

Homedale for the Holidays parade set Saturday

Homedale kicks off the holiday season with its annual Homedale for the Holidays Night Light Parade on Saturday.

This year, the parade, which carries the theme of "A Christmas Story," will push off at 6 p.m. The parade lineup will begin at 5:15 p.m. on East Owyhee Avenue in front of Tolmie's Ace Hardware.

Investigation begins after deadly US **Ecology explosion**

Federal investigators are looking into possible causes of Saturday's fatal explosion at Grand View's US Ecology Idaho disposal facility.

Grand View resident Monte "Alex" Green, 48, died after sustaining injuries in an explosion Saturday morning at the hazardous waste storage site.

Three other employees were treated for non-life-threatening injuries, the company said in a statement.

"Today is an exceptionally hard day for our team. As we mourn the loss of one of our own, we are also moving forward to try and figure out exactly what happened. US Ecology is committed to finding the cause and working closely with the agencies and teams on site to ensure a thorough investigation," Jeff Feeler, the company's chairman and CEO, said in a statement released Saturday.

"This is a tragedy that affects not only our team but the entire community. There hasn't been a moment that's gone by that we haven't thought about Alex, his family, and the crews



- Logan's Market in Marsing will be closing at 1 p.m. on Thursday.
- Westowns Disposal, Inc., rural garbage pick-up outside Homedale and Marsing will be delayed one day for customers who typically have their trash hauled away on Thursday or Friday.

Homedale Wish Tree, food drive start up

Effort to help schoolchildren, families runs through mid-December

More than 60 families with Homedale schoolchildren will be helped by this year's Wish Tree drive.

Elementary school counselor Randee Garrett has completed her annual collection of names, and Wish Trees will be placed in local businesses this week, Diana Uranga-Maxwell said.

The Wish Tree Texas hold 'em fundraiser, which helps supplement the community gift drive, is set for Saturday at the Txoko Ona Basque Center. The doors open at 6 p.m., and the poker tournament starts at 7 p.m.

Combined with the annual Hands Around Homedale food drive through the schools, the Wish Tree is a decades-long effort to help the town's needy families during Christmas.

County receives remote highway help

Jailer promoted to corporal

Owyhee County has renewed a public highways maintenance contract with the Twin Falls Highway District, made official with the signature of Commissioners Kelly Aberasturi and Jerry Hoagland on Nov. 13.

The agreement calls for road maintenance in certain areas of eastern Owyhee County to be performed by TFHD because that agency has resources closer to those areas than Owyhee County road crews do. According to the agreement, because of the great distances in Owyhee County, it is inconvenient and expensive for road crews to travel to these outlying areas.

The county and TFHD have

agreed to a good faith estimate of \$1,500 annually for three years, during which the highway district will perform maintenance duties, including "preservation and keeping of right-of-way and each type of roadway, structure, and facility in the safe and usable condition to which it has been improved or constructed."

These maintenance standards do not include reconstruction or improvement.


The type of maintenance for each highway means doing the work and furnishing materials and equipment to maintain the identified highways.

Strong finish pushes HMS to 2nd place at latest Academic Bowl

Homedale Middle School's Academic Bowl team is on a roll ahead of its home match next month.

The team finished second in last Wednesday's second meet of the 3A Snake River Valley conference season, following up its meet win in October.

The home team, Parma, won last week's meet with 130 points. Homedale used a strong buzzer round to rally for second place with 110 points in the eight-team meet.

Advisor Jan Silva, a fourthgrader teacher at Homedale Elementary, said the buzzer round was Homedale's strongest of the day.

Homedale teammates buzzed in first and correctly answered eight questions during a lightning round that feature 40 questions.

Eighth-graders Rylan Love, Corilynn Huskey and Catherine Decker captained a Homedale team that featured 20 boys and girls.

The Academic Bowl season takes December off, but the competition resumes at 4:15 p.m., on Wednesday, Jan. 16 inside the Homedale Middle School cafeteria.

who were working yesterday. Together we will rally and continue to be a strong team and community."

Feeler called Saturday "the darkest day in the in US Ecology's 66-year history."

Green began working at the Grand View facility in 2014.

An equipment operator, Green was moving materials when the explosion occurred. He was initially reported missing after the accident but was located Saturday afternoon.

"I want to deliver my deepest condolences to all who were impacted by Saturday's accident at US Ecology," acting Idaho Gov. Scott Bedke said. "We know US Ecology, their employees, and first responders have worked tirelessly in the aftermath of this event.

"As the investigation continues, more answers will be available. As for now, we are focused on the needs of employees and the Grand View community."

On Sunday, the US Ecology executive team joined investigators from the Environmental Protection Agency's Boise office and OSHA as internal and external investigations got underway.

In a release through the Idaho State Police, the Owyhee

Saturday said the explosion occurred in a building used to process powdered magnesium products.

US Ecology said 15 employees were on site when the explosion occurred at 9:23 a.m., during a routine operation. The subsequent fire destroyed the building.

"Our immediate thoughts are with families," US Ecology vice president of operations and chief operating officer Simon Bell said Saturday. "It's a very difficult day for US Ecology. Our focus is on the families of those affected by the accident, supporting the first-responders, and making sure our employees are cared for and updated on what's happening in this process."

The Caldwell Fire Department's Southwest Regional Hazardous Materials Response Team was among the responders on scene Saturday.

The Y Bar Café in Grand View provided meals for the crews working at the scene of the accident as the Grand View community pulled together.

The District 23 legislative delegation also released statements in the aftermath.

"Our hearts go out to the people of Grand View today, particularly to the family and County Sheriff's Office on friends of Alex Green," state

Sen. Bert Brackett (R-Rogerson) said Saturday. "It is understandably a very difficult time for the employees at US Ecology, first responders, and for the community here in Grand View.

"US Ecology has been a revitalizing entity for the region's economy and provides opportunity for so many in our district."

Dist. 23B Rep. Megan Blanksma (R-Hammett) also spoke about Saturday's accident.

"My sincerest sympathies go out to Mr. Green's family and friends," Blanksma said.

"US Ecology has had a positive impact in our region as an employer for many in Owyhee and Elmore Counties. Touring their site as part of my legislative duties and speaking with their executives and employees, I have experienced first-hand their unending commitment to safety.

"This has been a tragic accident. My focus is on helping residents cope with loss while working with authorities as investigations into the accident continue."

Hop producer seeks worker housing

One of the first issues Anderson may have to rule on is a hop farmer's bid to farmworkers inside the city

Oliver Schroeder of Schroeder Hop LLC went before the council last Wednesday to outline his plan to create living quarters for his seasonal employees closer to the hop fields.

Schroeder said his workers now live in public housing on Farmway Road in Caldwell, but he wants to move workers to Homedale to cut down on what is a 60-minute roundtrip commute.

"It's a huge liability to have that many people on the road 30

create housing for migrant minutes each way," Schroeder

Aebischer said Schroeder would have to seek a special use permit to either convert an existing building into living space or to build new construction for his workers.

A special use permit would require a public hearing.

"I just see a lot of vacant buildings ... that could be put to good use," Schroeder said.

During the discussion, Schroeder said that there would be minimal vehicle traffic because the farm provides transportation for the workers each day.

Councilman Aaron Tines told Schroeder that he has heard citizens' complaints that high-density housing would be detrimental to the push for city beautification.

No decision was made last Wednesday because Schroeder's appearance was placed on the agenda as a discussion item.

Schroeder said he planned to submit a special use application as the first step toward getting a permit for his project. The council would rule on the application only after a public hearing process.



Homedale library boosts programs with grants, tech




The book is based on the life of Emery's mother, Katherine Amanda Thomas Young, and is available on Amazon. A limited number of books also will be available at the book signing.



County seeks community center construction bids

A long-awaited local project is taking a big step forward.

Sealed bids for the planned Owyhee County Community Center project in Homedale will be received by Civil Dynamics until 11 a.m. on Thursday, Dec. 20, at 305 Cornell St., in Middleton.

Bids will be publicly opened and read aloud once the deadline passes.

The center will be constructed at the site of the old Armory building, which was demolished in January, in Homedale. The Armory stood on the county fairgrounds on West Nevada Avenue. According to a legal notice, prospective contractors must describe the work required to complete the project in sufficient detail to secure comparable bids.

The notice also notes that all work necessary to complete the project must be included in the bid and must conform to all local, state, and federal requirements.

Any bid received by the county may not be withdrawn after the time bids are opened.

Plans are available today from the office of JGT Architecture, 1212 12th Ave. So., in Nampa.

Electronic copies of the construction documents can be obtained by emailing JGT at gtoolson@jgt-architecture.

Prior to awarding a contract, the county will conduct investigation into the performance record of the low bidder, if officials deem it necessary. The county also will look into the bidder's ability to perform work of the expected type and magnitude involved in the construction of the community center.

The bidder must also be open to submitting information to the county, as necessary, to evaluate qualifications.

All bids must be accompanied by bid security, in the form of a bid bond, certified check, or cashier's check in the amount of 5% of the amount of the bid proposal.

The bid security will be forfeited to the county if the successful bidder fails to enter into a contract in accordance with their proposal.

The labor of love continues with the book signings:





Judge hands down prison sentences

Two men are heading to state prison after convictions on felony charges.

Marsing resident Pablo Barajas has entered a rider program after receiving a sentence of up to four years from Third District Judge Thomas W. Whitney on Nov.

Barajas was arrested for felony eluding of a peace officer on April 10 after her rammed an Owyhee County Sheriff's vehicle on Idaho highway 78 near the Marsing city limits.

Deputies also booked Barajas on misdemeanor driving under the influence and possession of an open container of alcohol. The DUI was the man's second in 10 years.

Barajas has been ordered to pay nearly \$18,000 in restitution with payments split between an insurance company, Owyhee County and the Idaho State Police forensic lab.

Barajas' driver's license has been suspended for one year.

Barajas entered a guilty plea to misdemeanor DUI and

felony eluding, and Owyhee County Prosecuting Attorney Douglas D. Emery dropped a second misdemeanor for possession an open alcoholic beverage container.

Emery said that Barajas' attorney filed an objection to the restitution amount on Thursday. No rulling has been made.

• Homedale resident James Dale Lockett has been sentenced to up to five years in state prison after entering a guilty plea to a felony domestic battery charge.

Whitney gave Lockett credit for six months he has already served behind bars.

Lockett's sentence will run concurrently with a sentence handed down in Ada County after his convicton for felony DUI

According to Owyhee County court documents, Lockett was arrested on May 8 after struck his wife and caused traumatic injury.

Emery dismissed three misdemeanor no-contact order violations.

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50-year-old military bombs found at Walters Ferry bridge

A unit from Mountain Home Air Force Base safely detonated unexploded military ordnance discovered in the Snake River during Walters Ferry bridge maintenance operations.

Two ordnances built before the Vietnam era were found on successive days as dive teams inspected the bridge that takes Idaho highway 45 across the river between Canyon and Owyhee counties.

On Nov. 9, the bridge and river were closed to the public as a Navy explosive ordnance device (EOD) dive team removed the second of two EODs, which had been discovered Nov. 1.

A sweep of the immediate area did not find additional EODs. The Idaho Transportation Department planned a thorough sweep of the area before resuming repair work.

When the second unexploded ordnance was discovered 20 feet beneath the river's surface, construction was halted and the Mountain Home Air Force Base EOD unit dispatched.

The EOD team determined the device was secure in its location and posed no immediate risk to motorists or boaters. Plans for the Nov. 9 operation were then enacted.

The first unexploded ordnance was discovered when divers were underwater inspecting the base of a bridge pier on Oct. 31.

The contractor contacted the Canyon County Sheriff's Office, which coordinated the dispatch of the Nampa Police Department bomb squad to contain the explosive ordnance device (EOD).

Mountain Air Force Base personnel took possession of the EOD and detonated it off-site.

"Thank you to the Owyhee and Canyon County Sheriff's Offices, the Nampa Police Department, the Office of Emergency Management, Mountain Home Air Force Base and the Navy for their partnership in securing the EODs and ensuring the construction zone is safe to resume operations," ITD District 3 engineer Amy Revis said.

"Safety is a top priority for ITD and proper protocol was followed in this rare circumstance to protect our employees, contractors, and the traveling public."

BLM poised to provide fire gear to RFPAs

The Bureau of Land Management is taking another step to help local ranchers fight range fires.

In an effort enhance wildland firefighting capabilities, the BLM's Rural Fire Readiness (RFR) program will transfer excess vehicles, equipment and supplies to local fire departments and Rangeland Fire Protection Associations.

Local groups that help the BLM wildland firefighting efforts must meet certain requirements to participate in the program that will provide at no cost wildland fire engines, water tenders, radios, pumps, hose, chainsaws, hand tools, personal protective equipment, fire shelters and other items the BLM no longer needs.

"Local fire departments and Rangeland Fire Protection Associations are critical partners of the BLM in wildland firefighting in Idaho," acting BLM Idaho state director Peter J. Ditton said.

"We appreciate the

opportunity to augment their capability to respond to wildland fires safely and effectively through the Rural Fire Readiness program."

Owyhee County has a handful of RFPAs, including Jordan Valley, Owyhee and Saylor Creek organizations.

To receive RFR wildland firefighting vehicles, equipment and supplies, local fire departments and RFPAs must meet requirements such as:

- An existing cooperative agreement with the BLM
 - Serve a rural area
- · Have wildland fire protection responsibilities
- In the vicinity of, or within, the wildland urban interface
- Close proximity to BLMadministered lands; respond to wildland fires in support of BLM as needed.

The BLM is currently accepting applications, and expects to start transferring the excess items to local fire departments and RFPAs prior to next fire season.

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

The effort came up three feet short when senior running back Mason Kincheloe was stopped on fourth down with eight seconds left in the game.

And the fans showed their gratitude with whoops, hollers and applause as the players walked solemnly to one final postgame kneel-down with Holtry and the coaching staff.

"That stadium has never been that full," assistant coach Randy Lyons, equally emotional, told the players in the final

postgame chat of a historic season. "My God, we have an amazing community."

The players, whom Lyons called "Men of Troy" and "Sons of Homedale," accepted the second-place trophy at the end of the game in the latest milestone in the 2018 season.

The Trojans (11-1) reached the first 3A state championship game in school history after winning the program's second 3A Snake River Valley conference title. Saturday marked the first state final appearance since 1999, and 2018 was Homedale's seventh

season of 11 or more wins.

"We've talked about holding your pen and writing your story," Holtry told his players. "It's a (heck) of a chapter in your book, but it's just a chapter.

"You get to go out and write a lot more chapters in your life, and make sure that book is about a champion."

The coaches stressed that the pain of the loss would fade into a memory of a great season and a great family experience.

"I hope that, in life, you are better people because you've played in this football game,"

Holtry told the players.

"It's taken 10 years to get the program to this point," he said. "There's been a lot of work and sacrifice, but the reality is our eighth-graders were undefeated, our junior varsity was undefeated.

Bypass hearing is delayed until February

A long-awaited public hearing on the proposed U.S. 95 bypass of Homedale is stalled until February.

"I was hoping we could make it in December. We just can't do it," said Bob Elvin, project engineer with the Idaho Department of Transportation.

The \$1.27 million, .6-mile stretch of road, on the books for construction in fiscal year 1996, is opposed by Homedale business leaders, who cite the potential for economic loss.

Transportation officials scheduled an in-house design review of the project Nov. 24, with traffic and construction specialists meeting to go over plans.

"It's mainly to tune it up as far as the design work goes," District 3 engineer LeRoy Meyer said.

An environmental assessment on the bypass is due in December or January.

Complete construction plans, including right-ofway limits, road alignment and intersections, will be unveiled at a Homedale hearing.

Bids on the project will be open in early December. Completion of the building is scheduled for late summer 1994.

Steve Hutchinson, District 3 assistant operations engineer, said the current shop is outdated and too small for modern snowplowing equipment.

The DOT moved into the building in January of 1951.

Two missile sites put up for bids, one at Bruneau

The Auburn, Wash. Regional Office of General Services Administration announced this week that it is offering two parcels of real estate, one in Owyhee County, for sale.

The parcels are former Titan "I" Missile Site S-1 containing approximately 55 acres. Each missile site has reinforced concrete underground chambers and missile silos as well as surface improvements.

Site S-1 is located approximately 17 miles south of Bruneau in Owyhee County; Site S-3 is located approximately two miles southeast of Orchard in Ada County.

MHS boys return with all-league star back on stage

Thanks to a group of players with plenty of court time, expectations for Marsing High School's boys' basketball team are high for the 2018-19 sea-

Sixth-year head coach Tim Little, who is joined by assistants Luke Ankeny, Chad Hungate, Clint Thomas, and Daryl Lemos, believes the team is more balanced offensively than he has seen in the past.

"I will be able to change some things defensively thanks to an experienced core group," he said.

The team, which went 9-13 last year during the regular season and finished fifth in the 2A District III Tournament, starts the season Tuesday at home against Payette with a strong group of varsity players.

One of those returners is firstteam All-2A Western Idaho Conference standout Enrique Quebrado. The 5-foot, 7-inch senior, who enters his fourth season as a varsity starter, led the team last year in scoring with 16 points per game.

"Obviously, Enrique will be the focus for many teams we play," Little said. "However, we have a solid offensive group overall that can score, push the ball, rebound well and defend."

Besides Quebrado, the team returns a deep varsity group:

- Jacob Ankeny The 6-5 sophomore was the secondleading rebounder and led the team in blocks.
- Merrick Hall The 6-foot junior scored 7 points per game last year and pulled down 4 boards each night.
- Dwight Sevy The 5-9 senior scored 6 points per game and was second on the team in steals.
 - Joaquin Oliveros Lit-

tle says the 5-7 junior brings enthusiasm, positivity, and a team mindset.

There is also a group of new varsity players that Little expects big things from:

- Cash Sevy The 6-foot junior has a nose for the ball and makes positive things happen on the court. "He will have an impact within our rotation," Little said.
- **Heath Milburn** The 5-7 senior shoots the ball well and is extremely quick. "(He) will help us push the tempo this year with his speed," the coach said.
- Roger Valadez Little says the 5-8 sophomore is a solid defender and has good basketball sense.

Little believes that with his solid core, some pressure will be taken off Quebrado and allow the team to be multi-dimensional offensively.

"Our skills have improved overall as a team thanks to a challenging off-season and dedication to improve this fall," Little said.

He thinks the strengths of the team are its quickness. The Huskies should be able to go up-tempo, press a little and push the ball in transition.

There are opportunities for improvement, however.

"(We have to improve) our communication defensively, (be able) to fill roles that we need, and overcoming a mental block to finish close games," Little said.

The coach notes that in 13 games last season the margin was seven points or fewer with MHS losing nine of those games. Two of the nail-biters came in district play.

Additionally, eight games were decided by three points

"We won four of those," Little said. "The four we lost were all on the road."

Little sees a very competitive conference this season. He believes Cole Valley Christian, New Plymouth, and Mc-Call-Donnelly are the teams to beat.

"All three teams have a ton of size and talent," he said. "McCall may be the preseason favorite with two very skilled transfers this year, one of which is a 6-foot, 11-inch ju-

Little thinks that fans should have a lot to root for this year and should have expectations.

"(There will be) lots of heart, hustle, and discipline," he said. "We're looking to push the ball more, with discipline, and mixing things up defensively to keep teams off-balance."

Homedale councilman provides ATV issue context


The following is City Councilman Mike Aebischer's response to Gary Evans' letter to the editor ("Convenience of ATVs on city streets poses danger," Nov. 7)

Several citizens of Homedale had spoken to (Homedale Police Chief Jeff Eidemiller) and inquired about the use of ATVs on city streets. The subject of ATVs was discussed in Homedale City Council. I was elected to the city council to voice my opinions during our discussions. Before the city council votes on any policy changes affecting Homedale, we hold public hearings.

If an ordinance was approved to allow ATVs on city streets, all such vehicles would have to be licensed and insured and obey all traffic laws; the same as all other motor vehicles. There would not be an increase in police responsibilities as ATVs and all traffic vehicles would be under the same laws. Since ATVs are lighter than cars and trucks, there would be less wear and tear on the city streets, so there would not be an increase in taxes. Since all traffic laws would be enforced, drivers of ATVs must be of legal driving age, and speeding would be prohibited. All areas of Homedale would be monitored and policed in the same way that they are currently.

Both unmodified motorcycles and ATVs run about 90-99 decibels, but ATVs are safer to ride since they don't tip over. I was raised in a small town in Arizona where ATVs are used by citizens to get from Point A to Point B, and they don't create any more problems than any other mode of transportation. Get emergency fund in place then restart 401(k) savings

Dear Dave,

Should I stop making contributions to my 401(k) account for a year in order to save up an emergency fund? Thanks to you, I'm 33 and debt-free.

— Blake

Dear Blake,

Congratulations on being debt-free at such a young age! I appreciate the credit, but the truth is I just pointed you in the right direction. You made the sacrifices and did all the hard work. I'm really proud of you!

Yes, my advice is to temporarily stop making contributions to your 401(k) until you save up an emergency fund of three to six months of expenses. It shouldn't take a year, though, to set aside

an emergency fund if you're debt-free and making decent money at your job. Just make it part of your monthly budget plan, and get that emergency fund set up in a few months.

Here's the way I look at it. If you don't have an emergency fund, but you're contributing to a 401(k), there's a good chance you'll end up cashing out your 401(k) if something happens that leaves you with a large, unexpected bill. When you cash out a 401(k) early, you get hit with a penalty plus your tax rate. That's not a good plan!

And that's just one of the reasons I tell people to have an emergency fund in place before they start investing.

Dear Dave,

Are home warranties a waste of money if someone has been following your plan and already has six months of expenses set aside in an emergency fund, plus home insurance?

- Andrea

Dear Andrea,

Home warranties are a waste of money even if you don't have quite that much set aside in an emergency fund. I recommend an emergency fund of three to six months of expenses to cover the unexpected things that life will throw at you. This amount of cash, sitting in a good money market account with check-writing privileges, will give you easy access in the event of a financial emergency.

I don't recommend extended warranties of any kind. They're just not a good deal. You're better off to self-insure against things breaking down, and putting what would have been profit and marketing dollars for the extended warranty company in your own pocket!

Section 1: Amends Title 9 of the Owyhee County Code, adding a Table of Contents and Index, adding definitions of Residential Subdivision and Light Industrial, adding Light Industrial as an allowed use in Multi-Use Zones, changing Residential Subdivisions from a permitted use to an allowed use in the residential zone, and adding clarifying language to except residential subdivisions from districts R and M



Autumn Bennett led the Huskies with 12 points, four rebounds, and six steals. Sister Hailee added 11 points, six boards, and three steals.


Sevy was big on the boards again, pulling down eight, to go with her three points. Loucks was good for nine points and five steals.

New coach welcomes core players from football team

The Homedale High School boys' basketball team threatened to make some noise late last season.

Now, with a new coach who remembers how the team stepped up in the district tournament, the Trojans are ready to make waves from the first tip.

"Standouts for the year will be the entire varsity roster," first-year HHS coach Chris Vines said.

Homedale finished third in the 3A District III Tournament in February, shaking off a pair of blowout losses in the regular season to Fruitland to send the eventual state champion to the wall before losing, 48-43, in the district semifinals.

Vines envisions a deep roster despite the absence of forwards Scott Matlock and Robert Quijano on the inside this season.

But there could be an influx of talent from the junior varsity club. Vines said the five new additions were "on the bubble" to make the big club last season.

"All are ready to show what they are capable of," Vines said. "And coming off a successful football run, they are hungry to keep the success going on the court."

Homedale's participation in Saturday's 3A state championship game delayed the football athletes' attendance in basketball workouts.

The core of the seven varsity returners were wearing shoulder pads and helmets this fall, including guards Nelson Lomeli and Daniel Uranga, both juniors, and senior scorers Mason Kincheloe and Carson Brown

Two of the varsity newcomers also were big contributors to the football team.

Jake Collett is a 5-foot, 8-inch junior forward whose ball-hawking, hard-nosed grid iron attitude may show up on the hardwood.

"(Collett is) bringing toughness as an on-ball defenders and is a great rebounder for his size," Vines said.

Ricardo Hernandez, another All-3A Snake River Valley conference footballer, is a 5-6 junior who will play guard.

"He's a tough on-ball defender and a good decision-maker," Vines said.

Two 5-8 senior guards will see their first varsity season – Carlos Ibarra and Ismael Garcia. Vines says Ibarra has a knack for the three-pointer, just like Lomeli and Brown, and Garcia is known for his ability as decision-maker and

guarding opposing teams' ball handlers.

The 6-1 Brown could be the tallest player on the floor most of the time.

"A weakness this year will be size, for sure," Vines said. "But with the lack of size, our strength will be speed and depth from the bench."

A speedy guard himself, Vines is preparing boosters for an exciting floor show.

"Fans can be ready to see the game be played fast and loose," Vines said.

"A lot of what I am trying to do is allow us to have our defense lead to offense and out-run teams."

The biggest play of the last-gasp drive was a 25-yard slant pass to Deal. But four plays later, Sugar-Salem's Westin Bratt stopped Kincheloe short of the goal line to end the threat.

Homedale (11-1) earned the first 3A runner-up trophy in school history, and the first second-place finish in the state playoffs since 1999.

The Diggers (10-1) won their 10th consecutive victory to win the school's first state

title in 30 years.

Sugar-Salem used its size up front and sheer advantage in numbers to wear down a Homedale team that had won 11 straight games to garner the top ranking among Idaho's Class 3A teams.

"Their linebackers are the best we've seen all year," Holtry said. "They did a good job of limiting us, but I think the offensive line did a good job, a solid job, of opening holes."

When Jake Collett picked off a tipped Tanner Harris pass deep in Homedale territory to end the first drive, the Trojans looked poised to control Saturday's title game just as they had controlled every other contest this season.

Uranga engineered a drive that featured Homedale sandwiching huge chunks of yardage between Kincheloe's short, punishing runs.

Collett had two of the biggest plays on the Trojans' first possession, tearing off a 14-yard run to get into Diggers' territory then setting up the team at the Sugar-Salem 16 with a 14-yard reception.

Uranga barreled and dived to

the 1-yard line for another first down before Kincheloe blasted in for the game's first score.

Sugar-Salem tied the game with a nearly seven-minute drive that showed glimpses of what was to come. Harris nestled behind his big offensive line to gobble more than half of the 65 yards of a march that ended with Kyle Ostermiller's 2-yard run.

Homedale cashed in another turnover to take a 14-7 lead when senior receiver Carson Brown made a leaping grab of Uranga's pass over Diggers' defensive back Hadley

Brown played hurt for most of the game after being hobbled during one of several gang tackles from Sugar-Salem's swarming defense.

Visibly slowed by his injuries, Brown muffed a punt after calling for a fair catch of Miller's booming kick near the end of the fourth quarter. Two plays later, Hayden Crapo scored on a 5-yard run for a 23-14 Sugar-Salem lead.

Brown caught a two-point conversion to get Homedale to within eight points, 30-22, after Kincheloe's 5-yard TD

run with 4 minutes, 32 seconds left in the game.

"That guy's a warrior," Holtry said of Brown. "We ask him to do a lot.

"He's one of the best wide receivers I've ever coached."

Sugar-Salem scored its final touchdown when Grady Rasmussen returned Drew Deal's fumble five yards for the Diggers' second defensive score. Deal had flashed around end to take a hand-off from Uranga in preparation for what appeared to be an option

The north end zone wasn't kind to Homedale earlier in the game either.

With the first half winding down, the Trojans stopped Miller at the 1-yard line on a fourth-and-goal play. But Sugar-Salem still got points out of the sequence because with 11 seconds left, Uranga fumbled the snap after he tripped over a lineman's foot while trying to get out from under the shadow of his goalpost. Spencer Fisher fell on the loose ball, but was tackled in the end zone for a safety.

Trailing 14-9 at the break, Sugar-Salem tried to keep the pressure on and recovered an onside kick to start the second half.

Homedale stopped the threat, but gave the ball back four plays later when a fourth-down try at the Trojans' 28 didn't pan out.

Three plays later, Harris lofted a 27-yard pass to Gerohm Rihari to give the Diggers the lead for good, 16-14.

"We made some mistakes, but you know we capitalized on some of theirs, too," Holtry said.

"In championship games, it comes down to whoever makes fewer mistakes."


Each team committed five turnovers in the championship game, and the miscues came at times to provided wild swings of enthusiasm if not momentum.

Brown's 7-yard TD reception for a 14-7 Homedale advantage followed Brady Trout's fumble recovery when the Sugar-Salem return man muffed Nelson Lomeli's punt.

"Their depth got to us down the stretch," Holtry said, "but I can't be more proud about how our guys showed grit and finished the game."
