obamacare and made it known."

• The beating of Kourosh Kenneth "Ken" Hamidi, a public access news reporter in California, while he tried to enter an SEIU Local 1000 meeting with his video crew. Hamidi says that union leaders at the meeting told the thugs to "beat the hell out of him." Hamidi was a fierce critic of the Local and had previously run for president of the chapter.

What emerges is a pattern of pure, political violence by the SEIU against Americans who wish to speak out against either the union directly, or the public policies they support.

What makes that all the more egregious is that this is the same union that Barack Obama has long associated himself with before he, as he put it, "was elected to anything." Leading a rally to energize SEIU enforcers, he shouted loudly, 'we are going to paint the nation purple with SEIU." Which, apparently includes lacerations and bone-deep bruises.

When American citizens were speaking out loudly over the summer, the White House told his supporters to "punch back twice as hard" against opposition to Obama's government-run health care initiative. Clearly, his SEIU cohorts took it to heart, as noted above.

Just to ensure that the SEIU onslaught continues full tilt, SEIU president Andy Stern meets regularly with Obama, as reported by the Washington Times: "Service Employees International Union head Andy Stern was the most frequent White House visitor in the first nine months of the year. The union chief met with top officials and attended events some 22 times, according to White House logs."

Ironically, while Barack Obama has been welcoming Stern with open arms, he has been churlishly snubbing one of Stern's minion's favorite targets: the Boy Scouts of America. In fact, until just days ago, Obama was the first president in nearly 100 years who had refused to allow his signature to be affixed to Eagle Scout Award certificates.

Reported the Grand Junction Sentinel on Saturday, Nov. 21, "Certificates received by Boy Scouts achieving the rank of Eagle Scout, the highest rank in scouting, traditionally are signed by the president of the United States, but they have yet to be signed by President Barack Obama ... Adam Abrams, White House regional communications director, said Obama's signature will be on the certificates of Eagle Scouts going forward."

### Damages reported following wind storm here

Homedale and the general area experienced a blizzard type storm a week ago Tuesday that brought snow and a piercing wind of a velocity to render a substantial amount of damages.

The Boise National Weather Service said that winds from the southeast began to blow around 6 a.m. on Nov. 27<sup>th</sup> and continued throughout the day, but two separate series of higher velocity winds occurred between 6-10 a.m. and 6-8 p.m.

The weather personnel said that the highest winds hitting Boise were recorded at 41 mph., but in our area they could have ranged between five to ten miles per hour higher. This being an educated guess of an unofficial nature since equipment does not exist near the Homedale area to measure wind velocity.

Darrel Ady, agent for Farm Bureau Insurance Co. of Homedale said that he had reports of damages to storage sheds, roofs, fences, etc., and that the awning from the Poly Clean Laundry had been destroyed. "But the most unusual thing about that storm," he said, "was that it didn't let up much, it blew constantly though the day."

### 144 years ago

### **December 2, 1865**

LETTER FROM THE CAPITAL. Boise City, November 27, 1865.

EDS. AVALANCHE: Our city has an unusually healthy and growing appearance. Buildings have been going up all summer to some extent, but as winter is approaching and the session of the Territorial Legislature near at hand, builders are hurrying up their work and every place that can be occupied is either rented as a business stand or as a new family residence.

The halls intended for the Legislature are two buildings owned by May & Brown, located on opposite sides of Main street near the Bridge. One is wood and the other a brick building. Each is twenty-five feet wide and sixty long, and fourteen feet in the clear. Secretary Gilson has contracted for the furniture. The desks and tables are made here by Mr. Scranton. They are calculated for two members at a table. The seats are armed chairs, purchased in Portland. The halls are spacious and roomy; probably will not be finished with a great deal of architecture, but taken altogether will accommodate these Honorable bodies.

Hons. Alex, Blakely and Al. Ripson have arrived from Idaho county. Shoshone county held no election and of course will not be represented. Nez Perce county will be represented in the Council by Mr. Brown; James Hays' health is too poor to leave, and the other member from that county has gone to Blackfoot.

Hons. Mr. Tiner and Allen, from Boise county, have arrived with their families and taken up their residence with us for the winter. The other members are expected to arrive by Thursday next, at which time there will be a sort of jollification.

Businessmen are receiving large supplies, and from what we can see of the supplies that are daily arriving, there will be no want of either drygoods, groceries or provisions for the ensuing winter.

Our mild winter climate so well known to the people in the mountain districts, and the axes to grind in the Legislature, has induced many here, and we anticipate the elite and social circles of Boise City will entertain all that comes. No better place could be found to drive away the long monotony of wintry days and nights, and we say to our bachelor friends in the mountain, if you would cast full twenty years in one, come to Boise City and commingle your thoughts and associations with the fair sex, and become better and happier men.

Half a dozen or more stages are coming and going every day, and all of them well loaded. One would think if they were to count the passengers only one way, that all the mountain towns in the Basin were being depopulated; but one comes and another goes. This is truly a world of people, and they are all in motion.

Gov. Lyon returned from Owyhee last week, very much intoxicated with the country. He has tin on the brain.

Our District Court sits next week. There will be town murder cases before the grand jury and there ought to be about two dozen larceny cases, but as it is generally unhealthy for thieves about court time, they will probably take the hint and leave. The civil business will number about thirty cases. A pretty good docket for the short time that has intervened between courts.

It is currently reported here that the Owyhee people are making up large companies to prospect the diamond beds on Snake River. Certain'y they should, for this is a great country.

SINCE our last, the foothills have been thronged with prospectors for diamonds, and for once have given quartz a brief respite. Among the prospectors may be numbered some of our most substantial citizens. From the best information we can obtain, there is no certainty that the genuine gems have yet been found; but magnificent crystals have been, answering to the book description. The hardest file fails to make an impression on them. The country is volcanic and there is no reason to doubt their existence.


